INTERFAITH DIALOGUE

SERMON FOR PARSHAT NITZAVIM

Delivered by Rabbinic Intern Jonathan Jaffe on September 15, 2006

One fall afternoon nearly four years ago, a young man sat on a bus outside of Afula, Israel when he noticed that the passenger in front of him was acting strangely. For one thing, he was wearing a large coat in the middle of September. Second, he

thought he saw a wire protruding from the man's coat. Fearing the man was possibly a suicide bomber, he searched for a way to alert the police, but he didn't have a cell phone on him. In a moment of pure *chutzpah*, he asked the man in the coat if he could borrow his cell phone. Even more surprisingly, the man shrugged and quietly obliged, handing it to him. The passenger calmly stepped to the back of the bus and, whispering into the phone, called the police. When the bus stopped in the Arab-Israeli town of Um Al Fachem, the police were waiting. Stepping off the bus, the bomber saw the police and detonated his explosives. Because he was outside of the bus, none of the passengers was killed. It was later revealed that the bomber was planning to transfer to a bus to Tel-Aviv where he hoped to set off his bomb. The bus passenger had saved dozens of lives through his courageous action.

This story is fantastic for so many reasons. First, this passenger had acted so heroically to save his fellow passengers. Second, he had the audacity to borrow the bomber's own cell phone in order to call the police. Yet both of these aspects pale in comparison to the most amazing aspect of the story: The passenger's name was Ra'id Muhammed and he was an Arab Israeli. He had risked his own life to stop a fellow Arab Muslim from killing Israeli civilians.

I read about Ra'id Muhammed while working on an Arab Israeli construction crew at Kibbutz Ginnegar, outside of Afula. It was Sukkot break during my first year of rabbinical studies at Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem. In order to improve my Hebrew, I had volunteered to work at Ginnegar for the two-week break between Hebrew ulpan and classes. Each morning, I would arise at 4:30 am to meet Chabashi, Jamal, and Achmed in the tool shed where we would sip our Turkish coffee and collect our equipment before heading out for the day. One day after work, I read about Ra'id Muhammed in *The New York Times* online. And I saw that he was recovering at the nearby Ha'Emek Hospital from his injuries from the bomb blast. And so I decided that given my proximity and sense of indebtedness to this young man, I would visit Ra'id Muhammed to say "thank you."

I shared my idea with another volunteer on the kibbutz, a British soldier named Danny. Danny had just finished a tour of duty in Kosovo and was looking for some peace and quiet ... and so naturally came to Israel. To say that Danny stood out in Israel would be an incredible understatement. Red-haired and freckled, standing a good 6'4" and weighing at least 250 pounds, he made me look like a small dark midget. But he was looking for something to do and asked to come along on the journey to Ha'Emek Hospital. And so, like George and Lennie from *Of Mice and Men*, we sojourned into the warm evening and set out for Afula. Upon arriving at the hospital, I realized that I had no idea of what I was supposed to do or say. I went to the hospital's front desk and said that I was hoping to visit Ra'id Muhammed. The clerk asked me why. "I want to say thank you," I replied. And so of course, they called security. After about 20 minutes of questioning, we were given permission and sent to the top floor of the hospital. We strolled past half-lit rooms with wallpaper peeling off the walls, each filled with Arab Israelis, five or six to a room. Each patient lay with their families gathered around them. I turned the corner and saw in the back of the room, two Muslim women in burkas, sitting next to a young boy. There lay Ra'id Muhammed with his mother and sister at either side of him.

I had forgotten that Ra'id was all of seventeen years old. I saw him now and was astonished by how young he looked. He was really just a kid. Danny and I approached Ra'id's mother and sister and, not exactly knowing what to do, managed sort of a half bow, saying "Salaam Aleikum". "Aleikum HaSalaam" they replied. As Danny didn't speak a word of Hebrew or Arabic, he took a position directly behind me, arms folded behind his back, as if I had brought my own British security guard. Ra'id looked up at me and quietly said hello. He was scrawny with teenage acne and looked tired and dreary. Later, I found out that Ra'id had regained consciousness after the bombing only to find himself handcuffed to his bed as a possible suspect. Being one of two Arabs on a targeted Israeli bus will do that to you. I also found out that his family had received daily death threats from Arabs upset that Ra'id had stopped the bomber. No wonder he looked so exhausted.

After a moment of uncomfortably long silence, I spoke to Ra'id in my best fourth grade level Hebrew. I said,

"Ra'id, thank you for seeing us. My name is Jonathan and I am an American student. I am also a Jew. This is my friend Danny from England. (Danny nodded.) We read about you in the American newspapers and traveled here to say thank you. What you did was incredibly brave and we want to make sure that you know that your deed was noticed and appreciated. There is a teaching in Judaism that to save one life is like saving the entire world. You have preserved all of the potential that comes from that one life. So thank you." I continued, "In America, there are some people who believe that all Arabs and Muslims wish them harm, especially after September eleventh of last year. But I believe this is false. I want you to know that for the rest of my life, when anyone tells me that all the Arabs want to kill the Jews, you will be my refutation. 'Not Ra'id Muhammed', I will say. 'There's one Arab boy who risked everything in order to save a bunch of Jewish strangers - and I'm sure there are many more where he came from'. You forever will be my symbol for the potential for peace and understanding between our religions and cultures. Thank you for what you did. I wish you a speedy recovery and all the best for you and your family."

Ra'id calmly nodded and pointed to the newspaper article I had printed out. "Can we keep it?" his mother asked. I handed it to her. In response, Ra'id's sister, sitting on the other side of his bed, extended a box of chocolates towards me and Danny. We each took one and said thank you. The five of us remained in a moment of silence as Danny and I munched on our chocolates. So there we were, an Arab Israeli family, a Jew from Hawaii and a British soldier, intersecting at the most improbable of moments and places, all nibbling away. It sounds mundane, yet it was a magical moment.



I tell this story now as this past week we observed the fifth anniversary of 9/11, a dark day for our community. This year, the anniversary of the destruction of the World Trade Center falls in the month of *Elul*, a time of reconciliation and forgiveness in the Jewish calendar. It is a season for bridging the chasm between people and for combating hate with dialogue and understanding. As 9/11 moves further into history and we do our best to honor the memory of those who died, we receive instruction from this week's Torah portion. *Parshat Nitzavim* commands us in simple terms, "I call heaven and earth to witness against you this day: I have put before you life and death, blessing and curse. Choose life – so you are your offspring may live." And so, I tell the story of Ra'id Muhammed as an example of one who chose life and, in doing so, inspired me and countless others to do the same.

It is now four years since I met Ra'id Muhammed and much has changed. I entered rabbinical school a curious single twenty-something. This May, I will graduate and be ordained as a rabbi. In the process, I have become a somewhat more mature, married thirty-something with our first baby due next month. My friend Danny is serving under the British Army in Iraq, and I receive emails from him, from time to time.

Though much has changed since that fall evening, I still think of Ra'id Muhammed and wonder what ever happened to him. I wish I could speak with him again, to thank him this time for influencing my Israel experience in such a profound way. After meeting with him, I returned to the kibbutz with a new vigor for interfaith dialogue. For the next two weeks, my Arab-Israeli construction crew became an informal discussion group. We painted roofs and poured cement, all the while debating Muslim-Jewish relations and our views on everything from the internet to Jewish and Arab cooking. One day, Achmed asked me how big the World Trade Center was. "Really, really tall," I responded. He asked, "Bigger than the kibbutz dining hall?" I realized then and there that we were worlds apart. But at least we had begun the process of finding common ground.

I wish I could speak with Ra'id Muhammed, now as I reach ordination and look forward to entering the rabbinate. I would say to him,

"Ra'id, I want to thank you again. I am forever indebted to you for influencing me so profoundly. Back in America, our newspapers tell of the daily violence between the West and the Arab world. I wish that more Americans could meet people like you, Arab or Jew, who choose life over religion, commonality over division. Meeting you gave me a sense of optimism that can never be shaken. You remain my proof that we have more in common than we do in opposition. And so for the rest of my career, I will work towards this goal from my side and you from yours. I hope one day we may see each other again, meeting somewhere in between. For now, *Salaam Aleikum* and Shabbat Shalom."

OF SOUND MIND by Judi Leff, Director of Special Projects

Those of us who work here at Temple Emanu-El are indeed privileged to be able to work in such an historical and beautiful building. It was a challenge and an honor for me to be asked to manage the recent bima remodel and sound system project.

The architects were charged with altering the current space to enable worship to become warmer and more intimate as well as to make accommodations for disabled congregants. This change was made to take into account the wishes and needs of our expanding congregation, and enable a wider variety of programming,

The sound system was designed to bring the sound of our services into the 21st century, with speakers designed by Meyer Sound owned by local sound reinforcement pioneers John and Helen Meyer. Our previous pewback system was practical, but we wanted to have a richer and warmer sound with more clarity. The space itself is an acoustical challenge. (A recent book on sound systems in churches and synagogues starts with the stern advice that one should avoid having any type of dome!)

Thanks to our staging vendor Chris Flum, we were blessed to have the new sound system organized by Don Pearson, a Jewish Bay Area sound engineer and the co-founder of UltraSound with another Jewish engineer Howard Danchik. Both Don and Howard had their professional beginnings with the Grateful Dead. Ultra Sound was known not only for its high-quality sound design, but also for its social consciousness, and provided the sound for the Tibetan monks, the pope, both Republican and Democratic conventions, the Three Tenors and many rock bands including Hot Tuna, Jefferson Airplane and the aforementioned Dead. After providing sound for thousands of shows over 25 years, Don became a technical seminar instructor for Meyer Sound, highly respected by all in the sound reinforcement universe.

The acoustical treatment, so necessary to begin to improve the challenging acoustics of the Main Sanctuary, was shepherded by long-time Don Pearson associate Sam Berkow of SIA Acoustics in New York. Sam has worked on Jazz at Lincoln Center, Cirque du Soleil, recording studios and larger multi-purpose venues, amphitheaters and stadiums. Sam also had experience with worship spaces, including the rescue of Central Synagogue in New York after their fire. During that project, Sam met his wife Toby, who has a position similar to mine at Central.

Demetrius Palavos of UltraSound/ProMedia, was responsible for the sound system installation, including our special Meyer speakers, and he was a protégée of Don Pearson, along with our High Holy Days sound engineer Armando Tobriner (whose father and grandfather grew up at Temple Emanu-El,) and Tom Lyon, who does sound for The Dave Matthews Band.

Sadly, this was Don Pearson's final project – he died suddenly in January. This project brought many people with a Don Pearson and/or Jewish connection into a beautiful Jewish worship space, some for the first time in many years. I only knew Don for a few months, yet it was so special for all of us who had been touched by Don's enthusiasm and expertise to see the project come to fruition, and enhance the worship experience for those of us here at Temple Emanu-El.

"ISRAEL'S BORDERS IN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE: THE SECURITY-DEMOGRAPHY DILEMMA"

Joseph Heller

Professor Emeritus, Hebrew University, Jerusalem

Professor Heller was born in Tel Aviv 1937. He studied Jewish and general history at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (B.A. and M.A. both cum laude), and earned his Ph.D from the London School of Economics in 1971. He has taught at Hebrew University since 1971, and was visiting professor at University College, London, UK, and Yale University from 1995 to 1996. He has been professor of international relations since 1998 and professor emeritus at the Hebrew University since 2003. Professor Heller has published several books on the history of Zionism and Israel: *The Stern Gang 1940-1949: Ideology, Politics and Terror; The Birth of Israel 1945-1949: Ben-Gurion and his Critics;* and *From Brit Shalom to Ichud: Judah Leib Magnes and the Struggle for a Binational State.* He is currently at work on *Israel and the Cold War, 1948-1967: The U.S. Soviet Russia and the Struggle for the Middle East.*

RABBI JOSEPH ASHER LECTURE

How Do We See Each Other? Classic and Contemporary Views of Jews and Muslims Toward the Other

Reuven Firestone Professor of Medieval Jewish and Islamic Studies, Hebrew Union College–Jewish Institute of Religion, Los Angeles

Rabbi Firestone is professor of Medieval Jewish and Islamic Studies, HUC-JIR, Los Angeles. He served for eight years as director of HUC-JIR's Edgar F. Magnin School of Graduate Studies and the Jerome Louchheim School of Undergraduate Jewish Studies at the University of Southern California, which offers degrees in cooperation with HUC-JIR. Prior to joining the HUC-JIR faculty, he taught at Boston University and was Yad Hanadiv Research Fellow at the Hebrew University. He received a Center for Arabic Study Abroad (CASA) III research fellowship for the Spring 2006 semester for study at the American University of Cairo, funded by the Fulbright Binational Committee in Egypt and the U.S. Department of Education. In 2000, Professor Firestone was awarded a fellowship for independent research from the National Endowment for the Humanities, and was chosen to be a fellow of the Institute for Advanced Jewish Studies at the University of Pennsylvania in 2002. His specialties are early Islam and its relationship with Jews and Judaism, scriptural interpretation of the Bible and Qur'an, and the phenomenon of holy war.

DR. WILLIAM L. COBB ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – GETTING HEALTHIER EVERYDAY

The new school year is underway and so is our Healthy Children Pantry at Dr. William L. Cobb Elementary School. This is our third year and again, we have wonderful support from the school staff, Lissa Collier, parent liaison and, parent volunteers as well as Congregation Emanu-El volunteers. This year the school nutritionist, Leigh Rossi, is helping with our food pantry by conducting tastings from the food we receive and supplying recipes for the families. So far, we have tried delicious cabbage coleslaw and sliced watermelon.

We continue to support the school's efforts in the area of academics, nutrition, and physical activity. We sponsor the food pantry and donate school supplies annually. We will also support Dr. William L. Cobb's after school program, participants in the mayor's Challenge - Shape Up San Francisco- Shape Up Walking Challenge. For twelve weeks, students will walk twice a week with the goal of walking over 1000 miles, collectively, along the coast of California. The students will track their progress on the www. shapeupsf.org website illustrating the distance they have walked along the California Coast.

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) MyPyramid.gov recommends that people participate in a physical activity 60 minutes a day. Regular physical activity and physical fitness make important contributions to one's health, sense of well being, and maintenance of a healthy body weight. However, the barrier often given for a failure to be physically active is lack of time. By participating in Walking Challenge, Cobb School is taking on this barrier, creating opportunities for students to physically active, academically sound, and nourished.

How do you start to become more active?

Walking has tremendous benefits:

- Walking regularly can build aerobic fitness, balance and strength, which reduce the risk of chronic diseases such as heart problems and diabetes and also reduce the risk of falls and fractures.
- Regular exercise such as walking improves mood and relieves depression and stress.
- Walking with other people builds community and social support for physical activity.
- Foot traffic brings business to local stores and creates a feeling of safety in a neighborhood.
- Walking improves the environment by reducing dependency on cars, easing traffic congestion, and creating less air pollution and noise.
- Walking is free!
