Obama looking good in Michigan

Raleigh, N.C. – Barack Obama is beginning the general election in Michigan with a 48-39 lead, according to the newest survey from Public Policy Polling.

This is the second week in a row PPP has found Democrats in a large Midwestern state unifying around Obama since Hillary Clinton dropped out and endorsed him. Last week PPP showed Obama with a 50-39 edge in Ohio.

Michigan is the first state where PPP has found Obama doing a better job of keeping Democrats in the party (78-12) than McCain is of keeping Republicans in the fold (74-19).

"Every new poll PPP does in a swing state provides more evidence that talk of long term Democratic disunity because of the drawn out contest between Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton was over blown," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "Those voters are almost all now supporting Obama."

The survey also found that Carl Levin is a safe bet for reelection to the US Senate. He leads challenger Jack Hoogendyk 54-32.


Taking a look forward to 2010, PPP tested possible Democratic gubernatorial candidates Dennis Archer and John Cherry and against potential Republican contenders Mike Cox and Candice Miller. At this early point Archer leads both GOP elected officials, while Cherry trails each of them. PPP will continue to test possible match ups when it conducts polls of the Presidential race in Michigan.

PPP surveyed 573 likely voters on June 21st and 22nd. The survey's margin of error is +/- 4.1%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
