PRE-PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS


Programs of study are offered in pre-law, pre-engineering, and pre-health professions, which prepare students to enter schools of medicine, dentistry, optometry, pharmacy, podiatry, and veterinary medicine, among others. Students in each of these programs enroll in an academic-subject major.

SPECIAL ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES

- Study abroad: Students may attend Loyola's John Felice Rome Center, the most popular study abroad destination; the Beijing Center for Chinese Studies; or choose from more than 70 other programs in 32 countries.
- Interdisciplinary programs: Loyola offers more than 25 programs (see page 3) that integrate coursework from various disciplines to give students an opportunity to explore and synthesize topic areas from different viewpoints.
- Five-year programs: Loyola's more than 15 combined bachelor's and master's degree programs (see page 3) enable students to complete both degrees in about five years.
- Six-year early admission to Loyola's School of Law (3 + 3 program)
- Early Assurance Program to Loyola's Stritch School of Medicine
- Loyola/Midwestern University Dual-Acceptance Pharmacy Program




Type of high school attended

STUDENT/FACULTY RATIO—14-TO-1 (2008)



- Various meal plans and convenient campus dining facilities offer students nutritious, diverse eating options.


Religious affiliation

CAMPUS INFORMATION

LAKE SHORE CAMPUS 6525 N. Sheridan Rd. Chicago, IL 60626

Loyola's main residential campus is located on Chicago's North Side, minutes from downtown Chicago and the Water Tower Campus, and is set along the shore of Lake Michigan. It is home to the College of Arts and Sciences, Graduate School, and Marcella Niehoff School of Nursing. The School of Education also offers academic courses, programs, and student advising at the Lake Shore Campus. More than 3,200 students live in 16 residence halls. The Lake Shore Campus also includes the main Cudahy Library, Madonna della Strada Chapel, Joseph J. Gentile Center, Halas Sports Center, the Quinlan Life Sciences Education and Research Center, and Information Commons, a state-of-the-art study and instructional space.

WATER TOWER CAMPUS 820 N. Michigan Ave. Chicago, IL 60611

Loyola's city campus is located along Pearson Street, just off North Michigan Avenue, Chicago's "Magnificent Mile." Here, undergraduates can complete one of many degree programs, as well as take advantage of internships at many of Chicago's business and cultural institutions. The Water Tower Campus is home to the Schools of Business Administration, Communication, Education, Law, and Social Work, and to selected programs in the College of Arts and Sciences. This campus also houses the Loyola University Museum of Art, as well as Baumhart Hall and Terry Student Center, where more than 600 upper-class and graduate students reside. The Clare at Water Tower, a high-rise continuing care community scheduled to open at the Water Tower Campus in early 2009, will provide numerous opportunities for life-long learning and will also house several of Loyola's academic programs.

TRANSFER ADMISSION

Transfer students must have graduated from high school or completed a GED, and have completed 20 credit hours of transferable college credit. Admission is based on college cumulative GPA. Without 20 transferable credit hours, high school transcripts and standardized test scores are required for admission.
