# Welcome

Wigtown is a historic market town on the Galloway coast that is home to 900 people, a malt whisky distillery and over a quarter of a million books. Each year our autumn book festival provides ten days of readings, performances, exhibitions and debates, prompting a mass migration of bibliophiles to this pastoral corner of Scotland.

This year the festival celebrates peace in Northern Ireland with First Minister, Rev Ian Paisley, giving the opening address, and a good number of Irish and Northern Irish writers in the programme. We look forward to welcoming a new audience from Belfast and the surrounding area and would like to thank Stena Line, our new principal sponsor, for allowing the practicalities of cross-channel links to be undertaken in great luxury.

Amidst a growing number of book festivals, Wigtown continues to set itself apart from the crowd. Thus, we celebrate Samye Ling Tibetan Centre's 40th Anniversary, hear Teresa Pascual launch a Catalan poetry anthology and learn about the wild boys of 20th-century Scottish art, Robert McBride and Robert Colquhoun.

As always, I would like to thank our increasing number of sponsors for their generosity, our growing band of helpers for their support, and our dedicated team of organisers for their hard work. Finally, I would like to thank the people of Wigtown for being such gracious hosts to festival visitors and for helping us try to fulfil their town motto "Let Wigtown Flourish."

#### Hugo Rifkind Overexposure County Buildings 3pm (£5)

Macaulay Lewis is a showbusiness reporter on a London newspaper, tormented by the fact he's not as famous as the people he writes about: so what better way to grab the headlines than to catch a celebrity cat-burglar? In his wickedly funny first novel, Rifkind uses his inside knowledge of being *The Times* newspaper's diarist, to satirise both Fleet St and celebrity culture. On 30 September 1669, Janet Dalrymple, one of Wigtownshire's most eligible daughters, was laid to rest. In love with the penniless Archibald Rutherford. she had been forced to marry David Dunbar, heir to Baldoon. Shortly after their wedding, the couple retired to the bridal chamber of Baldoon castle where. in a horrific incident, the bridegroom was stabbed and Janet was left insane. The story was taken by Sir Walter Scott and relocated in the Borders. Wigtown Festival Company brings you the real story behind Scott's novel, punctuated by some of the most memorable arias from Donizetti's Lucia Di Lammermoor. performed by artists from Scottish Opera.

# **MONDAY 1 OCTOBER**

#### Barbara and Richard Mearns County Buildings 11am (£5)



John Kirk Townsend: Collector of Audubon's Western Birds and Mammals is the latest work by local authors Barbara and Richard Mearns (best known for Biographies for Birdwatchers and The Bird Collectors). In this illustrated talk, they follow Townsend's 1834 journey across the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific, from which he provided the legendary artist John James Audubon with new species.

# The National Trust for Scotland The History of Threave Garden

County Buildings 1.30pm (£5)

Trevor Jones, property manager for Threave, recounts the history of one of Galloway's most popular gardens. Created by the National Trust, Threave plays an important role as a teaching garden, whose students are involved in its design and maintenance.

#### R F Foster Luck and the Irish

#### County Buildings 3pm (£5)

Few countries have transformed themselves as quickly as Ireland since 1970. Roy Foster, Carroll Professor of Irish History at Oxford University, offers an acute, witty and often controversial account of the changes. He casts his eye over North-South relationships, political scandals, sexual mores and the emergence of such emblematic figures as Bob Geldof, Charles Haughey and Mary Robinson.

# Mark Cocker Crow Country

#### County Buildings 4.30pm (£5)

Through the universally acclaimed *Birds Britannica*, Mark Cocker has established

himself as one of the foremost writers on nature and wilderness. *Crow Country* is an informative and poetic book in which he journeys around the country searching for ancient rookeries and their inhabitants, including one just a stone's throw from Wigtown.

#### Mark Cocker Bird Watching Workshop Galloway House Gardens, Garlieston 6pm (Free)

The author of *Crow Country* leads a dusk crow watch at one of Scotland's largest rookeries. Attendees are asked to make a donation to the garden trust.

#### Film Ring of Bright Water (Jack Couffer, 1969) Bladnoch Distillery 8.30pm (Bar opens 8pm) (£5)

Virginia McKenna and Bill Travers star in this adaptation of local hero Gavin Maxwell's masterpiece. London is no place to raise a slippery otter, so Graham (Bill Travers) takes "Mij" to live in a ramshackle cottage on the Scottish coast. It is not long before he finds himself falling in love with more than just the beautiful scenery.

# **TUESDAY 2 OCTOBER**

#### Poetry in the Wilds Making Time with Jackie Galley Wigtown County Buildings -Nature Reserve Viewing Room 10am – 3pm (£3)

Make time to explore the landscape around Wigtown Bay with this combined writing workshop and guided walk. Ecologist poet Jackie Galley, with support from Elizabeth Tindal of the D&G Council Ranger Service, will look at the effects of time and tides on the local landscape and wildlife, and get you started on writing poems based on your observations. Places are limited to 15, so book early.

#### Jack Hunter Galloway Byways – Out-takes and Updates

#### County Buildings 1pm (£5)

The historian expands the scope of his recent book on less well-known aspects of Galloway's past, dealing with topics that could not be accommodated in "Byways" and newly discovered information on some of its subjects.

#### The National Trust for Scotland Hornel's Home and Heritage

#### County Buildings 2.30pm (£5)

Sally Eastgate, the property manager of Broughton House in Kirkcudbright discusses the importance of this little known treasure of a town house nestling on the banks of the river Dee, which was the home and studio of Glasgow School artist E A Hornel.

# Chris Bain Cold War, Hot Wings

#### County Buildings 4pm (£5)

The retired Harrier and Hunter pilot describes his career in the RAF from 1962 – 1994 in which he saw active fighter service in the Radfan campaign and throughout the British withdrawal from Aden and the Middle East. His work in Washington DC with the US Defence Intelligence Agency during the first Gulf War provides a fascinating insider's account of the way army missions are planned in the USA.

#### John Hudson, Rab Wilson, Terry McDonagh and Ger Reidy Wild Poetry from the West

#### County Buildings 7pm (£5)

Two well-known poets from the southwest corner of Scotland return from a visit to Kiltimagh, on the west coast of Ireland. They share the stage with poets Terry McDonagh and Ger Reidy from County Mayo and discuss how its wild landscapes have inspired and influenced their work. 


