Space to breathe...

elfast will be smoke-free from 30 April 2007. This means that it will be against the law to smoke in most enclosed workplaces and public places.

These include:

- places of work like offices, factories, bars, restaurants, cafes and hotels;
- schools:
- hospitals:
- places used by members of the public, like shopping centres, church and community halls and health centres;
- most vehicles used for work purposes and vehicles used to carry members of the public, will also have to be smoke-free. This will include:
 - work vehicles used by more than one person (even if they do so at different times) for example cars, lorries and vans.
 - vehicles used to transport
 members of the public (even if they
 don't pay to use them) for example
 buses, taxis, trains and minibuses.

It is the responsibility of business owners to **display signs** at each entrance to smoke-free premises and in smoke-free vehicles. If the 'no smoking' signs aren't displayed, business owners could get a £200 fixed penalty or be prosecuted with a maximum fine of £1,000.

It is also their responsibility to **stop people smoking** in smoke-free places and vehicles. If they don't, they could get prosecuted and fined up to £2,500.

If you are found smoking on smoke-free premises or vehicles you could receive a £50 fixed penalty or be prosecuted up to a maximum fine of £1,000.

The new law is being brought in to protect workers and members of the public from second-hand smoke.

Second-hand smoke increases your risk of lung cancer, heart disease and stroke. Similar laws have been introduced in other countries and have proved very popular with smokers and nonsmokers alike.

We are responsible for enforcing the legislation. Council officers are trained to enforce the new law. They will be visiting premises giving advice and assistance to businesses and where necessary taking legal action against offenders.

We're all set to move towards a cleaner, healthier, smoke-free future.

peaking to City Matters from Miami, our cover star Eddie Irvine endorsed the introduction of smoke-free legislation: "It's similar to when they introduced seatbelts. When the law first came in we had to get used to it and now it's unthinkable to drive without a seatbelt. The same will be true for the smoking ban, it makes total sense."

Belfast business managers have been getting ready for smoke-free and they've welcomed the challenge. Cables Bar at the Hilton Hotel went smoke-free in September 2006 and the response from the public has been very good.

Bernard Lavery, owner of Lavery's and the Pavilion bar, has taken the opportunity to completely refurbish Lavery's bar and add an outside smoking room complete with widescreen TV. He said: "I'm really positive about it. We're making changes to our premises to help customers enjoy their experience. They certainly won't stink of smoke at the end of the night!"

Helen Mulholland, from Botanic Inns said: "We welcome the introduction of the smoking ban and believe that in the long term it will be beneficial to the industry as a whole."

Recycling chips

Your recycling bin or box is fitted with a chip called a Radio Frequency Identification Device. These chips allow us to:

- know if you need help to sort your materials;
- trace your lost box or bin;
- find out if we are meeting the waste targets set by government.

The information collected is matched to the number of your house and covers the weight, when and how often the bin is collected.

How do the chips work?
The chips are activated
when they are scanned by
the collection lorry, just
like the barcodes used in
supermarkets. The chip can't
tell what the actual contents
of the bin or box are.

Our collection crew check your

bin for the correct materials. If they see items that shouldn't be there, your bin won't be emptied and we'll leave a note to tell you that you've put the wrong items in it.

If the chip is removed or damaged, it is possible that your bin won't be lifted.


Will it be used to charge me for my waste?
No. Part of the rates you pay, totally funds the collection of household bins or boxes.

All the chip information that we hold is protected and only authorised staff can look at it.

Under the Data Protection Act, you're entitled to see any information which we hold about your address including recycling details.

Belfast's recycling challenge

Il households in Belfast now have access to a household recycling collection. Sixty-six thousand households now have blue recycling bins which allow you to recycle:

- paper,
- plastic bottles,
- aluminium drinks cans,
- cardboard, and
- steel food cans.

Fifty-five thousand households also have brown bins which allow you to recycle garden waste such as grass cuttings, garden prunnings, and cut flowers.

Additionally, 50,000 houses have **black 'Kerbie' boxes** which allow you to recycle:

- paper,
- cardboard,
- plastic bottles,

- glass bottles,
- aluminium foil,
- aluminium drinks cans,
- steel food cans,
- old clothes, and
- hand tools.

When we started the recycling collections in the summer of 2003 the recycling rate was 3%. Currently our recycling rate is 18%, which is an improvement of around 15% in three years.

If we fail to meet government recycling targets, it could mean facing heavy fines, which will result in a higher rates bill for your home.

Now that the facilities are in place in every home we believe we can raise the recycling rate even more. Will you help us rise to the challenge?

Upgrade for Palmerston Road Recycling Centre

Residents in the east of the city can now recycle numerous items at the recently reopened Palmerston Road Recycling Centre. The centre, located off Holywood Road, has just undergone a refurbishment and is now almost double its original size.

Items that can be recycled at the centre include:

- glass bottles,
- scrap metal,
- timber,
- books,
- batteries,
- old paint cans,
- cooking oil,
- ink cartridges,
- paper,
- food cans,
- cardboard,

- aluminium foil,
- garden waste,
- textiles,
- CDs,
- fluorescent tubes,
- engine oil,
- spectacles,
- old hand tools,
- plastic bottles, and
- drinks cans.

Currently the site has a recycling rate of approximately 70%. And with your support we hope to raise this again.

This year another recycling centre is scheduled to open at Park Road, off Ormeau Road. The opening of the Park Road facility will bring the total number of recycling centres in Belfast to four. Two other centres currently in operation are:

- Blackstaff Way, off Kennedy Way in the west, and
- Alexandra Park Avenue, off Antrim Road in the north.



Celebrated citizens

Bernard 'Barney' Hughes

Master baker, liberal and reformer (1806 – 1878)

hen the 18 year-old penniless labourer, Barney Hughes arrived in Belfast from Armagh, he got a job as a baker's boy in a bakery in Church Lane. By the 1870s he owned the largest baking and milling business in Ireland and had been elected Belfast's first Catholic representative on the Town Council.

Barney reacted to
the Great Famine by
producing a cheaper
household loaf and
refusing to increase his
prices. Soon his efficient
production methods made
him the market price leader. The
popularity of Barney's 'bap' won him
fame in the Belfast children's song 'half
a bap with sugar on top'.

He had a
strong sense
of social justice
and personal
courage
He dona
Peter's C

He spoke out against poor working conditions generally and in his own industry he was a key figure in the abolition of Sunday and night baking. He married Jane, a Presbyterian, in 1829

and they had three sons. Following Jane's death aged 44, Barney married his second wife and they had three daughters.

Barney had a strong sense of social justice and personal courage. When he was an eye witness to the sectarian riots of 1857 and

1864, he gave evidence to
the Royal Commissions
of Inquiry, provoking
the Tory hierarchy of
Belfast. His independent
outlook also brought
him into conflict with
the local Catholic bishop
and the Catholic press.

He donated the ground that St Peter's Cathedral is built on and his three sons donated the triple stained glass window, in the southern aisle, in memory of their mother Jane.

Hughes continued working until his late sixties and died on 23 September 1878. He is buried in Friar's Bush.

Your rates explained



Council rates below inflation but central government rates will rise

he domestic rating system in
Northern Ireland is changing.
The old way of working out
your rates was based on how
much it would have cost you to rent your
home 30 years ago. This needed to be
modernised, so from April 2007 there
will be a new system.

There are two main stages to this:

- Revaluation of households the Valuation and Lands Agency carried out a revaluation of all homes to establish the up-to-date capital value (the amount a property could reasonably have sold for on the open market on 1 January 2005).
- Recalculation of rates from April 2007 the Rate Collection Agency will calculate your rates bill based on the capital value of your home.

Your rates bills is made up of two main elements:

- a district rate which is decided by each district council, and
- a regional rate which is decided by central government.

The district rate accounts for 40% of you rates bill, whilst the regional rate accounts for 60% of your rates bill.

We set the district rate which helps fund council services including:

- waste management,
- street cleansing,
- waste disposal,
- environmental health services,
- parks,
- recreation grounds,
- cemeteries,
- the Ulster Hall and Waterfront Hall,
- community services,
- economic initiatives, and
- the zoo.

In 2007-08 the district rate will rise by 2.83%.

Central government sets the regional rate which helps fund services such as:

- education,
- housing,
- personal social services,
- oroads and agriculture, and
- rural development.

Your rates will increase significantly in 2007-08 but we are only responsible for 1.14% of this. Any increase above this level is due directly to central government's increase in the regional rates and its review of the rating system.

Over the past number of years, we've worked hard to minimise the rate burden for our ratepayers. But central government's failure to mirror our efficiency drive is continually undermining our efforts.

It's important that you distinguish between our efforts to keep our rates increase below inflation and the central government increases.

This pull-out explains:

- what we are doing to minimise your tax burden,
- the financial pressures that we're facing, and
- what services you actually pay for.

We also highlight some of the projects we will carry out in the coming year.

What we are doing

We've started an efficiency agenda. The aim of this is to provide excellent customer services with a strong focus on value for money through a coordinated programme of improvements.

Our target is to save £1 million per year for the period 2006-09

We'll save a total of £1.15 million in the current financial year and we've identified savings of £1.5 million for 2007-08. This is £650,000 above our target for the first two years of the three year period. We're currently looking at where we can save money in 2008-09. This has helped us to keep this year's rate increase below inflation. We're committed to achieving further efficiency savings, improving our overall approach to customer care, and building our capacity to change and improve.

Council faces government funding cuts

We are making these savings against a backdrop of central government cuts in funding to local government.

Last year we received £5.75 million but that has now been reduced to £4.49 million. The government has also withdrawn £1 million of European funding for the marketing of the Regional Tourism Partnership.

This comes at a time when central government's portion of the rates (regional rate) has increased from 48% in 2001-02 to 54% in 2007-08. With our rate pegged back to 2.83% and the regional rate set to increase significantly, it is clear that this trend will continue.

Vital work increases financial pressures

As well as government cuts, we face a number of financial pressures including:

- Closing our Dargan Road landfill site When our landfill site closes this month, waste will go to new private sector landfill sites in Lisburn and Newtownabbey. Although it will cost around £20 million to close the site, we've been setting money aside for this over the past few years and have already saved £9.5 million. See page 18.
- Meeting other waste management costs

The Dargan Road closure combined with other waste management costs mean that we have to double our expenditure in this area from £11 million last year to £20 million by 2009-10. You'll be relieved to know that we have a financial strategy in place to gradually meet these increased costs to prevent you facing big hikes in a single year.

- Extending our cemeteries
 We'll be extending Roselawn Cemetery
 which will cost £1.7 million. We're
 also looking at options for locating an
 additional cemetery or crematorium
 at a further cost of £11.7 million.
- Refurbishing the City Hall
 We face a £13.9 million bill to refurbish
 the City Hall and relocate staff (see
 page 20).
- Annual pay increases and superannuation costs
 The employer's contribution has increased from 11% in 2006-07 to 13% in 2007-08. This will require additional funding of £1.2 million.
- Single status
 Over £1 million will be spent on implementing the legislation which harmonises pay and conditions for all staff.

What the future holds

- The government is bringing local taxation levels into line with those in England, Scotland and Wales, so this will also increase your tax burden.
- Financial pressures will continue to grow over the coming years with the planned changes in local government and the introduction of water charges.
- The Review of Public Administration will increase the size of Belfast City Council's geographical area and result in us having a new range of extra responsibilities like roads and planning. This means our staffing levels will double and our budget will increase by two or three times the current level. We will have responsibility for funding and delivering to this new agenda.

Where your money goes

We've just completed one of our largest logistical exercises by providing recycling bins or boxes to almost every household in Belfast.

We expect our recycling rate to reach the target of 18% for 2006-07 and hope to exceed our target the following year as more people use their bins and boxes. The opening of the new recycling centre off the Ormeau Road will mean we have modern recycling facilities in each area of the city (see page 6).

Other initiatives, some of which are detailed throughout this edition, include:

- our Community Safety Warden scheme in the Holylands which provides a high visibility patrol service during peak daytime and nighttime hours;
- the Community Safety Small Grants scheme, which allocates funding to community groups to help improve community safety and deal with antisocial behaviour;
- additional neighbourhood watch schemes and comprehensive training courses for scheme coordinators;

- Safety of Seniors events to tackle fear of crime among older people;
- expanding our Night Time Noise Service;
- working with other agencies through the Resilience Forum for Belfast to develop plans that will reduce the impact of any disaster;
- support for businesses to provide smoke-free environments in line with new regulations;
- a scheme which publishes food hygiene information on the web and provides businesses with certificates to promote food safety (see page 20);
- over £1 million in financial support for community initiatives such as summer schemes, community buildings and advice services;
- rebuilding Ardoyne and Woodvale Community Centres;
- developing the Grove Well Being Centre (a one stop shop for health, leisure and exercise) in partnership with the North and West Belfast Health and Social Services Trust and Belfast Education and Library Board. The new Falls Leisure Centre is providing an excellent service to 250,000 customers each year; and
- transforming the 330 acre
 North Foreshore site into a major
 environment business location
 and public park (see page 18).

Making Belfast Brighter

ince 2003, we've spent £4.3 million on our 'Brighter Belfast' programme, plus £7 million of funding from our partners and other groups. The Brighter Belfast budget is used to complement the core work already being done by our cleansing and parks services.

The Brighter Belfast campaign aims to make the city cleaner and more attractive. We want to create a city where:

- the clean, attractive and safe environment is a source of pride and pleasure;
- there is clear responsibility for, and commitment to, maintaining streets and public spaces;
- cultural diversity is celebrated; and
- open spaces are continually improved.

We've already been working to meet these aims and will be spending another £600,000 this year to continue with Brighter Belfast projects, including:

- £180,000 on encouraging tourists, residents and shoppers to come into the city after 5pm. More than 100 shops in the city centre are now open to 7pm during the week, and restaurants are offering special early evening menus.
- £25,000 on a Neighbourhood Officer scheme (with the Housing Executive) to address residents' concerns such as housing defects and environmental issues.
- £100,000 for art projects to help increase pride in the appearance of local environments. Thirteen projects are under way and we are planning to carry out five more in the next year.
- £150,000 on further environmental improvements in deprived communities. We're consulting closely with the communities involved to help improve community safety and relations. We've finished 19 projects in four areas of the city,

- and will be working in more areas over the next year.
- £25,000 on a zero tolerance approach to fly posting and graffiti in the city centre. A dedicated team has helped reduce reports of illegal fly posting by 80% in the last year. We are working with the Planning Service and other interested parties to develop a long-term solution to the problem.
- £40,000 on expanding our successful 'Belfast in Bloom' project. We hope to get even more community and commercial involvement with more floral displays.

What are rates?

In Northern Ireland, rates are a property tax based on the capital value of household properties. The income from this tax contributes towards the cost of providing local and central government services.

Who sets the rates?

A **district rate** is set by individual councils and a **regional rate** is set by central government. Your annual rates bill will show the combined cost of the district and regional rates.

Where do we get our money from?

- Rates from householders (domestic) and business. This is our main source of income.
- Grants for example from central government
- Fees and charges money received for services like leisure services, waste disposal and building control.

Who collects the rates?

The **Rate Collection Agency** – an agency within the Department of Finance and Personnel.

Consumer advice

ur Consumer Advice Centre is at 14 Wellington Place - between Oyster House (the old YMCA building) and Pronuptia Bridal Shop. We offer help and advice on consumer-related problems to both traders and consumers.

Our advisers will make you aware of your legal rights and are happy to act as mediators on your behalf. All enquiries are treated seriously and no complaint is considered too trivial. Here, we look at your rights when a new appliance stops working.

I bought a new chest freezer in December 2006 for Christmas. I was expecting a lot of family over and I knew that I would need extra freezer space for food.

In February 2007 I went on holidays for a few days. When I returned I discovered that the freezer had stopped working and that all the food that had been in the freezer was spoiled. Can I ask the shop for a replacement freezer and what are my rights for the spoiled food?

You have rights under The Sale of Goods Act 1979 as amended by The Sale and Supply of Goods to Consumer Regulations 2002. These rights are against the shop and not the manufacturer.

This law says that if something is wrong with the goods within the first six months from when you bought it you can assume that the goods are faulty. You can then ask the shop to do something for you.

The shop has the right to argue that the freezer is not faulty, but it is then up to them to prove that the freezer was not faulty when you bought it. The shop may want to send an engineer out to inspect the freezer to check that it is faulty and not damaged. This is reasonable. If the freezer is faulty and is less than six months old you are within



your rights to ask the shop for either a repair or replacement. This repair or replacement is the shop's choice to make and not yours. However, to make sure that you are treated fairly the law says that any repair or replacement must be of satisfactory quality. It should also be carried out within a reasonable period of time. These are your rights in consumer law and are in addition to any manufactures warranty or guarantee.

Now about the spoiled food. It is obvious that if a freezer is faulty then it will damage food. This spoiled food is a loss you have suffered as a result of the freezer being faulty. This is known as foreseeable consequential loss and you are within your rights to ask the shop for compensation. The shop can ask you for the receipts or the packaging that the food came in as proof of what has been spoiled. A good idea would be to take some photographs of the spoiled food.

Frequently Asked Questions



I am going to replace my old central heating boiler. Do I need permission from anybody?



Yes. You must make a building regulations application to Building Control. A 'Building

Notice' application would be best and the fee will be based on the estimated cost of the work. The new boiler must have an efficiency of at least 86%. Condensing boilers can be even more efficient than this and will help reduce your fuel costs and reduce carbon emissions. You should think about upgrading the controls on your heating system to current standards.



Why can't I recycle glass in my blue bin?



The blue bin is emptied into the back of the recycling lorry so any glass would smash. The


broken glass would contaminate other materials and could cut the people employed to separate the items.

You can recycle glass at our recycling centres, civic amenity sites and 'glass bring sites' throughout the city.

What is the council going to do about the increase in cigarette litter when Northern Ireland goes smoke-free this April?



Our street cleansing staff are already working very hard to keep our city streets clean and these additional staff will support their efforts. We issued over 1,500 £50 fines last year for littering.

Once the smoke-free legislation is in place we will take a proactive and targeted approach to cigarette litter and will be issuing fines to those who flout the law.

Our officers have been speaking to businesses to encourage good practice in dealing with increased litter outside their premises.



Change in law for tenants and landlords

he law relating to privately rented houses is changing on 1 April 2007.

Landlords who rent out a house on or after that date will require a Certificate of Fitness from the council if the house was built before 1945. We will issue certificates if the house passes an inspection by one of our Environmental Health Officers. It will be an offence for a landlord not to apply for a Certificate of Fitness. Certain properties are exempt – details can be found at the web address below.

The new law 'Private Tenancies (NI) Order 2006' aims to improve the quality of rented houses and protect tenants' rights. As a tenant, you will be entitled to have a written tenancy statement from your landlord. We're also getting new legal powers to deal with any unfit privately rented houses.

Get your alley-gating manual

e're using the experience of our pilot alley-gating scheme to launch a manual for communities who want to erect alley gates.

The scheme, led by Belfast Community Safety Partnership, is almost finished and over 120 alley-gates have been erected in five areas:

- Little Americas:
- Lower Windsor;
- The Mount and Willowfield;
- Beechmount; and
- Woodvale.

Residents in these areas are experiencing benefits such as reduction in antisocial behaviour, burglaries and fear of crime. A resident from Beechmount said: "I haven't felt as safe in years, the gates make a real difference to security around here."

The new alley-gating manual provides step-by-step guidelines on how to install gates in your community.

Putting up gates involves a complicated legal process so communities considering this should contact us at an early stage.


New High Sheriff

he 'swearing in' of the new High Sheriff of Belfast, Councillor Jim Kirkpatrick, took place in January.

Councillor Kirkpatrick is the first person to have served as High Sheriff on two occasions, having also fulfilled the role in 1990.

The position of High Sheriff is one of the oldest secular offices in the British Isles and dates back to Saxon times. Appointments to the position of High Sheriff are made by the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland usually upon the recommendation of the council.

His term of office runs from January to December and while the role is now largely a ceremonial one, he will provide support to the Lord Mayor during the year.



Community Safety Roaming Wardens

rom May 2007 we are
deploying Community
Safety Roaming Wardens
to respond to problems
such as antisocial behaviour.

The new Community Safety
Roaming Wardens will act as a deterrent
and provide a targeted response in
identified areas - north, south, east and
west of the city. The Roaming Wardens
will complement the Community
Safety Wardens who are permanently
based in the Holylands area.

When a problem has been identified, one of four small teams of wardens can be deployed and will work with the community for up to two months with the aim of 'nipping the problem in the bud'. Early intervention is recognised as having a major influence on a long-term successful outcome.

Residents should continue to make their initial complaint to PSNI, NIHE or Belfast City Council. These bodies will meet regularly to determine the best use of the Roaming Wardens. Residents will be notified in advance of the wardens appearing in their community and, where possible, will be invited to become involved.

The Community Safety Roaming Wardens will become a positive presence throughout Belfast as we strive to make it a safer city.


Wedding and civil partnership ceremonies (and all other events) scheduled to take place at City Hall before 1 July 2007 will go ahead as planned.

70 people. After 1 July 2007 you will be able to view the room between 9am and 9.30am on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

ver 65 per cent of food places in Belfast are serving up good, very good or excellent standards of food safety. We want to make this information available to you by publishing the results of our food safety inspections online. You will be able to log on and check the rating of your local

restaurant, take-away or even your corner shop.

Eventually all 2,800 food businesses in the greater Belfast area will be awarded one to five stars based on conditions found during the most recent food hygiene inspection. The stars will be awarded based on the degree of legal compliance with food hygiene legislation – five stars being the highest standard possible.

Food businesses include everything from

supermarkets, to hotels and fast food restaurants. All inspected premises will be invited to display their star rating in a prominent position so you can see at a glance the standard they're meeting.

The scheme is part of a UK wide pilot by the Food Standards Agency and is based upon a risk rating system used throughout the UK.
