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# INTRODUCTION TO FALLING FOR GRACE

According to *The New York Times*, the odds of getting a feature film made and distributed theatrically is about 0.3%. Among those that were lucky enough to get theatrical distribution in 2007, only 6% were directed by a woman. So what exactly does it take for an Asian American woman, facing magnified odds in a brutal industry, to write, direct, produce, star in and now distribute a film – all on her own? It takes drive, tenacity, vision, talent, and good, old-fashioned courage. The exciting thing about *Falling for Grace* is that the story behind it is just as dramatic and uplifting as the story within the film. This fresh new romantic comedy represents the hopes and achievements of not one, but two all-American underdogs: Grace Tang, its independent heroine – and of course Lee herself.

Lee, a Broadway actress with both Sondheim and Shakespeare credits to her name, wrote *Falling for Grace* (originally titled *East Broadway*) as a proactive response to the lack of good roles for Asian American actors. Her script placed in several prestigious competitions, such as the Chesterfield Writer's Film Project and the Nicholl Fellowship, at which point major Hollywood producers began to show interest.

But they wouldn't buy it unless she changed one thing – the main character's ethnicity (from Asian American to White or Hispanic). Feeling that this change would defeat her whole purpose in writing it, Lee decided to preserve her story by raising the production budget herself. Four years later, shooting began, with a reputable cast attracted by the strength of the screenplay. When the initial director left the project, she stepped in to complete the film. The finished movie premiered at the Tribeca Film Festival, where it was one of that year's most popular entries, selling out every showing.

But despite the film's success at Tribeca, Hollywood again asserted its belief that no one would pay to see an Asian American protagonist. Having witnessed the viewer reaction to the six festival screenings, Lee disagreed, and took on yet another role – as distributor.

She has opened the film in a diverse variety of cities outside New York and L.A. – Washington, D.C., Bryn Mawr, PA, Sedona, Lakeside, and Scottsdale, AZ, Sausalito, San Francisco, Grass Valley and Palm Springs, CA, Des Moines, IA, Vancouver, Canada, Vienna, Austria – and everywhere, the audience response has been incredible.

Falling for Grace has opened at number 1 in the last 4 theaters in its release history. Twice it reached number 1 in its Scottsdale release at Harkins Camelview 5, an 'indie' theater well-known in the industry, where it outgrossed frontrunner indie films like *The Visitor*, *Priceless* and *Young @ Heart*. It eventually played there for 7 weeks. *Grace*'s box office performance has been so notable that exhibitors everywhere are hearing and spreading the buzz, and now Lee receives invitations from around the country and the world to open her film in their theaters.

Audiences everywhere thank Lee for making such a feel-good, classic-style romantic comedy. They describe not only "falling" for *Grace*, but relating to her as well. Contrary to Hollywood's predictions, they cite the Chinese family as one of the main reasons they love the film – they say the Tangs' dynamics evoke the experience of almost every American home. They laugh, cry, and applaud at the end. They tell Lee they have been inspired and moved by her heroine's struggle for self-acceptance, as well as by Lee's vision and perseverance.

### **SYNOPSIS**



Grace Tang is an ambitious, hard working, upwardly mobile banker determined to work her way up the ladder of life and out of working-class Chinatown. She seems to have done exactly that with an Associate position at a top notch Wall Street investment bank. But more than anything, Grace yearns to be part of Manhattan's Upper East Side socialite world.

When Grace finally receives that elusive invitation to the Opera's prestigious Junior Committee meet & greet, she is prepared to shine. What she isn't prepared for, however, is being mistaken as "the Grace Tang" of the Shanghai Tangs, the heiress of a famous Hong Kong fashion dynasty. But before Grace can correct the situation, she is introduced to Andrew Barrington, Jr., one of the most eligible bachelors of New York City and she decides to run with her new identity.

What follows is a whirlwind ride of romance and white lies, where we are offered a glance into the greed and pressures of Wall Street and the human side of Chinatown - two worlds which unknowingly interconnect and affect one another. When Grace and Andrew's worlds finally collide, through humor, romance, heartbreak and forgiveness, Grace ultimately learns to accept herself for who she is.





# **DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT**

I grew up watching and loving classic American romantic comedies: Working Girl, Pretty Woman, The Truth About Cats and Dogs. I identified with Tess McGill, Vivian Ward and Abby Barnes, all underdogs trying to find acceptance in a world where they don't quite fit in. It wasn't until later I realized that all my life, I had identified with non-Asian characters in these classic American stories. There were simply no Asian American Tess McGills in our cinematic catalogue that I can think of. So, when I decided to pen my first screenplay, I wanted to create the Asian "Tess."



When I first came up with the story of *Falling for Grace*, I didn't realize that what drove the plot of the film (Grace, our main character, wanting to be part of elite New York society) came from an event that happened to me at age 8, when I was singled out and shunned at a birthday party by a clique of girls who thought I was not good enough or wealthy enough to be one of "them." I ended up by myself on the first floor of the penthouse apartment, while the rich girls all played on the top floor. Perhaps this is why I have always been more conscious about class rather than racial differences. I was always very proud of being Chinese but never thought I was of the right "breed." It's amazing how a single event from childhood can inform and color the rest of one's life.

In telling Grace's story, I knew that New York Chinatown would be the perfect backdrop. Chinatown is a fascinating subculture of Manhattan. A Chinese immigrant can literally plant

him/herself in Chinatown and live the rest of one's life within a one square mile radius without ever needing to speak English. I wanted to examine what that could mean to a character like Grace who aspires beyond the confines of her own community and, on top of that, is continually influenced by pop culture and images created by the media and Hollywood.

In order to tell Grace's story convincingly, I needed to make sure that her family were all fluent Cantonese speakers, still the predominant dialect in New York Chinatown. Nothing bothers me more than seeing a Chinese family on screen speak different dialects or with a bad accent when they shouldn't. I lucked out with a great cast - Clem Cheung ("Ba") and Elizabeth Sung ("Ma") are both originally from Hong Kong. Ken Leung ("Ming") grew up in New York Chinatown and spoke Cantonese with his parents. They were the perfect family for Grace.

One of the major challenges I found as the writer, and then the director, was how to approach the role of Andrew. Being neither white nor male, I found myself writing a part that was more stereotypical than I had hoped. When Gale Harold was cast as Andrew, I started to re-shape the role for him. Gale's honest delivery made Andrew a far more complex and interesting individual and therefore, far more real. Through Gale's performance, we see that life for a rich, famous bachelor isn't perfect either - and can be, in fact, quite painful at times. As perfect as Gale may appear, he captures Andrew's flaws masterfully: his struggle to find happiness within his own world and stay true to himself.

Many, if not most, might point out that Falling for Grace sticks to that romantic comedy formula of boy meets girl, boy loses girl, and boy gets girl. What was extremely important to me, however, was that boy certainly cannot "save" girl, as in the traditional Cinderella convention. As an independent Asian American woman, I wanted to take the opportunity with my romantic comedy to debunk a few myths: that Asian women need saving from White Knights, that Asian men are geeks and uncool, that Asian American characters in film (with the exception of action flicks) can only handle supporting roles.

When all is said and done, I believe that *Falling for Grace* is an exploration of a universal struggle of self-acceptance. Whether you're a handsome, wealthy man from a famous family or a little girl from working class Chinatown, accepting who you are is the first challenging step to achieving fulfillment and true happiness. I hope you all enjoy my little homage to the classic American romantic comedy.

### LEE INVITED TO SPEAK AROUND THE WORLD

As the word of mouth surrounding *Falling for Grace* continues to grow, so does Lee's reputation as an engaging, eloquent speaker and interview subject.
