Obama continues to hold small lead in NC

Raleigh, N.C. – Barack Obama is hanging onto a 49-46 lead over John McCain in the newest North Carolina survey from Public Policy Polling. He led 50-44 in a similar poll last week.

Obama has actually made gains with independents over the last week since the McCain campaign took on an increasingly negative tone. What was a 46-40 advantage with that group is now up to 52-37. But the attacks may also be having the impact of shoring up McCain's base and helping him to peel off some conservative Democrats, as he's made small gains with voters in both parties over the last seven days.

The events of the last week have resulted in a new record for the percentage of North Carolinians listing the economy as their top issue. That figure has now hit 65%, and Obama leads 59-36 among those voters.

"For the longest time Barack Obama basically had free rein in North Carolina, but John McCain is finally starting to make some visits and put some money in here," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "With both campaigns contesting strongly here North Carolina looks like it will be one of the closest states in the country on election night."


The heated contest for the US Senate between incumbent Republican Elizabeth Dole and Democratic challenger Kay Hagan has tightened considerably in the last week. Hagan now leads 46-44, down from 49-40 previously. Most of the movement has come among Democratic voters, an indication that conservatives who often cross over to vote Republican in federal elections are perhaps being swayed by Dole's attacks on Hagan.

PPP surveyed 1,196 likely voters on October 11th and 12th. The survey's margin of error is +/-2.8%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
