#### **CANOE '09 HOLDS TWO SUCCESSFUL PUBLIC MEETINGS**

Canoe'09 held two public meetings, at the Owl's Club on Tuesday March 24th and at the Findlay Community Centre, Thursday March 26th. In all, more than 90 people attended. Both meetings started with a presentation of the event by Chair Chris Keevill and Communications Chair Stacey Jones-Oxner.

Following the presentation breakout sessions were held where the public was invited to approach Canoe '09 Chairs and Coordinators in the area of facilities, transportation and volunteers. Representatives from Halifax Regional Municipality were also on hand to answer questions about improvement made in and around the lake for Canoe '09.

For those who wanted to get involved with the Championships the Volunteer and Women's Canoe Billet program were of significant interest. The event will require up to 800 volunteers and Jill Knowles, Canoe '09 Volunteer Coordinator, was on site to ensure

that current and perspective volunteer questions were answered. Those interested in billeting a women's canoe athlete for a 2-week period were striking up conversations with Elaine Keene Canoe '09's Women's Cane Coordinator. This year women's canoe races will be exhibition but Canoe '09 has just received word that in 2010 Women's C-1 200m will be a full medal, full point event.

For most in attendance, road closures and upgrades around the lake were of primary interest. Construction will begin during the first or second week in May and end on or about July 24th. Birch Cove, the park surrounding the Judge's Tower, Lion's Beach, the corner of Prince Albert Rd and Nowlan St. and the parking lot next to Mic Mac AAC along Prince Albert Road will receive the most significant upgrades. During construction these areas may be closed to the public. Birch Cove, which hasn't had a major upgrade in more than 20 years, will be closed for the duration of the summer, but will re-open after the World Canoe Championships as an upgraded and enhanced park for public use.

"We are thrilled that so many residents and community members were present at our two public meetings," said Canoe '09 Chair Chris Keevill. "This will be the premier event in 2009 for all of Atlantic Canada and we want everyone to get involved and come out to witness the fastest paddlers on earth"



#### Canoe '09 Race Course Updates Underway

People have been racing on Lake Banook for hundred of years. Over the years, the course has taken on many different forms. Early races were probably used trees as start and finish lines, with distances decided upon moments before a race. As time went by, the course evolved into today's world class venue. However, to keep the course current with world standards, it needs substantial work. Starting in fall 2008 and continuing in spring 2009, crews have been hard at work, under the guidance of Race Course Engineer Fred Van Horne to ensure improvements to Lake Banook's course are completed on time. When the work is complete, our course will be the envy of the world paddling community and will be Canoe '09's legacy for years to come.



#### Major upgrades include:

- New concrete abutments at the 1000m, 500m, 200m and Finish points
- Clearing of debris around abutments
- 10 new lane wires
- 4 new cross wires
- 800 new buoys
