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Overview

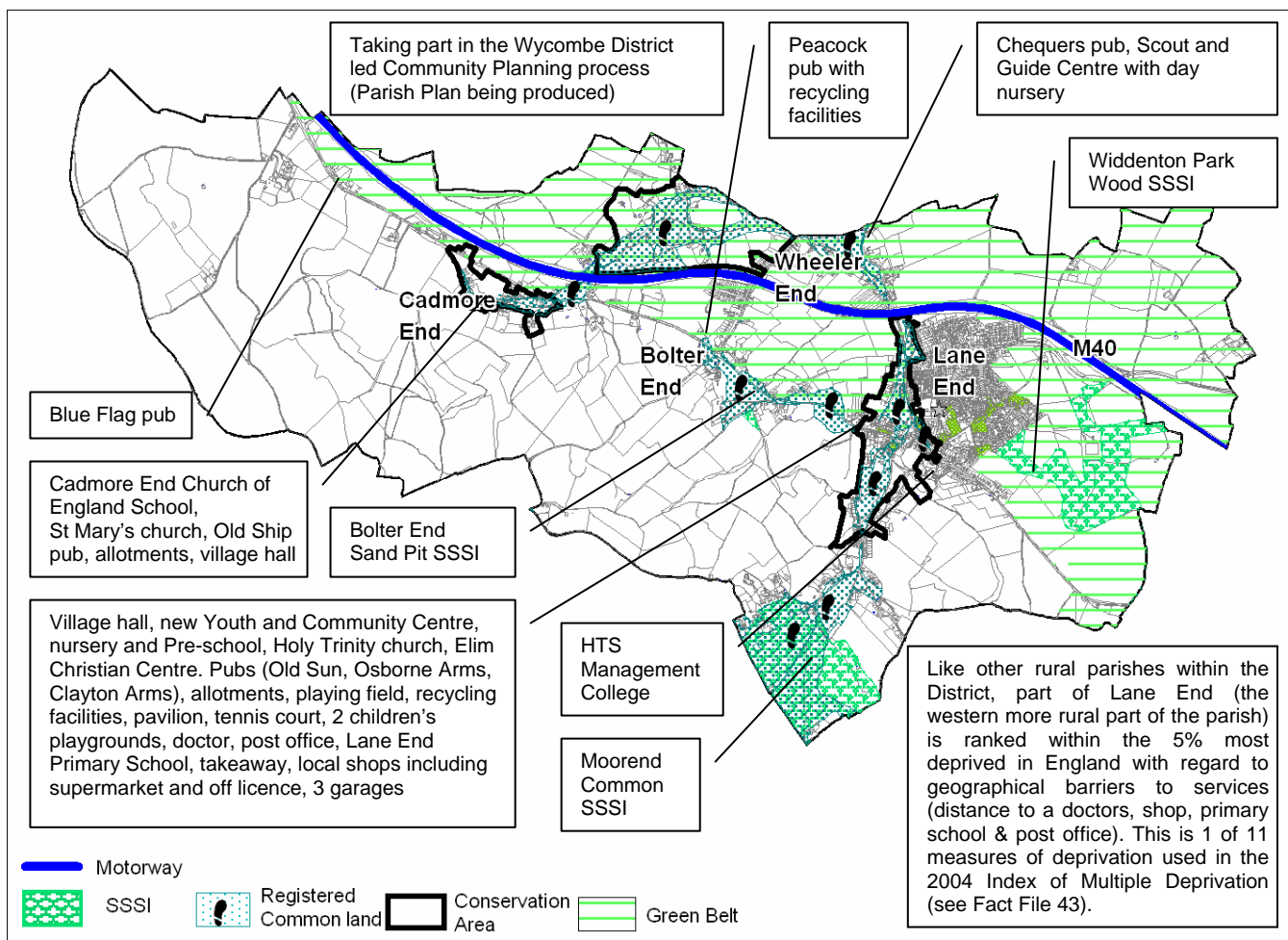
Lane End parish lies to the west of High Wycombe. It is predominantly rural but also includes the large settlement of Lane End in the east of the parish. The M40 cuts across the northern part of the parish. Part of Lane End village has Conservation Area status, as does Cadmore End Common and the small settlement of Cadmore End itself. Other small settlements in the parish include Wheeler End and Bolter End.

The parish covers an area of 1,161 hectares all of which is within the Chilterns AONB. Approximately 448 hectares or 38% is within the Green Belt.

In addition to a network of public footpaths there are many registered commons covering large areas of land.

The parish is within the Chiltern Rise District Ward (see Fact File 15 for further information).

Map of Lane End Parish



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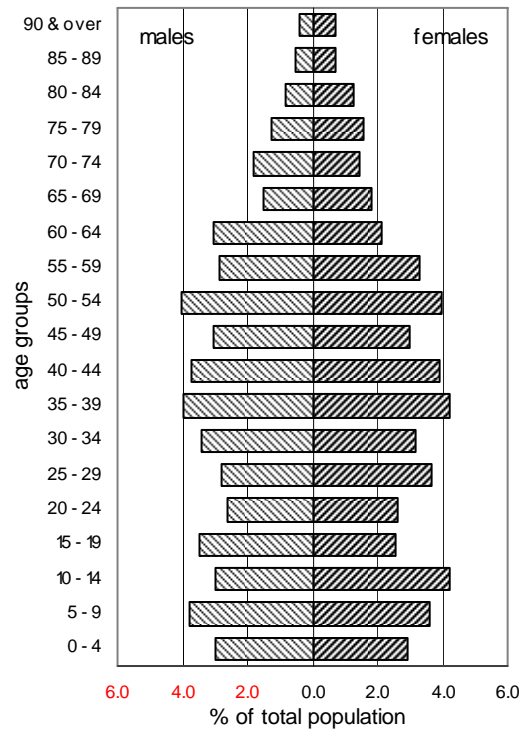
The people of Lane End Parish

- The total parish population has fallen slightly from 3,682 in 1991 to 3,583 people in 2001.
- The density of 3.1 persons/hectare is high compared to the other rural parishes in the District due to the presence of the large settlement of Lane End.
- The proportion of the population found in the different age groups is broadly similar to that found on average in Wycombe District and in England in 2001 (see Wycombe Fact File 2).

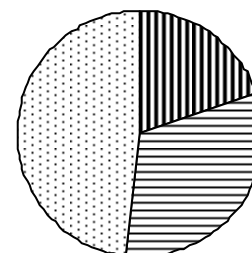
Household Composition




- The average household size (3 people are not in households) is 2.56 persons/household. In 1991 there were 2.80 persons/household. The reduction is in line with national trends.
- Lone parent families with dependent children have increased from 3% in 1991 to 6.6% in 2001. This is higher than the District average in 2001 of 4.7%.
- Pensioner-only households comprise 20% of all households, an increase from 18% in 1991. This is similar to the District average of 21%.
- 6 people in the parish do not live in households but in a communal establishment.

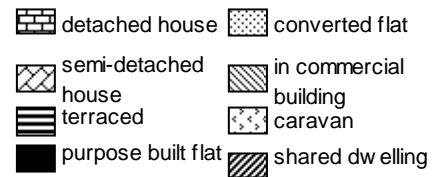
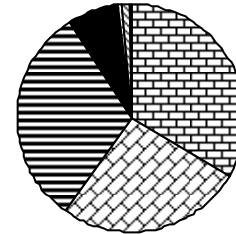

Housing

- The number of dwellings has risen from 1,372 (58 unoccupied) in 1991 to 1,461 (57 unoccupied) in 2001.
- Compared to other rural parishes in the District the proportion of detached houses is low, but is typical of the District as a whole. However the proportion of terraced properties at 31% is higher than the District average of around 25%.

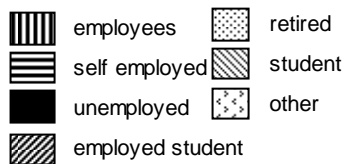
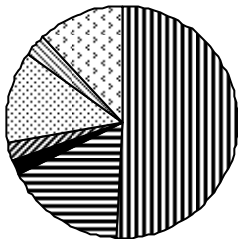

Employment

- Major employers in the parish include the HTS management college to the south of Lane End, Bolters Yard in Bolter End and the companies (including Elga Water) in the various factories and business units in Lane End.
- The proportion of economically active people who are self employed is higher at 17% than the District average of 10%.
- The eastern part of Lane End parish is within the most deprived 20% of areas in England with regard to education, skills and training (see the Indices of Deprivation Fact File 43).

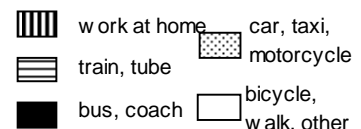
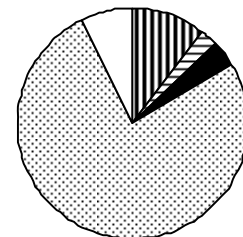
