McCain, Obama in NC holding pattern

Raleigh, N.C. – John McCain and Barack Obama continue to be locked in a tight race in North Carolina, the newest survey from Public Policy Polling shows.

McCain leads with 47% to Obama's 44%. Libertarian Bob Barr holds 3% of the vote. Every public poll conducted since Hillary Clinton dropped out of the race has shown the contest within five points in North Carolina.

Obama leads 53-38 among respondents most concerned with the economy, and 58-32 with those whose top issue is the war.

"The bigger an issue the economy is for voters the better Barack Obama is going to do," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "If North Carolina voters choose on immigration or moral and family values, John McCain is going to win a big victory here. But if voters increasingly put the economy foremost when deciding who to vote for, Democrats are going to have the best shot they've had in quite a long time."

Obama leads 82-8 among black voters, but trails 57-34 with whites.

The race for US Senate has tightened since last month, with Elizabeth Dole now leading Kay Hagan 49-40 after holding a 14 point lead in PPP's previous survey.


"Elizabeth Dole got a bump when she went on the air in late May, but that has largely dissipated," said Debnam. "With the news in the last week that the DSCC plans to make a considerable expenditure on Hagan's behalf, this race could end up being closer than previously anticipated."

PPP surveyed 823 likely voters from July 23rd to 27th. The survey's margin of error is +/-3.4%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
