I. The College

Bhim Rao Ambedkar College came into existence in 1991 during the birth centenary year of Bharat Ratna Baba Saheb Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar. It is a constituent college of the University of Delhi sponsored by Delhi Government. As a co-educational institution, it is maintaining its incessant momentum on the path of progress ever since its inception in academic and extra-curricular fields. The Principal and the staff have dedicated themselves to place the college firmly on its pioneering tracks, preparing students for their fruitful and responsible future.

The college offers many important courses to its students for the three year Bachelor Degree Programmes. Along with B.A. Programme, B.Com (Pass), B.Com (Hons.) and B.A. (Hons.) Geography, the college holds the unique distinction of being the forerunner in launching four professional courses of the University. B.A. (Hons.) **Hindi Journalism and Mass Communication** was introduced in 1994-95, B.A. (Hons.) **Social Work** and B.A. (Hons.) **Business Economics** were started in 1995-96. Since 2007-08, the college has also introduced B.A. (Hons.) **Applied Psychology**. For the B.A. Programme too, the college offers various vocational subjects like Functional Hindi, Industrial Relations and Personal Management, office Management and Secretarial Practice, and BDP.

II. Courses Offered

* As per the University letter No. Acad/OBC/2008/85 dated May 23, 2008.

III. General Admission Information

1. Admission to all courses based on qualifying examination is provisional, subject to the confirmation of the university.

- 2. Admission will be made on merit basis and as per the age requirements of the University, and in a particular course, it would be closed as soon as the seats are filled up. Merit list of the provisional candidates will be displayed on the notice board of the college as per schedule. No individual information will be sent. The college has the right to make any correction in the list.
- 3. For admission to B.A. Programme and B.Com (Pass) courses the minimum eligibility condition is 40% marks in aggregate in any of the following examinations:
 - A candidate must have passed Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (class XII) of the CBSE New Delhi (with one language and three elective subjects) or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto.

OR

Pre-university examination (two years after ten years of schooling) of an Indian University recognized by the University of Delhi.

OR

Intermediate examination of an Indian University/Board or an examination recognized equivalent thereto (pass in four subjects).

- (ii) Indian School Certificate Examination (Twelve years) of the Council of Indian School Examination, New Delhi (pass in five written subjects)
- (iii) General Certificate of Education Examination of U.K.
- (iv) Pass in five subjects at ordinary level and (b) at least in two subjects at the advanced level. These two advanced level courses may either be chosen from among the five ordinary level subjects or from outside this group, as prescribed by the University of Delhi.
- (v) Minimum percentage of marks for admission to B.A. (Hons.) and B. Com (Hons.) courses is 45% in aggregate in any of the examinations mentioned in (iv) above. For B. Com (Hons.) a student should have Commerce/Science stream and for B.A. (Hons.) Geography, students from Arts, Commerce and Science streams can also apply.

4. If a candidate wishes to apply for more than one course, separate application form is to be filled for each course.

- 5. Students who have not studied English at X or XII class levels will not be considered for admission as the college does not have the provision for teaching Remedial English.
- 6. Documents Required for Admission: (a) Mark sheet (class XII); (b) Provisional certificate (class XII); (c) Date of birth (class X); (d) Character certificate (original); (e) Migration certificate (wherever necessary); (f) Caste certificate/certificate of disability; (g) College Registration/ Admission slip issued by the University in case of all reserved categories (original); (h) Three recent passport size photographs; (i) one set of self attested photocopies of all certificates mentioned above and original documents.

Note: (1) Self attested copies of documents/testimonials may be submitted by the applicant. (2) However, if any false attestation/falsified records are detected at any stage, the concerned student shall be debarred from attending any course in the college for the next five years and in addition, a criminal case will be instituted against him/her as per relevant sections of IPC.

Students do not have a right for admission if they do not deposit fee as per the notified time schedule.

7. Reservation of Seats

- (i) Students seeking admission under category Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes, have to register at the University designated centres. Their admission college allotment will be done by the University. 22¹/₂% of the total numbers of seats are reserved for candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes (15% for SCs and 7¹/₂% for STs interchangeable if necessary). Students belonging to these categories should produce a certificate from the commissioner or any authority recognized by the University of Delhi for this purpose.
- (ii) 3% seats are reserved for Physically Handicapped Candidates and applications would be received at DSW office of University of Delhi.
- (iii) 5% of the seats of each course are reserved for Children/widows/wives of officers and Men of the Armed Forces, including paramilitary personnel, killed or disabled in action as per University guidelines. Admission under this category and college allotment would be done by the University.
- (iv) 5% seats in the first year in each course are reserved for Foreign Students. They are required to apply for admission through the Foreign Students Advisor, University of Delhi, Delhi – 110007.

8. 27% OBC Reservations

The policy of reservation of 27% of the seats for OBCs would be implemented in a phased manner. In the first year, the student intake will be increased by 18% as per the guidelines and modalities communicated by the University vide University Letter No. Aca I/OBC/2007/80, dated 14th May 2008.

9. Admission on the Basis of Sports and Co-Curricular Distinctions

5% of the total seats are available for admission separately both in the Honours and Pass courses, except in courses where there is an admission test or centralized admissions. The college reserves the right to consider only those sports and co-curricular activities as decided by the college. Students who wish to seek admission on the Sports and Co-curricular basis should (a) apply on the college form and clearly mark Sports category on the top of their admission form; (b) fill up the mandatory information, without which the form will not be accepted and (c) attach a copy of all the supporting documents highlighting distinctions.

The procedure for admission on the basis of sports is as follows:

- (i) College form along with photograph and a copy of all the supporting documents duly verified by the H.O.D. last attended and the Issuing Authority is to be deposited at the designated window, and receipt be collected.
- (ii) The Sports Committee constituted for the purpose of admission shall screen/evaluate all applications and the relevant necessary papers, hold interviews, trials etc., and recommend admissions.
- (iii) The level of competency in sports will be determined only if the candidate has achieved distinctions in sports during the last three years as per the University of Delhi guidelines.
- (iv) The screened applicant would be called for interview and also for trial (which will be compulsory) as per the dates notified by the college and evaluation chart prepared as per the University guidelines.
- (v) The list of such candidates would be prominently displayed along with the fee and time schedule in the college Notice Board including at the Gate.
- (vi) The list of students admitted on the basis of sports should be endorsed to the University Sports Administration Committee for necessary action.

Extra-Curricular Activities

- (i) Students seeking admission under Co-curricular should follow the same steps as outlined above for Sports category.
- Screen test for admissions will be held on 30th June, 2008 (Monday). Second round will be held if required. Appearing in the screen test is mandatory for taking admissions through cultural quota.

Note: Admission on the basis of sports and ECAs would be strictly as per the University Letter No. Aca/Adm/UG/2008-09/70, dated 7th May, 2008.

10. Migration from Other Institutions

- (i) Migration to any of the courses in the first year and also from correspondence courses will not be allowed.
- (b) No migration, whatsoever may be the reason, will be entertained in the first year.

11. Gap Period

Admissions on the basis of Gap Period would be considered on individual merit and to the satisfaction of the college.

12. Relaxation for Girl Students

The College provides 5% relaxation on the aggregate marks to girl applicants for the purpose of seeking admission to all the courses except in professional courses.

IV. Eligibility Criterion cum Selection Procedure for Professional Courses

B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics

The underlying philosophy of B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics course has been to keep abreast of the changing scenario of globalization of business. The college strives to equip students with professional tools as well as management principles at graduation level itself and to impart sufficient knowledge in diverse fields of Economics, Statistics, Quantitative Techniques, Finance, International Trade, Computers, and Environmental Economics etc. This professional course aims to provide employment opportunities to the students in corporate houses, NGO's and research institutions and also to enable students to pursue higher studies in Economics, Management and Finance. The B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics programme comprises an integrated six semester module for three years.

Admission Procedure

Admission to the course is through a common admission test conducted by the Department of Business Economics, South Campus, University of Delhi. For eligibility criteria and other details, please refer to the University Bulletin.

(i) General Category: The candidate must have passed Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (10+2) of the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE), New Delhi with a pass in four subjects (English, Mathematics and two Elective Subjects) or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto, with 55% or more marks in the aggregate of these four subjects.

(ii) Reserved Category: For SC/ST and other special category reservations, please refer to the University Bulletin.

Issue of Prospectus

Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics is centralized. The Controller of Examinations/ Deputy Controller of Examinations, University of Delhi, South Campus will conduct the admission test with the help of the Department of Business Economics. The prospectus with the application form for admission test will be available from 1/06/2008 to 16/06/2008, during working hours, on submission of crossed bank draft/cash of Rs. 400.00 (Rs. 200.00 for SC/ST and other reserved category students except foreign students) in favour of the Director, UDSC (B.A.(H) Business Economics) payable at the State Bank of India Service Branch, New Delhi. The Prospectus along with the application form can also be obtained by post from the college by remitting a crossed bank draft of Rs. 400.00 payable at the above mentioned branch. A self addressed envelope of size (25 cm x 17 cm) with required postage stamp worth Rs. 50.00 should also be enclosed with the request.

Admission Test

Admission test will be conducted on Sunday, June 22, 2008 from 10.00 AM to 12.00 Noon.

Note: Bulletin of Entrance Examination 2008 for B.A. (H) Business Economics is available in the college w.e.f. June 2, 2008.

Course Structure

Activities of the Department of Business Economics

Seminars and Workshops

Regular seminars and workshops are an integral part of the department. The department invites experts from industry and academic world to express their views on contemporary issues and problems.

Industrial Visits

In order to expose the students to the actual working of the industry environment, the department organizes industrial visits, both local and outstation.

Placement and Summer Training

At the end of the second year the students are required to undertake practical training for a

period of six to eight weeks in a business, commercial, economic or research organizations. The department has a placement team whose job is to prepare a placement brochure and to search for companies willing to take the students in.

B.A. (Hons.) Social Work

The need and scope for employment of qualified professional social worker at the grass root level resulted in University of Delhi formulating the Hons. course at the undergraduate level in 1995. B. R. Ambedkar college had the honour of being the first and the only the co-educational college offerig this course.

Rationale and Scope

The rationale for the introduction of such course is to provide an in-depth understanding of the issues related to social welfare and development. The course is designed to develop grassroots level professionals with necessary knowledge of social issues, their understanding and right attitude to work with people at different levels. These professionals work for planning and implementing programmes in the areas of family and child welfare, adult education, health care, community health and nutrition, education, mental health, youth welfare, rural and urban development, environment, research and so on.

Social work professionals so trained work as programme officers, project coordinators, youth development officers in programmes and projects initiated by government/non-governmental organizations.

Admission Procedure

- 1. The candidate should have passed 10+2 or equivalent examination recognized by the University of Delhi in Arts or Science or Commerce.
- 2. Admission to this course shall be open to all students who (a) score at least 55% marks or above in the XII standard examination; and (b) the candidate will have to qualify the written test (2 hours duration) to be held on 26/6/2008 at 10.00 AM and appear in an interview at 11.00 AM on 28/6/2008 to be conducted by the college. The candidates are advised to see the result on the college website, www.brambedkarcollege.org, or at the college notice board on 1/07/2008 for the first list. The second list will be out on 8/07/2008, if vacant seats are still left.
- 3. Written Examination will broadly cover the following areas and will be of 10+2 level. Test papers are divided into following sections:

(a) General Awareness about non-governmental and governmental organizations (their functions and role for the society); (b) General Awareness (Common); (c) Social Awareness; (d) Test of Reasoning; and (e) Test of proficiency in English.

Field Work Components

1. **Orientation Programme:** An orientation programme will be organized at the commencement of the course for all the students before starting concurrent field work. Orientation provides

information regarding: (i) the importance and place of field work in the educational programme; and (ii) the purpose, functions and ethics in professional practice.

- 2. Concurrent Field Work: Field work is a vital component of the educational opportunity to be provided to students. The purpose of concurrent field work is to develop social consciousness, sensitivities to human needs and sufferings, and practice social work intervention by concretizing theory in practice.
- **3. Rural Camp:** In the II/III year, a rural camp of about 10 days is organized to expose students to socio-economic and cultural situations and problems of that area.
- 4. Block Placement (after final year examination): At the end of the third year, students will be required to undertake four weeks of block field work in institutions/organizations. This is meant to provide them pre-employment experience. Successful completion of block placement is mandatory for obtaining the degree in B.A. (Hons.) Social Work.

Attendance: Eighty per cent (80%) attendance in the field work and seventy five per cent (75%) attendance in theory classes is compulsory.

Educational Enrichment Programme: The department organizes Group Conference; Skill Building Programme; Institutional Visits and Visits to Industries; Orientation Programme; Seminars and Workshops; Extension Projects; Voluntary Work during Vacations; and Mentoring Students

Placement Cell: The department publishes a placement brochure profiling the graduating students. It helps the students in job placement with national and international NGOs as well as government organizations.

Students' Activities

- (i) Students of social work have formed a club **Sankalp** through which they organize activities like seminars, quizzes, debates and outings.
- (ii) Students publish an annual newsletter titled **Endeavour** under the faculty guidance.
- (iii) Felicity is an annual festival organized by Sankalp and the department .Through this an effort is made to bring all aspiring social workers of Delhi on a common platform for reflecting on current social issues and problems.

प्रथम, द्वितीय एवं तृतीय वर्ष के पाठ्यक्रम की अवधि समाप्त होने के बाद विद्यार्थियों को विभिन्न संगठनों, जनसंचार माध्यमों में 15 मई से 30 जून तक वार्षिक प्रशिक्षण कार्य (इण्टर्नशिप) करना होगा। प्रशिक्षण के बाद विद्यार्थियों को अपने कार्यानुभवों का प्रतिवेदन एवं प्रशिक्षण संगठन से प्राप्त प्रमाण पत्र महाविद्यालय में देना होगा। प्रशिक्षण के आधार पर आंतरिक मूल्यांकन होगा। प्रथम वर्ष के लिए 30 अंक, द्वितीय वर्ष के लिए 30 अंक और तृतीय वर्ष के लिए 40 अंक निर्धारित हैं जो मूल्यांकन के पश्चात दिल्ली विश्वविद्यालय को भेजे जाएंगे। विद्यार्थियों को प्रायः निम्नलिखित मीडिया संगठनों में वार्षिक प्रशिक्षण पर भेजा जाता है:

इसके अतिरिक्त विद्यार्थियों को जनसंचार एवं पत्रकारिता से संबद्ध तकनीकी एजेंसियों एवं व्यवहारिक जानकारियां देने के लिए विशेषज्ञ वक्ता आमंत्रित किए जाते हैं। पत्रकारिता के विद्यार्थियों को विभिन्न-समाचार एजेंसियों, फ़ोटो फ़िल्म प्रभाग तथा न्यूज़ चैनलों में 45 दिनों का प्रशिक्षण भी दिलाया जाता है। प्रशिक्षण हेतु प्रथम, द्वितीय एवं तृतीय वर्ष के उन्हीं छात्र-छात्राओं को भेजा जाएगा जिनकी कक्षा में उपस्थिति 67% होगी।

चेतना पत्रकारिता मंच: इस मंच के माध्यम से पत्रकारिता के विद्यार्थी अपनी जागरूकता एवं रुचि के अनुसार महत्त्वपूर्ण समसामयिक मुद्दों पर वाद-विवाद करते हैं। इस मंच का उद्देश्य विद्यार्थियों में छिपी प्रतिभा को विकसित करना है।

B.A. (Hons.) Applied Psychology

The Applied Psychology (Hons.) course offers useful insights into human behaviour and psyche in individual as well as group situations. Apart from providing a solid grounding in the theoretical aspects of the discipline of psychology, an equal emphasis is laid on practical application of the theories and principles of psychology to everyday life situations in various arenas. The course is adequately supported by practicum related to all main papers where training and experience is provided to the students in laboratory methods as well as field work in form of field visits and research projects. Applied Psychology is a sunrise field and there is a rising demand of Psychology professionals in various fields and settings such schools, hospitals, NGOs and corporate organizations. It is a rich and diverse field with many useful branches like social psychology, industrial and organizational psychology and clinical psychology and various other interesting and lucrative sub fields.

V. Detailed Courses of Study

B.A. Programme

The University of Delhi has restructured its B.A. Programme with a view to providing a general understanding and foundation in Humanities. Thus at the under-Graduate level the course becomes relevant to the immediate environment of social opportunities while at the same time giving the student the basic intellectual equipment expected of a programme of higher education. The structure contents of the programme make it an integrated and interdisciplinary programme with flexibility and choice.

The B.A. Programme will have 12 courses over a period of three years with 04 courses taught and examined each year. There are four types of courses: **Discipline, Language, Foundation and Application.** The foundation courses will be taught in the second year and the application courses in the third year. The new space technologies, GIS (Geographic Information System) and Remote Sensing are apt tools in the hands of geographers. Besides, the students of geography have opportunities in the field of environmental sciences, regional planning, agriculture and land use planning, town and country planning, tourism management, and in the institutions of socio-economic analyses etc. It is also suitable for students desiring to opt for administrative jobs.

Concurrent Courses for Students of all B.A. (Hons.)

All student of restructured B.A. (Hons.) Social Sciences and Humanities Programme are required to take up a total of five Concurrent Courses.

The concurrent courses have four components:

1. Language Credit Course; (2) Qualifying Course; (3) Interdisciplinary Course; and (4) Discipline Centred Course

Marks

Each course carries 50 marks, 38 marks for annual examination and 12 marks for internal

assessments; The pass marks for the credit courses is 40 percent; and The pass mark for the qualifying courses is 36 percent. A student has to pass in the qualifying course to be eligible for Honours degree; however, the marks in this course will not be counted in the final division awarded.

Internal Assessments will be held for credit but not for the qualifying course. **Note:** In the first year a student shall offer 1, 2 and 3; and in the second year a student shall offer two discipline centred courses out of the various options provided.

Entrance Test Fee

An amount of Rs. 200.00 as entrance test fee in cash is to be deposited in the college along with the application form for Social Work (Rs. 100.00 in the case of SC/ST, OBC and PH candidates). For B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics Prospectus and Entrance Test fee shall be charged as per the University rates.

Fees on account of University Examination will be charges on the dates notified on the notice board. Names of students who fail to make payment of dues up to the last date notified shall be removed from the college roll. However, such a student may be re-admitted at the discretion of the Principal on a written request along with requisite readmission fee in each case.

Refund of Fee on Withdrawal/Cancellation of Admission or Migration

A student wishing to withdraw his/her name from the college must do so formally in writing. He/She is liable to pay all fees and other dues until his/her name has been formally withdrawn. Identity Card and Library Tickets must be surrendered at the time of withdrawal from the college failing which a penalty will be charged.

All India Entrance Scholarships

The University will hold a competitive examination in Delhi in the month of October each year for the award of All India Entrance Scholarships which will be fifty in number of the value of Rs. 250.00 (Rupees two hundred and fifty only) per month each tenable for three years for pursuing a course of study for Honours degree in this University.

The competition will be open to the students who have passed the Senior School Certificate Examination (under 10+2 pattern of education) from the Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi or an examination equivalent thereto with 55% marks in aggregate in the year when the All India Entrance Scholarships Examination is held.

The last date for the receipt of application will be 1st September each year. Other details may be had from the respective colleges or from the Examination Branch VII (i) (Main University Campus), Room No. 61 on any working day between 9.30 AM and 12.30 PM after 1st August each year. The examination forms shall be accepted from the eligible candidates along with an examination fee of Rs. 50.

VII. College Infrastructure

Computer Lab

The college has developed a computer lab which started functioning in 2005. It now has facility of scanning, digital voice recording and internet connectivity. Presently the internet is provided through a broadband connection and a radio link tower installed within the college premises and University of Delhi has released the frequency. All operational units of the college are fully networked with CAT-5 cable with the access to internet facility.

The college has a website, <u>www.brambedkarcollege.org</u>, which is regularly updated.Students are encouraged to use the computer lab facility. All faculty members have been given e-mail IDs on the college website account. The college is making efforts to make the computerized environment more user-friendly, Softwares, maintain students' record and salaries of employees.

Library

Any academic institution would remain incomplete without a well stocked and updated library. Our College has an independent two storey library wing which has adequately spaced stacks, a good reading area and houses around 18,000 books. Besides, we have current and previous issues of relevant nationally and internationally published journals and magazines like Business India, Computers Today, Economic and Political Weekly, India Today, National Geographic, Outlook, Frontline, Reader's Digest, Sportstar, Time, Taipei Review, to name a few. In Hindi we have journals like Aajkal, Hans, India Today, Kurukshetra, Kadambini, Manushi, Mukta, and Yojana among others.



The college library has been completely computerized. The library-card provided to students is non-transferable. A copy of library rules and regulations is displayed on the notice board for the benefit of students.

Seminar Hall

The college has a seminar hall with a capacity of 250. It frequently hosts seminars, workshops, lectures and debates on different topics and subjects.

Canteen

Canteen is an important place for the students to sit and interact and discuss things with each other in an informal manner. Efforts are made to provide quality food at affordable prices. The Canteen with seating space for around 100 people is common for teachers, staff and students.

Photostat

The college provides Photostat facility inside the campus. It ensures quality service at reasonable rates.

Bank

The Oriental Bank of Commerce has its computerized branch within the college premises providing banking facilities to the teaching and non-teaching staff, students of the college and residents of this area. The college is also planning to provide ATM facility.

Power Back-up

The college has full power back-up through two 125 KVA and 62 KVA generator sets.

Medical Facility

The facility of WUS Health Centre (East Campus) has been provided in the residential campus of the college. The centre caters to the needs of the university employees residing in the trans-Yamuna area. First-Aid facility is available free of cost to the college students. Students desirous of availing medical facilities of the University Health Centre should get in touch with the WUS Health Centre .

VIII. Learning Beyond the Classroom: Towards a Holistic Development

Classroom learning is a vital component of a student's life. But since the college has chosen overall development of young minds as its mission, we try to provide multifarious opportunities to foster their individual and collective potential for a growth towards excellence. Various departments organize academic and co-curricular activities like quizzes, debates, presentations, writing skill competitions etc., at the inter-college level.

Both the English and Hindi departments have separately instituted a running trophy for inter-

college debate competitions. The Economics department organizes an annual inter-college quiz competition Jigyasa for their running trophy Kautilya.

Professional courses organize various seminars, workshops and lectures inviting eminent academicians and experts from different fields, enabling the students to interact with them, and get a good insight of the work/professional sector for which they are preparing themselves. Intellectual stimulation apart, interdisciplinary cultural and sporting activities etc., intersperse the academic curricula to channelize the creative and physical talent and potential of students. There are ample opportunities for them to compete at the inter-college, intra-College and national levels.

IX. Campus Life: Information and Guidelines

College Session

The academic session of the college will commence on 16th July 2008 at 9 .00 A.M. All First year students are advised to assemble in the Teaching Block at 11.00 A.M on 16th July for Principal's Welcome Address and an Orientation Programme.

Identity card

Every student of the college should contact the S.O. (Admin.) for his/her identity card. He/She is expected to carry it at all times while in the college and has to produce the same whenever required to do so by the authorized staff members of the college.

Attendance

In order to appear at University examination, every student has to attend at least two- third of the total number of lectures /tutorials /preceptorials and three- fourth for practicals of the total classes held during the academic year. Attendance for tutorials/preceptorials is given only when a student submits a written assignment. He/she is advised to be regular throughout the year. In case of sickness, students are advised to submit their medical certificates in the college office immediately on the rejoining after recovery failing which no medical certificate on grounds whatsoever will be entertained. No relaxation in attendance is given to any student at the end of the year except in case of extremely deserving cases. Admit card may be issued as per the decision of the college. The college reserves the right to impose the critical minimum attendance percentage and to allow the benefit of attaining eligibility on the basis of medical certificate.

House Examination

The college conducts house examination examination in the month of December/January which is compulsory for every student. This examination forms part of the internal assessment of the student. The college reserves the right not to allow such a student to appear in the University exam if he/she does not clear or absents the house examination. Such a student will automatically be disqualified from the Principals Trophy or the Best Student Award etc.

Prizes are awarded in the Annual Day function of the college to the toppers of each course in the

house examination. Duly checked answer scripts will be returned to students with critical comments by the teachers for further guidance.

Internal Assessment

25% of the maximum marks in each paper (theory and practical) will be assigned for internal assessment on a continual basis and the remaining 75% marks for Annual/Semester University Examination. Such an assessment is based on house examination, assignment/tutorials/seminars/tests, and attendance as follows:

- 1) Out of the 25 marks for the internal assessment, 10% weightage will be assigned to House Examinations to be conducted by the College for all papers of all courses.
- 2) Each student shall be assessed on the basis of written assignment/tutorials/ project reports/ term papers/seminars and 10% weightage shall be given.

3)	Weightage of Attendance would be as follows:		
	i) 67% or more but less than 70% of the total lectures held	-	1 mark
	ii) 70% or more but less than 75%	-	2 marks
	iii) 75% or more but less than 80%	-	3 marks
	iv) 80% or more but less than 85%	-	4 marks

Discipline

Our college is well known for maintainingits discipline, which has especially been appreciated by parents of girl students. The Proctorial Board/Joint Consultative Committee mainly functions to promote a healthy atmosphere and calm environment in the college. Students should note that the following aspects of conduct will be regarded as breach of discipline or interference in the normal working of the college.

- Negligence towards assigned tasks and class work;
- Causing disturbance to a class or shouting and loitering in the college premises;
- Defiance to teachers or any of college authorities or any disorderly behaviour;
- **Misconduct** in the classroom, causing damage to furniture or equipment or any other college property;
- Inciting others to create trouble, teasing, using language of insubordination;
- **Smoking** in the college premises;
- Practising **ragging**, forming a Society without the permission of the Principal and collecting money from the fellow students;
- Use of mobile phone inside the teaching block and listening to the music aloud.
- Any other act prescribed by the Proctorial Board/Principal from time to time.

If a student violates any of the rules and breaks the discipline, action may involve warning and/ or fine and/or suspension from classes or library or even debarring from the examination as decided by the Proctorial Board/Principal/University in the light of Ordinance XV (B) and XV (D) of the rules of the University of Delhi.



With regard to issues of indiscipline, ragging and sexual harassment, the college shall follow the University ordinances in letter and spirit. A brief summary of these ordinances is given hereunder:

Ordinance XV-B: Maintenance of Discipline among Students of the University

- 1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested with the Vice-Chancellor.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
- 3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance, the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - (a) physical assault, or threat to use physical force against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution/Department and against any student within the University of Delhi;
 - (b) carrying of, use of, or threat to use of any weapons;
 - (c) any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976;
 - (d) violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes.
 - (e) any practice whether verbal or otherwise derogatory of women;
 - (f) attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner;
 - (g) wilful destruction of institutional property;
 - (h) creating, ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal ground;
 - (i) causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the College;
 - (j) ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
- 4. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students:
 - (a) be expelled; or
 - (b) be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - (c) be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a college, Department or institution of the University; or
 - (d) be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - (e) be debarred from taking a University or college or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or
 - (f) that the result of the student concerned in the Examination or Examination in which he/ she or they have appeared be cancelled.
- 5. The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Deans of the Faculties, Heads of Teaching Departments in the University, the Principal, School of Correspondence Courses and Continuing Education and Librarian shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments in the

University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to, such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.

- 6. Without prejudices to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Head of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of teaching Department in the University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
- 7. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and the several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances, and the Rules that have been framed thereunder by the University.

Ordinance XV-C: Prohibition of and Punishment for Ragging

- 1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
- 2. Any individual or collective act or practice or ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
- 3. Ragging for the purposes of the Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students and includes individual or collective acts or practices which;
 - (a) involve physical assault or threat, use of physical force;
 - (b) violate the status, dignity and honour of women students;
 - (c) violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the schedules castes and tribes;
 - (d) expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self esteem;
 - (e) entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
- 4. The Principals of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of Colleges, of University Hostels or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence or ragging.
- 5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also *suo moto* enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
- 6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
- 7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied

that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.

- 8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
- 9. On the receipt of report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under Clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incident described in clause (3) (a), (b) and (c); the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
- 10. The Vice-Chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period admitted to a course of study in a college, Departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
- 11. In case any students who have obtained degrees of Delhi University are found guilty under this Ordinance appropriate action under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees conferred by the University shall be initiated.
- 12. For the purpose of the Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
- 13. All institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions/ directions issued under this ordinance, and to give aid and assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective Implementation of the Ordinance.

Note: Order of the Vice-Chancellor in Pursuance of Ordinance XV (C) is also applicable.

Ordinance XV (D): Prohibition of and Punishment for Sexual Harassment

1. Short Title and Extent

The present ordinance is based on the Policy against Sexual Harassment by the Delhi University and seeks to maintain and create an academic and work environment free of sexual harassment for students, academic and non-teaching staff of the Delhi University. The ordinance will also apply to outsiders and residents, on the Delhi University campus, to the extent specified herein these rule and procedures.

2. Definitions

- (i). "Students" includes regular students as well as current ex-students of Delhi University.
- (ii). "Teaching Staff" include any person on the staff of the Delhi University or any colleges or institution affiliated to it, who is appointed to a teaching and/or research post, whether full time, temporary, ad-hoc, part-time, visiting, honorary, or on special duty or deputation and shall also include employees employed on a casual or project basis.
- (iii). "Non-Teaching Staff" includes any person on the staff of the Delhi University or of any colleges

or institutions affiliated to it, who is not included in the teaching staff. It includes employees who are fulltime, temporary, ad-hoc, part-time, visiting, honorary, or on special duty or deputation, and employees employed on a casual or project basis.

- (iv). "Member of the University" includes all those included in category i-iii above.
- (v). "Resident" includes any person who is a temporary or permanent resident of any of the accommodations or premises allotted to an employee by the University of Delhi or by any of its affiliated colleges or institutions.
- (vi). "Outsider" includes any person who is not a member of the University or a resident. It also includes, but is not limited to, any private person offering residential, food and other facilities to students, teaching staff or non-teaching staff of the Delhi University or any college or institution affiliated to Delhi University.
- (vii). "Campus" includes all places of work and residence in the Delhi University or any college or institutions affiliated to the Delhi University. It includes all places of instruction, research and administration, as well as hostel, health centres, sports grounds, staff quarters and public places (including shopping centres, eating places, park, streets and lanes) on the Delhi University campus or the campus of any college or institution affiliated to the Delhi University.
- (viii). "Sexual harassment" includes any unwelcome sexually determined behaviour, whether directly or by implication and includes physical contact and advances, a demand or request for sexual favours, sexually-coloured remarks, showing pornography or any other unwelcome physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct of sexual nature.

Explanation: "Sexual harassment" shall include, but will not be confined to, the following.

- (a) When submission to unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favours, and verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature are made, either implicitly or explicitly, a ground for any decision relating to employment, academic performance, extracurricular activities, or entitlement to services or opportunities at the Delhi University.
- (b) When unwelcome sexual advances, and verbal, non-verbal and/or physical conduct such as loaded comments, remarks or jokes, letters, phone calls or e-mail, gestures, exhibition of pornography, lurid stares, physical contact, stalking, sounds or display of a derogatory nature have the purpose and/or effect of interfering with an individual's performance or of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment.
- (c) When a person uses, with a sexual purpose, the body or any part of it or any object as an extension of the body in relation to another person without the latter's consent or against the person's will, such conduct will amount to sexual assault.
- (d) When deprecatory comments, conduct or any such behaviour is based on the gender identity/ sexual orientation of the person and/or when the classroom or other public forum of the University is used to denigrate/discriminate against a person or create a hostile environment on the basis of a person's gender identity/sexual orientation.

3. Scope of the Ordinance

This Ordinance shall be applicable to all complaints of sexual harassment made:

- (i). by a member of the university against any other member of the University irrespective of whether the harassment is alleged to have taken place within or outside the campus.
- (ii). by a resident against a member of the university or by a member against a resident irrespective of whether the sexual harassment is alleged to have taken place within or outside the campus.
- (iii). by an outsider against a member of the University or by a member of the university against an outsider if the sexual harassment is alleged to have taken place within the campus.
- (iv). by a member of the university, against an outsider if the sexual harassment is alleged to have taken place outside the campus. In such cases the Committee shall recommend that the university/ college authorities initiate action by making a complaint with the appropriate authority. Further the committee will actively assist and provide available resources to the complainant in pursuing the complaint.

Ban on Collection of Funds and Seeking Sponsorship

Students of the college including sports persons, office bearers of Students' Council and Academic Societies are not authorized to collect any money or seek sponsorship directly or indirectly from a company or public in any manner on behalf of the college. Any violation of this rule by a student will be treated as breach of discipline and shall attract severe punishment including removal from the elected post and/or expulsion from the college and/or debarring from University exam etc.

College Students' Council

Bhim Rao Ambedkar College has a very dynamic and active Students' Council .The council is elected by students through common franchise. Under the guidance of the faculty members, it organizes various activities of the college. The Committees of Staff Council will nominate the Cultural and Sports Secretaries. One seat out of four posts – President, Vice President, Secretary and Joint Secretary– will be reserved for girl student. All office bearers will hold office till 30th April 2009 in normal course, provided they do not suffer from any disqualification during their term of office.

General Rules of Election to College Students' Council

As per guidelines provided by the Hon'ble Supreme Court regarding Model Code of Conduct for DUSU Elections and the College Staff Council following rules will be implemented in future regarding college Students' Council elections:

Eligibility Criteria for Seeking Election

- 1. Undergraduate students under the age of 17 and 22 may contest the elections.
- 2. The candidate should in no event have any academic arrears in the year of contesting the election.
- 3. The candidate should have attained a minimum of 75% attendance.

- 4. The candidate shall have only one opportunity in all to contest for the post of office bearer. The candidate must be enrolled in a regular, full-time course of the college and must have paid all dues towards the college by the date of scrutiny of nomination forms.
- 5. The candidate should neither have a previous criminal record nor should have been subjected to any disciplinary action by the college/University authorities.
- 6. The candidate should not possess any other ground which may be deemed as disqualification by the college and Model Code of Conduct of DUSU Election.

2. Election Related Expenditure

- 1. The maximum permitted limit of expenditure for a candidate shall be Rs. 5000.00.
- 2. Each candidate shall within two weeks of the declaration of results submit complete and audited accounts to the college authorities. The college shall publish all audited accounts within two days of the submission of such accounts through a suitable medium so that any member of the student body may freely examine the same.
- 3. The candidates are specially barred from utilizing funds from any sources other than voluntary contributions from the students' body.
- 4. The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any non-compliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.

Grievances Redressal Cell

There is a Grievances Redressal Cell, a regular unit of the College, mandated with the redressal of the election of the college Students' Council.

Games and Sports

An activity that inculcates discipline, physical power and agility is obviously important for young growing minds. Making sports activities and games a way of life would immensely increase the intellectual output and prepare the person to work well even under pressure. Our students have been competing at the university level, national level, and international levels. The activities include cross country, athletics, archery, soft ball, swimming, volley ball, hand ball, table tennis, chess, badminton, football, judo etc. The college has developed its hockey, basketball, football and badminton courts.

Cultural Activities

B R Ambedkar College, with its vision to attain the epitome of cultural excellence, gives its students the appropriate and guided exposure to various art forms including dance, music and drama. Students excel in their respective fields and win accolade in intra and inter-college competitions. Our Annual Cultural festival **Chetna** is one such event which gives a platform to such hidden talents.

College Magazine

The college publishes its annual magazine **Chetna** by inviting articles on wide ranging issues from students, helping them to cultivate writing and literary tastes and to encourage creative articulation. The magazine provides a forum in which they can express their ideas in their respective fields of interest. The youthful spirit seeks and defines itself by articulating and responding to the world around. Students

are advised to contribute their original writings for the magazine.

The college is planning to start a Journal of Contemporary Issues related to social sciences, commerce, languages etc., to replace the earlier Hindi monthly magazine titled Samay Sarokar. The publication of this magazine is expected to be unique as it would encourage students and teachers to contribute, and will also include write ups from distinguished personalities and subject experts.

NCC-(Army and Naval Wing)

Under the guidance and motivation of Commander (Dr.) R. B. Solanki and Capt. (Dr.) M. S. Vats, students opting for NCC get a chance to actively participate in various activities like Horse Riding, Rock Climbing, Trekking, Mounteering, Para Sailing, Rafting Regetta etc. They are trained and further encouraged to participate in Chief Minister's and Prime Minister's rally, Basic Leadership Camp, Republic Day Parade etc. to build up a strong and healthy body, but also to discipline the mind and preparing for future challenge.

NSS

National Service Scheme (NSS) aims at inculcating the spirit of voluntary work among students and teachers through sustained community interactions and development. It brings the academic elite closer to the society. It shows how to combine knowledge and action to achieve results which are conducive to community development. Over the years, the NSS unit of the College has emerged as a modest but credible linkage involving some 200 to 225 student volunteers in tasks of social service including programmes for educational, cultural, social, moral, and economic reconstruction of the surrounding locality. The college unit in collaboration with Jan Shiksha Sansthan, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India runs a vocational programme free of cost to impart this training to women and children of weaker sections of the local residents. Special camps are organized and programmes like blood donation camps, cleanliness and sanitation drives are undertaken.

Green Cadets

Green Cadets is a programme through which the college aims to build up a team of students who would be trained as socially commited action-oriented resource persons for spreading awareness, promoting nature, and directly working for an efficient management of environment and natural resources and their further sustainability within the college and outside. The training module of the Green Cadets will include awareness sessions, skill building workshops, movie screening and practical training programmes.

Women Empowerment through Self Defence and Gender Sensitization

Girl students of the college are encouraged to undertake three-weeks' self-defence training programme under the guidance of Crime Against Women Cell, Delhi Police and also participate in such seminar/Workshop which relate to women development

Placement Centre

This unit undertakes activities to facilitate a platform for various job-providing agencies/ companies visiting the college.

Alumni Club

The College has an Alumni Club of all the pass out students. It organizes and coordinates all alumnae activities. The aims and objectives of the Alumni Club include:

- To establish and maintain contact amongst ex-students and teachers, both of present and retired.
- To foster a feeling of brotherhood and maintain friendship between old students and staff to promote the spirit of mutual helpfulness amongst them.
- To do all such things as may be deemed proper by the club to help, assist and promote the best interests of the college.

IGNOU Centre (0718)

Toppers of the Year 2006-2007

Bhim Rao Ambedkar College is running a study centre of IGNOU since 1992-93. About 1200 students take admission in different streams like M.A. Hindi, M.A. English, P.G.D.T., M.T.M, B.T.S., D.T.S., B.D.P., D.C.E., B.S.W., etc. Classes for these courses are held in the college during vacations and on weekends.

The college runs a Certificate Course of Delhi University in Russian Language.
