


The Hillsboro School District Board of Directors is composed of seven elected Board members serving four-year terms. Board members establish policy based on Oregon state laws and federal laws governing schools and represent the community in shaping the course of the School District.

The Hillsboro School Board is active at the state and national levels in public education advocacy roles. The Board has received the Outstanding Board Achievement Award from the Oregon School Boards Association for the fourth consecutive year.

# Mear One Progress OF THE DISTRICT STRATEGIC PLAN

The 2006-2007 school year represents the first full year of implementation of the District's Strategic Plan for 2006-2011, which was developed by a broad-based group of community and staff members, and adopted by the Board of Directors on February 28, 2006. In July 2007, an independent consultant reviewed the progress of the Strategic Plan and reported the results to the Board.

Following are highlights of the evaluation of the first-year implementation.

Strategy I - We will reignite the community's passion and commitment for our schools in order to build a world-class school system.

Major Accomplishments:

- The construction bond passage illustrated success in connecting with the community.
- Student phone banks resulted in parent participation at elementary school events, building a greater partnership between schools and parents.

*Recommendations for Year 2:* 

- Train staff to become effective District communicators.
- Continue increasing communications with the community, enhancing opportunity for feedback and input from stakeholders.

Strategy II - We will develop and implement a comprehensive plan to address future student population growth and its related needs.

Major Accomplishments:

- Educational excellence and equity remain the top District priorities and impact all facilities decisions. All facility projects include consideration for health, safety and security as part of those projects.
- The November 2006 construction bond election enabled the District to address future population growth through the life of the current Strategic Plan.
- District staff continue to forge partnership opportunities through shared facilities.

*Recommendations for Year 2:* 

- Establish a comprehensive communication plan for the boundary process that includes the Board of Directors, administration, staff, students and the community.
- Use bond projects as a tool to connect with the community: ensure the broader community is aware of the projects and timelines and knows how to access information related to the bond.

Strategy III - We will ensure that all staff use effective instructional strategies that actively engage students in achieving our strategic objectives.

Major Accomplishments:

- Teams of educators analyze student data to most effectively guide instruction and create strategies to improve student achievement.
- District power standards were developed to focus instruction on the most essential skills students should master to be successful in school and beyond.
- The Safe Schools/Healthy Students grant provides resources to increase the link between school, parents and students.

*Recommendations for Year 2:* 

- Provide all staff with in-depth professional development to enhance their instructional skills.
- Use instructional coaches to increase opportunities for classroom coaching, lesson demonstration and other projects.
- Plan the Middle Years International Baccalaureate program at the new middle school and the dual-language program at Minter Bridge Elementary School.

Strategy IV: We will continue our Hispanic Outreach programs to ensure that all students meet both standards and graduation requirements.

Major Accomplishments:

- Attendance intervention was increased through the Safe Schools/Healthy Students grant.
- Hispanic parent involvement increased through the Migrant Parent Advisory and other District and school committees.
- The partnership with Employers for Education Excellence (E3), developed to provide mentors for 30 at-risk middle school students, has been successful.

*Recommendations for Year 2:* 


- Assemble a resource handbook with the services provided through the Office of Hispanic Outreach.
- Enhance efforts to recruit bilingual and Hispanic teaching candidates.
- Change the position of Coordinator of the Office of Hispanic Outreach to a 12-month administrator position for fullyear operation.



# Academic Achievement

It is the goal of the Hillsboro School District to engage every child from kindergarten through 12th grade in a challenging, personalized instructional program that prepares them for success in post-high school studies or the world of work.




- The creation of campus "Data Teams," a core group of educators at every school, who use data-driven decision-making to identify areas to focus instruction and assess individual student performance in order to help all students succeed.
- The identification and communication of Districtwide "Power Standards," designed to provide a rigorous, consistent instructional program across the District at all grade levels. Power Standards are the essential standards that all students should master at any given grade level, at every school in the District.
- The implementation of effective teaching strategies through in-depth professional development for all teachers and principals.


Measuring the success of the these initiatives is largely determined by student performance on the Oregon State Assessment Tests (OSAT). The primary purpose of OSAT are to measure student achievement for reading and literature, mathematics, science and writing. Social science tests are available, but not required. Limited English-proficient students must take the English Language Proficiency Assessment. All students in Oregon public schools are required to take a series of OSAT exams.


Each August, districts receive final results of the OSAT, which assist educators and parents in monitoring individual student progress. The test data provides local schools and districts information to determine strengths and weaknesses of instructional programs. These results also inform parents and citizens about progress schools make year-to-year.

High school juniors in the Hillsboro School District also had the opportunity to take the ACT college entrance exam at no charge during the school day. The data has provided the District with vital information to assist students in their high school coursework and preparing for post-high school success.









#### OSAT RESULTS

#### Reading/English Language Arts (Grades 3-8 and 10)

The District average in Reading/English Language Arts declined in Grades 3-6. Grades 7, 8 and 10 improved, with the greatest District gain at Grade 10 where scores improved by 14 percent over the previous year. Hillsboro High School achieved a 23 percent gain over the previous year.

#### Mathematics (Grades 3-8 and 10)

- Mathematics scores declined in Grades 3-6. Mathematics scores increased in Grades 7, 8 and 10 with the greatest gain of 13 percent at Grade 10.
- Hillsboro High School showed an improvement of 21 percent over the prior year's scores. Century High School improved 17 percent.

#### Writing (Grades 4, 7 and 10)

The District average in writing decreased in Grades 4 and 7. Grade 10 scores increased by 2 percent.

Note: Science tests were suspended for the 2006-2007 school year due to changes in the state assessment system.

There were many changes in the assessment system during the 2006-2007 school year, including a change in the achievement standards, implementation of a new extended assessment, changes in participation rules, and a temporary switch to a short paper-and-pencil assessment.

Three circumstances are significantly different in this test administration from prior administrations:

- Some students took a paper-and-pencil test for the first time.
- Many students had only one opportunity to take the test.
- The test provided 30 items (short version) to allow administration of the test during one period. This number of items is statistically sufficient to yield an overall valid score, but does not allow the same

number of test items at the high and low ends of the performance scale.

#### Detail Report for: Oregon Department of Education

CRITICAL: The percent of students meeting the standard in 2006-2007 is not comparable to previous years' results.

In December 2006, a representative group of Oregon educators, parents and other members of the public gathered together to determine how well students need to do on the Oregon Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (OAKS) tests to be identified as having mastered the state content standards. The last time that was done was in 1996, so it was time to update or realign the standards with our expectations for students this year. At a small number of grades, mostly high school, the expectations are lower based on the review of actual test items used in our state tests. Due to the change in Oregonians' expectations for students, the percent of students meeting the standard in 2006-2007 is not comparable to previous year's results.

#### **EXPLORE® TEST**

In November 2006, the District provided the opportunity for all eighth-graders to take the EXPLORE® test, which is a precursor to the ACT college entrance exam. The EXPLORE® test was designed to assess students' career interests and academic achievement in English, mathematics, reading and science. We are proud to report that Hillsboro eighth-graders who took the test scored higher than the national norm group in math, reading and science, and in the composite scores. A detailed report of each student's performance was provided to families and high school counselors to make recommendations for high school coursework for individual students.

#### FEDERAL NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT

#### What is Adequate Yearly Progress?

Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) is one of the cornerstones of the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act. In Oregon, it is a measure of the year-to-year student achievement on the Oregon statewide assessments.

AYP applies to each district and school in the state. Each school receives its AYP status as a whole, and for each subgroup of students, based on the following categories: race/ethnicity, students with disabilities, Limited English Proficiency (LEP), and economically disadvantaged.

#### How to meet AYP:

There are two ways schools can meet AYP:

- 1) Each school must have enough students tested to be statistically valid. Each school must get 50 percent of students in each subgroup to meet English/Language Arts benchmarks and 49 percent of its students in each subgroup to meet math benchmarks. For this measure to count, at least 95 percent of the school's population must take the tests. Then, other requirements kick in: annual attendance rate of 92 percent for elementary/middle schools, and 68.1 percent graduation rate for high schools. The same attendance and graduation standards are required under Oregon's school and district report cards.
- **2)** A school also meets AYP standards if it reduces the percent of students who didn't make AYP the previous year by at least 10 percent and meets participation, high school graduation and attendance requirements by subgroup for elementary and middle school.





#### STATE REPORT CARD RATINGS

The Oregon Department of Education produces yearly report cards for schools and districts in the state. These reports, called for by the 1999 Oregon Legislature, provide the community with an opportunity to better understand how local schools are performing.

Each school in the state receives one of five overall ratings: *Exceptional*, *Strong*, *Satisfactory*, *Low*, or *Unacceptable*. The ratings are based on student performance, student behavior, school characteristics, and improvement over time. It is important to remember that the federal and state report rating systems are different, which is why a school might be rated *Strong* by the state yet rated under NCLB as having "Not Met" Adequate Yearly Progress.

In October, Hillsboro received State Report Card results for all schools. For the 2006-2007 school year, 17 out of 23 elementary schools in the Hillsboro School District earned *Strong* or *Exceptional* ratings from the Oregon Department of Education.

Five elementary schools received *Exceptional* overall ratings: Eastwood, Farmington View, Indian Hills, Orenco and West Union, and 12 elementary schools received *Strong* overall ratings: Butternut Creek, Groner, W. L. Henry, Imlay, Jackson, Ladd Acres, Lenox, McKinney, North Plains, Patterson, Reedville and Tobias.

Four of eight middle and high schools in the District received an overall rating of *Strong*. Glencoe High School – one of just a few high schools in Oregon – received an *Exceptional* rating.

At Peter Boscow, we believe that all children are successful learners. Instruction is designed to meet the needs of all learners. All students participate in a 90-minute literacy block based on research-based instructional practices. Grade-level teams meet regularly to collaboratively analyze student data to improve instruction. Our Title I program offers small-group, research-based intervention programs for developing readers. ESL students receive additional pull-out support. Our reading coach works collaboratively with classroom teachers to provide students with optimal reading instruction.

We are a Positive Behavior Support (PBS) school using a proactive approach to promoting positive school culture. Students are rewarded with Boscow Bucks for good behavior, selected as Stars of the Week and have the opportunity to become Self-Managers.

Our BLAST after-school program gives students the opportunity to develop positive leadership skills. Our Hispanic Outreach worker works collaboratively with building administration and our community to increase parent involvement to ensure that parents are our partners. We hold many evening events that allow us to build community with our families.

Teachers focus on instructional strategies that support individual student learning needs. Professional development is provided to staff members through school-based and District-supported trainings. All teachers strive to provide students challenging academic programs. Schoolwide activities include a literacy program that rewards students for reading activities and Spirit Assemblies

that focus on character building and positive behavior. After-school activities include programs for Talented and Gifted students and the Hillsboro Parks and Recreation sports program.

Family and community involvement is critical to student success at Butternut Creek. The Parent Teacher Club provides support for volunteer projects such as our annual school carnival and Outdoor Science School for sixth-grade students. A Hillsboro Schools Foundation grant funded a weather station that is used by classrooms and by the school science club. The weather station will be an addition to our school garden. Our 4-H Wildlife Stewards Habitat

program works with Clean Water Services to restore the Butternut Creek watershed.

Special events are planned throughout the year to involve families in school celebrations including music programs, Fall Festival, Science Fair, Talent Show, Beginning Band Festival, Mardi Gras, Country Fair, DARE, Architecture in the Schools, Field Day, Spelling Contests, and Geography Bee.

Farmington View receives strong community support and has formed many business partnerships. Over the past five years, Farmington View has received grants from Intel and Synopsys to support science, math and technology in the classroom as well as a number of Hillsboro Schools Foundation grants to promote innovative education. Nike funds both a summer and after-school Literacy Academy for primary students. Jeld-Wen is a major contributor to Farmington View's Accelerated Math program. The Bobcat Boosters raise funds each year for an AmeriCorps member to tutor students in reading, writing, and math; help direct after-school programs; support parent outreach activities; and recruit volunteers.

#### SPECIAL PROGRAMS & HIGHLIGHTS

- Reading and literature scores increased by 35 percent over two years.
- Students receive mentoring, academic support and counseling through an advisory program that meets three times a week.
- All students at Liberty have opportunities for acceleration through the honors options in every core class. We also provide many of the traditional Advanced Placement courses for students interested in advanced level coursework with the potential of earning college credit.
- The number of students participating in Advanced Placement testing has increased by 65 percent in the past three years. We were recently honored with qualification for the 2007 Siemens Award for Advanced Placement for our students' exceptional achievement.
- The Liberty Culinary Team was awarded a silver medal at the 2007 national culinary competition.
