BOROUGH PROFILE

Located in south-east London, the London Borough of Bromley is the largest in the city. At approximately 150 square kilometres it is 30% larger than the next largest borough.


Bromley has many green spaces and is a relatively prosperous area. However, the communities we serve differ substantially. The northeast and northwest of the borough contend with many issues similar to those found in the inner London Boroughs we border (Lambeth, Southwark, Lewisham, Greenwich), while in the south the borough is more akin to rural Kent.

We work with a wide range of organisations (including Social Services, Housing Associations, voluntary groups, Age Concern, Victim Support, and Help the Aged amongst others) to promote community fire safety and reduce anti social behaviour.




Station grounds are not consistent with borough boundaries. A station ground may include parts of a neighbouring borough and appliances from that station would be mobilised to the adjoining borough.










Malicious Calls (by ward)



Our firefighters in Bromley work hard to get to incidents as quickly as possible. On average our first fire engine arrives in 6 minutes and 30 seconds. When we need to, we will send more than one fire engine. On average the second fire engine arrives in 8 minutes and 12 seconds.

Risk scored premises

Under new fire safety legislation that came into force on 1 October 2006, we have the power to enforce the required standard of fire precautions. Our staff carry out fire safety checks to ensure that building managers and occupiers are complying with fire regulations. We have a risk based fire safety inspection programme and every building we check is risk graded and given a score between 2.25 and 6.5, where 6.5 is the highest risk. The graph below shows the number of checks carried out in the six month period following the implementation of the new legislation and the corresponding risk scores.

Schools Team

The Schools Team visit Year 2 and 6 pupils and deliver a package specifically designed for these age groups. Each class enjoys an hour long presentation with the schools officer, in which they learn the concepts of fire prevention, detection and escape. This hour includes visuals, worksheet activities and videos to stimulate, educate and inform the pupils. High priority schools are found in areas that have historically seen a higher number of accidental residential fires.

Juvenile Firesetters

The Juvenile Firesetters Intervention Scheme is designed to address firesetting behaviour among children and young people. Trained advisors are available to meet with the child or young person and their parents.

Partnerships

Through our participation in the Safer Bromley Partnership, we develop strategies for reducing crime, disorder, drug and alcohol misuse and anti-social behaviour throughout the borough. The partnership brings together Bromley Council, the Metropolitan Police, the Primary Care Trust, the probation service, the London Fire Brigade, the London Ambulance Service and Fosters Co-operation with the voluntary and private sector organisations to reduce crime and improve safety.

Through our partnership with other first responders on the Bromley Emergency Planning Group and the Biggin Hill Airport Emergency Planning Group, we formulate inter-agency emergency planning procedures for the borough. Through the Bromley Town Centre Management Initiative, we work with local businesses in improving the environment of Bromley.
