There were five teenagers in the car, all pupils of Buckie High School, when it left the road at a corner near the farm of the Holl 1/4 mile east of the Tynet Crossroads.

The driver was 17 year old John Taylor, 16 West Church Street. David Taylor, 16, his brother, like the driver escaped injury but their sister, Anne, 15, and Trevor Wilson, Queen Street, sustained minor injuries.

April 18 **Boat launches - A** 70' twin screw motor stern trawler was launched from the shipyard of Messrs Jones on Saturday. Built at a cost of £60,000 for North Shields owners the new vessel, christened **Conduan** has a number of innovations.

She has been built to a revolutionary and ultra modern design by G. L. Watson and Coy. Naval architects and incorporates many new features in her construction with a great deal of attention being paid to the provision of improved working conditions on deck for the crew.

The keel was laid a year ago after the vessel was successfully tested in a tank at John Brown's Shipyard on the Clyde.

The Conduan has all the latest navigational equipment, R/T communications and fishing aids.

She is the first fishing boat to be built with two engines, both of these being 156 Gardner diesel type with variable pitch propellers while a third engine, also a Gardner, has been installed for driving the combined seine and trawl winch. The electrical power is in the region of 10kw.

The Conduan has been built for Allan Morse and his brother Norman who already run a fleet of three fishing boats, one of which, the Conmoran was built by Jones 10 years ago.

The Conduan was launched complete and once in the water sailed off under her own steam. She will be used for both seine and trawl.
