

### The Dame Catherine Cookson Memorial Garden

Situated along the Hospital Street at South Tyneside District Hospital, the Dame Catherine Cookson Memorial Garden was designed by artist Elizabeth Tate around the theme of the Caduceus, the serpent-entwined staff symbolic of knowledge and healing. Catherine Cookson began her working life as a laundry checker in Harton Workhouse Laundry on the District Hospital site, where she worked from 22<sup>nd</sup> October 1924 – April 1929 and, by her writing success, became a major sponsor of both medicine and the arts.

The garden features a 40-metre-long water channel connecting two pools, set amid a serpentine shape whose loops enclose the garden plots. The garden was built under the Arts and Environment Initiative of the Health Promoting Trusts programme, which seeks to develop new partnerships to enhance the well-being and health of the community. This project included Pedalling Arts and Groundwork South Tyneside and the participation and funding of the Post Office Community Action Team. Additional funding was also provided by the Dame Catherine Cookson Trust.

The Garden was officially opened on Tuesday 20 November 2001 by Dr Hugo Marshall, Chairman of the Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust together with his wife Anne, a close family friend of Catherine and Tom Cookson.
