


# 6: Plas yn Rhiw - Llanbedrog

Pellter / Distance: 28.3km/17.6m



Soon after passing through the hamlet of Rhiw you will go around the foot of Mynydd Rhiw before nearing a burial chamber from the later Stone Age. From now on you are in a quite different environment since the coastal rock is far softer here. This results in spacious beaches characteristic of the southern coast where the sea has been free to erode the rock and clay to form sand. Porth Neigwl or Hell's Mouth is the first and biggest of these and the views from the western end are among the most memorable of the whole journey.

Remember to take a break at Llangian since it has another of the area's ancient churches with a granite pillar inscribed in Latin as a doctor's gravestone in the cemetery. The path then winds through Llanengan and onwards to Porth Ceiriad and the Mynydd Cilan peninsula. This stretch of coast is also a haven for wildlife today with bees, wasps, crickets, beetles and butterflies of all sorts amongst the smaller creatures that live here together with various seabirds nesting on the cliffs.

After departing from Cilan the islands of St Tudwal come into view, a sign that you are close to the popular tourist village of Abersoch.
