UPDATE FROM KWRU TENT CITY

House our Shildren! Billions for the war. Still Nothing for the POOR!

By Galen Tyler, Director Words can't describe the mental and physical abuse thousands of poor and homeless families go through during the cold months of winter. During the weeks of the Bushville tent city at Broad & Clearfield, KWRU had a total of 29 adults and 63 children who were homeless. The Tent City was a way to

house some families as well as show this homeless crisis in our city.

When we tried to meet with our local HUD officials to express concerns and seek solutions to these families' crises, we were denied access to their offices. With nowhere else to go, we along with other community groups marched to the military recruitment center where many of us protested that "billions for the war meant still nothing for the poor".

On Dec. 6, we had a bus ready to take our families and supporters to Washington DC to demand a meeting with the National HUD Secretary, but that morning at 6am one of the Bushville children was hit by a car. This child is 4. Collect Documentation in your area and join our in stable condition but, as a result of this tragedy, we arrived later then anticipated to the HUD office in DC. Upon arrival we were denied access to the public building. We expressed we still weren't leaving until we met with someone to help solve these homeless families' problems. After hours of protesting in the cold, HUD negotiated with us; 8 members were allowed to meet with officials. In the meeting we discussed the budget cuts to Section 8 and the lack of access to our local HUD office and beds for domestic violence victims.

In the end, we won a meeting with our local HUD officials. At this meeting with Milton Pratt, the HUD Regional Secretary and others, we got HUD to commit to solving 5 out of 28 families' situations immediately, and to working with us to solve the other families' housing crises.

FACES OF THE FALLEN PROJECT

The Kensington Welfare Rights Union along with the Poor People's Economic Human Rights Campaign has been committed to building a movement to end poverty in this country and the world. The war on America's poor and working families has left many of us without our economic human rights to food, housing, healthcare, education and living wage jobs. Over the past four years, our conditions have worsened. There are now over 31 million Americans living in poverty; 12.2 million children in our nation are poor, with over 1.35 million of them homeless. Over 43 million people in the US have no healthcare and there are currently almost 10 million unemployed Americans.

The poor have been disappeared from not only the welfare rolls and the workforce, but from the media and the political debates. Our stories are not told and our images are not seen.


If the general public knew our stories and saw our faces, we know that something would be done. We need economic human rights to be a priority over the next four years. For many of us who have been abandoned by political parties in the past, we simply will not make it.

We are asking everyone to conduct face-to-face interviews with the people in their community who are experiencing human rights violations.
