Obama barely leads in Michigan

Raleigh, N.C. – On the heels of a successful Republican convention Barack Obama's lead in Michigan is down to just a single point. He has a 47-46 advantage over John McCain.

The selection of Sarah Palin as the Republican Vice Presidential candidate appears to be a hit with Michigan voters. 45% of respondents say they are more likely to vote for McCain because of his running mate selection, while just 30% say Joe Biden joining the Democratic ticket makes them more likely to vote for Barack Obama.

"There's no doubt that the Palin choice shook up the race a good deal," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "The big question now is whether this tightening we're seeing in Michigan is just part of a convention bounce, or a sign that the state is going to be extremely competitive right through November. If it is, that spells trouble for Barack Obama."

The race breaks down pretty much as one expects. Obama leads with women, blacks, and voters under 45. McCain has the edge with men, whites, and older voters. The candidates are tied with independent voters.

In Michigan's Senate race, Carl Levin leads Jack Hoogendyk 51-36. This is the closest poll of the race so far, but more likely reflects momentum Republicans got out of their convention than anything actually going on in the contest.

PPP surveyed 1,147 likely voters on September 6^{th} and 7th. The survey's margin of error is $\pm 2.9\%$. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
