# Tropical Storm Allison DR # 709 Situation Report # 1 June 13th 2001

#### Mass Care

A shelter was opened at the Senior Citizens Center at 1400 N Monroe St in Tallahassee at 11:00PM on June 11th and was closed at 12:30PM on June 12th. Totals were - Staff: 7 Evacuees: 12.

Because of the possibility of additional flooding in southern Leon County the Senior Citizens Center along with the First Baptist Church at 9500 Woodville Hwy were placed on standby over night on June 12th / 13th. These shelters remain on standby at this time.

During the early morning hours of June 11th 5 mobile feeding vehicles were providing meals, snacks and drinks to victims, emergency workers and utility workers. During the daylight hours of June 11th these 5 mobile feeding vehicles were reduced to 2. Currently ERV # 1074 and ERV # II continue to provide meals, snacks and drinks while traveling from one flood site to another.

Both ERV # 1074 and # II are distributing the Repairing Your Flooded Home and After a Flood: The First Steps booklet and brochure as well as flood mitigation information.

### **Integrated Service Delivery**

### Damage Assessment

As of COB June 12th Detailed Damage Assessment was 80% completed for areas that are accessible. Detailed Damage Assessment Summary was:

Single Family: Destroyed: 1 - Major: 6 - Minor: 47 Mobile Homes: Destroyed: 1 - Major: 2 - Minor: 9 Apartments: Destroyed: 0 - Major: 71 - Minor: 18

Total affected dwelling units: 165

Because of the very scattered nature of the damage from this severe rain event Damage Assessment has been somewhat difficult. However the challenge of locating all the damage has been greatly reduced by working with our local media to promote a hotline number (878-6080) which victims can call if they need help. Detailed Damage Assessment continues today.

#### Family Services

On June 12th 13 Outreach Teams were dispatched into the field along with the Damage Assessment Teams. As of COB June 12th 59 901s had been opened with referrals and financial assistance being provided. Today eight Outreach Teams are assigned to the field.

Late today the MOCO a Mobile Outreach Center will be positioned in of the most heavily damaged area. This will provide a working environment for an Emergency Aid Station to be set up.
