Governor

Democrats: Dennis Aughtry, Tommy Moore, Frank Willis **Republicans:** Dr. Oscar Lovelace, Mark Sanford (I)

Sanford wants to be the first governor since the late Carroll Campbell to win a second term. Sanford has had a rocky first term with the Legislature, underscored in 2004 when he carried squirming piglets to the state House door to complain about pork-barrel spending. Sanford tried to tone that down this year and said he would emphasize the need to work with legislators, but sparks flew just a month into the session as he panned budget proposals coming out of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Aughtry: Born Dec. 8, 1945 in Greenwood. Bachelor's degree in English, Lander University; master's degree in English, Georgia Southern University, 1969; law degree, University of South Carolina, 1978. Single, no children. Joined the Army after earning his master's degree and entered officer candidate school as the Vietnam War wound down. Aughtry was in private practice before becoming assistant attorney then attorney for Richland County. Served nearly two years as acting county administrator. His top issues are health care, property taxes, assistance for single parents and legalized, Mississippi-style casino gambling, which could allow the state to "do away with taxes altogether."

Lovelace: Born Sept. 23, 1959, in Forest Acres. Family practice doctor in Prosperity. Bachelor's degree from Clemson University, 1981. Graduated from the Medical University of South Carolina and served his residency at the University of Virginia. He and his wife, Mary, have four children. Lovelace contributed to Sanford's 2002 campaign and served on a gubernatorial panel examining the state's medical needs. He says he entered the race after Sanford neglected health care ideas that could save the state money. Lovelace says he'll campaign on addressing the state's medical needs, particularly by raising the state's lowest-inthe-nation cigarette tax.

Moore: Born May 8, 1950, in Aiken. Bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies, University of South Carolina-Aiken, 1989. Founder and owner of Boiler Efficiency Inc. in Clearwater. Has served in the state Senate since 1981 after holding a state House seat 1979-80. Known as a Senate dealmaker for both parties. Moore says the state is falling short socially and economically under Sanford. He says he'll push for a "Marshall Plan" to address the state's education needs. He's capitalized on resentment that grew out of Sanford's efforts to put a price tag on Santee Cooper, the state-run utility. The move was seen as precursor to a potential sale and created backlash – as well as donors for Moore's campaign. He and his wife, Dale, have two children.

Bachelor's degree in business, Furman University, 1983; master's of business administration, University of Virginia, 1988. Defeated incumbent Democrat Jim Hodges by 4 percentage points in 2002. Served in the U.S. House for three terms before honoring a term limits pledge and leaving office in 2001. He and his wife, Jenny, have four children. Sanford frequently is at odds with the Republican-controlled Legislature's leadership. Sanford has cajoled legislators into addressing deficit spending and getting the state's financial house in order. The state lost its AAA credit rating with Standard & Poor's while he chaired the state Budget and Control Board, and he's faced persistent criticism for the state's unemployment rate, one of the highest in the country. His greatest legislative successes have come as he helped push longtime Republican priorities, such as limits on lawsuits.

Willis: Born Oct. 19, 1941, in Bennettsville. Bachelor's degree in psychology, University of South Carolina, 1964. Chairman of Willis Construction Co. Has been Florence mayor since 1995 and former chairman of Florence Economic Development Authority. He and his wife, Marguerite Smith, have no children. Statewide campaign chairman for Choose Children First, a group set up to challenge Sanford's and legislators' plans to create tax credits for parents sending their children to private schools. His campaign emphasizes bringing more jobs to South Carolina to "get our state back to work." Willis has lagged Moore in fundraising, but he ended 2005 by putting \$500,000 of his own cash into the race, quieting critics who questioned whether he'd last through the primary.

Lieutenant Governor

Democrat: Robert Barber **Republicans:** Andre Bauer (I), Mike Campbell, Dr. Henry Jordan

Bauer, known for nonstop campaigning and constituent service, is seeking a second term. He faces the son of a popular former governor and a former state Board of Education member in the primary and, if he wins, a former legislator in November. At 33, Bauer became one of the nation's youngest lieutenant governors.

Barber: Born July 29, 1949, in Charleston. Bachelor's degree from Wofford College. Master's of divinity from Duke University. Law degree from the South Texas College of Law. He and his wife, LaNelle, have a daughter, a son and two grandchildren. Former minister in two Laurens County churches. Elected to the Charleston County School Board in 1984; served as chairman, 1986-1988. Elected to the state House in 1988 and served until 1994. Ran as the Democratic candidate in 1994 for the 1st District seat but lost to now-Gov. Mark Sanford. Owns and operates Bowen's Island Seafood Restaurant near Folly Beach. Former lobbyist for various nonprofit groups including the Sierra Club, South Carolina Wildlife Federation and the American Cancer Society. Believes the lieutenant governor should be an "economic ambassador" for the state and focus on small, rural counties. Wants to use the position to advocate for improving public schools and growth that is environmentally friendly.


