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ARENA STAGE PRESENTS MICHAEL FRAYN'S HILARIOUS FARCE COMEDY NOISES OFF

*** British Director Jonathan Munby returns to D.C. to direct an all-star cast including Bob Prosky, Helen Carey and Susan Lynskey ***

(Washington D.C.) Hilarity and chaos ensue in Arena Stage's production of Michael Frayn's (*Democracy, Copenhagen*) ingenious play-within-a-play *Noises Off*, about a third-rate British acting troupe desperately trying to stage and tour a third-rate farce called *Nothing On*. British Director Jonathan Munby orchestrates the mayhem and directs the cast, which includes Arena veteran Robert Prosky as Selsdon Mowbray, Tony Award-nominee Helen Carey as Dotty Otley and Arena Affiliated Artist Susan Lynskey as Poppy Norton-Taylor. *Noises Off* runs **December 15 – January 28 in the Kreeger Theater. The press opening night performance is Thursday, December 21 at 8:00 p.m.**

"Noises Off is a hysterical story about a theater troupe's misadventures," said Arena Stage Artistic Director Molly Smith. "The underlying authenticity of an actor's reaction when thrust into the spotlight is one of the exhilarating joys of going to the theater for audiences. Directed by the talented Jonathan Munby, this exceptional cast shows us the complex, creative art of theater."

As actors in this play-within-a-play rehearse, forgotten lines, dropped trousers and lost plates of sardines create onstage pandemonium. Meanwhile, it is total chaos backstage as love triangles, petty bickering and ruined affairs lead to pratfalls, flying props and more than one bloody nose. In the end, at the frenetic final performance, everything merges into one perfectly ravaged and wholly uproarious theatrical nervous breakdown.

The havoc-ridden acting troupe is led by *Nothing On*'s director, Lloyd Dallas, rightfully played by British director/actor James Gale. In addition to Prosky, Carey and Lynskey, other Arena alumni members of the troupe include Stephen Schnetzer (*The Goat or, Who is Sylvia*) as Garry Lejeune, Lynnda Ferguson (*Hot 'N' Throbbing*) as Belinda Blair and Helen Hayes Award winner Stephen F. Schmidt (*Damn Yankees, Camelot, Guys and Dolls*) as Frederick Fellowes. Making their Arena Stage debut are Jay Russell as Tim Allgood and Amelia McClain as Brooke Ashton.

Noises Off premiered in London in 1982 and won the London Evening Standard Award for Best Comedy. It opened on Broadway in 1983 and was nominated for four Tony Awards including the 1984 Award for Best Play. In 1992, Marty Kaplan wrote a screenplay for *Noises Off* and turned it into a successful film directed by Peter Bogdanovich. The play was revived on Broadway in 2001 and was nominated for the 2002 Tony for Best Revival of a Play and earned Katie Finneran the 2002 Tony for Best Featured Role in a play.

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Michael Frayn is a celebrated playwright, novelist and translator. Early in his career he worked as a reporter and columnist for *The Guardian* and *The Observer*. He has published several novels including *The Tin Men* (1965), winner of a Somerset Maugham Award; *The Russian Interpreter* (1966), which won the Hawthornden Prize; *Towards the End of the Morning* (1967); *A Landing on the Sun* (1991), which won the *Sunday Express* Book of the Year; and *Spies* (2002), which won the 2002 Whitbread Novel Award and the 2003 Commonwealth Writers Prize. He is also the recipient of the 2002 Heywood Hill Literary Prize. His latest book is a work of non-fiction, *The Human Touch: Our Part in the Creation of the Universe* (2006). His plays include *Alphabetical Order* (1975); *Clouds* (1976); *Donkeys' Years* (1977); *Make or Break* (1980); *Noises Off* (1982); *Benefactors* (1984); *Copenhagen* (1998), which won the 1998 *Evening Standard* Award for Best Play of the Year and the 2000 Tony Award for Best Play; and *Democracy* (2003), which won the 2005 Tony Award for Best Play. He has also translated a number of works from Russian, including plays by Chekhov and Tolstoy. His films for television include *First and Last* (1989), for which he won an Emmy, and an adaptation of his 1991 novel *A Landing on the Sun*. He also wrote the screenplay for the film *Clockwise* (1986), a comedy starring John Cleese.

Helen Carey (Dotty Otley)'s former productions at Arena include *The Revengers' Comedies, The Odyssey* and *Crime and Punishment*. At the Shakespeare Theatre Company, she appeared in *The Persians, Anthony and Cleopatra, Macbeth, Henry VI* and *Volpone* (for which she received a Helen Hayes Award). For Signature Theatre, she played Phyllis in *Follies*. On Broadway, she received a Tony nomination and a Theatre World Award for Lady Gay Spanker in *London Assurance*. Other New York credits include works of Shaw, Brian Friel and Neil Simon. She has been a long standing artist at the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis, spanning the tenures of Founding Director Sir Tyrone Guthrie (*Uncle Vanya*) and current Artistic Director Joe Dowling (*Cherry Orchard, Death of a Salesman*). At the Festival Theatre, Stratford, Ontario, she played in *School for Scandal, Blithe Spirit, Merchant of Venice* and *Arms and the Man*. In Ireland, she received an ESB/Irish Times nomination for her work in *All My Sons* at Dublin's Abbey Theatre. Film/TV credits include *Little Children, Emperor's Club, Black Knights, "*House," "Seinfeld," "Law & Order" and "The Brotherhood."

Lynnda Ferguson (Belinda Blair)'s D.C.-area appearances include *Hot 'N' Throbbing* (Arena); *Blithe Spirit, The Misanthrope* and *Midsummer Night's Dream* (CenterStage, Baltimore); *Richard III* (Shakespeare Theatre) and *Rumors* (National Tour). She appeared in *Bring Back Birdie* and *Rumors* on Broadway, as well as *Romeo and Juliet* and *Mrs. Feuerstein* Off-Broadway. Other favorite productions at such theaters as Berkeley Repertory Theatre, South Coast Repertory, ACT (San Francisco), the Old Globe (San Diego), Alaska Repertory Theatre and The Denver Center include *Private Lives* (Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Actress), *The Homecoming* (Matrix Theatre Company, LADCC Award), *The Philadelphia Story, The Misanthrope, South Pacific, Bus Stop* (directed by Molly Smith) and *The Lady from Maxim's*. TV work includes "Law & Order," "Judging Amy," "Frasier," "News Radio" and "Deep Space Nine." Ms. Ferguson is Executive Producer for the feature film *Making Contact* directed by Molly Smith.

James Gale (Lloyd Dallas)'s New York credits include *The Skin Game* (Mint Theatre), *Playboy of the Western World* (Irish Rep.), *Major Barbara* (Roundabout), *Engaged* (Theatre for a New Audience) and *The Beard of Avon* (New York Theatre Workshop). His regional credits include *Mauritius, Raw Boys, Cloud 9, Camille, Blue/Orange, The Lion in Winter, Two Small Bodies, Twelfth Night, 33 Variations, The Magic Fire, Ghosts, Night Sky, The Greeks, Titus Andronicus, Betrayal, Macbeth, Educating Rita, King Lear, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf, Richard III, As You Like It, Equus and The Merchant of Venice at theaters in Boston, Louisville, Washington, D.C., Hartford, Indianapolis, Stamford,*

Philadelphia, Denver, Houston, Los Angeles, Santa Cruz, Bard on Avon and Rochester. His regional work in the UK includes *Romeo and Juliet, Arms and the Man, The Importance of Being Earnest* and *Richard III*. He has appeared at the London Fringe Festival in *The Paddy Factor, Blood Wedding* and *The Dumb Waiter*.

Susan Lynskey (Poppy Norton-Taylor) marks *Noises Off* as her sixth production at Arena Stage. Previous productions include *Born Yesterday*, *Intimations for Saxophone*, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *Book of Days* and *Proof*. Other recent Washington performances include Miss Kroll in *Citizen 13559* (Kennedy Center), Helen in *The Cripple of Inishmaan* (Studio Theater) and Iris in the U.S. premiere of *Girl in the Goldfish Bowl* (MetroStage). TV/Film appearances include *Contact*, *Random Hearts*, *Crazy Like a Fox*, NBC's "Homicide," HBO's "The Wire" and *The Visiting* (release 2007). Her radio/voice work includes narration and radio plays for NPR, CBC, PBS and 'SOUNDINCENTIVE' D.C.'s new ensemble of Radio Theatre artists. Her work has been recognized with a Helen Hayes nomination and the D.C. Commission on the Arts' Artist Fellow Award. Ms. Lynskey is one of Arena's Affiliated Artists.

Amelia McClain (Brooke Ashton) recently graduated with an M.F.A. from New York University's Graduate Acting Program where her favorite roles included Callie Pax in *Stop Kiss,* Helen McCormick in *The Cripple of Inishmaan* and Mia Panzoroff in *Le Bourgeois Avant-Garde.* Ms. McClain also played four different characters in *The Horton Foote Project,* an adaptation she co-created based on Horton Foote's nine-play cycle. She is a 1999 NFAA award winner.

Robert Prosky (Selsdon Mowbray) has appeared in more than 200 plays both on Broadway and in regional theater. He has been in 38 films and numerous television shows. He has been given or nominated for two Tony Awards, two Helen Hayes Awards, an Emmy, the Drama Desk Award and the American Express Tribute to an American Actor. He has appeared on Broadway in *Glengarry Glen Ross, A Walk in the Woods* and *A View from the Bridge*, among others. Highlights from regional theater include *Death of a Salesman, Twelfth Night* and *You Can't Take It With You*. He has also performed at the Moscow Art Theater in Russia and the Gate Theater in Dublin, Ireland. His films include *Mrs. Doubtfire, The Natural* and *Dead Man Walking*. TV credits include three years on "Hill Street Blues" and many TV films and guest shots. He has recently finished a long run on Broadway in Michael Frayn's play *Democracy*, last season's production of *Awake and Sing!* at Arena Stage, and Arthur Miller's *The Price* with two of his sons, John and Andrew.

Jay Russell (Tim Allgood) appeared on Broadway in *The Play What I Wrote* directed by Kenneth Branagh. Off-Broadway work includes *The Normal Heart* (Public Theatre), *The Green Heart* (Manhattan Theatre Club), *Private Jokes, Public Places* and *An evening with Burton & Russell* (coauthor/co-star). His regional work includes *Natural Selection* and *Listeners* (2006 Humana Festival/Actors Theatre of Louisville); *Gross Indecency* and *An Ideal Husband* (Repertory Theatre of St. Louis); *The Importance of Being Earnest* and *The Mystery of Irma Vep* (Cincinnati Playhouse); *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and *The Lion in Winter* (Utah Shakespearean Festival); *Anything Goes* opposite Sandy Duncan (Ordway Theatre); and *Design for Living* (Olney Theatre). Stephen F. Schmidt (Frederick Fellowes) returns to Arena where he appeared in *Damn Yankees*, *Camelot* and *Guys and Dolls*. Mr. Schmidt recently appeared in *A Prayer for Owen Meany* at Round House, where he has also appeared in *One Shoe Off, Chemistry of Change* and *The Fantasticks*. Mr.

Schmidt is the recipient of the 2006 Helen Hayes Award for Outstanding Supporting Actor, Resident Musical for Lockstock in *Urinetown* at Signature Theatre. Previous Helen Hayes nominations include *Roald Dahl's Willy Wonka* (Wonka) at The Kennedy Center, *It's A Wonderful Life* (George) at Toby's and *The Rocky Horror Show* (Brad) at Woolly Mammoth. At CenterStage in Baltimore, Mr. Schmidt has appeared in *Sweeney Todd, The Winter's Tale, The Investigation, As You Like It, H.M.S. Pinafore* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

Stephen Schnetzer (Garry Lejeune) appeared at Arena Stage as Martin in *The Goat or, Who is Sylvia?*. He has appeared on Broadway in *A Talent for Murder* with Claudette Colbert, *Filumena* directed by Laurence Olivier and *The Goat or, Who is Sylvia?*. His Off-Broadway credits include *Romeo and Juliet, Miss Julie* (Roundabout), the original cast of Terrence McNally's *Lisbon Traviata* and *Timon of Athens* (Delacorte). Regionally, he has worked at The American Shakespeare Theatre for Michael Kahn, as well as appeared in *Saint Joan* at the McCarter, *Shakespeare's People* with Michael Redgrave, *The Tempest* with Anthony Hopkins, and developed new plays at Florida Stage and O'Neill's National Playwrights Conference. He was featured in 20 productions at the American Conservatory Theatre, including *The Taming of the Shrew*, which was televised for PBS' "Theatre in America" series. His film/TV credits include *Brooklyn Lobster*, *Ben's Plan*, "Law & Order," "Law & Order: SVU," "Prince Street," "Cosby Murder Mysteries," and 17 years as Cass Winthrop on "Another World." He has won three MVP Awards, a Best Comic Performance Award and a Best Actor Daytime Emmy nomination.
