Introduction and Methodology

- ◆ The Strategic Counsel is pleased to present findings of a national survey of 1000 Canadians.
- Results are based on a proportionate national sample of Canadians 18 years of age or older.
- Interviews were conducted between August 25th to August 31st, 2008.
- The following table outlines the sample distribution and associated margin of error.
- Note: Proportions may not sum to 100% due to rounding.

Highlights

Campaigns matter. As we experienced in the last election, the dynamics of the campaign can have a significant impact on the election outcome. Below is a snapshot of the state of public opinion in the leadup to a Canadian Federal Election.

A Majority Government within Stephen Harper's reach - but not yet in his grasp:

- On the eve of an election call....
 - Conservatives (37%) now hold a substantial lead (8 percentage points) over the Liberals (29%)
 - The Conservative lead is powered by their strength in Southern Ontario (but not 416), lower mainland BC, and Quebec outside Montreal
 - The Tories have benefited from a relatively quiet Summer a reprieve from being on the defensive in the House of Commons as they were all Spring.
 - Conservatives also benefit from a gender gap with men while drawing comparable levels of women voters as the Liberals.
- Harper is perceived to be a strong and decisive leader in tough economic times. Indeed, he outdraws Stephane Dion on 7 of 9 leadership attributes. Harper is deemed to possess a more positive vision of the country – he is also considered more likeable, more likely to stand up to the United States, more empathetic, more effective in tough economic times, more caring about the economy of respondents' particular provinces and more decisive than Dion. Conversely, Dion is more trusted on the environment and is considered more likely to respect the views of others.







Highlights

- ◆ There is also an unexpected strength for Dion and the Liberals in Quebec and francophone voters. Quebecers believe that Dion is more likeable/easygoing, more likely to care about people like themselves and more concerned about the Quebec economy than Harper. Those same advantages are mirrored among francophone voters in general.
- After floundering several months ago, is the Conservatives are back in the game in vote rich Ontario where the Tories enjoy a 4 point lead.
- The Issues Have Changed the Canadian Political Landscape: The Economy Takes Centre-Stage, followed by the Environment and Health Care
- ◆ 20% of Canadians regard the Economy as the most important issue in the next election, up from a mere 7% in the last election. The Environment has also gained prominence, rising from 3% in late-November 2005 to nearly 15% today. Of the three main issues on Canadians' minds, Health Care has taken the biggest hit since the lead-up to the last election. It has fallen from 20% on the eve of the last election to 14% today.







Highlights

- Also benefiting the Conservatives is a decline in the percentage of Canadians who believe the country is on the wrong track, and the absence of a general yearning for change among Canadians. If the Liberals want to change the current dynamic, they must create a strong case that electing a Tory majority would be risky for Canadians.
- The Conservatives are doing a better job of consolidating their ideological base. While 7/10 self-identified Conservatives will vote for the Tories, only 1/2 self-identified Liberals will vote for the Grits. Simultaneously, while the plurality of switch voters abandoned the Liberals for the NDP in the last election, most are likely to flee the Liberals for the Tories in this campaign.
- Nonetheless, the data suggests that it is in the Liberals' interests to challenge the Conservatives in a two-way duel and polarize the choice for Canadians. The Liberals also have an opportunity to siphon voters away from the NDP and the Green Party who have the softest support going into this election. While 3/5 Liberal and Tory voters are unlikely to change their votes, fully half of Green Party and NDP voters would consider changing their minds over the course of an election campaign. And among NDP voters, for example, the second choice is twice as likely to be Liberal (31%) as it is Conservative (16%).

Right now, do you think that overall the country is on the right track or the wrong track?


