The Art Museum and Craft Gallery

The Art Museum first opened in the former headquarters of Nikkatsu Cooperation in 1952, later moving in 1969 into a new building donated by Shojiro Ishibashi at its present location in Takebashi. The Crafts Gallery opened in 1977 in the former Imperial Guards Headquarters building, now an Important Cultural Property. In 2002, the Art Museum reopened after 2.5 years of renovation work.

The art museum and Crafts Gallery collect, house, exhibit and research materials regarding modern art and crafts.

National Film Center

After the former Nikkatsu building was vacated by the Art Museum in 1969, the National Film Center opened there in 1970. When the building became timeworn, the Center opened a new building in 1995, which has since serviced as the hub of its activities to promote Japan's cinematic art.

In 1986, Film Center-Archive opened as a facility dedicated to the Center's film conservation activities.

The Center collects and conserves cinematic films and film materials from Japan and overseas. It also presents film screenings and conducts researches on







The National Museum of Western Art, Tokyo

This museum was established in April of 1959, upon the occasion of the return of the Matsukata Collection to Japan, and its Main Building opened two months later in June. The facilities have since been expanded by the addition of a new wing in November of 1979 and special exhibition wing in December of 1997.

This museum collects, houses, conducts public exhibitions, and researches artworks and other materials in the Matsukata Collection returned by the French Government and those related to Western art.

renamed the Tokyo National Museum in 1952. As Japan's most comprehensive national museum, the Tokyo National Museum collects, houses, and holds public exhibition of artworks, archeological artifacts, and other tangible cultural properties of the East Asian region, with a focus on Japan. It also gathers books on fine arts, stone rubbings, photographs and other materials, makes such materials accessible to researchers, and also conducts associated research, training, and public education programs.

This museum was launched as Japan's first museum on 1871,

following an exposition held at the Confucian temple named Daiseido in Yushima, Tokyo. Named the Imperial Museum in 1889, it was



Kyoto National Museum

The Kyoto National Museum first opened in 1897 as the Kyoto Imperial Museum, after a decision was made in 1889 to establish an imperial museum in Kyoto. It was donated to the city to commemorate the marriage of the Crown Prince and renamed the Kyoto Imperial Gift Museum in 1924. In 1952, the jurisdiction of the museum was returned the national government and given its current name.

The Kyoto National Museum exhibits, houses, and collects works of art and historical artifacts from temples and shrines in the Kyoto area, focusing primarily on objects made in the early capital from the Heian to Edo periods. It also conducts research related to its collection and exhibitions. The Conservation Center for Cultural Properties on the museum grounds was established for the conservation, restoration, and replication of National Treasures and Important Cultural Properties.

Nara National Museum

After the decision to establish an imperial museum in Nara was reached in 1559, the Nara Imperial museum opened in 1895. It adopted its present name of Nara National Museum in 1952

The museum collects, houses, conducts public exhibitions, and researches tangible cultural properties, with a focus on Buddhist art. It has an attached facility where cultural properties are restored and preserved ande replicas of cultural properties are produced. In addition to its Permanent Collection Exhibition featuring masterpieces of Buddhist art, the museum holds Special Exhibitions, the Shosoin Exhibition, Special Displays, and other exhibitions open to public.






