



Message from the Chair of the Scientific Program Committee

Dear Colleagues:

I welcome each and every one of you from all four corners of the world to what I firmly believe will be one of the most successful scientific gatherings in the history of the WFNS. The Scientific Program Committee has been hard at work over the last three years building the individual pieces that form the giant puzzle of the Scientific Program. I believe that this committee of 24 international colleagues, under my chairmanship and the co-chairmanship of Dr. Nelson Oyesiku, has paid very special attention to the needs of neurosurgeons across the planet and we hope that this attention to detail reflects itself in the quality of the enclosed program.

The guiding principles in the construction of the scientific program were based on inclusiveness, relevance, and innovation. Inclusiveness is easily seen by the 800 invited speakers from 60 countries, not including presenters of oral papers, electronic posters, and video symposia. Relevance is obvious in the wide ranging topics that address neurosurgical questions asked everywhere, from the tundra to the urban jungles, and from the mundane to the esoteric. Whatever the needs and expectations, we believe that there will be something for everyone in the program. And finally, the spirit of innovation, which characterizes the soul of neurosurgery, is well represented in all the sessions that deal with the state of our art and the promise of our science.

We began our journey into building the Scientific Program three years ago by sending out surveys to each of the individual WFNS Member Societies, requesting suggestions regarding topics and speakers. We toured the world, listened to suggestions and gathered names from every corner, established stars and rising talent. Our Committee was subdivided based on 13 separate subspecialty tracks (clearly outlined in the final layout), and the framework of the program began to take shape. Through intense collaborative work, more than 80% of the topics and speakers were identified and published by November 2007 at the time of the Interim Meeting in Nagoya. The third phase of this effort consisted of orchestrating and solidifying all details, and this task was completed in time for the release of this registration brochure.

As can be seen in the details of the program, the week will begin with an unprecedented 12 Practical Courses on Sunday, some full-day, some half-day, covering most specialties. Every subsequent morning for five days, there will be a choice of 20 Breakfast Sessions followed by 10 Main Topic Sessions. From Monday through Thursday there will be a full two hours of unopposed Plenary Session daily featuring three neurosurgical luminaries and one special lecturer from the basic sciences or an allied specialty. Although lunchtime (and coffee breaks) should offer the opportunity to interact with our sponsors and exhibitors, there will be one or two special Luncheon Symposia Monday through Thursday. The afternoon will proceed with 10 simultaneous two hour Oral Paper Sessions grouped by subspecialty, and the day will conclude with five simultaneous Interactive Sessions that promise to stimulate and engage the audience in controversial and complex topics, as well as five simultaneous Video Symposia narrated in person by the presenters. All posters will be electronic in format.



NEUROMODULATION: DEEP BRAIN STIMULATION Cost: \$450.00

Deep brain stimulation has become the preferred technique for modulation of various basal ganglia nuclei in chronic neurological diseases including Parkinson's disease and other movement disorders but also in refractory pain syndromes. More recently, neuropsychiatric disorders such as depression and obsessive-compulsive disorder have become the focus of attention. The participants of this course will learn about the relevant neuroanatomy, the basic techniques of functional stereotactic neurosurgery and deep brain stimulation, and the indications and surgical outcome of the contemporary spectrum with an outlook on new topics of the field.

Physicians should only claim credit commensurate with the extent of their participation in the activity. Practical course fees vary, so please check the specific course listing.

CME Credit for Posters

Physicians may claim AMA PRA Category 1 Credit™ directly from the AMA for preparing a poster presentation, which is also included in the published abstracts. To obtain credit from the AMA for this, physicians can either claim them on their AMA PRA certificate application or apply directly to the AMA for an AMA PRA Category 1 Credit certificate.

Physicians may claim *AMA PRA Category 2 Credits*™ for viewing scientific posters. Physicians should self claim credit to the AMA on their AMA PRA certificate application form.

Continuing Education for Allied Health Professionals

Letter of Invitation for Visa Applications

Individuals requiring an official letter of invitation in order to obtain a visa and authorization to attend the World Congress will find it in the back of this publication. Attendees may also visit the Web site at www.AANS.org/wfns2009. The letter of invitation does not financially obligate the World Congress organizers in any way. All expenses incurred in relation to the Congress are the sole responsibility of the attendee.

Visitors/Non-Immigrants—Traveling to Boston

Many citizens from other countries are required to obtain a visa to enter the United States. For the most up-to-date information and step-by-step guide visit: www.unitedstatesvisas.gov/obtainingvisa/index.html.

- Apply early for your visa. It is recommended that you apply for a visa six to nine months prior to the meeting.
- Yes I need a visa. How do I apply? Visit www.travel.state.gov/visa.
- What is the status of my visa application of more than 20 days after interview date? Visit www7.nationalacademies.org/visas and select questionnaire button.

Visa Waiver Program (http://travel.state.gov/visa/temp/without/without_1990.html)

All Visa Waiver Program travelers, regardless of age or type of passport used, must present machine-readable passports. In addition, depending when Visa Waiver Program travelers' passports were issued, other passport requirments will apply:

- Machine-readable passports issued before 10/25/05 no further requirements
- Machine-readable passports issued between 10/26/05 and 10/25/06 – requires digital photograph printed on the data page or integrated chip with information from the data page
- Machine-readable passports issued on or after 10/26/06 requires integrated chip with information from the data page (e-passport).

Tips for Successful Visa Applications. Visa applicants are expected to provide evidence that they are intending to return to their country of residence. Therefore, applicants should provide proof of "binding" or sufficient ties to their home country or permanent residence abroad.



This may include documentation of the following:

- Family ties in home country or country of legal permanent residence
- Property ownership
- Bank accounts
- Employment contract or statement from employer stating that the position will continue when the employee returns

Visa applications are more likely to be successful if done in a visitor's home country rather than in a third country.

- Applicants should present their entire trip itinerary, including travel to any countries other than the United States, at the time of their visa application.
- Include a letter of invitation from the meeting organizer or the U.S. host, specifying the subject, location and dates of the activity. A letter is included on page 58.
- Provide specifics on how travel and local expenses will be covered.
- If travel plans will depend on early approval of the visa application, specify this at the time of the application.
- Provide proof of professional scientific and/or educational status (students should provide a university transcript).

Currency

There are currency exchanges in Boston. Most banks exchange currency as well as travel centers. It is best to have U.S. currency or traveler's checks. ATMs are readily available throughout Boston.

Credit Cards/Travelers Checks

Most businesses accept most credit cards and U.S. dollar traveler's checks. There are limited places that *only* accept cash. Have the proper identification with you before cashing traveler's checks.

No Smoking Policy

Smoking is not permitted at any official WFNS event. In addition, no smoking is permitted at the Hynes Convention Center.



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
