

DUE TO SECURITY CONCERNS, AND FOR YOUR SAFETY, vehicles coming to the fair will be subject to inspection. In addition, we ask exhibitors to work with us to maintain a safe and secure environment for all our guests. **SEE MAP BELOW.**

- Beginning August 6, vehicles will be required to enter the grounds at Gate 1 (north Underwood gate, with access off Larpenteur Avenue) or at Gate 14 (Canfield gate, with access off Como Avenue).
 Individual vehicle inspections may occur at these locations.
 (The main gate off Snelling Avenue (Gate 5) and the South Underwood gate (Gate 7) will be closed.)
- Beginning August 16, we recommend Ag-Hort exhibitors delivering exhibits to use Gate 7 to avoid livestock traffic that will be entering and exiting Gate 14.
- If using Gate 1, follow Underwood Street. If using Gate 14, follow Canfield to Judson Avenue. The Ag-Hort building is on the northeast corner of Underwood and Judson.
- After dropping off entries, follow Judson east to Cosgrove Street. Take Cosgrove north several blocks to Randall Avenue, and turn left. Remain on Randall for two blocks. Turn right on Underwood, and exit the fairgrounds onto Larpenteur.



Please note the above only pertains to the pre-fair delivery of entries. See below for information on delivery and pick-up during the fair. After the fair is over, Gate 5 (the main gate off Snelling Avenue) and the Gate 7 (south Underwood gate, with access off Como Avenue) will re-open for the return of entries. **See map on previous page.**

NOTE: Competitive exhibitors may purchase gate admission tickets prior to the fair's opening, August 23, 2007, at an advance sale rate of \$8.00 each. No advance tickets will be available after 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 22, 2007. Upon leaving the grounds, fairgoers may ask for a pass-out privilege. This will allow them to re-enter the grounds until 10:30 p.m. that day without paying admission.

MINNESOTA STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Rules governing the management and control of the Minnesota State Fairgrounds and the Minnesota State Fair.

CHAPTER ONE - GENERAL

1.01 Authority

These rules are promulgated pursuant to authority granted the Minnesota State Agricultural Society by Minn. Stat. § 37.16. The Minnesota State Agricultural Society is not an agency of statewide jurisdiction, therefore, rules adopted by the Minnesota State Agricultural Society have not been promulgated pursuant to Minn. Stat. Ch. 14 and will not be found in the bound volume of Minnesota rules.

1.02 Definitions

For purposes of these rules, the following definitions shall apply:

- **A.** Board of managers: The board of managers is responsible for management and control of the Minnesota State Agricultural Society including the annual election of its secretary.
- **B.** Commercial space: Those areas and locations on the State Fairgrounds designated by the Society to be used for commercial exhibits and concessions.
- C. Commercial space committee: The committee of three or more members of the board of managers, designated by the president of the Society, empowered to examine Society commercial space policies and the actions of the commercial space division and make recommendations thereon to the board of managers.
- **D.** Competitive exhibitor: Any person or firm which enters animals or articles for competitive exhibition at the State Fair.
- **E.** Delegate: That employee of the Society given authority by the secretary to act on the secretary's behalf in the instance specified.
- F. Department superintendent: That delegate of the secretary who is head of a specific Society department.
- G. Director: That delegate of the secretary who is head of a specific Society division.
- H. License: An agreement whereby the Society grants to an entity the privilege to exhibit, disseminate information, sell, make deliveries of or accept deposits for future deliveries of goods, services, or information on or from an assigned State Fairgrounds commercial space during the period of the State Fair. Licenses will be granted in accordance with the Society's commercial space policy and rules, upon timely and proper application and showing of qualification, and if commercial space is available.
- Minnesota State Agricultural Society (Society): The public corporation and department of state charged with the responsibility for management and control of the State Fairgrounds and conducting the State Fair and other exhibitions on the State Fairgrounds.
- J. Personal property: All privately owned buildings, tents, booths, structures, improvements, business equipment, fixtures or other enclosures, whether portable or permanently affixed to State Fairgrounds property are personal property. A private party is precluded from holding any interest in real property on the State Fairgrounds.
- **K.** Secretary: The secretary of the Minnesota State Agricultural Society is also the executive vice president.
- L. State Fair: An annual exhibition conducted by the Society on the State Fairgrounds.
- M. State Fairgrounds: That certain area of land in Ramsey County, Minnesota defined and described in Minn. Stat. 37.01 and other real estate parcels as recorded with Ramsey County Register of Deeds, including the area outside as well as inside the fenced portion thereof.

1.03 All pay gates

Entry into the State Fair shall be solely contingent upon the presentation and surrender of a valid ticket of admission in accordance with the most current schedule of gate prices as established by the board of managers. Only properly identified emergency personnel, such as police, fire and ambulance, as well as properly identified Society service personnel, shall be exempted from this rule when engaged in legitimate emergency or service duty which requires passage through State Fairgrounds admission gates.

1.04 Gate controls

Admission gates and exhibit buildings of the State Fair will be open to visitors on days and during operating hours as set by the board of managers. Persons not involved in the preparation or teardown of exhibits for the State Fair may be prohibited from entering the State Fairgrounds during the preparation and teardown period. Gate admission fees will be charged during nighttime (non-operating) hours with the same fee schedule in effect as during day time (operating) hours. Persons entering the State Fairgrounds during non-operating hours, in addition to paying established gate fees, will be required to provide proof of their having business on the State Fairgrounds during said non-operating periods. License holders and their employees needing to enter or remain on the State Fairgrounds during the overnight period must first obtain an overnight badge from the appropriate Society department superintendent or division director. No badge will be issued without proper identification.

1.05 Pass-out gates

A pass-out system is operated during the State Fair at admission gates. Persons exiting through these gates may, upon request, obtain proper credentials for readmittance to the State Fairgrounds without additional charge. Readmittance will be honored the day of issuance only.

1.06 Admission prices

The board of managers shall annually review and establish gate admission prices for persons and vehicles including specific fee exemptions and discounts.

1.07 Vehicle restrictions

Maximum vehicle speed limits on the State Fairgrounds, as well as appropriate allowances and restrictions dealing with unnecessary acceleration, vehicle parking, delivery hours, restricted areas, tow-away zones and impound arrangements, shall be established by the secretary or delegate. The secretary or delegate shall provide for the placement of such traffic control signals, signs, and other traffic control devices on the State Fairgrounds as deemed necessary for the safety, protection and control of the State Fairgrounds and the people thereon. When any police officer or security person finds a vehicle illegally parked on the State Fairgrounds, they are authorized to issue a citation, or provide for the removal and impoundment of such vehicle, or both. Cost of removal and storage shall be borne by the vehicle's owner.

1.08 Pedestrian right-of-way

When walking on or about any street, sidewalk or other area generally open to the public on the State Fairgrounds, pedestrians shall at all times have the right-of-way as against all vehicles, other than identified emergency vehicles. Drivers of all vehicles, other than identified emergency vehicles, shall yield the right-of-way to any and all pedestrians on the State Fairgrounds.

1.09 Two-wheeled and track-vehicles

Two-wheeled vehicles, such as bicycles, motorcycles and motor scooters, will not be allowed on the State Fairgrounds during the State Fair unless such two-wheeled vehicles are on display in a commercial space licensed by the Society and, in such case, said two-wheeled vehicles must be kept in the assigned commercial space and may not, under any circumstances, be operated on the streets of the State Fairgrounds. Electric personal assistive mobility devices may be used on the State Fairgrounds by person that are physically challenged. Track-type vehicles, including snowmobiles, may not be operated anywhere on the State Fairgrounds at any time of the year without the express authorization and approval of the secretary or delegate.

1.10 Bannering, picketing, interfering

No person or group of persons shall banner, picket, march, protest, demonstrate or caucus on the State Fairgrounds before or during the State Fair in any manner that interferes with the convenience and safety of any State Fair patron, exhibitor or employee.

1.11 Handing out materials

The sale, posting or distribution of any merchandise, products, promotional items and printed or written material except from a fixed location on the State Fairgrounds approved by the secretary or delegate shall be prohibited.

1.12 Advertising vehicles

The operation or parking of any sound truck or vehicle upon which advertising signs, political or otherwise, have been affixed in any manner shall be prohibited anywhere on the State Fairgrounds. This rule is not applicable to a lettered service vehicle advertising a firm or its products while making deliveries or to the normal advertising on bumpers and windows of motor vehicles.

1.13 Conflict of interest

No manager, officer or employee of the Society shall:

- A. Enter into a contract with the Society.
- B. Have or acquire any financial interest, whether direct or indirect, in any contract between the Society and any license holder, performer, vendor or contractor.
- C. Engage or participate in personal business or financial transactions that conflict with the interest of the Society or their obligations and interests as a member of the board of managers, officer or employee of the Society.
- D. Be entitled to any special consideration involving the storage of vehicles and materials on the State Fairgrounds or the use of Society buildings, machinery, or equipment, except as may be specifically approved by the board of managers.
- E. Be allowed to purchase any material for their personal use through the name, credit or account of the Society.

1.14 Use of vehicles by Society employees

All vehicles used by managers, officers or employees of the Society in connection with Society business shall:

- A. Be the property of the manager, officer or employee, with the Society to have no interest or obligation except as authorized by the board of managers and stated in the Society bulletin covering expense reimbursement; or
- B. Be used by the Society as part of a service contract, through rental or on a courtesy basis; or
- C. Be the sole property of the Society to be used only on Society business.

No vehicle shall be rented by the Society from any Society manager, officer or employee.

1.15 Equal employment opportunities

The following policies concerning fair and equal employment shall be followed by the Society:

- A. It shall be the policy of the Society to foster the employment of all individuals with the Society in accordance with their fullest capacity and ability, regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national origin, marital or veteran status or status with regard to public assistance or disability, and to safeguard their right to hold employment with the Society without discrimination; and
- B. Every contract for or on behalf of the Society for materials, supplies, construction or licenses may be cancelled or terminated by the Society when discrimination on account of race, color, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national origin, marital or veteran status or status with regard to public assistance or disability, exists in the hiring or employment of common or skilled labor by the contractor pursuant to the contract for or on behalf of the Society.

1.16 Acceptance of gift

No manager, officer or employee of the Society shall accept from a person or company that does business with the Society, any gift, gratuity, cash, merchandise or thing of value. This prohibition shall extend to the acceptance of food or beverage or merchandise at less than full retail price from a license holder during the State Fair.

1.17 Hiring of relatives

No relative of a Society employee or a relative of a member of the board of managers shall be given preferential treatment in being hired or promoted. Relatives may be precluded from working in the same Society department.

1.18 Dogs

During the period of the annual State Fair, no dogs or other pets shall be allowed on the State Fairgrounds. There are two exceptions:

- (1) Certified Service animals or service animals in training.
- (2) Dogs or other pets may be allowed when part of an exhibition or demonstration authorized by the secretary or delegate. No other exceptions will be allowed during the period of the State Fair.

During the non-fair period, no dogs or other pets shall be allowed in State Fair buildings, unless part of an exhibition or demonstration authorized by the secretary or delegate. No dogs or other pets may be allowed on the State Fairgrounds at any time unless confined or restrained on a leash of less than six feet in length. During fair and non-fair periods, society personnel are empowered to order the removal from the State Fair any dog or pet in violation of the above, or found to be disturbing or endangering the public. During the non-fair periods.

There is one exception:

(1) Certified Service animals or service animals in training.

1.19 Roller skates, in-line skates and skateboards

Use of roller skates or in-line skates shall not be permitted on the State Fairgrounds during the State Fair except as authorized in an agreement executed by the secretary or delegate. Use of skateboards shall not be permitted on the State Fairgrounds at any time except as authorized in an agreement executed by the secretary or delegate.

1.20 Practice driving

The State Fairgrounds may not be used by any person, organization or firm to conduct lessons for or to practice driving automobiles or other motor vehicles, unless such activity is covered under an agreement executed by the secretary or delegate.

1.21 Use of metal detectors

The use of metal detectors or similar devices shall be prohibited on the State Fairgrounds. Any activity of discovery, whether undertaken with or without a detection device, which results in digging, probing or otherwise disturbing the ground, shall be prohibited on the State Fairgrounds. This rule shall neither limit nor prohibit activities or the use of detection devices as may be directed by the secretary or delegate in the legitimate conduct of Society work.

CHAPTER THREE - COMPETITIVE EXHIBITS

3.01 Competitive exhibition times

Times for the setup of State Fair competitive exhibits, the dismantling and removal of exhibits and the hours of public viewing will be set annually by the secretary or delegate and will be stated in individual department premium books.

3.02 Responsibility for competitive exhibits

The Society will use diligence to protect livestock and articles entered for exhibition, after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to or caused by any animal or article on exhibition. It is the responsibility of the competitive exhibitor to obtain appropriate insurance for any damages due to or caused by the exhibit and to indemnify and hold the Society harmless against any claim arising out of incidents involving the exhibit. Removal or pickup of exhibits at established times as stated in individual department premium books, entry blanks or entry receipts, shall be the responsibility of the competitive exhibitor. The Society shall not be responsible for any exhibit not removed or picked up at established time and the secretary or delegate will dispose of all exhibits not removed or picked up within one year of such established time.

3.03 Board of Animal Health

The exhibition of livestock on the State Fairgrounds shall be under the supervision of the Minnesota Board of Animal Health and its applicable rules and regulations will be complied with in full. Health requirements for individual departments will be set forth in their respective premium books.

3.04 General competitive entry requirements

Competitive exhibitors must file proper entry blanks with any applicable fees prior to the designated closing date for entries. The Society reserves the right to refuse entries or prohibit the exhibition of animals or articles entered if the showing of such animals or articles is contrary to law, or violative of the Society's interest in providing for the health, safety and protection of its patrons. Exhibits entered in the wrong lot or category may be transferred prior to judging at the discretion of the department superintendent to the proper lot or category of competition. Deception of any type by an exhibitor, as determined by the department superintendent will ban the exhibitor from any further competition and result in the forfeiture of all premiums. Mechanical or artistic articles must be entered in the name of the artist, inventor, manufacturer or maker. No Society employee or department superintendent, or member of their family, shall be permitted, directly or indirectly, to make a competitive entry in any department over which that person has supervisory responsibility or in which that person is employed. No society officer or member of the Board of Managers, or member of their family, shall be permitted to make a competitive entry of any type in any department.

3.05 Animal competitive entry requirements

When animals are entered for State Fair competition by an entity other than an individual, that entity (whether a corporation, partnership, breeding establishment or other) must have been in existence as of the closing date of entries. Appropriate documentation showing the status of the entity must be available for inspection by the department superintendent. All animals entered under a breed classification must be recorded in a breeding association recognized as representative of the particular breed. The competitive exhibitor must produce a certificate of registry at the request of the department superintendent. All animals shown must be owned by the competitive exhibitor from the time of making entry, except as otherwise provided in special rules of the department.

3.06 Judges

Competent and qualified persons will be employed as judges by the Society to evaluate all competitive exhibits. Judges shall be responsible for reading and understanding the general rules and all special rules applicable to the department or class in which they are to serve. No person who is a competitive exhibitor may act as judge in a class in which they are competing.

3.07 Interference with judging

Judges shall report to the department superintendent any competitive exhibitor who in any way, whether in person or by agent or employee, interferes with them or shows any disrespect to them during the judging. The department superintendent may exclude any such competitive exhibitor from further competition. The secretary may withhold from such competitive exhibitor any or all premiums that have been awarded and may also exclude such competitive exhibitor from further competition at the State Fair.

3.08 Award books

Judges and persons acting as clerks to the judges must use special care to record the proper names in the award books after awards have been made. The judge, competitive department superintendent in charge and clerk recording the awards of the department must sign the award book at the close of each class immediately after all awards in such class have been made.

3.09 Qualification of entries.

If there is any question as to the regularity of an entry or the right of any animal or article to compete in any lot or category, the judge or judges shall report same to the competitive department superintendent in charge for adjustment. Judges shall place a reserve award in each lot. Should any animal or article awarded a prize be disqualified, the animal or article awarded the next lower prize shall graduate into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judge, it is worthy of such prize. Judges must not award a prize to an unworthy exhibit. No premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving.

3.10 Finality of decisions.

In judging livestock, the decision of the official State Fair veterinarian and judge as to soundness shall be final. The decision of the judge shall be final in all cases, except when mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not known at the time of the award, is discovered. In such cases, the secretary shall take appropriate action or refer the matter to the board of managers.

3.11 Interpretation of rules.

A faithful observance of all rules governing the exhibit will be required, and when in doubt as to the application or meaning of a rule, the competitive department superintendent in charge shall interpret such a rule. This interpretation when requested by either a competitive exhibitor or judge must be reduced to writing and returned to the secretary or delegate with the award books.

3.12 Protests.

A protest from the decision of a judge will only be accepted from a competitive exhibitor named in the official judge's sheet for competition in the lot or class under protest, and must be filed with the secretary within five hours after the award has been made. An award is deemed to have been made when the notation of the decision of the judge is entered into the department award book. All protests must be made in writing and must be accompanied by a deposit of one hundred dollars. The protest must state plainly and specifically the facts upon which the complaint or appeal is based. The right to appeal will lie only when it is charged that the award has been made in violation of the rules governing the exhibit, or when it is charged that the decision of the judge has been influenced or interfered with by another person. No protest or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent or have over-looked an animal or article will be considered. The one hundred dollar deposit will be returned only if the protest or appeal is upheld. In protest and appeal instances where rules established by a breed association or other competitive organization with which the Society has an agreement differ from this rule, rules of the association or organization shall govern.

3.13 Late showing of exhibit.

No animal or exhibit will be judged or awarded a prize if it is not ready for judging and promptly brought into the show ring when the lot is called.

3.14 Premium money.

Cash premiums awarded will be paid by check made out to the competitive exhibitor and mailed to the post office address as stated on the entry blank. Competitive exhibitors may forfeit all premium money if exhibits are removed from the grounds prior to the official time of release. The board of managers reserves the right to make reductions in premiums if the financial conditions of the Society make such reductions necessary.

DIVISION RULES

- 1. ENTRY INFORMATION (ADVANCE ENTRY REQUIRED). All entry forms must be either postmarked with official USPS postmark, or submitted on-line by Wednesday, August 8. Only pre-registered entries will be accepted. There is no fee for entering. Late entries may be accepted at the discretion of the Competition Department and the Division Superintendent.
 - A. ON-LINE REGISTRATION. Begins May 1; <u>closes</u> Wednesday <u>August 8</u>. The entire process must be completed by midnight, or your entries will not be registered. Tags will be mailed to you or will be available when your trees are delivered. Follow the procedure below:
 - 1) Visit the Minnesota State Fair web site at www.mnstatefair.org.
 - 2) Click on "Competition" and select the link for "Ag-Hort-Bee". Follow the instructions to add the lots you intend to enter. After entering your contact information, click "submit" to continue the process.
 - When the summary page appears, review your selected lots, and be sure to click "confirm registration" to finalize your on-line registration.
 - 4) You will receive an e-mail confirmation of your entries. Print a copy of your registration confirmation. If you do not receive confirmation within 24 hours, please call 651-288-4417 to confirm.
 - 5) Exhibitors must bring their registration confirmation with their entry.
 - **B. MANUAL REGISTRATION.** Completed registrations may mailed or brought in to the Competition Office on or before the entry deadline (4:30 p.m. Wednesday, August 8). Official printed entry forms may be obtained from the Competition Department (telephone 651-288-4417 or e-mail competition@mnstatefair.org or download from www.mnstatefair.org web site).
- 2. Only persons growing Christmas trees are eligible to exhibit in classes 1-7. Class 8 is open to anyone.
- 3. No exhibitor shall make more than one entry in a single lot, either in their own name, the name of the farm or company, or in the name of some other person. No individual may exhibit more than ten (10) trees in classes 1-7 (lots 1-21). Only registered trees will be eligible for exhibit. Requests to switch lots after registration has closed may be accepted at the discretion of the Competition Office and the Division Superintendent
- **4.** Entries are to be brought to the State Fairgrounds Ag-Hort Building on Sunday, August 20, between 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Access to the grounds should be at the South Underwood gate (Gate 7).
- 5. All Christmas trees must have been grown in Minnesota.
- 6. Judging shall take place on Monday, August 20, 2007 and shall be done by a panel of qualified judges, according to the scorecards listed in these rules. Judges shall place only those entries worthy of an award. The decision of the judges is final.
- 7. The State Fair is NOT obligated to display all entries submitted. Every effort shall be made to display all entries submitted according to space available. At least one entry per exhibitor shall be displayed.
- 8. Trees shall be placed in water holding stands provided by the State Fair. The stand will not be considered by the judges.
- 9. Artificial coloring is prohibited in all classes except 8.
- 10. All trees shall be cut from their roots.
- 11. The height of the tree shall be measured from the butt of the trunk to the tip of the leader. The width of the tree shall be measured from branch tip to branch tip at the widest part of the tree.
- 12. Wreaths must be made on a 12" ring of natural conifer greens.

If you are interested in baking and cooking with honey or if you are an experienced or amateur producer of honey and beeswax, you are invited to exhibit your products in the Honey Show.

DIVISION RULES

- 1. ENTRY INFORMATION (ADVANCE ENTRY REQUIRED). All entry forms must be either postmarked with official USPS postmark or submitted on-line by Monday, August 13. Only pre-registered entries will be accepted. There is no fee for entering. Late entries may be accepted at the discretion of the Competition Department and the Division Superintendent.
 - A. ON-LINE REGISTRATION. Begins May 1; <u>closes Monday</u>, <u>August 13</u>. The entire process must be completed by midnight, or your entries will not be registered. Tags will be mailed to you or will be available when your entries are delivered. Follow the procedure below:
 - 1) Visit the Minnesota State Fair web site at www.mnstatefair.org.
 - 2) Click on "Competition" and select the link for "Ag-Hort-Bee". Follow the instructions to add the lots you intend to enter. After entering your contact information, click "submit" to continue the process.
 - 3) When the summary page appears, review your selected lots, and be sure to click "confirm registration" to finalize your on-line registration.
 - 4) You will receive an e-mail confirmation of your entries. Print a copy of your registration confirmation. If you do not receive confirmation within 24 hours, please call 651-288-4417 to confirm.
 - 5) Exhibitors must bring their registration confirmation with their entry.
 - **B. MANUAL REGISTRATION.** Completed registrations may mailed or brought in to the Competition Office on or before the entry deadline, 4:30 p.m., Monday, August 13. Official printed entry forms may be obtained from the Competition Department (telephone 651-288-4417 or e-mail competition@mnstatefair.org or download from www.mnstatefair.org web site).
- 2. Delivery of exhibits: The Honey Showroom will be open to accept entries from 3:00 p.m. 5:00 p.m. Sunday, August 19 and from 9:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, August 20 and 21. Foods must be entered by 1:00 p.m Tuesday, August 21.
- 3. Exhibitors must be bona fide residents of Minnesota. Each exhibitor will be permitted only one entry in a lot. Only one member from any family or household may make entry in any lot, except in the Junior Division
- 4. All entries in this Division must be produced or originate within the state limits of Minnesota, except in lots 19 and 20 in Class 97. Honey products in lots 21 through 23 (Class 97) need not be the product of the exhibitor.
- 5. Judging: Based on the score criteria shown after each lot or group of related lots. Results of judging and scorecard information will not be given on the telephone during the Honey Show. List of winners will be available on the Minnesota State Fair web site: www.mnstatefair.org.
- **6.** Failure to conform to any part of the class or lot description, including containers, shall be reason for disqualification of the entry.
- 7. Decisions of the judges shall be final unless an obvious error is discovered. Any protest of placement results must be filed with the Competition Department as per S.F. Rule 3.12. Judges may withhold an award or ribbon when the entries fail to meet the quality standards of the show.
- 8. The Superintendent reserves the right to remove from the show, at any time, any exhibit which has become unsightly.

CLASS 101 - CROP ART AND ARRANGEMENTS

- 1. Open to any resident of Minnesota, except lots 21 and 22.
- 2. Limited to one entry per individual per lot. One member only from a family or household may make entry in any lot except in junior lots (18, 19 and 22) which are limited to one exhibit per individual in each lot.
- 3. Completed entry form must be received by 4:30 p.m., Friday, August 10. Exhibits must be delivered between the hours of 11:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday, August 20, to the Superintendent, Farm Crops Division, in the Ag-Hort Building. Exhibits must be delivered prepaid. Judged Tuesday, August 21.
- **4.** Exhibits in this class will be released between 8:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m. on Labor Day. Arrangements for later pickup must be made with the Competition Department at 651-288-4417.
- 5. The exhibit must be the work of the exhibitor. No kits shall be used.
- **6.** Name and address <u>must</u> be placed on back of exhibit <u>and</u> must be covered by paper to prevent accidental identification while being judged.
- 7. Any exhibit which does not conform with requirements or which has plant parts or kinds, or products, which are not in compliance with the rules of this class, will be disqualified or discounted by the Superintendent in advance of the judging of the exhibits. Reason(s) for disqualification will be noted on the exhibitor tag.
- 8. Repeated showing of the same exhibit is discouraged and shall place lower than a new exhibit of equal quality. Exhibits will be dated on the back with UV reflective ink. This will be invisible and not harm the exhibit.
- **9.** The management of the Minnesota State Fair reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto.
- 10. The fair management will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss or damage done to any article on exhibition and the exhibitor shall indemnity the fair and the management thereof, against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.
- 11. Definition of Exhibitors:
 - A. Advanced Exhibitor. All exhibitors who have won a total of four or more first place premiums in the Crop Art Class during the last four years or won the Sweepstakes award for lots 1-16.
 - B. Amateur Exhibitor. All other exhibitors in lots 1-16 shall be designated Amateur Exhibitors.
- 12. Materials. Only the following materials may be used:

- A. Seeds, stems, heads or panicles, and fruiting bodies or structures of oats, wheat, barley, flax, rye, corn, soybeans, navy and field beans, pinto beans, sunflowers, common buckwheat, field peas, millets, safflower, sorghum, sugar beet, sudan grass, common forage grasses (timothy, bluegrass, bromegrass and wild grasses, etc.), clovers, alfalfa, and wild rice. Crop plants shall be those specimens grown in Minnesota. Superintendent shall be the final authority regarding crops grown in Minnesota.
- B. Seeds and dried fruiting structures only of any horticultural crop (vegetable and flower plants) which is suited or adapted for Minnesota are allowed in all lots. Forest, trees or shrub plant parts are allowed in lots 9-16 only. Weed seeds or plants are not permitted in any lot.
- C. Manufactured products of any of the above not to exceed 20 percent of the area of the artistic work.
- **D.** Permission to use materials other than the above must be obtained from the Superintendent.
- **E.** The use of plant parts or seeds other than those enumerated or specifically approved by the Superintendent will disqualify the exhibit.
- **F.** Backgrounds: Suitable backgrounds may be plywood, masonite, canvas board, heavy map board, paneling, burlap (colored), linen, and suitable other fabric. There may be other suitable background materials. Such backgrounds may not be painted in lots 1 and 2.
- G. Framing; see specific lot. When required to be framed, exhibit must be so framed. Suitable edging of seeds permitted in lieu of metal, wooden, or synthetic frames. Selection of frames should be such as to blend with the work involved.
- H. In lots 3, 4, 7 and 8, as indicated, 70% of the exposed area must be covered with seeds or plant parts. In lots 1 and 2, the background should be covered using seed.
- **13. Legend Cards.** Exhibitor is required to list by name all items used on 4" x 6" card(s) with each exhibit and to tape on the legend card a few specimens of the seeds used, of manufactured materials used, but need not provide a specimen of plant materials used due to difficulty of showing such materials on a 4" x 6" card. Typing of the list will be preferred. Failure to provide a list will result in a 5 point penalty.
- **14.** In lots 1, 2, 7, 8, 9 and 10, all materials used shall be shown in their natural color (not dyed or otherwise colored). In lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 & 16 it is optional whether the seed, stems, etc. are natural, dyed or otherwise colored.
- **15.** Hanging or standing exhibits are permitted. With hanging exhibits, the exhibitor must fit the exhibit with hanging hooks and wire adequate to support the work when hung.
- **16.** Maximum dimensions: 24" x 40", 30" in diameter.

APPROVED SEED CLEANING PLANT CONTEST

One sample of any one variety from any one grower, can be submitted by the approved plant. (See special rules, Class 105).

ENTRIES WILL CLOSE AUGUST 10 AND DELIVERY MUST BE MADE BY 12:00 NOON, WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 15.

Entries in the Utility Certified Seed Class will be considered for this event and the samples submitted will be entered in the name of the grower in the regular competition. The records available in the M.C.I.A. seed laboratory will determine where each entry was cleaned.

Three district awards are being provided, namely, Northwest District, Southwest District and Southeast District. Each District Champion will be awarded a plaque based on a system of points superimposed upon the awards attained on the individual growers exhibits that were cleaned by the approved plant. The approved seed cleaning plants have all been notified of their district assignments. A minimum of three approved plants must be competing in each district to be eligible for consideration of the champion award.

A point system will be applied to the placing of each entry (except lot 277) of lots in Class 105 as follows, 1st place, 25 points; 2nd place, 20 points; 3rd place, 15 points; 4th place, 10 points; 5th place, 5 points; and all subsequent placings, 1 point each. In event of a tie, the approved plant which accumulates the highest total of first placings, or championship placing entry or entries, will receive 5 additional points to break the tie.

AWARDS

A champion award will be made to the approved plant amassing the highest total points in each district. Permanent possession plaques will be awarded jointly by the Minnesota State Fair and the Minnesota Crop Improvement Association.

CORN

Exhibitors will enter and show only in the zone in which they reside. Amateur and Professional designations will continue as in the past. An exception to this rule will be the "SEED EARS" class which will continue on a statewide basis and open to showing in any maturity zone, all hybrid seed growers competing together (same as in the past).

The exhibitor may enter and show up to three varieties in each of the maturity zones. There being five maturity zones and three per zone permitted, an exhibitor may show a total of 15 different varieties. Only 10 ear exhibits will be shown (no 20 ear exhibits). The exhibitor is responsible for entering the hybrid in the proper maturity lot but if errors are made the Superintendent and Assistants will change the entry to the proper maturity lot, still allowing only three total entries per lot.

1. Entry Requirements:

- A. Old Corn: Entries on paper must be made by Friday, August 10, 4:30 p.m.
- **B.** New Corn: Entries must be made by Thursday, August 30, 10:00 a.m. at time of delivery of exhibits of new corn.

2. Delivery of Exhibits:

- A. Old Corn: Exhibits must be delivered by 12:00 noon, Wednesday, August 15. Exhibits will be accepted starting August 14.
- B. New Corn: Exhibits may be delivered prior to 10:00 a.m., Thursday, August 30. Exhibits should come in the South Underwood gate. (Gate 7) Call the Competition Office (651-288-4417) to receive a dated Ag-Hort vehicle sticker which is needed for access to Gate 7 and to the Ag-Hort parking lot. Mailed exhibits are to be delivered to the Farm Crops Division, c/o Steve Pooch, Minnesota State Fair, 1265 Snelling Ave. N., St. Paul, MN 55108, prepaid.
- 3. For the corn classification the state has been divided into five zones as follows: Southern, South Central, Central, North Central, and Northern.

Southern Zone: Counties of Blue Earth, Brown, Cottonwood, Faribault, Fillmore, Freeborn, Houston, Jackson, LeSueur, Martin, Mower, Murray, Nicollet, Nobles, Redwood, Rice, Rock, Sibley, Steele, Waseca, Watonwan, Winona.

South Central Zone: Counties of Carver, Chippewa, Dakota, Dodge, Goodhue, Hennepin, Kandiyohi, Lac Qui Parle, Lincoln, Lyon, McLeod, Meeker, Olmsted, Pipestone, Ramsey, Renville, Scott, Swift, Wabasha, Washington, Wright, Yellow Medicine.

Central Zone: Counties of Anoka, Big Stone, Benton, Chisago, Douglas, Grant, Isanti, Mille Lacs, Morrison, Ottertail, Pope, Sherburne, Stearns, Stevens, Todd, Traverse, Wilkin.

North Central Zone: Counties of Becker, Clay, Crow Wing, Kanabec, Pine, Wadena.

Northern Zone: Counties of Aitkin, Beltrami, Carlton, Cass, Clearwater, Cook, Itasca, Hubbard, Kittson, Koochiching, Lake of the Woods, Mahnomen, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk,

- **4.** All exhibits of corn entered and shown must have been grown in Minnesota by the exhibitor. Any irregularities in adhering to this ruling will disbar all entries made by the exhibitor.
- 5. Old corn shall be grown the year just previous to the year for which this premium list is issued.
- 6. No person will be permitted to enter more than one sample of any one variety in each lot. Nor can two persons in the same family enter samples in the same lot except when such persons may be farming independently and separately from each other.
- 7. All corn varieties must be properly entered and shown in the zone designations as registered with the State of Minnesota. The exhibitor must name the hybrid and maturity rating on the entry form at the time of making entry. Failure to label as to variety and maturity will disqualify the entry.
- 8. The maturity rating of any hybrid shall be that maturity used in the official registration to permit the sale of said hybrid with the State of Minnesota, as required by existing laws. Each exhibit must be entered and shown in the proper zone to be eligible for an award.

CLASS 107 - SEED EARS, OLD CORN and NEW CORN RULES

- 1. Open only to bona fide hybrid seed corn producers in Minnesota.
 - A. Producers of certified hybrid seed corn.
 - B. Hybrid Seed Corn companies.

- **C.** Bona fide contract growers for hybrid seed corn companies who have provided an affidavit from the company being produced for, implying permission by said company to exhibit the contract grown seed ears. Such affidavit shall be presented with the entry form and addressed to Competition Department, Minnesota State Fair, 1265 Snelling Ave. N., St. Paul, MN 55108.
- D. Bona fide individuals (other than the above) shall have an affidavit attested to by either the County Agricultural Agent or the Vo-Ag Instructor who shall determine the authenticity of said production. Either, but not both, contract grower or the hybrid seed corn company, for whom the hybrid seed corn was produced, may exhibit any designated hybrid.
- 2. All exhibits shall be properly identified with the same designation as used in the sale of such hybrid. Failure to comply with this requirement will be grounds for disqualification.
- 3. In the seed ear class only, an exhibitor will be permitted to exhibit any hybrid for any zone which he has produced said variety.
- 4. Each exhibit must be properly entered and exhibited in the zone of adaptation for the hybrid.
- 5. The hybrid must have been registered for sale with the State of Minnesota.
- 6. Old corn shall be grown the year just previous to the year for which this premium list is issued.

DEFINITIONS

SEED EARS - HYBRID CORN: Ears from hybrid crossing plots, which may be single cross, three-way cross, or double cross. This seed produces the commercial hybrid seed corn.

COMMERCIAL EARS - HYBRID CORN: Crop grown from the seed produced in hybrid corn crossing plots, and which is intended for feed.

- A. Single crosses: Crop grown from the seed produced in hybrid crossing plots involving two inbred lines.
- **B.** Three-way crosses: Crop grown from the seed produced in hybrid crossing plots involving an inbred line and a single cross.
- C. Double crosses: Crop grown from the seed produced in hybrid crossing plots involving two single crosses.

EXHIBITORS. Exhibitors shall be classified according to the following definitions. An exhibitor will be permitted to exhibit in any one class, either as an Amateur exhibitor or as a Professional exhibitor.

- A. Amateur Class Exhibitor Open to any resident of Minnesota who has not been designated a professional class exhibitor by the Minnesota State Fair management. Exhibitors showing in the Amateur class may not show in any lot in the Professional class. An exhibitor who has won a total of 5 or more first place premiums in the Amateur or Professional classes in the last 3 years, or who has won a Champion Showman award in the last 3 years, will be permanently designated a Professional class exhibitor. This shall apply to all members of a household, partnership, business, or corporation.
- B. Professional Class Exhibitor Open to any resident of Minnesota who has won 5 or more first place premiums in amateur or professional class competition during the last 3 years. A Professional class exhibitor may not exhibit in any lot of the Amateur class. This shall apply to all members of a household, partnership, business, or corporation. Upon becoming a Professional class exhibitor, the exhibitor shall remain in this class unless otherwise informed by the Minnesota State Fair management. These classifications shall apply only to the Commercial Ears classes. In the Seed Ears class,

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any exhibitor may show provided all requirements as to eligibility as set forth in Class 108, Seed Ears, are met. Open only to residents of Minnesota.

DIVISION RULES

- 1. ENTRY INFORMATION (ADVANCE ENTRY REQUIRED). All entry forms must be either postmarked with official USPS postmark or submitted on-line by Monday, August 13. Only pre-registered entries will be accepted. Enter only those lots for which you are eligible according to your exhibitor status (Amateur or Advanced Amateur). There is no fee for entering. Late entries may be accepted at the discretion of the Competition Department and the Division Superintendent.
 - A. ON-LINE REGISTRATION. Available for entries in the State Fair Flower Show (classes 129, 130 and 131). Begins May 1; <u>closes Monday</u>, <u>August 13</u>. The entire process must be complete by midnight, or your entries will not be registered. Tags will be mailed to you or will be available when your entries are delivered. Follow the procedure below:
 - 1) Visit the Minnesota State Fair web site at www.mnstatefair.org.
 - 2) Click on "Competition" and select the link for "Ag-Hort-Bee". Follow the instructions to add the lots you intend to enter. After entering your contact information, click "submit" to continue the process.
 - When the summary page appears, review your selected lots, and be sure to click "confirm registration" to finalize your on-line registration.
 - 4) You will receive an e-mail confirmation of your entries. Print a copy of your registration confirmation. If you do not receive confirmation within 24 hours, please call 651-288-4417 to confirm.
 - 5) Exhibitors must bring their registration confirmation with their entry.
 - B. MANUAL REGISTRATION. Completed registrations in the State Fair Flower Show (classes 129, 130, and 131) may mailed or brought in to the Competition Office on or before the entry deadline, 4:30 p.m., Monday, August 13.. Official printed entry forms may be obtained from the Competition Department (telephone 651-288-4417 or e-mail competition@mnstatefair.org or download from www.mnstatefair.org web site).
- 2. Entries in this division are limited to residents of Minnesota.
- 3. Only one entry will be permitted in a lot by one exhibitor. One member only from any family or household may make entry in any lot except in junior division. Professionals will not be permitted to show in Advanced or Amateur classes. Advanced will not be permitted to show in Amateur classes. The Superintendent of the Division of Flowers will have the power to determine either at the time entry is made or at the time the exhibit is staged as to the eligibility of the entrant and will have the authority to bar any entrant from exhibiting if in their best judgment the entrant is ineligible.
 - A. Advanced: Designation applies to persons who grow horticultural products mainly for personal use and pleasure and who may engage in part time professional or commercial horticulture through the limited sale of horticultural products or services but who do not derive their main livelihood from such activities. Designation also applies to exhibitors who are ineligible to exhibit in the Amateur class by reason of having won a total of four first place premiums in Amateur competitions during the last two years in the State Fair flower shows artistic division. Exhibitors in Advanced classes will not be permitted to exhibit in Amateur classes.
 - B. Amateur: Designation applies to persons who grow horticultural products for pleasure and personal use and who at no time engage in professional horticulture, and who at no time sell or dispose of horticultural products for monetary gain and who are in no way, directly or indirectly, connected with the handling of horticultural products commercially.
- **4.** All exhibits, unless otherwise specified, must be in place by 9:00 a.m. on the day specified and must be so constructed as to ensure, in so far as possible, to last for the TWO DAYS of the show (Exhibits must be in place in the Ag-Hort building on the days and hours noted in each class.). The preparation room in the Ag-Hort building will be open at 6:30 a.m. on the day specified for staging each lot.
- 5. The fair management will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition, after their arrival and placement, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss or damage done to any article on exhibition, and the exhibitor shall indemnify the fair and the management thereof, against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.
- **6.** Any article manifestly unfit to be shown may be excluded by the superintendent, and the judges shall withhold any premium when the entries are unworthy of awards.
- 7. After exhibits are arranged, they shall be under the exclusive charge of the superintendent and no one shall touch or remove them without the superintendent's permission.
- 8. The superintendent shall have the right to remove at any time, from the hall, any exhibits or parts of exhibits which have become unsightly or show signs of insects or disease.

- 9. Each person who becomes an exhibitor thereby agrees to conform strictly to the rules and regulations.
- **10.** Labels. Each variety (except in flower arrangement lots) must be correctly labeled with its name. Labels all of a uniform size for this purpose will be furnished exhibitors by the superintendent and must be used by them, except where a label approved by the superintendent is provided by the exhibitor.
- 11. No flowers or plants shall be given away or sold for delivery in the hall by exhibitors, and no soliciting of orders for any stock will be permitted. No plants, flowers or other material, except that which is regularly entered for competition, shall be displayed, except by special permission of the superintendent.
- **12.** Arrangements. Unless otherwise specified, arrangements may be shown in any suitable container. Special backgrounds, equipment, or containers necessitating unusual space or care will not be permitted.
- 13. Fresh cut plant material must be included in all classes except those indicated as "All Dried" or otherwise stipulated. Stands or mechanics for Plaques, Collages and Frames are to be supplied by the exhibitor. Accessories and supplementary plant materials will be permitted in all arrangement lots. When used, their appropriateness in terms of amount, color and general suitability to the flower arrangement specified will be considered by the judges. Foliage, seeds, berries, fruits, weeds, grasses and other natural plant parts not specifically mentioned in the lot description will be considered "supplementary plant materials." The use of artificial flowers, fruits, or foliage, or the painting of fresh flowers or foliage is not permitted. Wild flowers protected by law in Minnesota will not be permitted as cut flowers in any exhibit in the artistic division.
- 14. Dried Arrangements. All materials must be from nature but may be assembled to assume flower forms or to simulate flowers or other plant parts. Materials may be collected from any source - need not be native to Minnesota. Artificial preservatives and coloring, including paint, dyes, etc., may be used only on dry materials.
- 15. Horticulture Specimens and Collections must be grown by exhibitor and variety named. Small specimens must each be staged in separate amber bottles, and large specimens each staged separately in quart bottles. All bottles furnished by management.
 - **A.** The term "suitable sample" shall mean a sample of a plant or flower of proper size and proportion to be appropriately and attractively displayed in a bottle provided by management. It imposes no limitation as to number of stems, blooms, or flowers. The sample must be representative of the natural growing form of the plant or flower and must not be altered by obvious removal of natural foliage, stems or flower parts.
 - **B.** The term "and/or" as in combination of five (5) annual and/or perennials means exhibitor may have a combination of five (5) annuals and perennials; or five (5) annuals or perennials. A total of five (5) specimens.
- **16.** All other lots in Classes 129, 130, and 131 will be judged according to the "Suggested Scale of Points" found in the Handbook for Flower Shows by National Garden Clubs, Inc.
- **17.** On Tuesday, August 28, at 9:00 p.m., exhibitors must remove, under the direction of the superintendent, containers and staging equipment. Exhibitors not complying will forfeit any prize award given.
- **18.** After 9:00 p.m, Tuesday, August 28 admission will not be charged for exhibitors coming in the South Underwood gate (Gate 7) to remove exhibits. All flower exhibitors will receive a dated Ag-Hort vehicle sticker which should be firmly attached to the insider of the vehicles windshield. This sticker is needed for access to Gate 7 and to the Ag-Hort parking lot for both delivery and pick up of exhibits.
- **19.** All exhibitors' containers, props, etc., must be called for by 9:00 p.m. on Labor Day. There will be no guarantee of security after this date.

- 9. A sign identifying the club or organization should not exceed 9" x 24".
- 10. The Minnesota State Horticultural Society will take all possible precautions to prevent damage or theft but cannot be responsible for losses.
- 11. A pot or basket may contain more than one plant of the same variety, but not contain multiple varieties, except where noted. PLEASE CHECK THE SCHEDULE CAREFULLY AND ASK AT CHECK-IN

- 2. A Novice is classified as a Novice until they have won a blue ribbon in each of three different African Violet Shows. (Design and Horticulture are considered separately.)
- 3. Please call Classification Chair, **Ruth Bann**, at 763-571-6703 by Saturday, August 18, 2007, with your plant list so your plants can be run in the First Class program.
- **4.** Entries will be received Wednesday, August 22, 2007 from 10:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. sharp. Anyone entering more than 25 plants **MUST** enter before 12:00 noon; NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 5. Judging will be done on Wednesday, Aug. 22, 2007 from 4:00 p.m. until finished. Only qualified AVSA judges will be permitted to act as judges. The AVSA scales of points will be followed. The show will be merit judged by AVSA judges using AVSA scales and points applicable to each class. The decision of the judges is final.
- 6. All blue ribbons, including horticulture and design classes, will be counted toward the sweepstakes award. To break a tie in sweepstakes, red ribbons will be counted. If a tie still exists, Best-in-Class awards will be counted. Only blue ribbon winners are eligible to receive special awards.
- Absolutely no entries will be removed before the show closes 9:00 p.m. on Friday, August 24, 2007. The AVSM will take all possible precautions to protect the exhibits, however the society will not be responsible for any losses.
- 8. Help is needed for set-up and take-down! Please volunteer at these times.

HORTICULTURAL DIVISION RULES

- All plants must go through Classification before going to Entries. Entry list must accompany the African violets and
 other gesneriads so the Classification Chairman will know the names of all plants entered. All plants must be single
 crown plants, with the exception of trailers, species and other gesneriads. All plants must have been in the exhibitors
 possession for at least three months prior to the show.
- 2. Only AVSM members are eligible to enter the Collection classes. Only one collection may be entered by an exhibitor in each collection class. The collections will be jusged by a panel of three judges using the usual judging criteria and filling out a collection award point score sheet. These sheets will be given to the exhibitor.
- 3. No flared pots, supports or collars under foliage will be permitted.
- **4.** For uniformity, all plants (except for trailers and gesneriads, which can be shown in the pots they are grown in) must be slip potted with a moisture barrier inserted between clean white pots.
- 5. Exhibitors may enter only one specimen of a variety in a class. However, more than one variety may be entered in a class, except the Unusual Container classes..
- 6. All African violet species, cultivars and other gesneriads shall be correctly named; however, all cultivar names need not be listed in the AVSA publications.
- 7. All African violet exhibits must be in bloom.
- 8. Any number of seedling may be entered provided they have been originated by the exhibitor or have been given release rights in writing by the hybridizer. A new cultibar may be exhibited once only in an affiliate show, once only in a council or regional show, and once only in an AVSA Convention Show.

DESIGN DIVISION RULES

- The Design Chairman will call the design information to the Entry Chairman in advance so it can be pre-entered. Please pick up cards before placing design.
- 2. An exhibitor is allowed one entry in each design class. All designs shall be the exclusive work of the exhibitor.

Although advance registration is not required, exhibitors may be asked to sign their name and address on a registration sheet at the show. If entry tags are needed prior to the show, please contact the show chairman. Otherwise tags will be available at the building prior to showtime. Exhibitors will have access to the Ag-Hort Building's preparation room after 5:00 p.m., Friday, August 24, 2007. Exhibiting members of the society will receive one vehicle admission pass per family or carpooling unit. NOTE: Because of security policies, you will not be allowed to drive your vehicle up to the Horticulture building until after 9:00 p.m. and before 9:00 a.m.

RULES OF THE SHOW

- A. All gladiolus must be grown by the exhibitor, except in the arrangement division. Glads will be available at the show for arrangers to use in their arrangements.
- **B.** Exhibits must be in place on the show table by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 25, 2007. Late entries will not be judged. **PLEASE NOTE TIME CHANGE TO 9:00 A.M.**
- C. All entries will be classified and placed properly in accordance with both the North American Gladiolus Council Classification and show layout. The show chairman and artistic chairman will provide aid to exhibitors in their properly classifying and placing of the exhibit.
- D. Each exhibit must be properly named, marked as a seedling, or marked "Name unknown".
- E. Seedling spikes should be entered in the Seedling Classes (D).
- **F.** Stem length below the lowest floret should not exceed 20 inches.
- ${f G}_{\!\scriptscriptstyle \bullet}$ Entries will be disqualified if any props are left on exhibits; except in the artistic division.
- **H.** Glads must be the dominant flower in the arrangements, but other flowers, fruits, or foliage may be used along with mats, bases and/or accessories. Each exhibitor is allowed one entry per class.
- I. All judging in the Spike Division will be done by accredited judges of the North American Gladiolus Council or Minnesota Gladiolus Society. All judging in the Artistic Division will be done by qualified Artistic Judges. Only these persons and authorized clerks will be present while judging is in progress. Judge's decisions will be final.
- J. Judging will conform to the NAGC standards.
- **K.** An amateur or novice is anyone who has less than a combined total of ten (10) blue ribbons or one champion ribbon in all previous gladiolus shows or artistic divisions of other shows.
- L. Vases must be at least 9" in height. The entry must use at least five (5) spikes.
- **M.** A "seedling" is any unnamed glad that has not yet been offered for sale.
- N. Diseased entries will be disqualified and removed from the show.
- O. Open classes have no restriction pertaining to either growing or showing experience. Anyone may enter open classes.
- P. Exhibitors will please remove all unused materials and containers from the show area.
- Q. Closing time of the show is 9:00 p.m., Sunday, August 26, 2007. Exhibitors are urged to claim their exhibits and ribbons. All plant material not claimed will be disposed of at the discretion of the show chairperson.
- **R.** On items not covered by these rules, the decision of the show chairperson will be final.
- S. Exhibitors may choose to return their ribbons to the show chairperson if they do not want them.

- **4.** The Preparation Room opens at 6:00 a.m. Entries must be in place by 9:00 a.m. on August 29. Late entries will be marked "Not for Competition".
- 5. EXHIBITORS MUST PAY THEIR OWN ADMISSION TO THE FAIR. PLEASE NOTE There are security procedures governing entrance to the fair. Questions should be made at time of registration. Exhibitors receive EXHIBITOR WINDSHIELD STICKERS allowing entrance to he Underwood Gate on Como Avenue.
- **6.** Judging begins at 9:30 a.m. Show opens as soon as judging is completed and continues until 9:00 p.m.; opens again August 30, 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.
- 7. Plant material on the State Conservation List may not be used in the show.
- 8. The Standard System of Awards will be used. First place exhibit must score 90 or more; second place, 85 or more; third place, 80 or more; honorable mention, 75 or more. Any award may be withheld if the exhibit does not meet the specific requirements.
- Exhibits must be approved by the Classification Committee. Entries that do not conform to the schedule will be placed for display only.
- 10. THE SCHEDULE IS THE LAW OF THE SHOW. CAREFULLY READ AND FOLLOW YOUR SHOW SCHEDULE.
- 11. Show requirements and scale of points are found in the 2007 edition of the National Garden Clubs "Handbook for Flower Shows."
- 12. The fair management will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles entered, but under no circumstances will they or the sponsors of the show be responsible for any loss or damage.
- 13. ALL ENTRANTS MUST SIGN IN WITH ENTRY CHAIR. Your exhibitor number and entry tags will have been provided for pre-registered entries. Registration chair will assign exhibitor numbers for any other classes you enter.
- **14.** EXHIBITORS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR REMOVING THEIR OWN ENTRIES IMMEDIATELY OR THEY WILL BE TOSSED. Entries are to be removed between 9:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m., August 30. Fairgrounds may be entered without admission charged after 9:00 p.m. at the Underwood gate on Como Avenue. EXHIBITOR WIND-SHIELD STICKER must be displayed to get to the Preparation Room.

DESIGN RULES

 - A. Accessories, featured objects, backgrounds, bases, mats and cards of explanation.
 - **B.** Treating of dried plant materials.
 - C. Contrived flowers and other forms made of real plant material, fresh or dried.
 - D. Objects which add interest when tastefully used, i.e. coral, shells, sponges, sea fans, starfish, bones and antlers.
- 10. The size of the niche in class 14 is 40" high, 33" wide and 18" deep and is staged on a bunker 40" high. All other exhibits should occupy a space no more than 24" wide and 28" deep, except classes 5 & 10 are allowed 40" wide.

- 6. Container grown plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three (3) months, except for multiple plantings, which must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least six (6) weeks.

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- 7. Containers will be provided for cut specimens. Cut specimens should not have any foliage below the water line.
- **8.** There may be more than one plant per container in classes 71-75 unless prohibited by plant society policy. Classes 68-70 may contain NO MORE THAN ONE VARIETY OR CULTIVAR.
- 9. Wedging with wood, plastic wrap or foil for cut specimens is permitted, to be furnished by the exhibitor.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Orchid Society of Minnesota (OSM) will hold its State Fair Show August 31st and September 1st, 2007 in the Agriculture-Horticulture Building. The show is open to the public both days from 9:00am to 9:00pm.
- 2. Exhibit set-up will begin at 9:30 p.m., Thursday, August 30th and must be completed by 11:45 p.m. Exhibits shall be left in place until 9:00 p.m., Saturday, September 1, at which time they shall be promptly removed.
- Neither the OSM nor the Minnesota State Fair is responsible for loss or damage to any exhibitor's materials and property including plants, blooms, corsages and containers.
- 4. Paper-covered display tables will be provided free of charge. All other material used in individual exhibits must be provided by the exhibitor.
- 5. Natural foliage, live plants, moss, and other plant materials may be used to supplement exhibits. Plants, plant materials, moss and foliage may not be dyed or artificial. The exception is artificial grass as a floor covering.
- **6.** All lighting used in exhibits must be provided by the exhibitor. Lighting must be coordinated with the State Fair Show Chairperson. Exhibit lighting must be color corrected for daylight or turned off during judging. Electricity is available for some displays.
- Identification cards containing the exhibitor's name will be provided by the OSM. No other exhibitor identification will be permitted.
- 8. Exhibitors must provide small cards or labels identifying each plant or cut flower. Improperly labeled plants and flowers will not be judged.
- 9. No fountains, streams or other water will be permitted in exhibits.
- 10. Reasonable effort will be made to provide space as requested by exhibitors. The State Fair Show Chairperson retains the right to assign and allot space as necessary.
- 11. Each exhibitor, by entering the show, agrees to abide by the show rules and regulations. Exhibits not in conformance with these rules and regulations shall be disqualified. The State Fair Show Chairperson reserves the right to remove any portion of an exhibit determined to be non-conforming, inferior or insect-infected.
- 12. No cut flowers will be permitted in flowering plant exhibits and no flowering plants will be permitted in cut flower exhibits. Dried flowers are prohibited from all exhibits.
- 13. First blooming seedling (class 113) and specimen plants (class 114) must be registered with the Judging Chairperson before judging begins.
- **14.** Judging will begin promptly at 11:45 p.m. following set up.
- **15.** Judges are appointed by the Judging Chairperson. The decisions of these judges are final. Judges and clerks are expected to familiarize themselves with the rules and regulations prior to judging.
- 16. First, second and third place ribbons may be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judges. Judges have the right to issue or withhold any scheduled award and may subdivide any class where warranted.
- 17. Only properly authorized persons will be permitted in the show area during judging.
- 18. Society members may elect to exhibit plants in a special OSM exhibit. These plants will be judged along with all others.

DIVISION RULES

- 1. ENTRY INFORMATION (ADVANCE ENTRY REQUIRED). All entry forms must be either postmarked with official USPS postmark or submitted on-line by Monday, August 13. Only pre-registered entries will be accepted. Enter only those lots for which you are eligible according to your exhibitor status. There is no fee for entering. Late entries may be accepted at the discretion of the Competition Department and the Division Superintendent.
 - A. ON-LINE REGISTRATION. Begins May 1; <u>closes Monday</u>, <u>August 13</u>. The entire process must be completed by midnight, or your entries will not be registered. Tags will be mailed to you or will be available when your entries are delivered. Follow the procedure below:
 - 1) Visit the Minnesota State Fair web site at www.mnstatefair.org.
 - 2) Click on "Competition" and select the link for "Ag-Hort-Bee". Follow the instructions to add the lots you intend to enter. After entering your contact information, and click "submit" to continue the process.

- 2. Special Notice. All exhibits, unless specifically exempted in the special rules of the class, must have been grown by the exhibitor. Only one entry will be permitted in a lot by one exhibitor. One member only from any family or household may make entry in any lot.
- 3. The Superintendent, Fruits Division, shall have the power to determine, either at the time entry is made or at the time the exhibit is staged, as to the eligibility of the entrant, and the superintendent shall have the power to bar any entrant from showing if in his best judgment the entrant is ineligible.
- **4.** Professionals will not be permitted to show in the Amateur classes. The following definitions shall govern to differentiate between Amateur and Professional exhibitors:
 - A. Amateur. Persons who grow horticultural products for pleasure and personal use, possibly sell small quantities and who are in no way, directly or indirectly, currently connected with the production or handling of horticultural products commercially. For the purposes of the wine competition, persons who make small quantities of wine for their consumption are not required to be licensed by the Federal B.A.T.F.
 - B. Professional. For the purposes of this competition, all other individuals shall be considered professional, regardless of whether horticulture is their principle business. Exhibitors who are deemed professional by these criteria are ineligible to exhibit in Amateur classes.

CLASS 136 - FRUITS, AMATEUR SPECIAL RULES

- 1. All division rules apply. See instructions at head of the division.
- 2. Entries in this division are limited to residents of Minnesota, and all articles competing for premiums must have been grown within the state or made from Minnesota products and by the persons in whose name they are entered, unless otherwise noted in rules or classification.
- 3. Only one entry will be permitted in a lot by one exhibitor. One member only from any family, household or firm may make entry in any lot.
- 4. Amateur Exhibits. Must be in place in the Ag-Hort building between 10:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m., Wednesday, August 22, and will be judged later that same evening. Do not bring exhibit before above day and time, except by special arrangement with the superintendent.
- 5. All exhibits will be placed under the direction of the superintendent, provided same are received by him at the building prior to the time named for exhibits to be in place, and only then if proper entries have previously been made with the Competition Department.
- **6. Plates.** A plate of apples or pears must consist of exactly six (6) specimens; grapes, three (3) bunches, crabapples, plums and cherry plums, ten (10) specimens. Not more than one plate of any one variety will be permitted in a collection, nor can fruit of any one variety be shown under synonymous names.

- 7. Labels. Each variety must be correctly labeled with its name, or, if an unnamed seedling, it must be so stated. Every plate or tray must be identified by lot number, entry number, and variety. In the case of a multiple plate or multiple tray entry, each plate or tray must be labeled with lot number, entry number, and the specific variety displayed in that plate or tray. Identifying tags will be provided for exhibitor use in the Ag-Hort Building on August 22.
- 8. Replacing. Exhibitors may replace with fresh fruit any specimen that shows a tendency to spot or decay at any time during the fair, except when the judge is working upon the class to which it belongs.
- 9. Inferior Specimens. Decayed, injured or inferior specimens must not be exhibited, and when such specimens appear in a collection, they will not be counted and the entire exhibit will be disqualified for judging.
- 10. Deciding Awards. The judges may, at their discretion, withhold awards from any exhibit which they consider to be unworthy of a prize.
- 11. Exhibitors wishing to retain exhibits must make arrangements with superintendent at the time the fruit is delivered for competition, and exhibits must be called for between 8:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. Labor Day. Unclaimed specimens will be discarded or donated to a local charity, if they are determined fit for such use.

Under size, color, form and condition, respectively, are also considered uniformity and conformity to a desirable type for the variety. Overgrown specimens are not desirable. In picking the fruit, care must be taken not to break out the stems. Select specimens normal in size, color and condition. All blemished fruits are discounted by the judges. Handle the specimens carefully. Fruit which is to be shipped any distance should be well wrapped with regular wrapping tissue or newspaper, and packed firmly in a suitable strong container. Loosely packed fruit will bruise in shipping.

In order to encourage excellence in growing grapes for fresh consumption, and the exploration of cultural techniques for enhancing quality, the MGGA has decided to sponsor an additional section of the State Fair's fresh grape competition. Growers are encouraged to learn about and explore various standard techniques for manipulating grapes and improving their quality for fresh eating. These include cluster and berry thinning, cane girdling, and giberellic acid treatments (in seedless varieties). These techniques can have dramatic

effects on 1) cluster size and weight and 2) attractiveness of the cluster. The MGGA has available both written and video materials describing these techniques. A \$25 cash award will be made to the winner. Ribbons will be awarded to the top three (3) places.

RULES

- 1. Each entry shall consist of a single grape cluster. This cluster may not be entered in any other lot.
- 2. Condition of the fruit will not be specific evaluation criterion. However, only fruit in excellent condition (free of fungus and insect damage) will be accepted.
- 3. Entries in lot 782, Heaviest Cluster, shall be scored on their weight, with the heaviest cluster awarded first place, etc.
- 4. NOTE: Entries in the MGGA Special Category do not count in sweepstakes award computations. (See lot 781)
- 5. This competition is open to both amateur and professional growers.

CLASS 137 - WINE SHOW CLASS RULES

- 1. All division rules apply. Follow instructions at the head of the division. Special note of classifications of amateur and professional should be made.
- 2. Entries are limited to residents of Minnesota. Only one entry permitted in a lot by an amateur exhibitor, except for lots 31 34 (which are open to professionals). One member only from any family or household may make entry in any lot.

- 7. Labeling. Each variety must be correctly labeled with its name. Potatoes entered "Any other white", "Any other red" and "Any other russet" must be labeled as to variety. Labels and pins of a uniform size for this purpose will be furnished exhibitors by this department and must be used by the exhibitor.
