INTRODUCTION

The John P. Heiss Family Papers, 1835-1872, was a gift from Robert Lusk, the grandson of John P. Heiss. The collection consists of ca. 500 items and two volumes. The collection occupies .84 linear feet of shelf space. The collection has no restrictions.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

These papers are composed of correspondence, editorials, dispatches, legal documents, etc. John P. Heiss began his career has a newspaper man in charge of the financial department of the printing establishment of the Nashville *Union* under the editorship of Jeremiah George Harris in 1840. For two years beginning in 1842 he joined with Thomas Hogan as co-editor of the Nashville Union and at the same time was a Major in the Tennessee Militia. In 1845, he became business manager of Washington *Union*, the newly established organ of the Polk administration, joining with Thomas Ritchie of the Richmond Enquirer. This partnership ended in 1848, and from 1851-1855 Heiss was editor of the New Orleans Delta. William L. Marcy, Secretary of State, employed him to carry dispatches to Nicaragua where he became associated with William L. Walker. After becoming a citizen of Nicaragua he served as charge d'affaires in place of Father Vijil and was authorized to ratify on behalf of Nicaragua a treaty with the United States. Heiss continued his interest in Nicaragua and was appointed in 1860 as bearer of dispatches to the U.S. Legation. On his return to the Latin American county he served as an agent for Spanish-American and British bondholders. His chief concerns, however, was the cultivation of cotton in Central America and he was very much, interested in the Development of the cotton gin. Numerous letters of David Hoadley, President of the Panama Railroad, are concerned with opportunities for capitalist in Latin America by means of cotton and hemp cultivation, development of transportation, building of steamers, construction of a canal railroads. Heiss was appointed by Great Britain and the United States as special commissioner to negotiate the "Mosquito Territory question." Some correspondence with William Walker deals with this question. There are 41 letters written by Heiss in the collection. The letters from James K. Polk deal primarily with political matters while Heiss was editor of the Nashville *Union*. Other correspondents in this collection, in addition to those already mentioned, includes Joseph Brenan, Lewis S. Coryell, J.R. Cox, George M. Dallas, John Travis, Daniel E. Delavan, Fermin Ferrer, Hugh Fraser, George Walker, and Henry A. Wise.

Two scrapbooks contain numerous clippings about Nicaragua. Some agreements, indentures and editorials make up the reminder of the collection.,

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

John P. Heiss married Ann Molineaux at Trinity Church in Philadelphia on September 15, 1835. In 1840, he became a resident of Nashville, Tennessee, and was in charge of the financial department of the printing establishment of the Nashville *Union*, then conducted by J. George Harris. From 1842 to 1844, Heiss was a Major in the Tennessee Militia and joined with Thomas Hogan as co-editor of the Nashville *Union*. From 1845 to 1848, Heiss became a business manager of the Washington *Union*, newly established organ of the Polk administration, with Thomas Ritchie of the Richmond Enquirer. This newspaper was established after the purchase of the Washington Globe by Ritchie and Heiss. In 1848, he retired from partnership but remained in Washington for some time. From 1851 to 1855, he was the Editor of the New Orleans Delta. From 1856-1857, Heiss was associated with William Walker and was employed by Marcy, Secretary of State, to carry dispatches to Nicaragua. He was left as charge d'affaires by Father Vijil to look out for interests of Nicaragua. He was authorized to ratify on behalf of Nicaragua a treaty with the United States. He was also authorized by the Walker Government as a citizen of Nicaragua and in close touch with Walker until the fall of 1857. In 1857, Heiss returned to Washington and established a newspaper called the *States*. In 1860, he retained his interest in Nicaragua and was appointed bearer of dispatches to U.S. legation, receiving his commission from William Henry Trescots, acting Secretary of State of Tennessee. In 1861, Heiss returned to Nicaragua and his chief concern was cultivation of cotton in Central America. In, 1862, he served as an agent of Britain bondholders who had claims against Nicaragua. On August 22, 1865, Heiss died in New York (obituary) and was buried in Bristol, Pennsylvania.

From 1865 to 1872, Henry Weiss, son of John Weiss served in the Confederate Army and after the war became on of the editors of the *Republican Editor*. In 1872, Henry Weiss became the managing editor of the St. Louis *Times*. He returned to Nashville in 187 and became managing editor of the *Union and American* for about a year until it was consolidated with the *Republican Banner*. In 1872, he became the managing editor of the *American*. In 1876, Henry Heiss married Miss Mary Lusk of Nashville, Tennessee.
