# Landscape Painting A History

## **DESCRIPTION:**


Since antiquity, painters have sought to portray the glories of nature, and many of their works have become the best-known masterpieces in the history of art. In this sweeping treasury of Western art, accomplished art historian Nils Büttner has chosen pictures that not only portray natural vistas—mountains, fields, forests, and water but also dramatic scenes with people, architecture, and manmade objects. His broad selection of paintings in this genre results in a marvelous collection of works.


The author describes and illustrates the paintings chronologically, beginning with the heritage from the ancient world and precursors of landscape artists in the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, as for example Leonardo da Vinci, Giovanni Bellini, and Raphael. In the sixteenth century with the new perception of the natural world, such masters as Albrecht Dürer and Bruegel are covered. Next artists of the flowering age of landscapes in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries are featured, including Claude Lorrain, Nicolas Poussin, Rubens, Rembrandt, van Ruisdael, and Canaletto. In the early nineteenth century, dominated by the spirit of Romanticism when artists displayed a new manner of treating nature, here are Constable, Turner, Whistler, Thomas Cole, Frederic Church, Bierstadt, Thomas Eakins, and Winslow Homer. These artists are followed by plein-air painters, Impressionists, and Postimpressionists, among them Corot, Manet, Monet, Sisley, Renoir, Cézanne, Seurat, van Gogh, Bonnard, and Henri Rousseau. In the twentieth century, some of the artists represented are Derain, Matisse, Picasso, Kandinsky, Klee, Magritte, Georgia O'Keeffe, Andrew Wyeth, Jasper Johns, and David Hockney. Many of these works are reproduced in full along with a detail and a descriptive caption.

In the authoritative text, the author explains that the artist often portrayed not merely what he saw or remembered but the attitude of the society and age in which he lived. In addition, the artist was influenced by the conventions of established schools of art who until the early nineteenth century disapproved of artists working exclusively in landscape. In fact, the French Academy had no "landscape" category for its coveted prizes until 1817, when an "historic" landscape depicting a narrative event was allowed.

Nils Büttner is a professor of art history at Dortmund University. He is the author of The Invention of the Landscape, the co-author of several books, the author of numerous catalog essays, and a curator of a number of museum exhibitions.
