SCHOOL PROFILE 2007-2008 (CEEB/ ACT School Code 142300)

COMMUNITY

The school is 17 miles west of Chicago and serves a suburban 612 graduates residential area of approximately 35,000 people. Students live in Hinsdale, Clarendon Hills, Oak Brook, and portions of Burr Ridge, Willowbrook and Westmont. The parents are predominantly professional, executive, or managerial people.

SCHOOL

Central is the older and larger of two four-year senior high schools in District 86. Enrollment at Central is approximately 2700 students with about 625 seniors. Over 99% of Central's students complete high school with 88% (150 colleges) pursuing a four-year college education, 11% (8 colleges) continuing at two year colleges and 1% entering other opportunities. Central is a member of the North Central Association, The College Board and NACAC/IACAC.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

The school year consists of four quarters, each nine weeks long. The day is divided into seven 50-minute periods. The first semester ends on January 17, 2008 and the second semester ends on June 5, 2008.

FACULTY

Of the 210 certified faculty members approximately 140 hold a Masters Degree or beyond. 30% of the faculty has more than 20 years of teaching experience.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Central students are highly involved in school activities. There is an extremely rich tradition in athletics with 27 varsity sports available to men and women. Hinsdale Central athletes have captured 68 state championships, the second most among high schools in the state. In addition, more than 81% of the student body participates in at least one of the 68 active clubs or organizations that are available. 74% of our students participated in volunteer work or community service.

STUDENT SERVICES

A comprehensive program of student services is provided. Thirteen guidance professionals assist students with personal, social and emotional concerns, college selections, and career/vocational plans. Complementing the counselors are social workers, psychologists and a fully inclusive Educational Services Program.
