Their life stories are also about adjusting to life in the American landscape (which can sometimes be insensitive to or obsessed with race and identity). Of interest to Jewish readers is the story: 'What Color is Jesus', by James McBride. Both his biological father and step-father were African-American while his mother is a Polish Jew, the eldest daughter of an Orthodox rabbi.

A first-person account of the experiences of Marcia Freedman, a U.S.-born feminist who became a founding member of Israel's women's movement, a member of the Knesset and came out as a lesbian to her husband and young daughter after 13 years of marriage. Making aliyah in 1967, Freedman returned to the U.S. in 1981, convinced her lesbianism and peace activism could not be tolerated in Israel.

Independence Park, Tel Aviv and Independence Park, in Jerusalem are well-known meeting places for gay men in Israel. The book also pick up independence as the theme of the collection of narratives told by twelve gay men from a cross-section of contemporary Israeli society. The speakers are Jewish and Arab, ranging in age from 22 to 72 and speak about their family backgrounds and early childhood memories including their first stirrings of sexuality and responses to those feelings.

This guide will help parents navigate the challenges of connecting with a GLBTQ child and becoming an integral and supportive part of that child's life. The book is especially notable for its chapters on transgender issues and multicultural issues. There is also a chapter on youth questioning their sexuality (straight and gay and in-between), and how parents can be supportive in that as well.

extend death benefits to each other.

This paperback book is written by kids for kids. It reflects the "thoughts, feelings, and experiences of children, adolescents, and young adults who have a gay or lesbian parent." Issues such as homophobia, discrimination, shame and struggle in coping with being different are common themes and each kid has a different important and valuable story to tell. Out of the Ordinary: Essays on Growing Up with Gay, Lesbian and Transgender Parents A collection of essays edited by Noelle Howey and Ellen Samuels, which talks from the heart about the experience of growing up with Gay, Lesbian and Transsexual parents. Some of the stories are easy to relate to while others are a bit unusual (such as those with transgender parents) and really make us think hard about what it means to be an inclusive family. There is one chapter, Rites of Passage, by Daniel Belasco, A Jewish teenager talks about his Lesbian mom, her partner, a Rabbi, and how they all integrated into Jewish society at large and within their own family.

Gays and the Holocaust

Bent

This play (also later a movie) is about Max, who is gay man in Nazi Germany. Max is sent to Dachau concentration camp under the Nazi regime. He tries to deny he is gay and gets a yellow label (the one for Jews) instead of pink (the one for gays). In camp he falls in love with his fellow prisoner Horst, who wears his pink label with pride. *Bent* debuted onstage at The Royal National Theatre in 1979 with Ian McKellen starring in the London production and Richard Gere in its later Broadway version. The play raised awareness about how Hitler used Paragraph 175, a largely ignored German law making homosexuality a criminal offense. The movie of the play can be rented or purchased. Men with Pink Triangles: The True Life-and-Death Story of Homosexuals in Nazi Death Camps

This is a life-and-death story of homosexual prisoners in the Nazi concentration camps of World War II. Very little has been written before on this subject as discrimination against homosexuals continued into the 1970's and many prisoners, once released from the camps (if lucky enough to have survived them), were re-imprisoned. It is a graphic book, but important reading of those nightmarish years. The Advocate rated this "One of the Ten Best Books of the Year".

Paragraph 175

This movie is set in 1920's Berlin, known as a homosexual Eden, where gay men and lesbians lived relatively open lives. With the rise of the Nazis, all this changed. Between 1933 and 1945, 100,000 men were arrested for homosexuality under Paragraph 175. Some were imprisoned, others were sent to concentration camps. Of the latter, only about 4,000 survived. In 2000, fewer than ten of these men were known to be living. Five of them told their stories for the first time in the film.
