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THE BOOSEY & HAWKES ARCHIVE

The company of Boosey & Hawkes has its roots in a number of firms, all producing high-quality instruments, whose records have survived to a greater or lesser extent and now constitute the Boosey & Hawkes Archive.

Thomas Boosey established a bookshop in London in 1792. In 1816, Thomas Boosey Jr. branched out into music publishing. Production of wind instruments began in 1851, and production of flutes began in 1856, the result of collaboration between Boosey & Sons and the flute player and inventor Robert Sydney Pratten. Boosey & Sons also co-operated with bandmaster Carl Boosé in the area of instrument sales.

Already dealers in band and orchestral wind and percussion instruments with a worldwide market, Boosey & Co purchased from Henry Distin in 1868 the sizeable firm of Distin & Co, whose production included a wide range of brasswinds. In 1874 new headquarters and saleroom premises in Regent Street were opened and sales of instruments were concentrated at the new address. In 1876 Boosey & Co opened a new factory at Frederick Mews, Stanhope Place, and Marble Arch to replace the former Distin & Co factory at Great Newport Street, Cranbourn Street, and Covent Garden.

In 1930 Boosey & Co merged with one of their main competitors, Hawkes & Son, to form Boosey & Hawkes. Hawkes & Son had in 1924-5 built the factory at Deansbrook Road, Edgware which was until 2001 the main plant of Boosey & Hawkes. Boosey & Hawkes moved the former Boosey production from Frederick Mews to Edgware in 1931-2.

Boosey & Hawkes bought the leading British firm of flute makers, Rudall Carte, during World War II. Before the War they had also produced brass instruments and reed woodwinds. The production of Rudall Carte woodwinds was continued as a separate operation until the 1980s.

Prior to 1895, the Besson family operated a substantial wind instrument making firm (F. Besson) with factories in Paris and London (their London factory at 100 Euston Road). In 1895 the London operation was sold to become the firm of Besson & Co. In 1933 Besson & Co took out a long lease on the former Boosey factory in Stanhope Place and closed the Euston Road factory. In 1948 production was moved to the Boosey & Hawkes plant in Edgware, and over the following six years the product range of the two companies was consolidated, although Besson & Co was not completely absorbed until 1 July 1968. The Paris Besson company was also acquired by Boosey & Hawkes in or by the 1970s.

Unlike the Boosey & Hawkes Museum Collection, established within Boosey & Co in or before 1905 by their works manager, the acoustician and inventor David James Blaikley, the archive is the incomplete remnant of the highly organised documentation systems of the firms mentioned above. Production and sale of instruments were documented through their various stages, and even in the era of mass production which followed World War II each instrument was given a serial number. The serial numbers enable present-day users of the archival material to follow the trail of individual instruments through various archival records and in many cases identify the original records for instruments which survive in public and private collections.

Various instruments described in the archival documents are unfamiliar today, and identification (by serial number) with surviving instruments allows a positive interpretation of the records. Examples of such identities are: Cavalry Trombone, Lied Horn, Orpheon, Case's Model Trombone, Cornet Columbia, Imperialphone, and Forcor. The precise nature of some other instruments mentioned in the archives is still a matter of speculation, no surviving examples being known. Example of these are: Tenor Euphonion, Baritone Koenighorn, and Georgephone.

The inclusion of a complete record of all Boosey brasswind produced from 1868 to 1985, and a nearly complete record of all Boosey woodwind produced from 1857 to 1986, makes this archive a unique resource, not only for the study of individual instruments but also for a statistical analysis which would reveal trends in the production, development and use of instruments. Similarly, the consistency over generations in record-keeping allows the entire working careers of individual craftsmen (in some cases families of craftsmen) to be traced.

1. DISTIN & CO ARCHIVAL DOCUMENTS (1868-1874)

When the factory and stock were purchased by Boosey & Co, the operations were not immediately integrated, but were conducted as separate businesses for nearly six years. The Distin & Co stock books record numerous items 'sold' to Boosey & Co, and the Boosey & Co stock books from 1868 to 1874 record a number of items 'sold' to Distin & Co. There were very few sales in the Distin & Co stock books recorded to overseas customers, so it is probable that Boosey & Co (then at 24 and 28 Holles Street) quickly took over handling the exports of Distin instruments.

1.1 WORK SHOP ORDER BOOKS

In general, it would appear that orders for single instruments were to meet special requirements of customers, orders in larger batches were to replenish stock. Occasionally an order for a single instrument appears to have been for an experimental model, the development of a new production model, or an exhibition example.

A workman was charged with making a batch of instruments. Batch sizes for popular models grew in size over the years. Typical batches were two or three for large instruments and six or eight for small ones. (Later Boosey and Boosey & Hawkes typical batch sizes were sometimes twelve, twenty-four, forty-eight, or even sixty or a hundred. Even larger numbers were recorded for bugles and duty trumpets ordered late 1914, in 1915 and other times of war.)

The function of these books appears to have been: Recording which instruments had been assigned to which workmen, allocating serial numbers, tracking individual instruments though the production process, accounting for instrument-making labour costs.

The money amounts recorded in the "Remarks & Cost" column appear to be the amounts paid to the workman in charge of making the batch. In many cases the name of an assistant (paid at an hourly rate approaching that of the workman in charge), an apprentice (paid at a much lower rate), or even a "boy" are included. These money amounts appear to be the payments for the main process of assembly only, since valve clusters were made by specialists and recorded separately, and standard components such as stays, water-keys and music card-holders were kept in stock. These money amounts appear to exclude materials, consumables and overheads.

The column "Date given out" appears to be when the workman was charged with making the batch, the actual date of making being in some cases immediate but in other cases weeks or months later. The "Date given out" for an instrument is usually identical with the "Date made up" of the corresponding pistons.

The column "Date received" appears to be when the workman in charge of the batch finished the instrument and it was ready to hand over to the next tradesman. Batches were sometimes "received" simultaneously, more usually over a period in smaller groups or singly. There are anomalies such as instruments being "received" on the same day they were "given out" or even before: these may be errors in data entry or may point to further complexities in the factory operations. Quite often pistons were "made up" before they were received, suggesting the being "made up" was an association on paper of a particular valve cluster with a particular instrument rather than a physical process, and that in these cases the specialist valve maker was working simultaneously with the corresponding instrument maker.

The entries in the column "Description" are mostly straightforward.

The column "Class" in the early books was used for the quality of the instrument and completed with "A", "B", "C", "E", "best" etc. Increasingly a model number was added as in "C17", "A10", "B36" etc. Later the column was headed "Model" and quality letters without model numbers were used only for one-off special orders.

The column "Given to / polish" indicates that this was a separate operation, carried out in a different part of the factory. The entries in the column for the name of the polisher (added from 19 Feb 1916, see Boosey & Hawkes brass instrument books) indicates that the polisher was a specialist.

The entries in the column for the name of the grinder (added from 19 Feb 1916, see Boosey & Hawkes brass instrument books) however indicate that this was not a specialised operation since the workmen who were grinders are recorded elsewhere as instrument makers. This process (honing valve cases and trombone outer slides and grinding pistons and trombone inner slides to close tolerances) required the highest level of skill.

The column "Entered / in / stock" usually corresponds with the entry in the Distin & Co stock book. The column "Charged to Regent St" used instead from 1 May 1874 also often corresponds with the entry in the Boosey & Co stock book (where that exists) but not always. The date entered seems to refer to an accounting operation rather than precisely dating a physical movement of the instrument. There are some anomalies in the dates recorded, and at present there is an element of speculation in interpreting these dates.

2 Workshop Order Book 3 (E82.2) A227/005

Apparently the orders from Distin & Co. at 9-10 Great Newport Street to their workshops, probably reflecting orders from Boosey & Co. at 24 Holles Street and at New York. Marked: Distin & Co Workshop Order Book 3. This book arranged in sections, respectively: Instruments: serial numbers 11702-12801 (cornets) and 24539-26960 (other brass), 1 May 1872 - 30 Apr 1874.

Pistons: piston numbers 14115-16575 (includes coded bore sizes for pistons from 1 May 1872 plus those still in stock at 30 Apr 1872), 1 May 1872 - 6 Mar 1874.

Water keys, card stands, card stand sockets, stays etc, screws, sundry machine turnings, crooks slides etc, sundries, plush lined cases, silver work are also listed.

For some instruments, numbers have been added later in red ink 3798-3895 and 14195-14344, the latter five-digit numbers corresponding to Boosey & Co Stock Account Book numbers. The columns on the "Instruments" pages are: Date / given out, Date / received, No of / Piston, No of / Inst, Description, Class, Workman's Name, Given to / polish, Entered / in / stock, Remarks & Cost, The columns on the "Pistons" pages are: Date / given out, No of / Inst, No of / Piston, Description [the bore code is entered at the far right of this column], Class, Workman's Name, Date / received, Date / made up, Remarks & Cost. 1 May 1872 – 30 Apr 1874

Workshop Order Book 4 (E82.3) A227/006

W.O.B. 4 represents a fresh start with the record keeping, coinciding with the opening of the premises at 295 Regent Street and the replacement of the Distin & Co. Inscription on the instruments by Boosey & Co. The former Distin & Co sequence of serial numbers was discontinued: W.O.B. 4 uses a serial number sequence continuing that of Boosey & Co. This book records the orders from Boosey & Co. trading as Distin & Co at 9-10 Great Newport Street to their workshops, probably reflecting the requirements of Boosey & Co. at 295 Regent Street, New York and possibly other branches. The dates instruments were "sent to polish" were included throughout, and the instruments section has a column "Charged to Regent St" from the start of the book, replacing the column "Entered / in / stock". This book arranged in sections, respectively:

Instruments: serial numbers 14345-17814, corresponding to Boosey & Co Stock Account Book numbers, 1 May 1874 - 30 May 1876. Pistons: piston numbers 16576-19462, 7 Mar 1874 - 29 May 1876.

1.2 STOCK BOOKS

These list the stock held by Distin & Co at 15 June 1868 and the 1st January for each of the years 1870-74 ordered by type of instrument, and the instruments added between stocktakings in serial number order. Against each entry is the date of sale and customer's name (or if unsold a note that it is entered in stock again the following January). Many instruments were "sold" to Boosey & Co, especially in 1874 when it appears that stock was run down at Great Newport Street and transferred to Regent Street. The first mention of Regent Street is on 17 March 1874 when a "Circular Eb" was sold to "Boosey & Co Regent St". Instruments given out before but not completed by 30 April 1874 all have two serial numbers: the Distin & Co numbers (up to 26960, 12801) and the Boosey & Co numbers added later in red ink (3798-3895 and 14195-14344). The five-digit numbers correspond to the entries in the Boosey & Co Stock Account Book. The four-digit numbers do not correspond to any surviving documents, and may possibly refer to Boosey & Co New York stock numbers. The five-digit numbers have been found stamped on instruments, but not the four-digit numbers.

This period is characterised by small batches with quick turn-over. Reed Instruments and Flutes were slow-moving: more remained in stock than were moved. There were many saxhorns, and some ventil horns.

There was no stock-taking at 1 Jan 1869, only 6½ months after the takeover, but thereafter stock-taking was annual.

Stock-taking at 1 Jan 1870 first lists cornets at 31 Dec 1869, e.g. 10118-10126, 10610-10615, plus two pages of Brass Instruments and Sundries. Many were "sold" to Boosey & Co or carried forwards to 1871

2. **BOOSEY & SONS**, BOOSEY & CO and BOOSEY & HAWKES ARCHIVAL DOCUMENTS (1857-1985)

This highly important collection of documents includes both work shop order books and stock books. The former are divided into *Brass Instrument Books*, *Pistons Books*, and books under various titles documenting the production of woodwind instruments. The production of percussion instruments (mainly drums) was small in comparison with wind instruments, and was recorded at some times in the *Brass Instrument Books* (sharing the brass instrument sequence of serial numbers), and at other times in the same books as woodwinds (with a drum serial number sequence starting at 10000 at the beginning of 1903). After 27 Oct 1934 (serial numbers 14428), later Boosey & Hawkes percussion was numbered in the brass instrument serial number sequence. These latter percussion instruments seem to have been only timpani, bass drums and side drums: B&H dance band drum kit (sold under the trade name "Ajax") is not mentioned in the surviving archival documents.

When Boosey and Hawkes merged, there was a similar lapse in time before the operations of the two firms were integrated. It was not until late 1931 that the first Boosey & Hawkes instruments with serial numbers continuing the former Boosey & Co sequence were ordered from the former Hawkes & Son factory at Edgware.

Orders for instruments were given out in batches to specified workmen, who made the instruments using raw materials and stock items such as stays and water keys. The valve clusters were generally drawn from stock, and the serial numbers for `pistons' are given alongside the serial numbers for instruments. The polishing, grinding (of pistons and trombone slides) and plating were carried out by different workmen (although the names of the grinders often appear elsewhere as makers). Typical batch sizes in the period 1868 to 1931 ranged from 2 (for contrabasses) through 4 (bombardons), 6 (trombones) to 12 (cornets). Rarer models and special orders were usually made in a batch of 1.

In the later books the hour worked on each batch and the sums of money paid to the workmen are recorded. Often more than one workman was paid for a batch, indicating that the work was shared. Sometimes there would be a payment to an apprentice or "boy"; this was at a pitifully low rate: in 1918 the most skilled workmen were paid 11 pence per hour, apprentices a mere 1½ pence per hour. Following the end of the first World War, wage rates nearly doubled.

The fact that every instrument made was individually recorded means that a count can be made of the production of each model. It is striking that some of the rarer instruments are well represented in collections. Many ballad horns, for example, survive - due to their domestic rather than band use. All four slide contrabass trombones made in this period survive, due to their being orchestral rather than band instruments and not subject to heavy use. On the other hand, some models of instruments made in large numbers have virtually disappeared.

Despite a large production, few Boosey circular basses survive. The F, G and Eb valve trombones have also nearly vanished. Only one Boosey & Co cavalry trombone appears to have survived.

The instrument and pistons order books show the extent to which Boosey & Co employed labour of overseas origin. Algernon Rose, describing his visit to the Boosey factory circa 1893 [Talks with Bandsmen, 1895] writes "I was glad to note that two-thirds of Messrs. Boosey's employés were Englishmen". The names of the most skilled hands suggest that perhaps a higher proportion of craftsmen were of European extraction, and may have learnt their trade abroad. In the period to 1899, the more prominent makers of pistons were: Derkinderen, Holmes, Kurzendorfer, J. Rockaerts, N. Rockaerts, and V. Rockaerts. In the same period, the more prominent makers of instruments were Bailey, Bauer, Bloomfield, Cave, Cook, French, Henry, Hoyer, Jacob, Korb, Kurzendorfer, Last, Mackay, Mooney, Seidel, Sendlick, Squire, Ungelenk, and Villefranc. They all built in the house style rather than with individual characteristics. Each maker was apparently required to make the whole range of instruments; however some makers were favoured for special orders. For example, whenever a rarer model or one-off trombone was ordered, it was entrusted to Jacob.

2.1 FLUTE, REED INSTRUMENT AND DRUM BOOKS

Drums and percussions were included in the brass instruments books until the December 1902, and from November 1934 onwards, although there was little production recorded of drums and percussion in the 1930s.

Apart from the first book, whose original purpose is unclear, the function of these books appears to have been analogous to that of the Brass *Instrument Books*, that is:

Recording which instruments had been assigned to which workmen. Allocating serial numbers.

Tracking individual instruments thought the production process. Accounting for instrument-making labour costs.

They are apparently the orders from Boosey & Co at Stanhope Place to their workshops, probably reflecting orders from Boosey & Co at 295 Regent Street; from late 1930, orders from Boosey & Hawkes, later at Deansbrook Road, Edgware. Unlike the brass winds, a significant proportion of woodwinds were apparently bought in and stamped with Boosey serial numbers until this practice stopped in 1917.

The columns on the pages of the *Instruments: Wood* books are: Date Charged, Date received, Serial Number, Description, Class, Workman's Name, Date charged to Regent Street, Cost and Remarks, Amount.

Beginning with Book 5, and additional column "Keys to Polish" is inserted between the "Workman's name" and the "Date charged to Regent Street" columns for all woodwinds. This may also have been the case in Book 4 (missing). For alto and bass clarinets, two additional; columns exist, one headed "Rough" and the other "Tuned", located after the "Workman's name" column.

2.2 BRASS INSTRUMENT BOOKS

When the works were moved from Great Newport Street to Stanhope Place in 1876, the recording of orders was again re-organised, although the serial number sequences were continued. Separate books were kept for brass instruments and for pistons, recording the orders from Boosey & Co at Stanhope Place to their workshops, probably reflecting the requirements of Boosey & Co at their various addresses. The *Instrument Books* form a sequence starting with Book 1 from 1 June 1876 up to recent times, and the serial number sequence is still current at the time of writing [2002].

These continue the Instruments sections in the Distin & Co Work Shop Order Books and are apparently the orders from Boosey & Co at Stanhope Place to

their workshops, probably reflecting orders from Boosey & Co at 295 Regent Street; from late 1930, orders from Boosey & Hawkes, later at Deansbrook Road, Edgware.

Drums and percussions were included in these books until the December 1902, and from November 1934 onwards, although there was little production recorded of drums and percussion in the 1930s.

The entries in the *Instrument Books* became much less detailed from the 1940s onwards, as most instruments were from then on manufactured using mass production techniques. The "Date sent to polish" was entered only until c1940.

Dates recorded after serial numbers are dates given out.

Books 1-25 have entries in sequence of date given out.

Books 26 onwards have entries in sequence of job number.

From Book 32, new columns: Job Card Number, Date Issued, Qty, Serial No, Model No, Date Delivered, Finish, Stamped, Customer, J/C No, Fin J/C.

"I.P." (International Pitch) begins to replace "F.P" (French Pitch) from 7 Feb 1905 although "F.P" occasionally used up to 1912 and later.

"Sun" noted from 20 Feb 1903 onwards, presumably indicating instruments to be marked with the rising sun trademark. They seem all to have been A5, A6 or A7 Model cornets, including many Columbia model cornets, and were probably all made for export to the U.S., the trademark being a subtle hint at the Boosey address in New York at East Street.

Tradename "Acme" mentioned from 1908 onwards.

2.3 PISTONS AND SUNDRIES BOOKS

These continue the Pistons sections in the Distin & Co Work Shop Order Books and are effectively the orders from Boosey & Co at Regent Street to Boosey & Co at Stanhope Place.

The later piston-valved instruments of Distin & Co, all the piston-valved instruments of Boosey & Co, and earlier Boosey & Hawkes piston-valved instruments have pistons numbers stamped on the valve casings. These numbers form one sequence from prior to 1868 until the practice was discontinued. The last "Pistons Book" was never completed, recording and separate numbering of pistons being discontinued some after 19 Oct 1952, contributory factor will have been the closure of the Besson factory in 1948 and the movement of Besson production to Edgware. However, at least one higher

piston number has been observed on an instrument, so recording in the "Pistons Book" probably ceased before stamping on the valve casings.

Rotary valves (termed 'cylinders' in the records) were also employed on a small number of instruments, but these are not given serial numbers or entered in the Pistons Books.

The valves were made by specialist workmen. Most were made in quite large batches (6, 12, 24, even 48) and kept in stock until required. Instruments were made either in batches (e.g. for stock) or in response to special orders. It was thus common for an instrument to have been made with pistons that had been in stock for several years. Quite frequently, however, pistons were made immediately before the instruments. And occasionally, presumably for a rush order, work would start on the instrument before the pistons were finished.

The serial numbers for the instruments eventually incorporating the valve clusters were added alongside the serial numbers for pistons, and the date the pistons were "made up" into instruments is recorded, this in many cases being identical with the date the instrument was "given out". Occasionally mix-ups occurred: sometimes a surviving instrument is found to have been made with a different valve cluster from that intended when made up. The codes for bore sizes continued in use throughout the period these books were kept. Costs were systematically added from 1921, but recorded intermittently for earlier pistons.

2.7 STOCK BOOKS

There are two Boosey & Co Band Instrument "Stock Account Book Ct/Brass/ Wood and Reed" covering January 1868 - December 1873 and January 1875 - December 1875 respectively. As with the Distin stock books these list the stock held by Boosey & Co at the 1st January for each of the years 1868-75 ordered by type of instrument, and the instruments added between stocktakings in order of serial number. Some items were "sold" to Distin & Co and appear correspondingly in the Distin & Co Stock Books. There are entries for the larger number of instruments "bought" from Distin & Co, but not all the items recorded in the Distin & Co Stock Books as sold by Distin & Co to Boosey & Co appear in these Stock Account Books: the other sales were probably to branches of Boosey & Co in New York, Aldershot and elsewhere. For the stock-taking at 1 January 1875, brass instruments occupy 26 pages (reflecting the probable fact that Distin & Co stock and Boosey & Co stock had been combined at Regent Street from September 1874).

Sales represent brass band, military and orchestral instruments, with some models used in more than one performing medium. Sales are worldwide, so are not necessarily typical of British musical practice. The clerks who wrote the stock book rarely gave full details, and it is likely that many of the customers apparently private individuals were in fact dealers or agents. Many of the dealers or agents were overseas firms such as Wm A. Pond & Co in New York, Kelly & Walsh in Shanghai, and S. Marshall & Sons in S. Australia. Research is necessary to identify the locations of other dealers whose purchases are recorded in the stock books. Nevertheless, from looking at individual sales, it is clear that many of the more exotic instruments were destined either for North America or for India.

2.8 SOLD JOURNALS

These are day books of sales from one of Boosey & Co's locations, possibly Regent Street (there was a repair shop in the basement at Regent Street until c1990). The number of instruments sold does not seem to account for the total production of the factory.

The entries for each day list items sold or work done together with the price charged, but only very occasionally the name of the customer. The few cited customers were both home and overseas.

After the entries for each calendar month, totals of sums received are given broken down into categories. Up to 28 Feb 1901 the entries occupy both verso and recto, but from 1 Mar 1901 the entries are only on the verso, the recto carrying a day-by-day analysis with page-by-page totals at the foot.

The items listed include:

Instruments (brass, woodwind and percussion), usually only the model number and the serial number cited.

Accessories such as crooks, mutes, cases, stands and lamps; spare and replacement parts; pads for woodwinds in bulk; plating of instruments to order. Repairs, including repairs to instruments by other makers. Customised inscriptions (stamped and engraved) and emblazoning of drums (the band's name usually mentioned). Second hand instruments; cleaning instruments for [exhibition at] contests.

There is a sizeable collection of technical drawings, occupying several plan chests. These dates from the period 1872 to 1999, mostly from the 1950s to the 1980s, after which the firm used computer drafting techniques.

The drawings include:

Building and furnishing plans for the factory at Edgware.

Technical drawings of general instrument making equipment, machine tools etc. Designs for tools for specific instruments and components: mandrels, jigs and dies.

Instrument designs for brass, woodwind and percussion.

Correspondence to and from D.J. Blaikley with tables of pitch standards.

Other correspondence and designs, eg Manuel Gomez.

The information relating to the history of instrument construction contained in these is a singularly valuable resource. Many of the older drawings are the work of D.J. Blaikley himself, and the hand of Arthur Blaikley is recorded on drawings as late as 1950. The drawings include substantial remnants of a systematic drawing filing system dating from the late 19th century, organised into folders by instrument type. These folders contain the original drawings for many instruments which, when surviving, are now important museum specimens, such as the model of Lied horn with re-modelled bell profile of 1885. The drawings give critical details of the design of instruments such and bore profiles, tonehole placements and keywork mechanisms.

Some of the drawings are the work of the German maker Hüttl, who worked at the Boosey & Hawkes factory in the early 1950s.

4. RUDALL CARTE ARCHIVAL DOCUMENTS (1863-1985)

Documents includes both *Work Books* and *Stock Books*. These series in fact both recorded stock, though the earlier series also included workman's name. The earlier series included records for both brasswind and woodwind. Post-World War II brasswind with Rudall Carte inscription (such as the "tarline" range) was recorded in the B&H *Brass Instrument Books* and numbered in the B&H serial number sequence.

4.1 WORK BOOKS

These are stock books recording the delivery of woodwind and brasswind instruments into stock by named workmen with dates, a brief description of each instrument, and the date of the sale to named customers.

Dates for each volume vary from instrument type to instrument type. Different instrument types had different serial number sequences, dispersed throughout the volumes. As a rough guide, the records begin in 1869 and end during the early 1940s.

The depression badly hit Rudall Carte (along with other instrument makers). Brasswind making ceased in 1939. The books show that the instruments were virtually unsaleable in the 1930s: some new instruments were "sold as secondhand" after being in stock for years.

5. BESSON & CO ARCHIVAL DOCUMENTS (1868-1968)

5.1 STOCK BOOKS

The books have not survived in which Besson & Co recorded the instruments ordered and the allocation of serial numbers (a series analogous to the Distin & Co "Work Shop Order Books" can be assumed). What remains in the B & H archive is incomplete but nonetheless informative. These record the instruments as completed: a brief description, the date added to stock, plating, engraving, case, date of sale and the name of the purchaser.

Two sequences of serial numbers were used, one for valved instruments and one for slide trombones. In the case of the valved instruments, the serial numbers of surviving instruments (stamped on the piston casing) accord with the stock book entries. Fewer Besson slide trombones survive form the period 1875-1895: not all bear serial numbers, but those which do correspond to the stock book entries. The manufacturing details are written in French (even the later entries), also sales details for British and export customers. It would appear that common serial number sequences may have been used for Besson production in Paris and London up to the point where the London factory passed into British ownership and separated from the French Besson firm (1895).

The stock books give details of the date, model (e.g. Desideratum), plating, engraving, case, and the name of the purchaser.

By piecing together the data in these books it will be possible to reconstruct the two serial number sequences for valved and slide instruments to a good approximation. Since before 31 Mar 1871 the stock book entries were made in order of delivery from the workshop, they are not in serial number order. The time taken to complete some batches could be weeks or months longer than other batches close in serial number.

It was from this time that distinct B&H and Besson models were replaced by common models. For example, a "Besson" *Westminster* model trombone of the 1960s differed only in engraving from the B & H *Regent* model.

5.3 MINUTE BOOKS

The Chairman of the Board from 1895 to 1912 was Stratten Boulnois. A prominent Board member was Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who chaired at least one Board meeting c1917.

The Directors' *Minute Books* contain interesting industrial history. An example of this is the successful measures to resist trade union demands in 1913 for higher wages, and for the same wages to be paid to all employees regardless of levels of skill and experience. The minutes, and an enclosed letter to the Salvation Army, describe how Besson & Co formed an alliance with their main competitors in London, Hawkes & Son and Boosey & Co, to agree a common response (a lock-out of union members) in the event of industrial action. (The Boosey & Co *Instrument Books* show that wage levels remained low until 1918.)

Another interesting episode is Besson's trouble with their United States agents, Carl Fischer, who (according to the *Minute Books*) over-priced Besson instruments to the point at which the larger instruments were unsaleable in the U.S., did not have the capacity to handle coast-to-coast distribution, and were guilty of using Besson tradenames such as "Prototype" for instruments by other makers.
