2007 PIONEER LAS VEGAS BOWL GAME NOTES

THE TEAMS

BYU (10-2/8-0/1st), champions of the Mountain West Conference, and UCLA (6-6/5-4/T-4th) of the Pacific-10 Conference meet in the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl. This year the game featured the first choice from the MWC and the fifth selection from the Pac-10.





THE MATCHUP

The 16th edition of the game features a meeting of two programs that are making their third trip to the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl. The two-time defending conference champion Cougars are participating for the third straight year, marking the most all-time appearances by any MWC program and most consecutive trips by any school. BYU defeated Oregon 38-8 last year after losing its first trip to the game, 35-28, to California in 2005. UCLA becomes the first Pac-10 team to play in three Pioneer Las Vegas Bowls. The Bruins defeated New Mexico 27-13 in their first trip in 2002 and then were downed by Wyoming 24-21 in 2004. The two Western powers have met once before in the postseason as the Bruins won 31-10 over the Cougars in the 1986 Freedom Bowl staged in Anaheim, Calif.

REMATCH REDUX

This will be the second meeting between BYU and UCLA this year as the Bruins defeated the Cougars 27-17 during the regular season on Sept. 8 in Los Angeles. It will also mark the third rematch in Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl history. Hometown UNLV avenged an earlier road loss by crushing Central Michigan 52-24 in 1994 and Toledo ended up sweeping the University of Nevada by winning 40-37 in 1995 during what was the first overtime game ever played on the Division I-A level.

RANKINGS

Both teams were ranked in the nation's top 25 this fall. UCLA began the season ranked 14th by the Associated Press and rose to as high as 11th in both the AP and Coaches' polls on Sept. 9 before falling out. BYU broke into the rankings on November 18 and is currently 19th in both the AP and Coaches' polls. BYU is the third ranked team to ever appear in a Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl (the Cougars were 19/20 last year and Air Force was 21/23 when it faced Oregon in 1997's game).

TELEVISION

The Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, an ESPN Regional Television (ERT) owned-and-operated



event, will be televised live on ESPN and ESPNHD, beginning at 5:00 p.m. (PT) on Saturday, Dec. 22. Brad Nessler will handle the play-by-play duties alongside analysts Bob Greise and Paul Maguire while Bonnie Bernstein will report from the sidelines.

RADIO

The game will also be broadcast on the Sports USA Radio Network and along Armed Forces Radio Network. Tom Dillon will handle play-by-play while former UNLV and NFL coach John Robinson will serve as analyst.

TITLE SPONSOR: PIONEER

Pioneer Electronics (USA) Inc., a world leader in digital entertainment products, became the game's title sponsor beginning in 2004. Pioneer is the leading manufacturer of plasma televisions and monitors, DVD players and DVD recorders, A/V receivers, CD players and CD recorders, speakers and other audio and video accessories. From 2004-2006 the game was known as the Pioneer PureVi-

sion Las Vegas Bowl but the name was slightly altered this past summer.



CONFERENCE TIE-INS

The Las Vegas Bowl announced in 2005 that it had extended its contract with the Pac-10 Conference for an additional four years through the 2009 season, getting the fourth selection in 2006 and 2008 while getting the fifth selection in 2007 and 2009. In addition, the bowl extended its contract with the MWC for the first selection/ champion through the 2009 season.

ATTENDANCE NOTE

This will mark the third consecutive sellout for the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl. Tickets not designated for the participating teams sold out on October 17 – nearly two months before either school had been invited. Last year's game boasted the largest crowd to ever see a team sporting event in the state of Nevada – 44,615.

GAME SITE

Sam Boyd Stadium will once again serve as the host venue for the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl. Last year's edition attracted a sold-out state-record attendance of 44,615, which included an additional 4,100 temporary bleachers in the end zones. This year, organizers announced the addition of a new seating area in the venue's North End Zone that will offer unprecedented views of the game. Taking the place of the temporary bleachers will be the new La-Z-Boy Comfort Zone Club at the Field. The raised and heated area will include complimentary food and beverage and fans can watch the action on the field a few feet away or on the surrounding Pioneer HDTV plasma televisions.

TICKETS

Although sold out in mid-October, public tickets to this year's game were priced at \$20, \$30, \$50 and \$100. Also, each team received 12,000 tickets for their fans.

PAYOUT

Each conference receives \$1 million.

UCLA IN BOWL GAMES

Earning its 29th bowl trip overall, UCLA is 13-14-1 all-time in bowl games and was the first team in history to win a bowl game in seven straight seasons from 1982-88. Despite falling to Florida State in last year's Emerald Bowl, UCLA has the most bowl victories – 11 – of any Pac-10 team in the last quarter century. That same win total also ranks ninth in the nation over the same span.

ALL-TIME SERIES

This will be the ninth meeting between the two Western powers with UCLA having earned a commanding 7-1 advantage. BYU won the first game in 1983 and the Bruins have won seven straight, including 2007's clash at the Rose Bowl. The teams will actually face each other three times in just over 12 months because UCLA is scheduled to travel to Provo on Sept. 13, 2008.

TROPHIES AWARDED

The Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl Championship Trophy will be awarded to the winning team's head coach at midfield in a ceremony following the game. Voted on by members of the media, The Rossi T. Ralenkotter Most Valuable Player Trophy will be awarded to the selected player at the post-game press conference, which will take place in the interview room located behind the visiting team's (UCLA) locker room.

LAS VEGAS BOWL FIRSTS

The Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl was home to two major college football firsts. In 1995, Toledo and Nevada played in what was the first-ever overtime game on the Division I-A level. The existing overtime rules were put into affect only for bowl games that season and the Rockets and Wolf Pack were the only teams that needed the extra time in the postseason. OT became standard for all college football games the very next season. In 2002, Katie Hnida of New Mexico became the first woman to play in a Division I-A level game when she entered in the first quarter to attempt an extra point. The attempt, which was low, was blocked by UCLA during the Bruins' 27-13 victory.

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PIONEER LAS VEGAS BOWL TIMELINE

- Oct. 17, 2007 -- The newly named Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl sees its allotment of public tickets gone nearly a month earlier than the previous record set in 2006 to mark a third-straight sell-out.
- **Dec. 21, 2006 --** No. 19 BYU, the first MWC champion to play in the game, rolls past Oregon 38-8 before the largest crowd to ever witness a team sporting event in the state of Nevada 44,615 thanks to 4,100 temporary bleacher endzone seats.
- Dec. 22, 2005 -- Cal defeats BYU 35-28 before a sold-out, then-bowl-record crowd of 40,053, which was the fourth-largest attendance figure in Sam Boyd Stadium history for a sporting event.
- Aug. 2005 -- Bowl extends its affiliation with both the Pac-10 (fourth- or fifth-place team) and Mountain West conferences (first choice of teams) to meet through the 2009 season.
- Dec. 23, 2004 -- Wyoming upsets UCLA 24-21 before a then-record in-house crowd of 27,784.
- Aug. 11, 2004 -- The bowl announces new sponsor Pioneer PureVision in time for the 2004 game.
- Christmas Eve 2003 -- Game features a record-breaking performance by Oregon State running back Steven Jackson. In the Beavers' 55-14 victory over New Mexico, the Las Vegas native scores five touchdowns to tie the all-time single-game bowl record held by two other players.
- Christmas Day 2002 -- New Mexico place-kicker Katie Hnida attempts an extra point, which was blocked, and becomes the first woman to ever play in a Division I-A football game.
- **Feb. 2002** The Sega Sports Las Vegas Bowl enters into a two-year agreement with the Pac-10 and extends its agreement with the Mountain West for an additional three years.
- Christmas 2001 -- Played for the first time on Dec. 25, Utah shocks USC 10-6, which garners a TV rating of 4.7 and a 14 share on ABC. Paid attendance is a then-bowl-record 30,894.
- May 2001 -- ESPN Regional Television (ERT), a subsidiary of ESPN Inc., assumes the ownership and management of the Las Vegas Bowl.
- **Dec. 21, 2000 --** Making its first appearance in the Las Vegas Bowl since 1994, UNLV records a 31-14 victory over Arkansas, the first Southeastern Conference team to play in the game.
- **Dec. 18, 1999** EA Sports Las Vegas Bowl features the first bowl meeting between the WAC and the MWC. Two conference co-champions battle with Utah holding off Fresno State 17-16 behind Ute RB Mike Anderson's 254 yards on 34 carries -- the sixth-best rushing total in bowl history.
- Dec. 20, 1997 -- Las Vegas Bowl VI presented by Reno Air unveils a new format that matches a representative from the WAC against an at-large opponent. The game features an offensive explosion from Oregon, which puts up 583 yards of total offense vs. 21st-ranked Air Force.
- Dec. 14, 1995 -- Toledo defeats Nevada in Las Vegas Bowl IV to cap an undefeated season. The Rockets post the first-ever overtime victory in Division I-A history by a score of 40-37.
- 1992-96 -- The first five years of the Las Vegas Bowl feature champions of the Mid-American and the Big West conferences. Aside from UNLV's 52-24 lopsided victory over Central Michigan in 1994, the average margin of victory is four points.
- **Dec. 18, 1992 --** The Los Angeles Times calls the inaugural Las Vegas Bowl "the most exciting bowl game of the year" as Bowling Green holds on to record a dramatic 35-34 victory over Nevada.




LAS VEGAS BOWL MEDIA PARKING MAP








SAM BOYD STADIUM LAYOUT

UCLA INTERIM HEAD COACH DEWAYNE WALKER



DeWAYNE WALKERINTERIM HEAD COACH/
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

DeWayne Walker will serve as interim head coach for the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl. Walker, who, prior to coming to UCLA, had excelled at

coaching defense for three different organizations in the National Football League, is in his second season as UCLA's defensive coordinator and cornerbacks coach.

This season, UCLA again ranked among the national leaders in several defensive categories. The Bruins are 25th in rushing defense (115.42 yards per game), 26th in pass efficiency defense (113.85), 33rd in scoring defense (22.75 points) and 34th in total defense (349.75 yards). UCLA is also tied for third nationally in third down conversion defense (28.6%).

Last season, the Bruins ranked among the national leaders in rushing defense (tied for ninth in the NCAA and tied for first in the Pac-10 with 91.08 yards per game) and total defense (33rd nationally at 304.83) and allowed almost half as many touchowns (27) as the previous year (48). UCLA allowed 91.1 yards per game, 2.83 yards per rush and just nine touchdowns on the ground. The 91.1 rushing yards per game allowed was UCLA's lowest total since 1985. The Bruin defense also ranked fifth nationally in third-down conversion defense (28.4%,).

Walker joined the Bruins from the Washington Redskins, where he had coached the secondary, specifically the cornerbacks, the previous two seasons (2004-05) under head



coach Joe Gibbs and highly-respected defensive coordinator Gregg Williams. In 2005, the Redskins won 10 of 16 regular-season games, including their final five straight, to earn a wildcard berth in the playoffs. Washington defeated Tampa Bay on the road before dropping a 20-10 decision to the NFC champion Seattle Seahawks on the road.

The Redskins ranked No. 1 among the NFL's 32 teams in lowest opponent passing percentage (54.4%). In addition, they also ranked second (tied) in fewest

touchdown passes allowed (15), 10th in pass defense (192.6 yards) and 14th (tied) in interceptions (16). Walker played a key role in the development of rookie cornerback Carlos Rogers and the continued fine play of Shawn Springs. In 2004, his first year in Washington, he coached Springs to a solid year. Springs became the first cornerback in NFL history to lead his team in sacks (five) and interceptions (six) in the same season and finished the year with 69 tackles. He also tutored veteran Walt Harris and Fred Smoot in that first year.

Walker spent the previous two seasons (2002-03) as secondary coach of the New York Giants under coordinator Johnnie Lynn, a former Bruin. Prior to joining the Giants, Walker spent the 2001 season as associate head coach/secondary coach at USC under Pete Carroll and was the first staff member hired by Carroll. That season, the Trojans ranked seventh nationally with 19 interceptions and also ranked 16th nationally in pass defense (179.2 yards) and 16th (tied) in fewest touchdown passes allowed (11).

He also served as secondary coach of the New England Patriots for three seasons, the first two (1998 and 1999) under Carroll and the third (2000) under Bill Belichick. During his tenure with the Patriots, defensive backs Ty Law and Lawyer Milloy each earned trips to the Pro Bowl. Walker began his coaching career at Mt. San Antonio College (1988-92), serving as secondary coach for four seasons before becoming defensive coordinator in 1992. He then gained valuable experience by coaching at Utah State (1993), BYU (1994), Oklahoma State (1995) and California (1996-1997) before moving to the Patriots. At California, he tutored future NFL defensive backs Kato Serwanga and Marquis Smith.

He also participated in the NFL's minority coaching internship program, working with the San Francisco 49ers in 1996 and the Patriots in 1997. A former cornerback himself, Walker played three seasons professionally – one in the CFL (Edmonton Eskimos in 1982) and two in the USFL (Oakland Invaders in 1984 and Arizona Outlaws in 1985). In college, he was a two-year starter at Minnesota (1980-81) after playing at Pasadena City College for two years Walker earned his bachelor's degree from Regents College.

BYU HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



BRONCO MENDENHALL HEAD COACH

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was named the 14th head football coach at BYU on December 13, 2004.

Since that time, Mendenhall (41) has held fast to the vision of restoring BYU to national prominence by requiring a higher level of commitment on and off the field through accountability, effort and discipline. Equally significant

in the restoration process, Mendenhall has emphasized the importance of honoring the coaches and players who have established a proud football tradition at BYU-a program of national prominence. Finally, by implementing a mission statement that outlines core values, Mendenhall has turned the tide at BYU by embracing tradition, spirit and honor.

Concluding his third season as the head coach at BYU, Mendenhall has taken a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and has turned it back into the Mountain West Conference's premier football program, and is steadily rebuilding the national prominence the Cougars once enjoyed. After posting a 6-6 record in 2005, Mendenhall's Cougars have won 21 of their last 25 games over the past two seasons.

In his first season, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl – the team's first post-season bowl appearance in three seasons. Since then, he has coached the Cougars to back-to-back, 10-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents. Under his direction, the Cougars have not lost a league game – at home or on the road – in two years and has finished the regular-season ranked among the nation's top-20 programs in the Bowl Championship Series standings.

With an invitation to attend the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU football history to take a team to a bowl game in three straight seasons during his first three years as a head coach. On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach in 2005, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted a 10-2 regular-season record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC. In dominating fashion, and with a swagger similar to that of the glory years of BYU football, the Cougars handed Oregon a 38-8 defeat in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Throughout the 2006 season, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The 2007 season started out in similar fashion, winning just one of the team's first three games; however, under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars rebounded to win the final nine games of the season, and like the previous year, garnered the attention of local, regional and national voters. BYU finished the regular season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings – three places higher than the 2006 Cougars.

Like the 2006 season, BYU ranked among the nation's leaders in several statistical categories. The Cougars led the MWC and ranked 13th in passing offense, averaging 304 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked 15th in total offense, averaging 457.6 yards per game.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked 10th nationally in total defense, allowing just 307.2 yards per game. During the season, the Cougars did not allow a single 100-yard rusher and held teams to an average 92.1 yards rushing per game to ranked 9th in the nation. One of Mendenhall's jobs as the head coach and defensive coordinator is to manage points. Defensively, BYU ranked 13th in the nation, allowing just 18.8 points per game.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall has stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo during the 2005 season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006 and another perfect, 6-0 mark in 2007. In 2006, the Cougars finished the season as the most dominate home team in the country, and the most dominate home team in BYU football history, winning games by an average 35.16 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars outscored opponents at Edwards Stadium by

an average 17.3 points per game. BYU allowed just 11.3 points per game, marking the best scoring defense effort since the 1988 season when BYU held opponents to just 10.2 points per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free

safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple has three sons.

SAM BOYD STADIUM

Now standing as one of the top college football facilities in all the West is UNLV's Sam Boyd Stadium, which celebrated its 36th birthday in 2007.

Undergoing a complete facelift and renovation during 1999, the "New" Sam Boyd Stadium expanded to its present capacity of 36,800 (with the ability to seat more than 40,000 when called for).

Located approximately seven miles from both the UNLV campus and McCarran International Airport, Sam Boyd Stadium successfully combines the excitement of a college

football stadium and the versatility of an entertainment arena.

SBS marked its 25th anniversary in 1996 by hosting the state's then-largest-ever crowd to watch a sporting event on Sept. 14 when 41,091 fans saw UNLV take on Wisconsin. That total was surpassed just three months later when 41,238 saw BYU get past Wyoming in the first WAC Championship game. That record was re-written once more when 42,075 fans saw the Badgers re-

turn to face the Rebels on Aug. 31, 2002. The 2006 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl upped the record to 44,615 in a game between BYU and Oregon.

The stadium has hosted some of the greatest talents in sports and show business. Future NFL quarterbacks Randall Cunningham, Jim McMahon, Drew Bledsoe, Andre Ware, Alex Smith and John Beck are among those who have played at Sam Boyd Stadium along with events involving athletes such as soccer legend Pele and motor sports stars. Additionally, the stadium has hosted world-class concerts by such musical acts as the Dave Matthews Band, the Eagles, U2, Paul McCartney, Wayne Newton, and the once-annual summer appearances by the Grateful Dead.

A mecca for football played on all levels, the stadium is currently site of the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl each December, including two consecutive sold-out crowds, after serving as home to three Western Athletic Conference championship games from 1996-98. The facility has twice served as host to professional football as the Las Vegas Outlaws of the XFL made it their home in 2001 as did the Las Vegas Posse, a Canadian Football League franchise that played one season in 1994. SBS also hosts high school games and has been site of the state's prep championship game.

The venue also recently hosted two other college football events: the Silver Dollar Classic, which features two teams from historically black universities, and the Las Vegas All-American Classic postseason all-star game from 2003-05.

Originally named Las Vegas Stadium when it was built in 1971 at a cost of \$3.5 million, the facility was re-named the Las Vegas Silver Bowl in 1978 and then known as the Sam Boyd Silver Bowl in honor of local gaming pioneer Sam Boyd beginning in 1984. Its name was officially shortened to Sam Boyd Stadium in April 1994.

The first event held in the then-15,000-seat stadium was a UNLV football game against Weber State on Oct. 23, 1971, won by the visiting Wildcats, 30-17. Official dedication ceremonies, however, took place the next season on Sept.

9, 1972, at halftime of a 35-28 loss to Western Illinois before 8,800 fans.

SBS, which has always retained its horseshoe shape, underwent an expansion to 32,000 seats in 1978 and again enjoyed improvements in 1994. The Rebel Experience area outside the stadium opened in 1997.

One of the highlights of the most recent renovation was the replacement of the so-called "Magic Carpet" retractable artificial turf that had been in place

since 1985. Originally fitted with traditional AstroTurf, Sam Boyd was the first stadium in the world to install a Monsanto Corp. outdoor retractable turf, which helped give the facility its multi-purpose capability. The surface, which simply rolled up into cylinders in less than an hour, was installed at a cost of \$1.2 million in part through a grant by the Sam Boyd family. Natural grass replaced the artificial turf from 1999- 2002 before a synthetic surface, made by TurfTech, was installed in time for the 2003 season.

ESPN BROADCAST TALENT



BRAD NESSLER PLAY-BY-PLAY COMMENTATOR

Brad Nessler, one of the leading play-by-play commentators in the business, calls games for both ESPN and ABC. He has worked for ESPN since 1992, added ABC assignments in 1997 and continues to handle college football and basketball games for ABC and ESPN.

For ESPN, Nessler has called college basketball games and Big Ten and Thursday night football contests from 1992-1997. In 1997, he switched to ABC for college football, including the Bowl Championship Series title game, and began doing college basketball for ABC as well.

Nessler began his career as sports anchor and talk show host for WGST-Radio in Atlanta beginning in 1980. In 1985, he became sports director at WSB-Radio, also in Atlanta. While at both Atlanta stations, he handled radio play-by-play of Georgia Tech basketball (1980-85), and the Atlanta Falcons (1982-88) before assuming the same duty for the Minnesota Vikings on WCCO (1988-89). He has done play-by-play of ACC football and basketball for Raycom/Jefferson Pilot telecasts, and did WLAF games for USA Network (1991-92). Nessler also has served as play-by-play announcer for Miami Dolphins preseason telecasts.

Nessler joined CBS in 1990 and worked on college football and men's and women's basketball, including the NCAA Division I women's championship game, and NFL games. He was that network's host for speed skating coverage at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, France.



BOB GRIESE GAME ANALYST

Bob Griese has become as well known for his insightful analysis as he is for his Hall of Fame football career. Griese joined ABC in 1987 and currently serves as a college football analyst on ESPN and ABC telecasts, primarily working Saturday afternoon games on ABC.

Direct, frank commentary and skillful use of a telestrator during replays have helped distinguish Griese as an insightful and enlightening analyst. From 1982 through 1986 he was a top analyst for NBC Sports' NFL coverage. He has also covered numerous post-season bowl games, including the NFL Super Bowl, College Football's Fiesta Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl, and two of the first three Bowl Championship Series games of college football.

Griese was a two-time All-American at Purdue, runner-up for the 1966 Heisman Trophy and member of the College Football Hall of Fame. He was the number-one draft choice, and fourth overall, for the Miami Dolphins in 1967.

In the 1970s, Griese led the Miami Dolphins to nine winning seasons, three AFC Championships and two consecutive wins in Super Bowls VII and VIII. His greatest accomplishment came in 1972, when he returned from a mid-season injury to lead his team to an undefeated, championship season.

He was a six-time Dolphin MVP, four-time All-AFC and a two-time All-Pro. He played in two AFL All-Star games and six NFL Pro-Bowls. In 1990, Griese was immortalized with induction into the Professional Football Hall of Fame.



PAUL MAGUIRE ESPN GAME ANALYST

Paul Maguire serves as a college football game analyst, working alongside Brad Nessler, analyst Bob Griese and reporter Bonnie Bernstein. Maguire returned to call college football games in 2006 after serving as an NFL analyst for ESPN's Sunday Night Football since 1998 (he previously worked on college football games for the network from 1980-86. Maguire

rejoined ESPN in April 1998.

During his first stint at ESPN, Maguire was an analyst with veteran playby-play commentator Jim Simpson on college football and USFL games.

Maguire's previous tenure at ESPN during the early 80's was sandwiched between his role as NBC Sports' NFL studio and game analyst (1971-79 and 1986-97). Highlights at NBC include serving as game analyst for Super Bowls XXX and XXXII, and working the pregame show for Super Bowls XXIII and XXVII. Immediately prior to rejoining ESPN, Maguire was a member of NBC's lead NFL broadcast team with Dick Enberg and Phil Simms.

Maguire played professional football for 11 years as a punter and line-backer with the San Diego Chargers (1960-63) and the Buffalo Bills (1964-70), winning AFL championships in 1963, '64 and '65. He holds Buffalo's punting record for longest-season average (42.1 yards per kick), and was named to the Bills' Silver Anniversary All-Time Team as a punter in 1984.

Maguire is a 1960 graduate of The Citadel where he earned all-Southern Conference honors and led the nation in receiving touchdowns his senior year.



BONNIE BERNSTEIN ESPN SIDELINE REPORTER

Bonnie Bernstein rejoined ESPN in July 2006 as a sideline reporter and studio host. She currently serves as the reporter for ESPN on ABC Saturday afternoon college football games with Brad Nessler, Bob Griese and Paul Maguire. She was a reporter on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball series in 2006. Bernstein is also a rotating host and feature reporter on several

ESPN programs, including NFL Live and Jim Rome is Burning. Bernstein was a SportsCenter correspondent with ESPN from 1995-1998. Additionally, Bernstein covers the NFL for CBS/Westwood One Radio.

Bernstein, a 15-year broadcasting veteran and one of the most recognizable and highly respected journalists, had worked for CBS Sports for eight years prior to rejoining ESPN. While at CBS, she served as the lead reporter for NFL and NCAA Men's Basketball Championship telecasts and contributed features for The NFL Today.

Bernstein has covered five straight Super Bowls since joining the radio announce team in 2001 and the Pro Bowl since 2003.

Prior to ESPN, Bernstein made local television history at the NBC affiliate in Reno, NV (KRNV-TV), becoming the "Biggest Little City's" first-ever female weekday sports anchor. She began her television career at WMDT-TV (ABC) in Salisbury, MD, anchoring weekend news, and broke into broadcasting in radio, as the news and sports director for WXJN-FM in Lewes, DE.

The four-time Academic All-American in gymnastics was graduated magna cum laude from the University of Maryland's prestigious Merrill College of Journalism.



(December 25, 2002) – UCLA interim head coach Ed Kezirian led the Bruins to a 27-13 victory over New Mexico in the eleventh edition of the Las Vegas Bowl. UNM, making only its second bowl appearance in 41 years, jumped out to a 6-3 lead on a 55-yard interception return by Desmar Black in the first quarter. Following the touchdown, Katie Hnida became the first woman to play in a Division I-A football game when she attempted the extra point. The kick, which sailed low, was blocked by the Bruins. In the second half, UCLA (8-5) got the big plays and defensive stops it needed to seal the victory. The Bruins put the game away with a 74-yard punt return by MVP Craig Bragg and two touchdowns in the fourth quarter off New Mexico turnovers. Safety Jarrad Page scored one minute into the fourth quarter on a 29-yard interception return after he picked the ball out of the air on a pass from Casey Kelly that hit tight end Zach Cresap in the back. Freshman halfback Tyler Ebell scored with 10:40 left after New Mexico's third turnover of the game – a fumble by wide receiver Joe Manning that was recovered by linebacker Brandon Chillar at the Lobos 31.

Keys to the game: Despite being out-gained by New Mexico in total offense, UCLA returned an interception and punt for scores in the win.

(December 24, 2003) – In Mike Riley's first bowl appearance as a head coach, Oregon State completely dominated New Mexico by a score of 55-14. Junior running back Steven Jackson, a native of Las Vegas, earned Las Vegas Bowl MVP honors after scoring five touchdowns and rushing for 149 yards on 28 carries. He also had five catches for 51 yards for 200 all-purpose yards. Jackson's five scores – a 34-yard touchdown reception from Derek Anderson and touchdown runs of 3, 11, 6 and 1 yards – tied the all-time bowl record held by two players: Sheldon Canley of San Jose State who scored five times against Central Michigan in 1990's California Bowl and Barry Sanders who tallied five scores (all rushing) against Wyoming in the 1988 Holiday Bowl. On the defensive side, Oregon State held heralded sophomore running back DonTrell Moore to 5 yards on 11 carries.

Keys to the game: Oregon State held New Mexico to one first down in the first half and 21 total yards through the first three quarters.



Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl





(December 23, 2004) – Wyoming won its first bowl game in nearly 30 years, upsetting heavily favored UCLA 24-21 in the 13th edition of the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl before a bowl-record crowd of 27,784 at Sam Boyd Stadium. The Cowboys jumped out to an early 10-0 lead on a 39-yard field goal by Deric Yaussi and then a 10-yard touchdown pass from Corey Bramlet to Tyler Holden late in the opening quarter. UCLA answered with two passing touchdowns in the second quarter, the first a 26-yard hook-up between Bruin quarterback Drew Olson and wide receiver Junior Taylor, cutting the lead to 10-7. After Olson hurt his knee, Bruin backup David Koral came in and kept the Bruin offense moving connecting with Craig Bragg twice, once in the second and again in the third quarter to give UCLA a 21-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

The Cowboys used a trick play to cut into the deficit, as Jovon Bouknight threw a pass on a wide receiver reverse that J.J. Raterink hauled in for a 22-yard touchdown that trimmed the margin to 21-17. Bramlet then completed the Cowboy comeback, firing a 12-yard touchdown pass to John Wadkowski with 57 seconds left in the game. Bramlet finished the game with 307 yards passing and two touchdowns, earning him MVP honors.

Keys to the game: Wyoming threw for 329 yards through the air, including three touchdown passes while UCLA had just 185 passing yards.

(December 22, 2005) - Cal's Marshawn Lynch rushed for career highs of 194 yards and three touchdowns to help the Golden Bears hold off BYU and win the 2005 Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl 35-28 before a packed Sam Boyd Stadium on Dec. 22. Lynch earned MVP honors for his running efforts while teammate DeSean Jackson caught two scoring passes for Cal, which improved to 8-4. Cal took a 21-point lead into the final quarter after Lynch's 35-yard scoring run and Jackson's 22-yard diving TD catch in the third. But BYU quarterback John Beck responded with scoring passes to Jonny Harline and Todd Watkins, whose 9-yard grab with 5:35 left cut Cal's lead to seven points. BYU had a chance to tie late in the game, but Beck's arm was hit by Cal lineman Phillip Mbakogu, and Daymeion Hughes intercepted the wobbling pass to seal the Bears' second bowl victory in three postseason trips under head coach Jeff Tedford. Beck set Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl records by going 35-for-53 for 352 yards and three TDs. Enjoying playing before a partisan Cougar crowd among the bowl-record 40,053 fans, BYU made its first bowl trip in four years and finished the season at 6-6.

Keys to the game: Marshawn Lynch ran for nearly 200 yards himself and the Cal ground game racked up 241 yards while BYU ran for just 94 yards.

(December 21, 2006) – BYU quarterback John Beck stood on the podium above a throng of blue-clad fans so dense the green field below them was barely visible. After five years of frustration and a decade of postseason futility, BYU finally had something to celebrate. Beck passed for 375 yards and two touchdowns, leading the No. 19 Cougars to a 38-8 victory over Oregon in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl. BYU (11-2) closed the season with 10 straight victories, capping the streak with its first bowl win since the 1996 season. Beck was 28-for-46 with two interceptions, and got plenty of help. Curtis Brown ran for 120 yards and two TDs, Jonny Harline, voted game MVP, caught nine passes for 181 yards and Justin Robinson intercepted two passes for BYU, which shut out the Ducks (7-6) through three quarters. Beck, Brown, Harline and Robinson were all playing their final game for the Cougars. Cougars fans who packed Sam Boyd Stadium with a record crowd of 44,615 stormed the field after the final play in celebration of the BYU blowout. It was the largest crowd in stadium history, breaking the previous high of 42,075 fans for UNLV's game against Wisconsin in 2002, and the fans were nearly all wearing BYU dark blue.

Keys to the game: BYU racked up 548 yards of total offense, including 181 yards receiving by Jonny Harline and 375 yards passing by quarterback John Beck.


