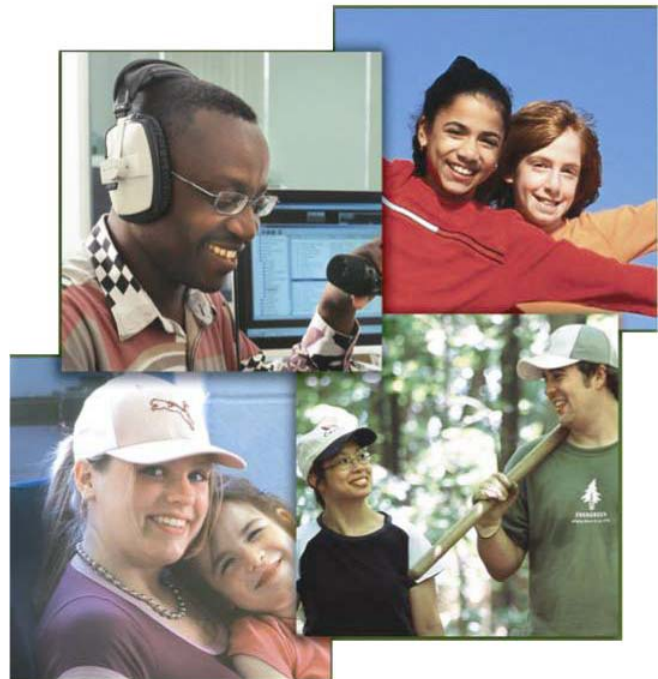

Introduction

Welcome. This Community Report contains valuable information about our granting activities in your community and our local Grant Review Team members, led by Chairs Lucille Michaud and Guy O'Brien.

There is a Community Report for each of the Foundation's geographic catchment areas. All are companion documents to the 2005-2006 Annual Report, which contains information about the Foundation's activities, priorities and financial statements.

The Ontario Trillium Foundation is an agency of the Ministry of Culture. We receive \$100 million annually from Ontario's charity casino initiative. We fulfill our mission to build healthy and vibrant communities throughout Ontario by strengthening the capacity of the volunteer sector through investments in community-based initiatives.

From April 1, 2005 to March 31, 2006, the Foundation invested \$94,968,100 in 1,444 grants to charitable and not-for-profit organizations across the province. Our granting demonstrates our commitment to the people of Ontario and our response to their diverse interests and needs.

Beyond being a leading grantmaker, our Foundation's staff and volunteers are well known as conveners and supporters of people and ideas.

In the summer of 2005, we undertook a series of discussions with Ontarians on-line and at nine community meetings that we called *Community Conversations*. These meetings were a terrific opportunity for representatives from different organizations to come together, many for the first time, and share ideas and concerns. We listened and learned more about the diverse needs of communities and are using what we heard to inform and improve our grant-making practices.

In November 2005, we held an OTF conference to share learnings with staff and volunteers. The conference opened with our Great Grants Awards celebration. We were delighted to recognize the achievements and amazing work of 19 outstanding organizations from across Ontario.

Great grants just don't happen, they are made with the support of a great team. At the Foundation, we are fortunate to have over 300 caring and steadfast Grant Review Team members and a solid Board of Directors that help make our work possible.

Our unpaid volunteers bring their experiences and invaluable knowledge about Ontario's communities to review applications and make recommendations for funding. They are supported by our Foundation staff, who are capable and talented professionals.

We are proud to be one of Canada's leading grantmaking foundations and to invest in the remarkable work of organizations in communities like yours that make this province truly great.



Our grants in Northwestern

It is our pleasure to report to you on the results of the Ontario Trillium Foundation's (OTF) grants to communities in Northwestern. The areas that comprise the Northwestern region include Kenora District, Rainy River District and Thunder Bay District.

OTF grants have a wide and lasting impact in communities across Ontario. They provide critical support for organizations to build on their strengths, improve their capacity, develop new ideas and move forward.

Over 300 local volunteers from across Ontario serve on the Foundation's Grant Review Teams. These unpaid volunteers are appointed by the Government of Ontario to review grant applications and make recommendations for funding. They have a keen and practical understanding of the diverse needs of Ontario's communities and they bring that knowledge and experience to the grant review process. Their involvement in the decision-making process helps ensure that the grants that the Foundation supports reflect local needs and have the greatest impact possible.

In 2005-2006, we were delighted to review and support the grant applications of 47 local organizations and provide \$2,010,300 in Foundation grants. We invite you to read the results of our work and the ongoing efforts of the Foundation to build healthy and vibrant communities in Northwestern.

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Who we are

The Ontario Trillium Foundation is an agency of the Ministry of Culture. We are one of Canada's leading grantmaking foundations. Established in 1982, we receive \$100 million annually of government funding generated through Ontario's charity casino initiative.

Our mission is building healthy and vibrant communities throughout Ontario by strengthening the capacity of the voluntary sector, through investments in community-based initiatives.

Our granting priorities

The Foundation supports the building of healthy and vibrant communities through community-based initiatives that strengthen the capacity of organizations in the arts and culture, environment, human and social services and sports and recreation sectors.

In particular, the Foundation places priority on supporting organizations that work in the following areas to help Ontarians achieve their potential:

- Enhanced success for students and learners
- Healthier and more physically active Ontarians
- Enhanced employment and economic potential for workers and their families
- More effective volunteers and more people engaged in their communities

Eligible sectors

We welcome applications in four sectors—arts and culture, environment, human and social services and sports and recreation.

Eligible organizations

- A charitable organization or foundation registered as a charity with the Canada Revenue Agency
- An organization incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation without share capital in a Canadian jurisdiction
- An unincorporated branch or chapter of a charitable organization or incorporated not-for-profit organization. The incorporated or registered organization must authorize the application and accept responsibility for the grant
- A First Nation
- A Métis or other Aboriginal community
- A collaborative of two or more organizations that contains at least one eligible member
- Local Services Boards, rural and small communities incorporated as municipalities with populations of 20,000 or less and their agencies in either the arts and culture or sports and recreation sectors

Our grant programs

The Ontario Trillium Foundation has two grant programs:

Community Program

The Community Program funds initiatives that take place in one catchment area and have a local impact on one or more communities within it. More than 300 unpaid local volunteers work together in 16 regional Grant Review Teams to review grant applications and recommend projects for funding within a specific catchment area.

Province-Wide Program

This program funds initiatives that have a province-wide impact. At a minimum, the work must take place in three catchment areas or two in the North. A committee of our Board of Directors reviews and recommends projects for funding in the Province-Wide Program.

The Foundation's Board of Directors reviews and ratifies grants in both programs.

Types of grants available

In the Community and Province-Wide programs, the Ontario Trillium Foundation provides three types of funding in each of our four sectors. These are available individually or in combination:

- Operating Grants for ongoing program and administration costs over a limited period of time up to five years
- Project Grants for an initiative that has a definite beginning and end and that may be in addition to a group's regular work
- Capital Grants for making repairs, renovations or improvements to lands and buildings or for buying equipment that will have a direct effect on a group's program or activities

Achieving great results

The Foundation's funding has made hundreds of community facilities accessible and restored heritage buildings across the province. Grants have supported community sports groups, programs for seniors and youth and environmental initiatives that have helped rehabilitate rivers, replant forests and promote conservation.

Grants have also invigorated the arts and culture sector in Ontario. In addition, the Foundation's grants have helped hundreds of organizations build their capacity and enhance their programs.

In all sectors, from arts and culture to sports and recreation, Ontario Trillium Foundation grants have improved the quality of life in Ontario, provided economic opportunities and enhanced tourism.

Our vision, mission and values

The Ontario Trillium Foundation is a catalyst that enables Ontarians to work together to enhance the quality of life in their communities. We believe that communities across Ontario are rich in talent, creativity and drive, and our grants stimulate communities to build on these assets.

Because we believe passionately that our work enhances the quality of life for people across Ontario, we aim to achieve the highest professional standards of excellence.



Volunteer and staff leadership

Our leadership depends on skilled staff working in productive partnership with knowledgeable volunteers who understand the needs of local communities in their region. Our staff and volunteer human resources practices foster this creative synergy.

Inclusiveness and innovation

Our policies and programs acknowledge that the people of Ontario are diverse and dynamic and that community needs differ across the province. We support creative initiatives that respond to the real needs of Ontario's varied and evolving communities.

Integrity and respect

Our grant decision-making processes, business practices and communications strategies are governed by the principles of honesty, integrity and fairness. We treat all stakeholders respectfully, including volunteers, staff, grant applicants, and members of the public.

Efficiency and impact

We are determined to ensure that public funds are well invested and that our grant-making and grant-monitoring processes are cost efficient. We consistently measure and evaluate results based on grant outcomes.

Our granting priorities

The Foundation will support the building of healthy and vibrant communities through community-based initiatives that strengthen the capacity of organizations in the arts and culture, environment, human and social services and sports and recreation sectors.

In particular, the Foundation will place priority on supporting organizations that work in the following areas to help Ontarians achieve their potential.

Enhanced success for students and learners

A healthy and vibrant community depends on the skills and knowledge of its members. Whether knowledge and skills are developed in the early years when children start school or much later in life, it is key that people of all ages and abilities are ready to learn. This is why the Ontario Trillium Foundation will place priority on initiatives that:

- Provide community-based learning opportunities and create conditions for achievement for people of all ages and abilities
- Help prepare children and youth for success

This includes, but is not limited to, broadening learning experiences for children and youth; helping children and youth remain and achieve in school; preparing young children to learn; providing opportunities for children and youth to experience positive personal growth; and improving adult literacy through resources and activities.

Healthier and more physically active Ontarians

Encouraging Ontarians to lead healthier lifestyles, as well as improving other determinants of health, such as air and water quality, and providing opportunities for people to enhance their health and well-being will lead to healthier and more physically active Ontarians. To this end, the Ontario Trillium Foundation will place priority on initiatives that:

- Promote physical activity for people of all ages and abilities
- Promote recreational activities for people of all ages and abilities
- Enhance and help protect human and ecosystem health
- Create conditions for people to reach their full health and well-being potential
- Promote cultural and artistic activities for people of all ages and abilities

This includes, but is not limited to, promoting and increasing physical activity; increasing or sustaining recreational and leisure opportunities; helping communities take responsibility to protect the natural environment; supporting systems that sustain health and well-being; sustaining a healthy arts community; and celebrating and preserving heritage.

Enhanced employment and economic potential for workers and their families

The Ontario Trillium Foundation supports initiatives that are innovative and that stimulate economic growth. To this end, OTF will place priority on proposals that support organizations to build skills, create jobs and enhance economic potential for individuals and communities through initiatives that:

Our granting priorities (*Continued*)

- Provide skill development or employment opportunities
- Sustain and promote a greener economy and community
- Strengthen the economic health of a community
- Help further a community's long-term vision and growth

This includes, but is not limited to, increasing opportunities for employment for those experiencing barriers including Aboriginal people, newcomers, people with disabilities and at-risk youth; strengthening organizations and supporting initiatives that promote a sustainable environment; sustaining the economic viability of the community; and encouraging community-planning processes.

More effective volunteers and more people engaged in their communities

Volunteers are the foundation of healthy and caring communities that are safe, clean, secure and vibrant. Providing people with opportunities to actively participate in activities or programs offered within their community also contributes to this. We support initiatives that:

- Create conditions to increase community engagement of people of all ages, abilities and cultures
- Strengthen volunteerism among people of all ages, abilities and cultures
- Strengthen the voluntary sector

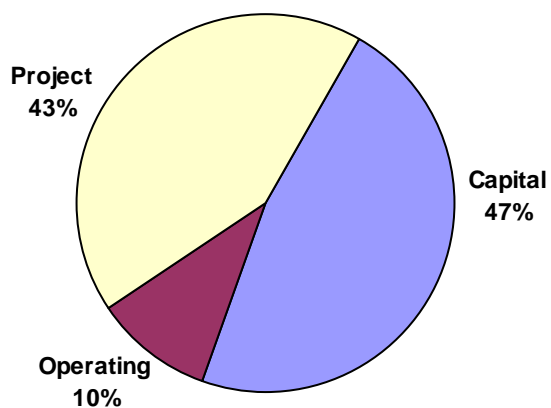

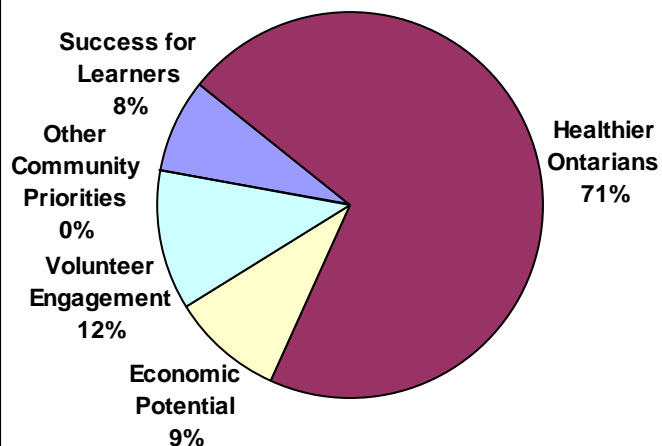

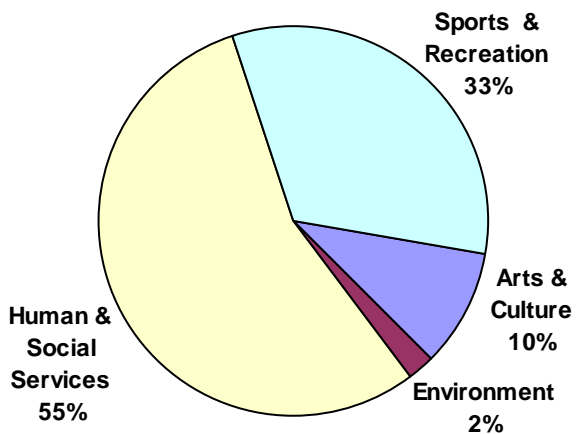
**Northwestern
Grants by budget fund**



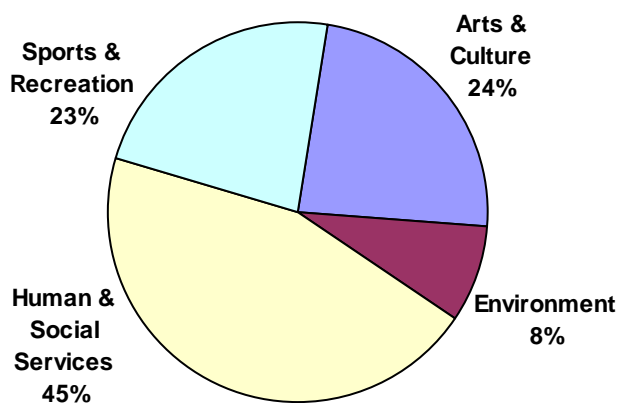
**Northwestern

Ontario Trillium Foundation community grants

Making a difference in Northwestern for 2005-2006

In 2005-2006 the Ontario Trillium Foundation awarded 47 grants in Northwestern valued at \$2,010,300. The following is a list of the organizations that were awarded grants and descriptions of their projects:



Atikokan Intergenerational Centre for Arts and Alternatives

\$25,000 over one year to purchase an environmentally friendly furnace and heating system, enabling the centre to continue providing cultural programming for people of all ages and abilities in the community.

Big Brothers and Big Sisters of the Patricia Region

\$75,000 over three years to build the capacity of the organization, which will increase its effectiveness and ability to provide enhanced mentoring programs and services for children and their families in the Dryden and Sioux Lookout areas.

Big Thunder Nordic Ski Club

\$7,200 over one year to purchase equipment that will facilitate year-round training for youth and adults involved in the sport of cross country skiing in Thunder Bay.

Le Centre d'alphabétisation Alpha Thunder Bay Inc.

\$53,000 over one year for Ensemble nous grandissons, a literacy program that encourages Francophone parents to work with their pre-school children to expose them to spoken and written French, thereby strengthening their commitment to their language.

City of Dryden

\$25,000 over one year to equip and install a skateboard park that will provide a safe and challenging sport environment for children and youth in the community.

Corporation of the Municipality of Sioux Lookout

\$50,800 over one year to upgrade the community's only recreation and fitness centre, making it more accessible especially to seniors and people with disabilities.

Corporation of the Town of Fort Frances

\$25,000 over one year to promote literacy among elementary school children and teens by providing tutoring and homework help programs at the library.

Corporation of the Town of Rainy River

\$11,000 over one year for furniture and equipment to improve the children's section of the library, making it a safer and more enjoyable environment for children and families in the community.

Corporation of the Township of Emo

\$29,000 over one year to purchase playground equipment, which will help provide social and recreational opportunities for children in the community.



Corporation of the Township of Oliver Paipoonge

\$50,200 over one year for renovations to the Nor-West Arena that will improve its safety, enabling the community to continue hosting tournaments and offering hockey programs and activities to children, youth and adults in the region.

Corporation of the Township of Terrace Bay - Library

\$11,000 over six months to purchase and install new shelving in the library, which will create spacious, safer and barrier-free access for all patrons.

Dryden Dolphins Swim Club

\$20,800 over one year to purchase swimming equipment, which will enable the club to attract more members and continue offering physical fitness activity for youth in the community.

EcoSuperior Environmental Programs

\$48,000 over one year to improve the effectiveness of the organization through a comprehensive strategic planning process, which will help increase the involvement of the Thunder Bay community in environmental initiatives.

Elizabeth Fry Society of Northwestern Ontario

\$48,000 over one year to recruit, train and coordinate volunteers to assist with the delivery of services for the rehabilitation of women in conflict with the law in the Thunder Bay area.

Emo Meals on Wheels Inc.

\$45,000 over one year to purchase a Handi-Transit vehicle, which will provide accessible transportation for people with disabilities and senior citizens in four neighbouring rural communities in the Emo area.

Equay-wuk (Women's Group) Inc.

\$51,000 over 10 months to provide cross-cultural training and resource materials to health care providers delivering services to people in 30 remote First Nation communities.

Family Services Thunder Bay

\$91,000 over two years to strengthen the capacity of the organization to earn revenue while continuing to provide family and credit counselling programs and services to low-income individuals, families and youth in the community.

Finn Fling 06 for Children & Youth c/o Thunder Bay Finnish Language School

\$6,300 over one year to plan and implement an international Finnish festival, which will provide cultural and recreational activities for children and youth, and encourage participation in Finnish cultural and heritage events in the future.

Fort William Curling and Athletic Club

\$35,000 over one year for equipment to improve the curling club and increase its capacity to host major national curling events for participants of all ages.

Ignace Bowling Club

\$75,000 over one year to add two five-pin bowling lanes to the facility, doubling the club's capacity and enabling it to accommodate more organized leagues, special events and regional tournaments.

John Howard Society of Thunder Bay

\$141,000 over two years to provide transitional housing for ex-offenders and help in their successful reintegration as contributing members of the community.

Kenogamisis Recreation Corporation

\$50,000 over one year for equipment to enable the organization to provide recreational opportunities for people of all ages in the Geraldton community and region.

Kenora Health Providers Group c/o Lake of the Woods Child Development Centre

\$44,000 over two years to encourage residents of all ages to participate in health and fitness activities in order to increase overall wellness in the community.

Kingfisher Lake Socio-Economic Development Corporation

\$26,800 over one year to purchase furniture and equipment for the new community centre, which will increase participation in cultural programs, activities and events by people of all ages and abilities.

Lakehead Festival of Music and the Arts

\$43,000 over one year to purchase a grand piano for use at the annual music festival, for piano exams and for community performances featuring visiting and local musicians from the Thunder Bay area.

Lakehead Search and Rescue Unit Inc.

\$10,000 over nine months to purchase equipment, which will enhance a volunteer service that provides valuable search-and-rescue assistance to the Thunder Bay community and region.

Lappe Nordic Ski Club

\$32,500 over one year to rent facilities and equipment and provide general support to host the National Cross Country Ski Championships in Thunder Bay in March 2006.

Manitouwadge Figure Skating Club

\$25,000 over one year for assistance with club operations to improve coaching and volunteer development and continue providing skating programs to children and youth in the community.

Mended Hearts

\$9,800 over one year to develop marketing materials and provide training, which will build the volunteer capacity of the organization and strengthen the group's ability to promote heart disease awareness and programs in Thunder Bay.

Muskrat Dam First Nation

\$60,000 over one year to purchase a dasherboard system for an outdoor ice rink that can be utilized year round for sports, cultural events and social gatherings.

Ne-Chee Friendship Centre

\$50,000 over one year for repairs to the existing facility, creating a safe and healthy environment for Aboriginal participants of all ages in Kenora and 10 neighbouring First Nation communities.

Northwestern Ontario Literacy Network o/a Literacy Northwest

\$20,000 over six months to support a literacy network conference to help improve the skills of adult learners and provide partnership opportunities for literacy and employment providers in Thunder Bay and Northwestern Ontario.

Our Kids Count of Thunder Bay Inc.

\$91,400 over three years to implement a volunteer management program to recruit, train and monitor volunteers in support of programs and services for low income families with children aged 6 and under in Thunder Bay.

PARO: Centre for Women's Enterprises

\$182,000 over three years for economic support programs to help women living in small communities in the Northwest region who are struggling to attain and/or maintain financial independence.

The Pictograph Gallery (Atikokan)

\$10,000 over one year to renovate the facility and purchase equipment that will enable the organization to continue providing visual art exhibits and programming to people of all ages and abilities in the community.

Port Arthur Curling & Athletic Club

\$75,000 over one year to replace essential equipment and allow the century-old curling club to continue providing recreational and sports activities for people of all ages.

Stanjikoming First Nation

\$12,000 over one year to purchase sports and fitness equipment and upgrade the outdoor rink facilities, which will help increase participation in fitness and sports activities by people of all ages in this community near Fort Frances.

Step Risers Project c/o Sounds of Superior Chorus

\$9,900 over one year to purchase portable risers and equipment that will improve safety and enable chorus groups to continue providing barbershop musical programming for people of all ages and abilities in Thunder Bay.

Thunder Bay District Fish & Game Association Inc.

\$25,000 over one year to purchase and install equipment for an indoor shooting range and continue offering programs to people of all ages and abilities.

Thunder Bay Figure Skating Club

\$19,200 over one year for equipment to enhance and improve the figure skating program for children and youth in the community.

Thunder Bay Multicultural Association

\$29,500 over one year to install a new furnace and heating system in the association's heritage facility, enabling it to continue providing cultural programming and settlement-assistance services for people of all ages and abilities in the community.

Thunder Bay Triathlon

\$69,400 over six months for the purchase of timing equipment to be used by eight partner organizations for local, regional, provincial and national sporting events for participants of all ages.

Township of Atikokan

\$14,500 over one year to purchase equipment, materials and furnishings for the library, which will help improve access to programs and services for people of all ages and abilities in the community.

The Underground Gym & Youth Centre Inc.

\$25,000 over one year for renovations to the facility, providing a safer venue that will encourage physical activity and healthy lifestyles for youth at risk in the community.

United Way/Lakehead Social Planning Council/211 Steering Committee c/o United Way of Thunder Bay

\$110,000 over two years for the development of a resource plan and implementation strategy to ensure the viability of 211 services, the three-digit number that facilitates access to community information and referrals in Thunder Bay and the region.

Wauzhushk Onigum Nation

\$8,000 over one year to purchase equipment to support a traditional powwow and other special events in the Kenora area that celebrate and reaffirm Aboriginal cultural values and customs.

Women's Place Kenora

\$35,000 over one year to help fund the Young Women Real Power Camp program and hire staff to deliver it. The program provides at-risk girls aged 12 to 18 years with skills that help foster self-confidence and a positive self-image.

Ontario Trillium Foundation province-wide grants

Making a difference across the province for 2005-2006

In 2005-2006, the Ontario Trillium Foundation awarded \$18,687,600 in 98 grants to organizations across Ontario. The Province-Wide Program is overseen by the Foundation's Board of Directors and supports initiatives that have a provincial impact. Work on initiatives funded through this program takes place in at least three geographical catchment areas or two in the North.
