Eastern Oregon University (EOU) is committed to fostering student success through high academic expectations and recognition of each student's unique culture, social, and intellectual background. The primary goals of the Native American Program are to recruit, retain, and graduate Native American students at EOU. The Native American Program, formerly known as the Indian Education Institute, was developed in 1969 by Eastern Oregon State College faculty and administrative leaders. EOU's Native American Program is one of the earliest and ongoing student support services programs in the Oregon University System (OUS). Program staff serve as liaisons between University and student funding agencies, as well as assist students in a variety of areas as they pursue their goals. Services include academic advising, peer counseling, financial aid/scholarship information, networking-to-career programs, internships, and job information.

Speel-Ya (Coyote Legend) was organized in the early 1970's and is one of Eastern's oldest active clubs. Speel-Ya is a social and cultural support group for new and returning students. They meet twice a month during Fall and Winter

terms and once a week during Spring term. Smoke-signals is the club listserv. It provides a forum for discussion on issues that concern club members. Speel-Ya is involved in a number of events and activities that promote and enhance the cultural awareness of Eastern's general student body as well as the community of La Grande. They raise money for club trips, social gatherings and pizza parties. Each year Speel-Ya hosts the annual [Spring Celebration and Pow Wow](#), usually in May. The Pow Wow draws support and participation from Native American communities throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Speel-Ya leadership consists of a president, vice-president, secretary/treasurer and publicist.

INDIAN EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Title VII Projects

Title VII Indian Education programs are funded through the Indian Education Act which was instituted in 1972 in recognition of the special educational and culturally related academic needs of Indian and Alaskan Native students. The Office of Education, U.S. Department of Education, administers programs funded by the Act. Grants are made through the department's Office of Indian Education to local educational agencies, tribal and Indian controlled schools, and state educational agencies, institutions of higher education and Indian tribes, organizations and institutions. Grants are awarded on an entitlement or competitive basis. These grant-funded projects are designed to improve educational opportunities for Indians and Alaskan Natives and to support the goal of self-determination for

Indian communities. An elected parent committee in each school district helps identify those needs and ways to meet them. Part A grants support tribal or Indian-controlled schools or local educational agency projects for elementary and secondary students. Projects funded under Part B include early childhood classes, curriculum development, remedial and enrichment instruction and cultural presentations. Part C awards grants for adult education projects offering components such as life coping skills, ABE/GED preparation and career education.

Johnson O'Malley Programs

JOM programs are funded through the Bureau of Indian Affairs for supplemental education services. Indian children from age 3 through grade 12, who are at least one-quarter Indian from a federally recognized Tribe, are eligible for JOM services. JOM programs provide financial assistance for education-related services, leadership development and cultural activities.

Title VII and JOM programs differ in the eligibility requirements. JOM programs serve students from federally recognized tribes for the purpose of supplemental educational activities. Title VII programs serve students primarily in urban areas. Blood degree or federal status of the Tribe is not considered in determining eligibility.
