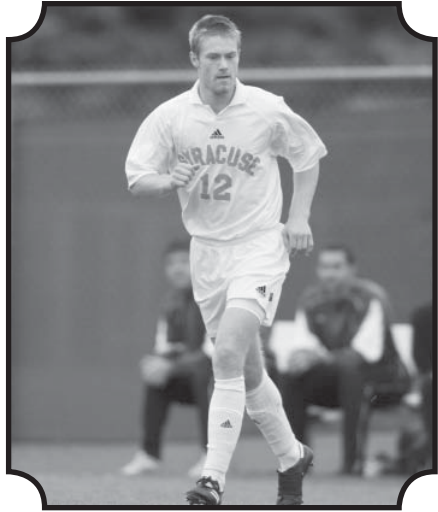

2006 Season Preview



Forward Spencer Schomaker led all SU true freshmen in scoring last season with six points.

The 2006 Orange return 85 percent of its offense and seven of its eight goal scorers from a 2005 club that earned its first BIG EAST Championship berth in five seasons. Their talents, as well as several returning members of a stingy defense that posted the fifth-best team goals against average (0.89) in school history, will be the driving force behind SU's 2006 run at the BIG EAST title.

Overall, Syracuse returns eight starters and 12 letterwinners from last season. Head coach **Dean Foti**, now in his 16th season, also brought in 13 newcomers, which will create healthy competition for playing time and give Foti the luxury of using several different lineups.

"This year, more so than any year that I've been here, we'll have more depth," said Foti. "With the numbers we have the training sessions are going to be more competitive, which in turn will make us sharper. No player can afford a couple of poor practices. Doing so could cost him his spot in the lineup."

Forwards

Sophomore **Pete Rowley** is the leader of a young group of talented offensive players. The Reading, Pa. native led the Orange in points (13), goals (6) and tied for the team lead with two game-winning goals in 2005. Joining Rowley up front is sophomore **Spencer Schomaker** and junior **Justin Van Houten**. Schomaker had a solid rookie campaign, tallying two goals and two assists last year. He demonstrated a consistent ability to finish scoring opportunities, including netting the golden goal versus Cornell. Van Houten appeared in 17 matches last season and registered his first career point, assisting on the Orange's first goal in a 2-1 victory versus Adelphi.

"Pete and Spencer have good size and bring a great deal of athleticism to the table," said Foti. "Justin may be our most improved player coming out of the spring. He's a real hard worker that we can use up front."

The remainder of SU's offensive unit is made up of newcomers. The Orange added **Tom Perevegyencev** in January. SU also brought in freshmen **Scott Campbell** and **Erik Kreider**, who were consistent scholastic scorers. Rookies **Elliott Townsend** and **Jake Young**, along with transfer **Kyle Hall**, will also challenge for playing time.

"We've got a lot of players we can use," said Foti of the forwards. "The challenge is to see who plays well with whom and which combinations can perform at a high level consistently."

Midfielders

The Orange midfield is made up of a blend of veterans and newcomers. Junior **Isaac Collings** is the team's most dynamic playmaker, using his speed to create scoring chances. He led the Orange with five assists in 2005 and ranked second on the club with seven points. Senior co-captain **Richard**

Asante is SU's most experienced player with 47 collegiate matches under his belt. Asante netted a personal-best two goals last season, while serving as a steady defensive presence.

"We want Rich to take charge of the midfield," said Foti. "We're looking for him to be a leader game-in and game-out and consistently perform at a high level. Isaac has grown as a player, but we want him to take on more responsibility as a scorer."

Another player Foti believes will raise his game is junior **James Goodwin**. Goodwin has played in all 36 games the last two years and tallied his first career goal last season, netting the game-winner against USF.

"James has always been solid, but he's another guy we're looking for to step up and take on more of a leadership role this year," said Foti.

Sophomores **Eric Kleiman** and **Jimmy Linus** are back for their second SU campaigns and will also be key contributors. Kleiman appeared in 12 games last season and Linus competed in 18 matches. Both players found the scoring column in 2005 with Linus registering his first career point with an assist on Kleiman's first collegiate goal.

"Eric improved by leaps and bounds," said Foti. "He's getting better at reading the game and combining with other players. He's a guy we can also use up front. Jimmy had a good spring and is going to be right there fighting for time with everyone else."

Also competing for playing time in the midfield are returning sophomores **Mauricio Laniado** and **Anton Nicholls**.

"For Mauricio and Anton the preseason is a great opportunity to earn a spot," said Foti. "They've improved and will try to emerge from a talented pool of midfield players."

Freshman **Hansen Woodruff**, Florida's 2006 Player of the Year, netted 86 goals in his scholastic career and tallied 52 assists. Along with Woodruff, freshmen **Felipe Godard**, **Luis Martinez** and **Geoff Lytle** are also in the mix.

"Hansen is an athletic, tough kid. We're hoping he will be an attacking player for us," said Foti. Geoff is a really good possession player, keeping the ball moving and bringing a lot of energy to the game. Luis is a very technical player. He started with us in January and we hope he can add some spark to the attack from the midfield. Felipe is another guy that could play his way into the picture during preseason."

Defenders

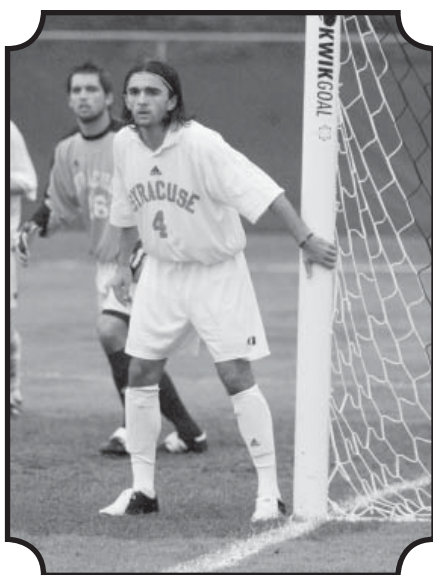
Once again, SU's back line will be anchored by junior **Brad Peetoom**. Peetoom earned the team's Defensive MVP Award for the second straight year in 2005 and spent a portion of the offseason working out at a Canadian minicamp for 2008 Olympic hopefuls. He also became a factor on the offensive end of the field, serving as one of SU's primary targets on set pieces. Also back in the defensive fold is junior **Edvin Hot** and senior **Andrew Hawtin**. Hawtin started every game for the Orange in 2005 and notched his first career point with an assist. Hot appeared in every game last year and made two starts.

"Brad and Andrew were both solid starters last year," Foti said. "I expect them to be on top of their game again this year. Edvin started some games in the back last year and will be vying for a starting spot in preseason."

SU's defensive unit will be bolstered by the return of junior **Aaron Bonser**. Bonser missed all of 2005 with a leg injury, but played in 31 matches in 2003 and 2004.

"Aaron was a starter for us when he was healthy, so he is going to be looking to get back in there," said Foti. "He brings versatility, experience and athleticism to the back four."

Junior **Tyler Stoviak** will also compete for playing time in the back, along with sophomore **Ryan Teager** and freshmen **Ryan McCormick** and **Pete Hill**. Freshman **Daniel Sherry** had offseason surgery on his knee, but will figure in the defensive mix when he returns.

"Tyler and Ryan Teager have really improved in the last couple of years," said Foti. "They are very competitive players and will try to work themselves into the mix. Ryan (McCormick) and Pete can play anywhere in the back and Daniel is a very versatile player as well, so when he comes back that group gives us a lot of options."

Goalkeepers

Sophomore **Robert Cavicchia** returns for his second season as the starting keeper after a sensational rookie campaign. Cavicchia started all 19 matches as a freshman in 2005 and ranked fifth on SU's season goals against average list with a 0.86 GAA. He tied for fifth in the BIG EAST in saves per game (4.0), shutouts (6) and began his career with a shutout streak of more than 413 minutes, the longest such stretch for an SU keeper in 19 years. The other goalkeepers on SU's roster are freshman **Andrew Usyk** and transfer **Robert Smith**. Usyk hasn't seen any collegiate action, but showed improvement during the offseason and will add depth to the position.

"We're very high on Robert (Cavicchia)," said Foti. "Hopefully he will be fit and injury free. He's the incumbent. Robert and Andrew will be chasing him."

The Schedule

SU's 2006 slate will once again prove to be challenging. The Orange's 16 foes combined for 152 wins in 2005 and six of its opponents advanced to last year's NCAA Men's College Cup. Syracuse will open the year at home against Niagara on August 25. The Orange also entertains Albany, Binghamton and Hartwick in non-conference home matches. SU's lone non-league road game will come on Sept. 1 when the Orange competes at Loyola (Md.).

The BIG EAST will keep the same divisional alignment as it had a year ago with the 16 members separated into two eight-team divisions. Once again, the Orange will compete in the Red Division.

SU's league slate kicks off on Sept. 8 with an inter-division road match versus Georgetown. The Orange will also play Blue Division foe Seton Hall away from the SU Soccer Stadium. SU's remaining road contests will come against intra-division opponents Cincinnati, St. John's, Villanova and USF.

Its home BIG EAST schedule begins on Sept. 15 with a match against inter-division rival Providence. SU will also take on Connecticut in an out-of-division match. The balance of the Orange's home conference slate is made up of divisional foes Louisville, Rutgers and DePaul.

The 2006 conference championship will feature the top 12 teams in the league with the top six in each division earning berths in the tournament. The top two teams in each division will receive byes into the quarterfinal round. This year's two semifinals and the championship match will be played in Piscataway, N.J. from Nov. 3-5.

"We're fortunate to play in a really strong conference," said Foti. "The BIG EAST sent seven teams to the Men's College Cup, so our schedule prepares us for NCAA Tournament-level competition."

The Bottom Line

"It's going to be an interesting first part of the season in terms of answering the questions of who's fit, who's injury free, and who's playing at the top of their game," said Foti. "It's going to be different from other years in that we will have a lot of options. It may take some time to see who works best together. What we're trying to do may not look as refined as it could in the beginning, but it's not where you are in September, it's where you are in October that counts."

SU head coach **Dean Foti** has accumulated more wins than any other Orange soccer coach in his 15 seasons on the sideline. Foti has a school-record 117 victories, including four seasons of at least 10 triumphs, and 11 wins versus ranked opponents since 1997.

Foti's 15 seasons marks the second-longest coaching tenure in the history of Orange soccer behind Arthur Horrocks' 22-year stint as the SU mentor.

Foti has guided the Orange to a top-25 ranking in four of the last six seasons and the Orange has at least one win versus a ranked team in seven of the last eight campaigns. Foti and the Orange were ranked as high as 18th during the 2001 season, the second straight year the squad was among the nation's top 20.

Foti's student-athletes have also found success after Syracuse. Chris Aloisi, captain of the 2003 team, was drafted by the Los Angeles Galaxy of Major League Soccer. He is still in the league currently competing for the Houston Dynamo.

The Orange has had a player selected in the USL First Division College Draft in eight of the last nine years, including 2006 when Ezra Prendergast was selected by the Rochester Raging Rhinos. Prendergast was also picked in the MLS Supplemental Draft by the Chicago Fire. Syracuse has also had players compete in the NPSL, WISL and USISL.

Foti has coached 33 student-athletes to All-BIG EAST honors in his 15 seasons, including eight first-team selections. Two players have been named the conference's Rookie of the Year during his tenure, including 2001 winner Jarett Park. Park led the nation in assists and was named

national Freshman of the Year by *Soccer America Magazine*. Foti's players have also been recognized as some of the best in the region. Twenty-eight of his charges have received All-New York Region honors, including 14 first-teamers.

Foti coached the 2000 Orange to its first top-25 ranking since 1997 after Syracuse upset top-ranked, and eventual national champion Connecticut on the road. Foti and the Orange made their second consecutive BIG EAST Tournament appearance that season, a first for the program since 1995 and 1996. In 2005, he guided SU to the conference tournament for the fifth time. On its way, the Orange knocked off a pair of ranked league opponents in USF and Cincinnati.

The 1999 NSCAA/adidas New York Region Coach of the Year, Foti led the Orange to 11 wins that season, the highest single-season total in his tenure. The squad finished the year ranked second in the region, boasting wins versus a pair of top-25 teams.

Even before his tenure on the sidelines began, Foti was a part of Syracuse soccer history. A four-year starter from 1979-82, Foti captained the squad his junior and senior seasons, leading the Orange to the inaugural BIG EAST Tournament title and a school-record 17 wins. He is one of just 17 SU players to wear the captain's armband for more than one season.

Prior to returning to Syracuse, Foti spent six years as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland. He was an integral part of the staff that led the

Terrapins from a dormant ACC program to an NCAA Tournament team in 1986. Foti also was a graduate assistant at Syracuse in 1984 and an assistant at Fayetteville-Manlius High School (N.Y.) in 1983 before joining the Maryland staff.

In addition to his duties with the Orange, Foti is an active clinician. He serves on the Olympic Development Program (ODP) Region I staff, and has served on the USSF National Coaching School's staff. Previously he worked on the ODP staffs of both New York West and Maryland. Foti is currently the assistant coach of the U-17 Region I Olympic Development Team. His squad has travelled the globe, playing in tournaments in France (1996-97, 2004, 2006), Brazil (1998, 2003), Switzerland (1999), Morocco (2000), Spain (2002) and England (2004).

Foti is a member of several coaching organizations. He is the current vice president of The BIG EAST Conference Men's Soccer Coaches' Association and served as the organization's president from 1996-98. He was also a member of the NSCAA Regional Ratings Committee (N.Y.) from 1993-98, serving as chairman in 1994 and 1995. He served three terms on the NCAA Regional Advisory Committee for the Division I Men's Soccer Championship (1992-94, 1998-2000 and 2004-05).

Foti has been involved in youth soccer, directing summer camps for 21 years. After co-directing the 1985 Syracuse Soccer Camp, he successfully started and directed the University of Maryland camp from 1986-90. Since 1991, Foti has run the popular SU Boys Soccer Camp.

Foti graduated from Syracuse in 1983 and received his master's degree in physical education from SU in 1985. He holds both a USSF "A" license and a NSCAA Advanced National Diploma.

Foti, a native of Oneonta, N.Y., and his wife, Holly, have three daughters -- Riley, and twins, Sophia and Lainey. The Fotis reside in Syracuse.

JARO ZAWISLAN
Assistant Coach
Clemson, 1993

Jaro Zawislan is in his fifth year as an assistant coach for the Orange. Zawislan assists with all aspects of the Syracuse program, including recruiting, opponent scouting, game preparation and player training. In 2003, he helped put together one of the top 40 recruiting classes in the nation according to collegesoccernews.com.

In addition, Zawislan works with the Orange's goalkeepers. Under his tutelage, sophomore Robert Cavicchia had one of the most successful rookie campaigns in team history in 2005, finishing fifth in the BIG EAST in saves (76) and tied for fifth with six shutouts. Cavicchia posted a 0.86 goals against average, the fourth-best mark in school history. Zawislan also mentored former SU keeper Alim Karim who was a member of the Canadian Olympic team (U-23) for the CONCACAF Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico and helped lead the Canadian U-20 squad to the quarterfinals of the 2003 FIFA World Youth Championship. Karim ranked in the top 10 in the BIG EAST in saves per game three times.

Zawislan came to SU from Stanford, where he was an assistant coach and goalkeeper specialist for the nationally-ranked men's and women's teams.

Zawislan has coached in two NCAA Men's College Cup final fours. In 2001, he helped guide Stanford to the national semifinals, its first Pac-10 title and the best record in school history (19-2-1).

In 2000, Zawislan helped Creighton to a second-place finish in the Men's College Cup and the Missouri Valley Conference Tournament championship. The Bluejays set a school record with 22 victories and became the first team in school history to reach an NCAA championship game. In 1999, Creighton boasted the lowest team goals against average in Division I and goalkeeper Tom Zawislan, Jaro's brother, was named an All-American.

Zawislan graduated from Clemson in 1993. He was the starting goalkeeper in every game of his four-year career, and was the MVP of the 1993 ACC Tournament. He was a three-time All-ACC and four-time All-South Region selection. The two-time Tigers' MVP holds the Clemson records for career saves (448), season saves (134) and career starts (88).

A national All-Academic selection, Zawislan received the Jim Weaver Award, presented annually to the top male ACC student-athletes.

Zawislan went on to play professionally with the Columbia Heat of the USISL, where he was an Atlantic Division All-Star. He later moved to Arka Gdynia, a Division II professional team in Poland, and then played for the Detroit Neon/Safari of the Continental Indoor Soccer League.

Zawislan holds a USSF "B" License, NSCAA National Diploma and an NSCAA Goalkeeper Academy Diploma. In 2000, Zawislan coached the Nebraska ODP Men's Open U-23 squad and the Nebraska State ODP goalkeepers.

Prior to his time at Creighton, Zawislan coached at the Canadian Soccer Academy and was a player-coach with the Heat.

Zawislan earned his master's degree in liberal studies from Creighton in 2001. He holds a bachelor's degree in computer science from Clemson, as well as a bachelor's of education from the University of Toronto which he received in 1999.



RYAN HICKEY
Assistant Coach
Syracuse, 2005

Ryan Hickey is in his second season on the sideline after completing his playing career with the Orange in 2004. He assists with all facets of the program, including recruiting, training and game preparation.

Hickey was a tri-captain for SU in his senior year. Following the season, he was honored with the Frank Schantz Award given to individuals who have demonstrated their commitment to the SU program through their on-field performance, character and citizenship. A four-year letterwinner at defender and midfielder, he finished his career with a goal and two assists in 60 games.

Hickey was named to the SU Athletic Director's Honor Roll all 10 semesters of his undergraduate career (redshirted due to injury in 2001). He was a four-time BIG EAST Academic All-Star, and was twice named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District I Second Team.

Hickey is a native of Spencerport, N.Y. and a 2000 graduate of Spencerport High School. He was a first-team all-state selection in 1999 and was named the Monroe County Section V Division II Player of the Year in 1998 and 1999.

A 2005 graduate of SU, Hickey earned his bachelor's degree in social studies education and history. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in public administration at Syracuse's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs.

2005 Season In Review



Ezra Prendergast was selected in the third round of the MLS Supplemental Draft by the Chicago Fire. He was also picked in the USL Draft by the Rochester Raging Rhinos.

PRENDERGAST EARNS ALL-REGION HONORS AGAIN; CALLED BY PROS

Defender **Ezra Prendergast** earned NSCAA All-New York Region honors for the second consecutive season in 2005. He was a second-team selection after being a third-team choice in 2004. Prendergast was also recognized by the BIG EAST Conference's coaches who named him to the all-league second team. Prendergast tallied a goal and an assist in 2005 and was an integral part of six SU shutouts. Against nationally-ranked Cincinnati, Prendergast set an SU team record for the fastest goal to begin a match, scoring 57 seconds into the contest. The professional ranks took notice. He was selected with the 34th overall pick by the Chicago Fire in the MLS Supplemental Draft and tabbed with the 23rd pick by the Rochester Raging Rhinos in the USL First Division Collegiate Draft.

SU RETURNS TO BIG EAST CONFERENCE TOURNAMENT

The Orange made its first BIG EAST Championship appearance in five seasons in 2005. Syracuse earned the sixth seed in the Red Division and its postseason trip marked the 13th time the Orange reached the conference championship tournament. It also represented the fifth appearance under head coach **Dean Foti**. The Orange squared off against the Blue Division's third seed, Notre Dame, in South Bend in the tournament's opening round. SU gave the Fighting Irish all they could handle, playing them to a scoreless draw for 110 minutes. Notre Dame eventually advanced to the second round, besting the Orange, 4-2, in a penalty-kick shootout.

FRESHMAN PHENOM

Goalkeeper **Robert Cavicchia** made his impact felt right away, beginning his career by holding opponents scoreless for more than 413 minutes, including three shutouts. It was the longest shutout streak by an SU keeper in 19 years. Cavicchia continued his terrific play, starting all 19 of the Orange's contests in 2005 and posting six shutouts. He finished with a 0.86 goals against average, the fifth-best mark in school history, and a .817 save percentage, the second-best total for an SU freshman. Cavicchia was named to the Soccer America National Team of the Week after making a season-high 11 saves against Cincinnati. That same week he was also tabbed the BIG EAST Rookie of the Week and ECAC Goalkeeper of the Week. Cavicchia finished the year ranked 25th nationally in save percentage.

STARTING A NEW STREAK

Syracuse, which had its string of seven consecutive campaigns with at least one win against a top-25 team stopped in 2004, began a new streak in 2005 with victories against #22 South Florida and #18 Cincinnati at the SU Soccer Stadium. The Orange played a total of five games against ranked opponents in 2005 and was 2-3 in those contests. All three losses versus nationally-ranked clubs came by the score of 1-0. Since the start of the 1997 season, SU has 11 triumphs against ranked teams.

DEFENSE DOMINATES

In addition to the play of **Robert Cavicchia** between the posts, the Orange got a superb effort from the rest of its defense in 2005. The Orange finished the year with an overall team goals against average of 0.89, its best mark since 1996 and the fifth-best total in school history. SU allowed more than two goals just twice in 19 matches and five of its seven wins came via shutout. Syracuse ranked third in the BIG EAST in fewest goals allowed (18) and fourth in the conference in team goals against average.

PEETOOM INVITED TO ELITE NATIONAL CAMP

Brad Peetoom was one of 16 players selected to compete in a Canadian U-23 mini-camp by senior national team coach Frank Yallop. The camp featured several players that will be eligible to compete for Team Canada at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, including Peetoom who has 18 international caps to his credit playing for the Canadian U-17 and U-20 squads.



Pete Rowley rebounded from a season-ending leg injury in 2004 to lead the Orange in points and goals in 2005. He was selected as SU's Most Valuable Offensive Player.

FOTI HELPS REGION I ODP TO CHAMPIONSHIP BERTH

Orange head coach **Dean Foti** visited France as an assistant coach of the Region I ODP staff. He helped guide the squad to an appearance in the championship match at the Trophée de l'Avenir, a two-day, eight-team tournament held in Angers. The Region I ODP lost the title tilt on penalty kicks, however, 5-4. Overall the Americans had a good showing, posting a victory and three draws, including its tie against Espanyol of Spain in the championship game.

HANDING OUT TEAM AWARDS

Offensive MVP - Pete Rowley

Rowley led the Orange in points (13) and goals (6) in 2005. He scored a career-best two markers at Providence on Sept. 23 and tallied the first assist of his career against Louisville. He was selected to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll twice in 2005.

Defensive MVP - Brad Peetoom

Peetoom was selected as the Defensive MVP for the second consecutive year. He contributed to an Orange defense that ranked fourth in the BIG EAST in goals against average (0.89). He was named the league's Defensive Player of the Week after netting the game-winning goal versus Loyola.

Frank Schantz Award - Mike McCallion

The Schantz Award is given to those individuals who have demonstrated their commitment to the SU program through their on-field performance, character and citizenship. McCallion, a 2005 team captain, was a member of the Athletic Director's Honor Roll every semester and was a four-time BIG EAST Academic All-Star. He recorded a personal-best four assists in 2005.

2005 BIG EAST Review

The BIG EAST Conference

In 2006-07, the BIG EAST will be in its second year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference. The first year with 16 members was wrought with curiosity among those in the world of collegiate athletics and in the media, but the league thrived in its new alignment, enjoying significant success in the athletic arenas, on the playing fields and in the classroom.

The goals of the BIG EAST have remained constant throughout its history -- to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

In men's basketball last year, BIG EAST squads secured a league-record eight NCAA bids. Seven BIG EAST women's basketball teams earned NCAA berths. In football, West Virginia garnered the attention of the college football world with its victory over Georgia in the Nokia Sugar Bowl. The Mountaineers were the BIG EAST's representative in the Bowl Championship Series.

In 2005-06, the BIG EAST welcomed five new members to increase its membership to 16: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida. Some were ready to call the new BIG EAST alignment too unwieldy, but the league showed that there can be strength in numbers even when that number is a large one.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 123 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

Last year, the Villanova women's cross country team was named the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Cross Country Program. The Wildcats have won seven NCAA team titles since 1981. Former Wildcat standout Carole Zajac was named the top individual performer of the women's cross country era.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors. Last year, West Virginia's Joe Herber was named the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American of the Year in men's basketball.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA

crowns the previous year, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last seven women's basketball crowns and three of the last eight men's titles.

Moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The BIG EAST has continually turned challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST athletes have earned All America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented on U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

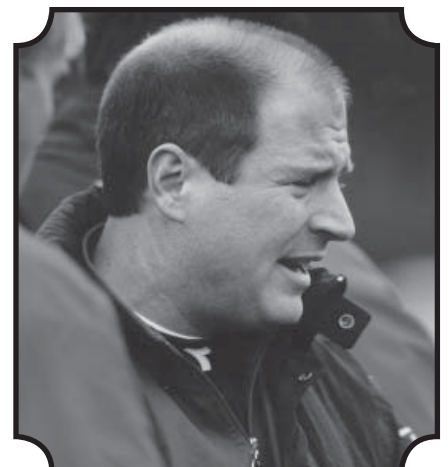


John McCallion (1993-95) and Mike McCallion (2004-2005) are the most recent set of brothers to each wear the captain's armband for the Orange.

The wearing of the captain's armband dates back to Syracuse's first varsity season in 1920. Every player selected to serve as team captain shares the common bond of being one of a chosen few to represent the most ideal characteristics of a Syracuse University student-athlete. As an Orange captain, one must gain the confidence of his coaches and the respect of his teammates. As an extension of the coach, he must exhibit leadership, character, good judgement and the ability to motivate others. Superior play, composure in critical situations and the ability to communicate to both coaches and teammates are the trademarks of an effective captain. A leader both on and off the field, the captain must set the standard for excellence.

Among those who have worn the captain's armband are All-America selections **John McEwan, Vincent Black** and **Paul Young**. In addition, **Steve Morris**, SU's all-time points leader, and **Dean Foti**, SU's current head coach, have earned the honor. **Chris Aloisi** (2001-03) and **John McCallion** (1993-95) are only players in Syracuse history to wear the armband for three seasons.

Steve Morris (1986, 1988-90) Milwaukee Wave

Four-year letterwinner and two-time Orange captain Steve Morris had his jersey retired by the Milwaukee Wave of the National Professional Soccer League on March 3, 2002. Morris was the first Milwaukee player since 1992 to have his number hung from the rafters.

Morris spent nine seasons with Milwaukee starting in 1992. He is among the franchise's top 10 all-time with 325 games played, 190 goals scored, 230 assists and 590 points. He scored a career-best 98 points during the 1999-2000 season.

Morris also made his mark with the Orange. He is SU's all-time leading scorer with 129 points. He ranks first on the Syracuse assists ledger with 43 helpers in four seasons. He also set the school's single-season record for assists (16) and points (50) in 1989. Morris ranks second all-time at SU with 43 goals.

Morris was the BIG EAST Northern Division Player of the Year in 1989 and the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year in 1990. He was also a three-time first team all-region selection (1988-90).

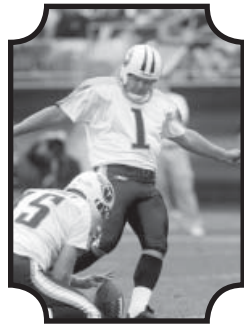

Houston Dynamo (MLS). Aloisi was a sixth-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Galaxy in the 2004 MLS SuperDraft. Aloisi made his MLS debut on June 6, 2004 versus the Chicago Fire in a game televised nationally by ESPN2. 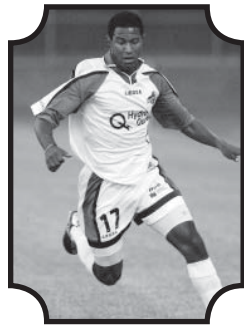

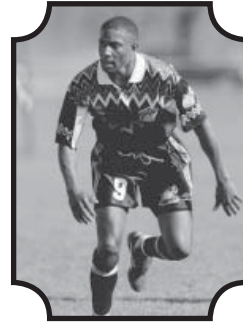
all-time at SU with 16 assists, including a career-best eight in 2001.

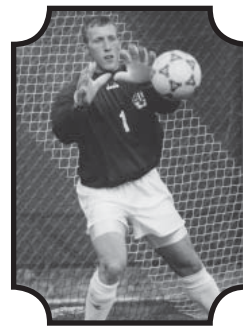
for the Rhinos. At Syracuse, Britton was a second-team all-region pick in 1990.

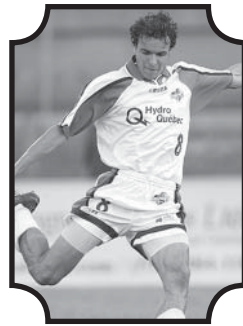
defender. He played professionally with the Syracuse Salty Dogs of the A-League in 2004.

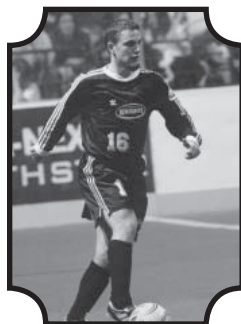

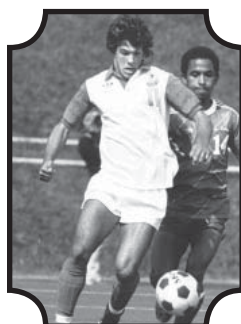
with six goals, seven assists and 19 points. His best season was in 2001 when he had four goals, one assist and nine points. Hall played both midfield and defender during his career.

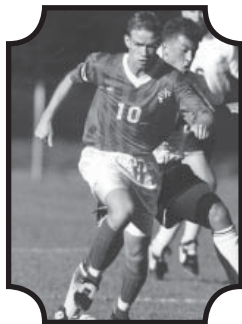

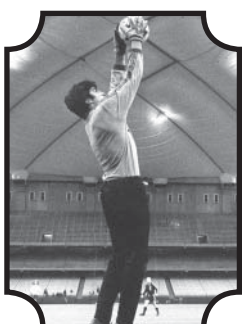

Western Mass Pioneers (USL Pro Select). Kolodziej holds the SU record for most goals in a season (18) and is fourth on SU's all-time scoring list with 82 points. Kolodziej was the first player ever signed by Western Mass. He played five seasons for the Pioneers before joining the coaching staff.



John McCallion • 1992-95

North Jersey Imperials (USISL). A three-time captain, John McCallion was originally drafted by the Rochester Rhinos (A-League) in 1996. He spent 1996-97 with North Jersey and 1998 with the New York Capitol District Alleycats (USISL) before returning to North Jersey in 1999.



Joe Papaleo • 1979-82

Dallas Sidekicks (Continental Indoor Soccer League). The only SU goalkeeper to be named All-American, Joe Papaleo played 11 seasons of professional soccer, including seven with the Dallas Sidekicks. Papaleo holds the SU goalkeeping records for shutouts in a season (12), wins in a season (17), career shutouts (36) and career wins (44). He was the 1982 *Soccer America*

Goalkeeper of the Year. Papaleo returned to Syracuse to coach the boys team at Christian Brothers Academy. He also appeared frequently as a color commentator for Time Warner Sports on television broadcasts of Syracuse men's and women's soccer.



Eric Puls • 1989-92

Reading Rage (USL Pro Select). In addition to his playing duties in Reading, Puls was named head coach of the Rage in 2001. He is the team's all-time leader in scoring, assists and games played. He spent two years in Germany playing for German third division club Rot Weiss Waldorf before returning to the U.S. and the St. Louis Knights (USISL) in 1995. In 1996, he was drafted by the Colorado Rapids of the MLS.



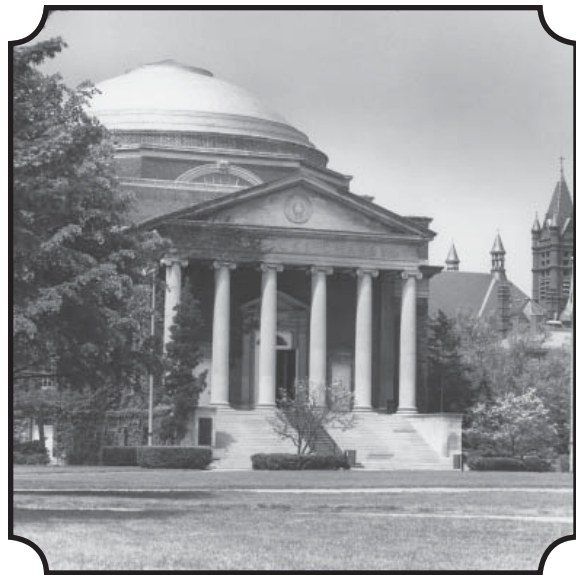
Paul Young • 1990-92

Rochester Raging Rhinos (A-League). The three-time BIG EAST All-Conference selection and SU's most recent All-American spent two seasons with the Charleston Battery (USISL). In 1994, he was the Most Valuable Player in the Atlantic Division of the USISL. Young spent 1996 splitting duty between the Columbus Crew and World Cup qualification matches with the

Jamaican National Team. Young spent the 1998 season with the Tampa Bay Mutiny (MLS). In 2000, he joined the Jamaican National Team Program staff. Young now works with the U-16, U-17 and U-20 Jamaican National Teams.

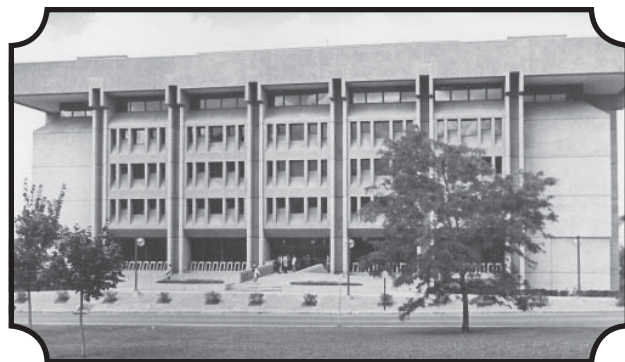

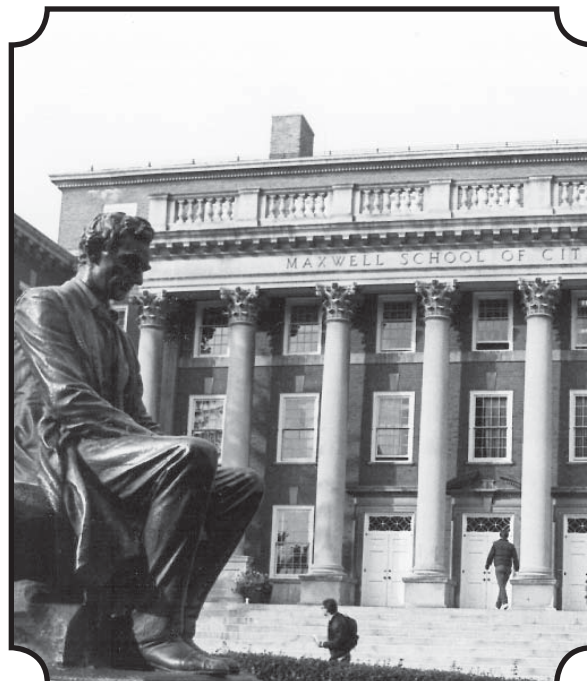

Nancy Cantor, Ph.D., is President and Chancellor of Syracuse University. She received her A.B. in 1974 from Sarah Lawrence College and her Ph.D. in Psychology in 1978 from Stanford



University. Dr. Cantor’s fields of specialization are personality and social psychology, and personality and cognition.

Prior to her appointment as president and chancellor, she served as chancellor of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign; provost and executive vice president for academic affairs at the University of Michigan; dean of the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies and vice provost for academic affairs at the University of Michigan; chair of the department of psychology at Princeton University; and professor of psychology and senior research scientist at the Institute of Social Research.

She has co-authored and co-edited several books, and is the author and co-author of numerous book chapters and scientific journal articles. She is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences. Dr. Cantor received the American Psychological Association’s Distinguished Scientific Award for Early Career Contribution to Psychology and the Anti-Defamation League’s Woman of Achievement Award.

She is the past chair of the board of directors of the American Association for Higher Education and is also chair of the board of the American Council on Education. She serves on the board of trustees of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences and the American Institutes for Research. She has served on the board of trustees of Sarah Lawrence College, as a member of the Advisory Board of the National Survey of Student Engagement and on various advisory boards and study sections of the National Science Foundation and the National Research Council, and a Congressional Commission on Military and Gender-Related Issues.

TEACHING AS A PRIORITY AND INTEGRATION OF FACULTY RESEARCH

Faculty members are encouraged to bring their first-hand research into the classroom for student discussion and analysis. An undergraduate research program exposes students to faculty projects.

CLASSROOM OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH SMALLER CLASSES

Fewer than three percent of all classes taught have more than 100 students. The faculty-to-student ratio is 1:14 and average class size is just more than 30 students. Larger introductory course lectures occur during the first two years and always include a smaller discussion section or lab.

INTRODUCTION AND STRENGTHENING OF FIRST-YEAR GATEWAY COURSES

Freshman-level courses outline opportunities within each undergraduate college and the eventual job field. Course material provides information for student in their preparation for choosing a major, and, ultimately, a career. Writing studios of fewer than 20 students are required for all freshmen.

ADVISING OPPORTUNITIES

Students receive close attention from faculty and peer (student) advisors. All faculty members have posted office hours and are eager to meet with students. The Syracuse Academic Improvement Program offers services to student who require assistance with learning strategies. Syracuse University's All-University Program to Strengthen Academic Advising won an Outstanding Advising Program Award from the National Academic Advising Association. Faculty members are accessible and help is always available.

UNIVERSITY-WIDE SUPPORT THROUGHOUT UNDERGRADUATE TENURE

Beyond regular advising, students are supported during their entire stay at Syracuse University through tutoring, summer academic programs, mentoring, and comprehensive career advising. All-University and college-based services are available.

DR. DARYL GROSS

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

His vision to ensure that Syracuse, year in and year out, is recognized as one of the great athletic institutions in the country, is what drives Director of Athletics Dr. Daryl Gross. His mission for SU Athletics is to compete and perform at the highest level in everything – on the playing field, in the classroom, with facilities, and in the community. The principles he believes in include winning championships, graduating all of the student-athletes, maintaining compliance to all NCAA rules and being fiscally sound. A 14-year athletics administration veteran, Gross understands the proud name and great athletics tradition of Syracuse University.

“Whenever I hear the name Syracuse University, I think of greatness,” Gross says. “It has a phenomenal history. Every team will have the opportunity to win and graduate its student-athletes. We will work to meet our expectations with energy and enthusiasm. The coaching staffs will guide and mentor our student-athletes with the tools necessary for success.”

In addition to his day-to-day duties as the Director of Athletics managing the department, Gross works directly with football, men’s and women’s basketball, volleyball and tennis, as well as other sport programs directly and indirectly.

During his 14 years in athletic administration at the University of Southern California, Gross savored the sweet flavor of success: The Trojans won 16 national and more than 30 Pac-10 championships, fielded 145 Olympians, and finished almost every year in the top 10 of the Sears Directors’ Cup all-sports rankings. During the last three seasons Gross was a member of the USC administration, the university’s signature program, football, dressed two Heisman Trophy winners and won two national championships.

Gross has prepared himself to become an athletics director. At USC, he directed coaching searches and contract discussions, served as the department’s media spokesman, led marketing and corporate sponsorship efforts, negotiated television contracts, developed and contracted football and men’s basketball schedules, jointly directed student-athlete academic services, and directly supervised 10 of the University’s 19 intercollegiate sports programs, among other responsibilities.

“Daryl embodies exactly the qualities we are looking for,” said SU Chancellor Nancy Cantor introducing Gross as SU’s ninth Director of Athletics. “He has shown a depth of experience and leadership at USC and—in obtaining both his master’s and doctorate—a great appreciation and understanding of academics. This speaks well of his ability to lead a top-notch athletics program and work closely with academic partners in the institution.”

Among Gross’ most important duties at USC was identifying top coaching talent. In 2001, Gross led the effort to sign longtime NFL coach Pete Carroll, who is now 54-10 with two national championships, and five bowl appearances in five years as head of the USC football program. Gross’ searches have also produced women’s volleyball coach Mick Haley, track and field coach Ron Alice, and men’s and women’s water polo coach Jovan Vavic, all of whom, like Carroll, have won national championships and been named national coach of the year.

“I look for coaches who are the best in the business,” Gross says. “The first thing I look for is how great are they at teaching their subject matter. The most critical attribute for a coach is to be a great educator. It’s so important.”

Gross holds both a master’s degree and Ph.D. in educational psychology from USC, as well as a bachelor’s degree in psychology from the University of California at Davis, where he was a football wide receiver from 1979 to 1981, catching passes from future New York Jets quarterback (and later USC football assistant coach) Ken O’Brien.

From 1982 to 1985, he was on the UC Davis football coaching staff; in 1985, the Aggies were the nation’s No. 1 Division II team. He also was the assistant men’s tennis coach.

In 1986 and 1987, Gross was a grad assistant at USC, working with quarterbacks and wide receivers. From 1989 to 1991, he was a personnel scout for the New York Jets.

Gross joined USC’s athletic administration as an assistant athletic director in 1991, overseeing five sports teams as well as the athletic training room and the student-athlete insurance program. He also directed searches for the hiring of coaches; was the drug-testing coordinator and drug awareness and counseling liaison; directed the Degree Achievement and Former Athlete Degree Achievement programs; directed the Professional Sports Advisement Committee; coordinated Amateur Athletic Foundation youth camps; and served as USC’s senior administrator at Pac-10 Conference winter meetings.

In 1995, Gross was promoted to associate athletic director. From 1997 to 2000, he also held the post of interim director of Student Athlete Academic Services. In this role Gross restructured all programming related to academic support for student-athletes. He designed and implemented a certified tutorial program, instituted a compliance-oriented system, and hired supervisors and counselors to handle the program’s daily operations. He also integrated Student Athlete Academic Services with the campus Learning Skills Center.

Gross was named a senior associate athletic director in 2002. In addition to the aforementioned responsibilities in his role as senior associate athletic director, Gross led USC athletics’ corporate sponsorship program to record revenues of more than \$4 million in 2004. He headed a football marketing effort that broke the USC attendance record in 2003 and in 2004.

Gross also assisted in the undertaking of the biggest building program in the history of USC athletics, including a new track stadium; expansion of the tennis stadium and the football practice field; a new women’s soccer field; and construction of the \$70 million Galen Center, which became home to the USC men’s and women’s basketball and volleyball programs in 2006.

A native of Los Angeles, Calif., Gross has two daughters, Jamie and Jolie.



ORANGE SU At Home

With one of the finest natural grass soccer facilities in the northeast and the Carrier Dome for off-season training, Syracuse's facilities create an ideal setting for year-round player development.

As the needs of student-athletes change, so changes the athletic department at Syracuse University. It is no different for Orange soccer. The SU men's and women's soccer teams moved into their new exclusive soccer stadium in the Fall of 1996. Prior to 1996, the Carrier Dome and Coyne Field served as home for Syracuse soccer.

The Orange has posted a winning record at home in 21 of the past 23 seasons.

Located behind Manley Field House, the Soccer Stadium at the Lampe Athletics Complex includes a 120'-by-75' lush natural grass playing field, bleachers extending the length of the field and lights for night competition.

The completion of the Hookway Fields project in 2004 provided the Orange with a practice facility that boasts seven natural grass fields, including two with lights.

Soccer is not just a fall sport at Syracuse University thanks to the Carrier Dome. While the Soccer Stadium at the Lampe Athletics Complex provides an environment specifically suited to the needs of SU soccer, the Carrier Dome remains a vital part of the SU men's soccer program.

During winter and spring training, the Carrier Dome is the perfect practice facility, providing a regulation soccer field protected from the elements. The surface was upgraded in the summer of 2005 with the installation of FieldTurf, the same material used on 21 FIFA recommended fields throughout the world and by 12 English Premier League clubs. In addition, the Orange hosts an annual spring tournament in the Carrier Dome.



The Soccer Stadium at the Lampe Athletics Complex has been the home of the SU men's soccer team since 1996. The Orange owns a 46-34-7 all-time record at the facility. SU has drawn at least 4,000 fans in each of the last four seasons and more than 22,000 fans have flocked to the Soccer Stadium since 2001. In 2005, the Orange matched its season record for victories at the facility with six.



The Orange uses the Hookway Complex as one of its practice sites. The fields were renovated in 2004 and feature seven grass fields, including two that are lighted.



The athletic training room is just one of the high-quality facilities located at Manley Field House, the hub of SU athletics.

Academic Services



The Milton and Ann Stevenson Educational Wing has expanded during the last six years, allowing for increased attention and support of the needs of the student-athletes. Computer clusters, group meeting rooms, office space and private tutorial rooms are in place to further enhance the support provided by the department. All of the space is convenient to the living, academic and athletics facilities enjoyed by the student-athlete.

The Stevenson Educational Center

To support the athletic and academic goals of the student-athletes, the Syracuse Athletics Department has a comprehensive academic unit, the Office of Student-Athlete Support Services.

The unit is staffed by a director, five full-time advisors, a secretary, seven graduate assistants and a complete tutoring staff devoted specifically to individual academic and personal development.

Mission Statement

The mission is to provide supplemental academic support for all varsity student-athletes at Syracuse University in a manner which addresses their unique academic needs. Primary academic advising and support is received from the academic advisor assigned to each student-athlete from his or her home college, school or department.

The Stevenson Educational Center will test and diagnose the academic weaknesses of student-athletes and provide developmental support where necessary. A tutoring system is provided to foster academic success.

Academic programs will be monitored continuously in order to assure that NCAA and University rules and regulations are met and progress is being made toward graduation. The Stevenson Educational Center will act as a liaison between the academic and athletic communities and address any problems which may arise. Transitional and developmental programs will be provided to assist student-athletes during their college years in preparation for life after college.

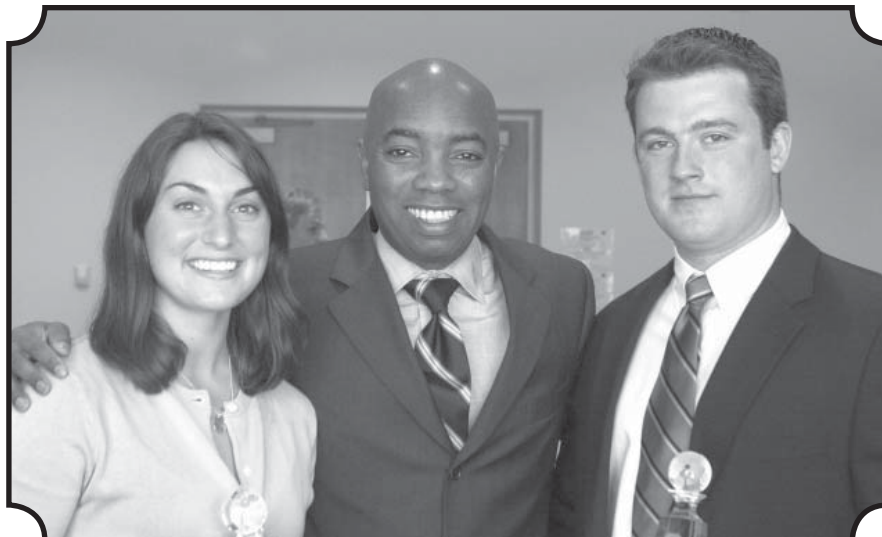
NSCAA Team Academic Award

It is fitting that the Soladay Award is the most prestigious award given to a student-athlete by the Department of Athletics. After all, Doris R. Soladay epitomizes all of the positives in intercollegiate athletics. The Soladay Award is given annually to the top male and female student-athletes who best exemplify the essence of Doris.

From her appointment as the first, and only, Director of Women's Athletics at Syracuse University in 1975 until the day she retired as Associate Director of Athletics on May 31, 1995, Doris dedicated herself to student-athletes wearing the Orange of SU.

The SU Department of Athletics and the world of intercollegiate athletics sports lost a dear friend when Doris passed away in May, 2001.

She established scholarships for women, while increasing the budgets to run the programs. She worked with the late Chancellor Eggers and others who supported women's athletics to begin Orange Plus. Throughout her career, Doris made it a point to attend every home athletic contest of every Syracuse team whenever possible. She often cheered on one team in the morning, another in the afternoon and a third in the evening.

Her impact on athletics reaches far beyond "The Hill," however. Prior to the NCAA taking women's athletics into its fold, Doris held offices on numerous committees in the AIAW (Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women) on the state, regional and national levels. After the merger Doris directed her energy into the NCAA Council, serving from 1989 through 1995.

Doris was also influential regionally where she was an integral part of the expansion of The BIG EAST Conference to include women's athletics, as well as chairing various committees in the league. The ECAC also benefited from her knowledge and savvy, where she was a member of the ECAC Women's Steering Committee from 1983-87. For her many outstanding contributions, the ECAC honored Doris with the 1995 Katherine Ley Award, presented annually to a women's athletics administrator who serves as a role model for her colleagues, as well as a strong proponent of women's issues.

It is no secret that since her retirement her presence in the corridors of Manley Field House has been missed, but it is clear that her legacy will remain a part of the Orange forever.

The Student-Athlete Fund

THE PURPOSE

The Student-Athlete Fund is a permanent endowed fund established in the Athletics Department to help perpetuate programs that directly benefit the student-athletes - specifically scholarships and educational services. By building this endowment we will help to ensure the future of our student-athletes.

The Student-Athlete Fund gives alumni, parents and friends of the university the opportunity to be linked directly to the most important needs of our student-athletes.

FUND PRIORITY

Historically, student-athlete scholarships were funded through the University's general budget so that the Athletics Department funds could be used to support the sports programs and improve facilities. Now, as part of the Athletic Department's contribution to the University's restructuring program, the department committed more than \$3.5 million each year to help finance scholarships for student-athletes.

Meeting this additional need poses a formidable challenge. Although the Athletics Department is determined to fulfill its commitment to the University, it is equally determined not to drain funds necessary to sustain and improve athletic teams.

Despite the challenge of establishing endowed scholarships, once in place, the endowments will benefit student-athletes forever.

The Student-Athlete Fund accepted this challenge. To be successful, much help will be needed from those closest to the athletics program, former athletes, alumni, parents and friends.

The purpose is substantial and the success of the Student-Athlete Fund will determine the future of Syracuse University Athletics.

PERSONAL DECISIONS

There's no such thing as an "unacceptable" offer to support the Student Athlete Fund. The point is not what the University wants to accept but what the donor wants to give - and that's another of those personal decisions where there is much flexibility, not only in the amount but in the arrangements.

Gifts to the fund have ranged upward of \$2 million, and they have come in a variety of ways. There are outright gifts of cash (including stocks and securities) or deferred gifts (bequests, life income agreements, insurance, etc.). Also, many companies have matching-gift programs, so if you work for such a company they may be able to match your gift and thus increase the value to the Fund.

The Kicker's Fund has been in existence for more than 20 years and was formed to give support to the Syracuse University men's soccer program. It operates under the umbrella of the SU Orange Pack Office, the parent fund-raising organization for Syracuse athletics. More than 200 avid SU soccer fans belong to the Kicker's Fund. The Kicker's Fund is committed to providing the SU men's soccer program with the best possible opportunities for academic and athletic achievement. Kicker's Fund contributors believe what is learned on the playing field augments what is learned in the classroom. Membership is open to letterwinners, alumni, parents and friends.

Endowed Men's Soccer Scholarship

The Syracuse University Endowed Men's Soccer Scholarship was created in the summer of 1995, by an SU Soccer alum who requested anonymity. The generous contribution, specifically designated for the Syracuse men's soccer program, in conjunction with the SU Student-Athlete Fund Drive, was initiated in an effort to establish a resource from which future scholarships for men's soccer could be generated. Contributions, large and small, enable the endowment to grow. The goal is to one day fully endow men's soccer scholarships at Syracuse University, and thereby secure the future of the program with a revenue source that is recession proof, inflation proof and perpetual in nature.

Frank & Catherine Schantz Family Endowed Athletic Scholarship

The Schantz Family Athletic Scholarship was created in 1991 by Frank and Catherine Schantz. Both Frank and Catherine graduated from Syracuse in 1931. Frank graduated with a Bachelor of Science from the School of Management and Catherine graduated with a degree in Human Development. While at SU, Frank was an honorable mention All-American soccer player. He also lettered in wrestling, and was the team captain in 1927-28. Frank also played freshman lacrosse. After graduation, Frank and Catherine started a development company called Schantz, Homes Inc. based in Rochester, N.Y. In 1984, Catherine passed away, yet Frank continued his commitment to SU. He actively supported the Varsity Club, Orange Pack and his endowed scholarships until his death on February 4, 2002 at the age of 96. In 1988, Frank was named a Letterwinner of Distinction. In 1999, his son John Schantz Sr. was also named a Letterwinner of Distinction. The Schantz Family Scholarship is awarded annually to a current men's soccer student-athlete.

Henry E. Glies Memorial Endowed Scholarship for Men's Soccer

The Henry E. Glies Scholarship was created in 1997 by Betty Glies in memory of her late husband Hank. Hank enjoyed a long and successful career in the insurance industry. A chartered life underwriter, Hank retired in 1984 from the Syracuse University Development Office where he was the director of deferred giving for eight years. The proud father of four, whose sons Dave ('80) and Doug ('83) were both SU soccer letterwinners, was an avid SU soccer fan. Contributions to the Henry E. Glies Scholarship help to build the Glies endowment which annually makes an award to a current SU men's soccer student-athlete.
