The 8th Principal of Farrer, Mr Steve Cavanagh, took up his position at the beginning of last Term.

Having taught in a number of schools across the State, he comes to us with a wealth and variety of experience.

Born in Gosford, he was educated in Tamworth at CBC and then McCarthy Senior Catholic HS, before completing his B Arts and Dip Ed at UNE.

He began his teaching career in English at Temora HS. This was followed by positions at Wade HS Griffith, Bellingen HS and Mt Austin HS Wagga Wagga before he was appointed to the position of Principal at Nyngan HS.

"I have thoroughly enjoyed every school in which I have taught and greatly valued the efforts of Staff, students and community, even though they have all been different," he said.

"Having come from Tamworth, I was already aware of the great reputation that Farrer has, and as it was different to the other schools, I considered it as my first choice."

Old boys visit the school after 60 years

Recently, two Old Boys, Ron Jones (1940-42) and Henry Duprez (1942-46) contacted Mr. Les Carrington to arrange some time to have a look at the Museum and School. The visit was prompted by the news that Alice, the wife of the inaugural Principal, and Mr Fred Eldering, one of the Golden Oldies had both recently passed away. Memories came flooding back, as though it were only yesterday that they had been in residence.

Ron, who came from Pilliga, already had his cousins at the school and as there was no school at Pilliga, Farrer was his chance to get an education. A quietly spoken man, Ron, who now lives in Kurrajong Village in Tamworth, contemplated what was and how things had changed so much. While he listened to Henry's stories for the most part, he did admit to riding his pushbike to Lye's farm, buying a watermelon for 6 pence and then balancing it on his handlebars back to school, where he proceeded to sell pieces to the other Boarders.

He was very impressed with the sporting facilities now available. When he was a student, the fields weren't leveled but on a slope and were very rocky.

"It made for interesting hockey games. It was okay if you were running downhill, but then you had to run uphill and often the ball would become confused with a rock."

His time at Farrer had an interesting outcome. He was so taken with the pigs on the farm that when he returned home he purchased his own animals and began his farming life. (Not impressed when it was suggested that perhaps some of his stock may have escaped to become feral pigs in the Pilliga).

Henry, who now lives diagonally opposite the Nemingha Hotel, was more forthcoming with his stories.

Originally from a farm 17 miles north of Manilla, he was only 11 when he arrived at Farrer. As it was wartime and petrol was scarce, so he only got to see his parents three times a year at holiday time. There was certainly no chance of day leave.

In later years he would ride his pushbike into town to the Railway Station, catch the train to Manilla at 5am and then ride his bike the rest of the way home.

However, the one thing that was most vivid in his memory among other things was Dairy duty.

"You had to get up at 3am to get the cows in from the top paddock. We didn't have torches, so you basically went by the moonlight and sometimes got confused by stumps and hillocks. After hand milking we then had to carry the 8 gallon (36 litre) cans up to the Refectory. Two cans between three boys."

"It sounds hard, but it was what we were used to, so we just did it."

Both were able to put to rest one of the great Farrer Myths. The existence of a bomb shelter under Centre Lawn.

"There was never anything under the lawn. We built slit trenches on the slope outside where the Hall is today. I think more people got injured trying to get into the trenches during drills than could ever have been hurt by bombs, if they came."

Following the time in the Museum, they walked across to the Industrial Arts block to marvel at the variety of equipment available and to view the Year 12 HSC Major Works.

"When we were here, we weren't allowed to do work with metal. We did make a few small things in wood. The forge room, which now houses the welding bays, was only for the Staff and was mainly used to garage the Truck."

Time was running short, but they managed to fit in a quick look at the Old Bricks dorms, where they had previously lived. The main change evident to them was the fact that the old verandahs are now filled in and there is carpet, heating, air conditioning, kitchenettes and separate Prefects rooms. It was good to watch their faces as they moved around the school, marveling at the improvements and journeying back in their minds to a time 60 years ago.

Farewell to members of the Farrer Family

It is with deep sadness that we report the passing of our foundation members of the Farrer Family.

Mrs. Alice James was the wife of the foundation Headmaster, Clary James and filled the position of Matron. In that capacity she was more than just the wife of the Boss. She was mother to the many young boys who called Farrer home in those early days. Alice gave more than just medical assistance as the first boys, some as young as 11, came to terms with living away from home. One of the early memories was of her secretiveness as she concealed birthday presents such as pushbikes, until the right day and then sharing the joy with the boys as they received them. A grand lady, she maintained great fondness for Farrer and following Clary's death, funded a Speech Day award in his memory. The James Family award is presented each year to the student who excels in Senior Agriculture. Both she and Clary were always welcome visitors to the school they established, long after his retirement. She passed away at age 96.

Mr Fred Eldering was among the first intake in 1939. His association with Farrer began before then, as his father, who was the publican of the Nemingha Hotel, had been one of the chief advocates for the establishment of the school. During his life after Farrer, Fred was very active in Agriculture as a sheep buyer, travelling throughout Australia. It was Fred who coined the phrase Golden Oldies and provided the school with a sign, now in the Old Boys Museum, which has been signed by all of the initial enrolment who attended the first reunions. More recently, his sheepdog can be seen in the film Babe.

In 2001, Mr. Eldering wrote, "In those early years, we were a family, students, the James', teaching staff, field staff and domestics, that is why the school was able to get off to such a great start.

I owe much to "the Boss", his talks and advice. It was a special part of my life. I was honoured by being first, as the Boss said to me in 1956... "Creating a Tradition for others to Follow".

Mr. Eldering, who passed away on 8th June 2006 at the age of 82 is remembered each Speech Day with the presentation of the Fred Eldering Shield for "academic sporting and agriculture achievement, leadership and school spirit."

Mr Barry Charles Munro (OB 1940) Aged 76 of Lismore passed away 14th February 2004

We may have lost four of our links to the past, but their legacy lives on.

The Class of 1951-1955

Realising that it was 55 years since we commenced High School and 50 years since we sat for the Leaving Certificate, we began contacting each other in early 2005. While we are still not absolutely sure of our statistics, they can be summarised as; 32 commenced in 1951, 1 arrived and 1 left after 1st and 2nd year and 32 sat for the Intermediate Certificate. 16 left after the Intermediate and 2 arrived (one for only 1 year) and 17 sat for the leaving certificate. 23 have been contacted. Sadly two are no longer with us, having died young in car crashes; a salutary lesson here.

White Suffolk Sale

Farrer's 12th Annual 'on-farm' Ram Sale saw repeat commercial producers using the Helmsmen system. Farrer sold 40 'Lambplan' tested white Suffolk rams at a very consistent average of \$791 with a top of \$2000. Stud Manager, Darren Smith said the experience was fantastic for the students, who were very pleased with the result. The sale average stacked up well against the national averages for this breed.



Farrer Bull Sale

Once again Farrer hosted a successful 'on-property' annual bull sale with a slightly improved average to last year. With an almost total clearance, 32 bulls sold to a top of \$7,500, averaging \$4,296 and grossing \$137,500.

Congratulations to Nigel & Sue Smith of Woonooka Angus Stud who paid the top price for Farrer Z79 by Wattletop Woofer. The Smith's chose wisely to select two bulls from the sale draft that would McCulloch (2002) competing at the suit their breeding objectives.

The first bull sold at the Sale is traditionally the 'scholarship bull' and this year, Farrer Ringleader Z44 was sold to the Say family 'Euroa' Glen Innes for \$5000.

Tamworth Show

As has been the practice in recent years, Farrer students have taken part in all aspects of the Show: Junior judging of pigs, Beef cattle, Merino sheep, meat sheep and fleeces. In addition to the job of preparing and leading the Angus and Illawarra cattle, students have also participated in the Junior Parader's competitions. Quite a number followed the tradition and assisted the Show Committee as Stewards, around the Show as well as in the Main Arena. Of particular note is that even after leaving school, many Old Boys continue to compete and this year saw Daniel Sydney RAS Young Auctioneers competition where he was judged the best in NSW. This follows on his previous successes in Merino Fleece judging. It also continues a recent trend of Farrer Old Boys in this competition, such as Patrick Purtle (Manilla) and Chris Goscomb (Gunnedah).

Dairy

This was a bumper for the dairy leaders with 22 boys participating in the showing, parading and judging of the Farrer Illawarra cattle. During the four week lead up to the show all of the boys helped to prepare the cattle, involving themselves in leading, washing, groom-

Year 8 Ag Pig Unit

This year the Year 8 Agriculture classes have the experience of working with a group of 40 pigs as



they grow from weaners to porkers. Each class is rostered on for 6 weeks and students work in small groups to ensure the pigs wellbeing over those 6 weeks.

Students become proficient at weighing the pigs and the new technologies involved in NLIS are used to identify each pig throughout its growth. The boys look forward to the regular weighings to see how well their pigs are performing, although for some the smell is a bit of a deterrent. Their classmates are quick to point out when they have been to the piggery, however they know it will soon be their peers turn!

The piglets come from D'Hudsons as weaners and are sold for processing into pork on the north coast.



Former Farrer First XIII Captain, Alan Tongue has capped off a fantastic year for the Canberra Raiders, in his seventh season in First Grade with the club, by taking the coveted Raiders Player of the Year award

"Alan has had a tremendous season for the green machine, starting in all of the Raiders 24 home and away matches and breaking the NRL record for most tackles in a season with 1040," said Ben Pollock, Raiders Media Manager.

In setting the record, Alan was a phenomenal 200 tackles in front of his nearest rival, Nathan Hindmarsh of the Parramatta Eels. It was a pleasing record for Alan to set, as the previous record holder was Richard Swain. Richard who represented Melbourne Storm and New Zealand, had preceded Alan as the Captain of the Farrer First XIII in 1993. Swain now plays with in the English "Superleague".

After collecting his awards Alan said he is just happy to be playing good football at the moment and credited his success this year to his teammates and family.

"I just wanted to be the player that other players want to play with," he said. "It's been a great year for me and I would like to thank both my beautiful family and the rest of the Raiders players and coaching staff."

Raiders coach Matt Elliott said

Tongue is the perfect example of what a football player should aspire to be.

"Alan Tongue is the most inspirational player I have ever met and it has been a pleasure coaching him," Elliott said.

Alan's potential was recognised early when he was placed on a Bronco's scholarship for his senior school years. The commitment to success was no surprise to those at Farrer who knew him as a schoolboy player. While others were rising for the day and getting started, Alan could be found on the training paddock, from 7am each morning, practising sprints, chip and chase exercises and honing his step. That commitment was rewarded with an Australian Schoolboy guernsey & CHS Blue in 1998, before being picked up by the Raiders as a utility forward. The Raiders Player of the Year is selected by the players and coaching staff on a 3-2-1 voting system, with Tongue polling 28 votes ahead of Troy Thompson (19), Clinton Schifcofske (16), Adam Mogg (13) and Todd Carney (12). Alan's time at Canberra has been littered with awards and strong performances. In his first year, 1999, he was Jersey Flegg captain; in 2000 he was named Raiders Rookie of the Year; and in 2003, Clubman of the Year. Last season he finished runner-up in the Player of the Year.

The Presentation Night was a good time for Farrer Old Boys. Nick Colley, Year 12 last year, received the coaches' award for the Jersey Flegg side.

Perhaps the next player to capture the record will be Marty Lewis, now playing with the Parramatta Eels. In 2005 Marty was Captain of the School and the First XIII, with three years service, and represented the Australian Schoolboys.

Funding included payment of casual teacher relief, travel, meals and conference registration fees.

Zac Carrigan and Jason Herbig were invited to attend due to them undertaking a pilot program in a new course called "Cotton Basics" developed by the Cotton industry. The course uses units of competency drawn from the national training package in rural industry, which Mr. Harris had agreed to trial.

This trial has been enthusiastically endorsed by Year 9 students wishing to undertake the course in 2007.

Numerous links to various participants within the cotton industry were explored and developed.

During the conference a number of outcomes were achieved which included:

Establishment of direct articulation from the Cotton Basics Certificate II into the Certificate III course at Queensland Agricultural Colleges Emerald campus;

Development of opportunities fro structured work placements with a number of leading cotton organisations including Auscott and Boolamon Plains Pastoral. Both of these received prestigious awards at the Cotton Awards dinner;

Preliminary discussions with NAB regarding a cadetship in finance for a Farrer student each year; Promotion of Farrer as a school of choice for agricultural education;

Development of links with many Farrer Old Boys who are involved in the industry;

Collection of teaching resources to assist in the delivery of the course; and

Development of employment related links for Farrer students.

Apart from attendance at the conference lectures and symposia on current issues in the industry, the boys and Mr. Harris manned the Cotton Australia stand to answer questions regarding educational options for students. They then appeared on stage with Mrs Georgie Carrigan for a segment addressing the national skill shortage in the industry and future training opportunities.

Following discussions with Emerald Ag College officials, Mr Harris was able to negotiate a pathway for Senior students who undertake the Certificate III Grain Production course as part of their HSC. Farrer is the only secondary school licensed to deliver this qualification. Successful completion of the course will permit entry into the Advanced Certificate at Emerald (1 year) followed by advanced standing into the second year of the Agriculture degree at the Gatton campus of the University of Queensland.

- Founded in 1939 as an agricultural high school for boarders, particularly those who are isolated and day students from the Tamworth region. Located on the outskirts of Tamworth NSW on 140 hectares of prime Peel Valley farmland.
- We are a Lighthouse school for BOY'S EDUCATION including Vocational Education, traineeships and an outstanding ODAS program of camps and tours involving the whole school every year.
- The only PUBLIC agricultural boarding school for boys in Australia.
- Third largest boarding school in the State with outstanding facilities including 7 computer rooms, outstanding TAS workshops, indoor basketball Gym, 200 seat auditorium, 25 meter pool, weights room, Old Boys museum and great facilities to teach practical agriculture.
- Student population 610 with 360 boarders. 65% of students off farms with many more associated with the agricultural industries. We have 34 aboriginal students, many boarders.
- The Staff are dedicated, caring and committed with many being here for over 20 years. Nigel Smith has coached the 1st XI hockey side for the past 29 years and coached representative sides to State Championships.
