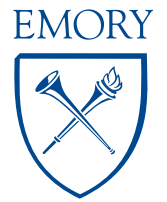

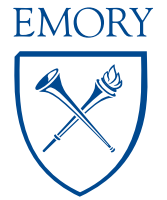

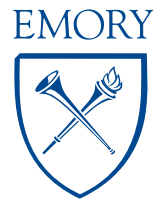

head coach **sonny travis**



Sonny Travis was named head coach of the Emory men's soccer program in July 2007.

During his first season with the Eagles, Travis led the Eagles to a 16-3-0 record and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. He won the 300th match of his career during the Eagles' 4-0 win over Heidelberg College (Ohio), on September 15, 2007, becoming the 27th Division III head coach to do so. The win came at the Adidas Invitational, hosted by Center College (Ky.), where Travis began his coaching career. Emory finished the 2007 campaign ranked 13th in the nation, the highest final ranking in Emory history.

In 22 years of coaching at the Division III level, Travis has a career ledger of 310-95-37. Entering the 2008 season, his .743 career winning percentage ranks him 33rd among all-NCAA Division coaches all time, and 14th among Division III coaches all time. His 310 victories are the 23rd-most in Division III history, and 19th among active Division III coaches.

Travis came to the Eagles' program after an extremely successful 18-year stint with the Virginia Wesleyan program. During his tenure, he established himself as the school's all-time winningest coach with a record of 270-74-31. He directed Virginia Wesleyan to 13 NCAA appearances, including four this decade (2000, 2003, 2005, 2006), and eight Old Dominion Athletic Conference championships. He had three of his squads advance to the NCAA Tournament's Final 16. He had been honored as the "Coach of the Year" on 15 occasions including five ODAC Conference selections. Travis was the head men's soccer coach at Virginia Wesleyan since 1989 and school's athletic director since 1999 before leaving for Emory. His career also includes a three-year stay at Centre College (1986-89).

Travis holds a Class "A" license with the United States Soccer Federation as well as an NSCAA Premier Diploma. He serves as a state or district Olympic Development Program coach in three states and is presently on the Virginia Coaching Education Staff for licensing coaches at the USSF "D" and National "C" courses conducted in Virginia.

Travis played collegiately at Slippery Rock University where he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and health in 1977. He obtained his master's degree in physical education/sports administration concentration from the University of North Carolina in 1980.

assistant coach jacques edeline

Jacques Edeline was appointed assistant coach of the Emory men's soccer program in August 2007.

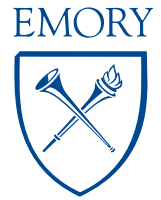
Edeline is a familiar face to the Emory program, having played for the Eagles during the 2002–2005 seasons. During his career, he appeared in 73 games, 60 as a starter, and totaled 15 goals and 14 assists for 44 points. He served as captain of the 2005 squad and was a member of two teams that made appearances in the NCAA Tournament. Edeline distinguished himself in the classroom as well, earning All-University Athletic Association academic honors all four years of his collegiate career.

Edeline has seven years of coaching and instructional experience working at the camp and club levels and has served as community coach for the boy's varsity team at Decatur High School. He recently obtained his USSF "C" License.

"I feel fortunate to have Jacques as an assistant coach," Head Coach Sonny Travis said. "I have had the opportunity to work with him as various camps and was impressed with him. In addition, the fact that he was a former captain at Emory shows his leadership potential."

Edeline, a native of Avondale Estates, attended St. Pius High School where he was a member of state championships teams in 1999 and 2001. He earned his bachelor's degree from Emory in history.





2008 outlook



By all accounts, Sonny Travis' first year as the head coach of the Emory men's soccer team was a successful one, both personally, and for his team. Travis became just the 27th coach in NCAA Division III history to win 300 career games, while helping his new squad to a 16-3-0 record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament. However, it might be the Eagles' last-minute, tough-luck loss to the University of Redlands (Calif.) during last year's NCAA Tournament that will push Travis' veteran Emory squad to take the next step forward in 2008.

"I know [the loss] fuels me, and I believe it is going to fuel the senior class especially, because they know this is it and they can't have any regrets," said Travis. "They have to go as hard as they can this year and realize every game is important."

Twenty of the 28 players on the team's 2008 roster have at least a year of experience in an Emory uniform, including 11 players who will be entering their senior season.

"Knowing these guys from last year, we can take them a step further because of their experience," said Travis. "We also have some good underclassmen that are just waiting for their chance to start. I think the team depth is going to be excellent."

Headlining Emory's offense will be returning first team all-American and University Athletic Association (UAA) Most Valuable Player Patrick Carver. The senior forward led the team with 16 goals and 41 points last season and currently sits eighth on the Eagles' career scoring list with 94 points. Emory's co-captain is just four points shy of becoming the seventh Eagle, and the first since Matthew Levine in 2003, to break the 100-career point mark.

Carver will once again be partnered with senior forward Patrick McFarland, who paced the team with 12 assists last season, to go along with his 12 goals. Sophomore Michael Scannapieco, who scored five goals in 2007, along with freshman Ben Schlang and junior Gary Smith will provide depth to the Eagles fast-attacking offense.

The Eagles will bring back three starting midfielders in 2008, as Joey Howie, Marc Del Marmol, and Jack Eisen-Markowitz are all returning for their senior seasons. Howie finished third on the team with 17 points last season, while Eisen-Markowitz added 12 points of

his own. Del Marmol, an all-UAA and South Region second team honoree, will once again look to assist the Eagles' backfield at the defensive midfield position. Likely to fill the remaining midfield position will be sophomore transfer Christopher Howie (younger brother of Joey), who comes to Emory after a season at Division I Georgia State University. Senior John Darsie, junior Sutton Freedman, and sophomore Graham Dekeyser will provide experience off the bench, while freshmen Bryan Fedner, Zach Samuels, and Nico Dalton will look to make an impact during their first year of the squad.

Emory's backfield will consist of a veteran core of players as well. Seniors Jordan Edelman and Andre Jakubowski, both all-UAA honorees in 2007, will anchor the squad that finished 26th in the country in goals against average (0.67) last year. Two more seniors, Erik Laney and Jacob Roche, will play key roles in the backfield as well, after each started 18 games for the Eagles last season. Sophomores Adam Waxman, Jake Graetz, and Frank Hapak, along with junior Phillip Andreae and freshman Viva Nguyen also figure to be contributing factors in what could be a stifling unit for opposing offenses.

Perhaps Emory's largest hole to fill will be at goalkeeper, where the Eagles will lose two-year starter Keith Meehan, who finished his career in 2007 with the lowest goals-against average in school history. However, senior Jonathan Laycock, who transferred from Division I Mercer University (Ga.) prior to the 2007 season, will look to step in and fill Meehan's shoes, following his 50 shutout minutes in goal last year. Backing him up will be sophomore Greg Irons (50 shutout minutes in 2007), along with freshmen Josh Brickell and Trenton Spindler.

Expectations are high for the Eagles squad in 2008, as Emory was the top-ranked team in the UAA's Preseason Coaches' Poll, in addition to be ranked 13th in the nation according to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America preseason poll. However, with experience all across the field and depth on its bench, Emory could be primed to fulfill, and maybe exceed, those expectations come November.

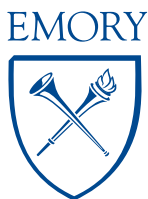

junior (2007): Carver recorded one of the most successful offensive campaigns in Emory history during the 2007 season. The junior became just the sixth Emory player to be named the University Athletic Association (UAA) Player of the Year, scoring six goals and assisting on five others during conference games. Carver finished the 2007 season with career highs in goals, assists, and points, leading the team in goals and points, and finishing second on the squad in assists. His 41 points were the eighth-best single season mark in school history, his

16 goals are the 10th-best single season total, and his nine assists are the 16th-best single-season total. The forward had seven game-winning goals during the year, matching the Emory single-season record, and his 14 career game-winning scores are a school record. He added four game-winning assists, the second-best total on the team, including two against UAA opponents and one in the Eagles' overtime win over Greensboro College (N.C.). He had four multiple-goal games in 2007, including a two-goal performance against UAA rival Carnegie Mellon University (Pa.). Carver also scored the "golden goal" against the University of Chicago (Ill.) to give Emory a 3-2 double-overtime victory. He finished the 2007 season ranked eighth in school history in points (96), seventh in school history in goals (37), and ninth in school history in assists (22).

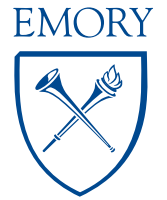
sophomore (2006): Carver led the Eagles in all scoring categories in 2006, registering six goals and nine assists for 21 total points. He has led Emory in goals scored in each of his first two seasons, and both his 0.6 goals per game and 1.57 points per game over his career are fifth best in school history. The sophomore received all-conference honors for the second-consecutive season in 2006, after being named to the University Athletic Association (UAA) second team. Carver scored two game-winning goals during the season, one against the seventh-ranked College of New Jersey, and the other against Oglethorpe University (Ga.). The forward recorded two five-point games (two goals and one assist) against Oglethorpe and Clayton State University (Ga.). Carver had five game-winning assists in 2006, the second-most in school history. He played in all 17 games for the Eagles during the season.

freshman (2005): Carver garnered the conference Rookie of the Year honor, along with an honorable mention to the all-conference team during the 2005 season. The freshman set school records for goals scored (15) and points (34) by a freshman. Carver led the team in goals and finished second on the team in points. The forward added four assists during the season, the fourth highest total on the team. Carver scored multiple goals in a game on three different occasions, including two hat tricks and a four-goal, one-assist performance against Huntingdon College (AL). Five of Carver's goals were game winners, and he assisted on one game-winning goal as well.

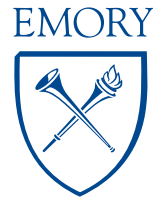

junior (2007): Edelman was named an honorable mention to the all-University Athletic Association (UAA) team for his performance as part of the Emory defense during the 2007 campaign. He was one of just three players to start all 19 games for Emory during the season, helping Emory to a 0.67 team goals against average and nine shutouts. Edelman helped the Eagles outscore their opponents 58-13 and hold a 146-57 advantage in shots on goal in 2007. His 37 consecutive-game starting streak is the longest active streak by an Emory player. Edelman also contributed career bests with one goal and four assists during

the season, including game-winning assists against Guilford College (N.C.) and Carnegie Mellon University (Pa.).

sophomore (2006): Edelman started all 17 games for Emory's defense during the 2006 campaign. He was a key member of the Eagles' backfield, which compiled a 0.93 goals against average and seven shutouts during the year. The sophomore picked up his only point of the year against Piedmont College (Ga.), assist on a goal during a 3-0 Emory victory. Edelman was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District second team for his performance both on and off the field.

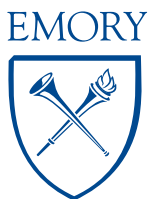
freshman (2005): Edelman appeared in 16 games for the Eagles, starting four of them as a freshman. He was part of an Emory defense that had the ninth-highest shutout percentage in Division III soccer, the 16th-best team goals against average and broke a school record by shutting out 14 of its 19 opponents. Edelman helped the Eagles defeat LaGrange College (Ga.) 8-0, picking up two assists in the game. Edelman took one shot on goal during the season.

He played in all 19 Emory games during the season, starting all but one of the matches. The midfielder finished the season with three goals, six assists (the fourth-best total on the squad), and 12 points (fifth-best by an Eagle). Of Eisen-Markowitz’s six assists, four were on game-winning goals, the second-best mark on the team. The junior recorded a career day during Emory’s 8-0 win over Piedmont College (Ga.), scoring two goals and one assist for five points. He also assisted on the “golden goal”

during the Eagles’ 2-1 overtime win over Wittenberg University (Ohio).

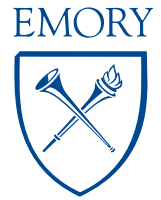

senior (2007): Howie recorded a career year for the Eagles in 2007, setting career highs in each of the major offensive categories. He finished the season with five goals and seven assists for 17 points, each the third-best mark on the team during the year. Howie's three game-winning goals was the second-best total on the team during the year, including back-to-back game winners against University Athletic Association (UAA) opponents Washington University (Mo.) and Case Western Reserve University (Ohio). The midfielder also assisted on the game-winning goal against New York University. Out of the 16 shots that he took, 12

were on goal for a team-best .750 shots on goal percentage. He recorded a career-best five points during Emory's 8-0 win over the University of the South (Tenn.), scoring two goals and an assist in the win. Howie started 15 games for the Eagles, playing in 17 total matches during the season.

junior (2006): Howie started 14 of the 13 games he played in for the Eagles during his junior season. The midfielder registered three goals and four assists for a total of 10 points during the campaign, the fourth-best total on the team during the season. His shining moment of the season came against Christopher Newport University (Va.), when he scored the "golden goal" for Emory in a 2-1 overtime win. university profile



Emory University is an inquiry-driven, ethically engaged, and diverse community whose members work collaboratively for positive transformation in the world through courageous leadership in teaching, research, scholarship, health care, and social action. The University is recognized internationally for its outstanding liberal arts college, superb professional schools, and one of the leading health care systems in the Southeast.

Emory is enriched by the legacy and energy of Atlanta, whose downtown area is just 15 minutes away. Through collaboration among its schools, units, and centers, as well as with affiliated institutions such as The Carter Center and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Emory is committed to working for positive transformation in the world.



Emory's future is being guided by an ambitious strategic plan, "Where Courageous Inquiry Leads." Within this plan, the University has committed its unique combination of resources to address some of the world's toughest challenges and greatest opportunities—from religion, conflict, and peace building, to race and social difference, to issues of global health and new understandings of what makes us human. Implementation of Emory's strategic plan will transform its campus and positively influence local and global communities.

One of Emory's most compelling features is its location in the vibrant, international city of Atlanta. The University's campus master plan outlines a bold vision for campus development, while retaining its distinctive sense of place and a commitment to sustainability. This commitment is evident through the Clifton Community Partnership, which provides a framework for building and enhancing a vibrant living-learning-working environment in and around Emory's Druid Hills campus. In recognition of its connection to the community, Emory was one of 60 schools in the United States recognized as an "Engaged Institution" by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

Alice Walker, Pulitzer Prize-winner and internationally known Georgia-born novelist and poet, placed her archive with Emory in December 2007. Additionally, in March 2008, the Southern Leadership Conference announced plans to place its archive of historical civil rights records at Emory. These collections are major additions to Emory's collections in African American literature, history, and culture.

In addition, several Emory faculty members brought special honor to Emory as well as to themselves.

Professor Natasha Trethewey, the Phillis Wheatley Distinguished Chair in Poetry, won the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry for her book *Native Guard*. *Time Magazine* named Charles Howard Candler Professor of Psychology, Yerkes researcher, and world-renowned primatologist Frans de Waal as one of the leading scientists and thinkers in its 2007 list of the Top 100 People Who Shape Our World. And AIDS drugs developed by Emory scientists Raymond Schinazi and Dennis Liotta continue to save thousands of lives worldwide.

rankings

Emory University is one of the top 20 national universities in the *U.S. News & World Report* annual college-quality rankings. Additionally, Emory is one of 25 top schools in the nation tapped as a “New Ivy” in Kaplan/Newsweek’s 2007 “How to Get Into College Guide” and is ninth in the country for best values among private universities in the 2008 *Kiplinger’s Personal Finance* magazine. Goizueta Business School’s Executive MBA Program ranks sixth worldwide, and its BBA program ranks fifth among undergraduate business programs in rankings compiled by *BusinessWeek*. Those programs are ranked 10th and 13th by *U.S. News*, which also ranks the full-time MBA 20th. *U.S. News* ranks the Rollins School of Public Health seventh, the School of Medicine 23 among research-oriented medical schools, the School of Law 22nd, and the Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing 26th. The School of Nursing ranks in the top 10 among private nursing schools for research funding from the National Institutes of Health, and its nurse-midwifery graduate program ranks eighth in the nation.

students

Emory benefits from a student body that is the most ethnically and religiously diverse of any of the top 20 national research universities, with 12,570 students from 50 states and 106 countries. There are 6,719 undergraduate students and 5,851 graduate and professional students. Emory houses a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest and most prestigious academic honor society. Emory students have received Rhodes, Marshall, Fulbright, Goldwater, Rotary, Rockefeller, Mellon, and USA Today scholarships as well as National Science Foundation Fellowships. Emory was ranked among the top 10 academic institutions in the country that provide the best work environments for life science postdoctoral research professionals by *The Scientist*.

faculty and staff

Emory is the largest private employer in metro Atlanta with 24,404 employees, including approximately 3,600 faculty. Two of Emory’s key strategic goals focus on faculty and staff: enhancing a diverse and distinguished faculty, and becoming the workplace of choice for all staff.

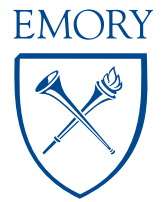
alumni

The mission of the Emory Alumni Association (EAA) is to strengthen relationships among alumni worldwide, provide lifelong learning and leadership opportunities, and facilitate alumni participation in the University and its mission. The EAA represents more than 100,000 alumni living in all 50 states and more than 150 nations. By keeping alumni informed and involved in the actions of the University, the EAA keeps the spirit of Emory alive within its graduates. The EAA wants alumni to feel not only a constant connection to the University, but also feel as if they never left it.

academic support

Holdings of the nine Emory University Libraries total approximately 3.2 million volumes. The libraries also provide access to thousands of electronic information resources, including more than 40,000 e-journal titles. Emory’s Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library (MARBL) offers rich collections in areas such as the Irish literary revival; Twentieth-Century American, British, and Irish poetry; and African American literature, history, and culture. MARBL also is strong in research collections devoted to the social and cultural history of the American South, with a particular emphasis on Georgia and Atlanta. Pitts Theology Library, the second-largest theology library in the country, is home to the Richard C. Kessler Reformation Collection, which documents the 16th-century Protestant Reformation in Germany. The Woodruff Health Sciences Center Library includes branches at Grady Hospital and Emory Hospital, as well as a Housestaff/Medical Student Learning Center at Grady. Emory University’s Hugh F. MacMillan Law Library is a selective depository for U.S. government documents, and it is a full depository for publications of the European Union.





athletics

Emory fields 18 varsity teams under the auspices of NCAA Division III, whose members award no athletic scholarships or preferential treatment for student-athletes. Emory has one of the top all-around athletic programs in the NCAA Division III, based on cumulative results in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings since fall 2000 and has had more student-athletes receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships than any other NCAA school in the past four years.

arts

The arts programs of Emory bring together 200,000 students, faculty, guest artists, and visitors each year in a spirit of collaboration and discovery. The new Emory College Center for Creativity and Arts and Emory University Creativity and Arts Initiative celebrate, nurture, and inspire the arts and other innovative endeavors. Major exhibition and presentation spaces are the Michael C. Carlos Museum and the Schwartz Center for Performing Arts. Cultural offerings include music, theater, and dance performances, exhibitions, poetry readings, literary events, master classes, lectures, artist residencies, and film screenings.

global perspective

Home to more than 2,000 international students and scholars, Emory sends some 40 percent of its undergraduates to study abroad on intensive learning experiences that include such opportunities as research in high-tech science labs around the world, exposure to global business through international opportunities with some of the world's best business schools, and field work in developing countries. Students and faculty in Emory's graduate school and professional schools in the fields of public health, nursing, medicine, theology, law, and business also are engaged in international research and teaching.

financial profile

Undergraduate tuition is \$35,800. About 76 percent of all students receive some form of financial aid, and Emory recently created a nationally recognized program to help lower- and middle-income families pay for college. This program, Emory Advantage, will help reduce debt for undergraduate students and families with incomes and assets less than \$100,000 per year. Emory's operating budget is \$2.8 billion, and the value of its endowment and trust funds was \$6.2 billion as of August 31, 2007. Emory received \$383.9 million in sponsored research in 2007, and, according to a recent study commissioned by the University, spends more than \$2.6 billion in Atlanta each year for a total estimated impact on the city's economy of \$5.7 billion.

woodruff health sciences center

The Woodruff Health Sciences Center (WHSC) comprises those Emory University schools and units that educate health professionals, pursue research affecting health and illness, provide patient care, and develop policies for preventing and treating disease. The WHSC includes the schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health; the Winship Cancer Institute; Yerkes National Primate Research Center; and Emory Healthcare, Georgia's largest and most comprehensive health care system. The WHSC's goal is to serve humanity by making people healthy. To achieve that goal, the center is investing heavily in predictive and global health initiatives, in innovative ways to train the right kind of health care professionals, in the translation of new research discoveries into medical practice, and in ways to ensure the highest quality and safety in patient care.

building a better emory

Just as it transforms the lives of students, Emory University is transforming its campus to meet the challenges of higher education in the 21st century.

psychology building

Scheduled for completion in the spring of 2009, the new Psychology Building will provide 118,000 square feet of teaching and research space for the department and Emory College. The five-story structure features five registrar classrooms with innovative presentation technology in addition to a 110-seat auditorium. The project has been designed to comply with the University's Environmental Stewardship Standards.



ignatius few and lettie pate whitehead evans halls

Opened in fall of 2008, Ignatius Few Hall and Lettie Pate Whitehead Evans Hall were built as part of phase two of the housing master plan. The two adjoined freshman halls are 111,000 square feet, five stories, with 295 beds. The project includes double and single rooms, and study and social space, and it is built to the University's Environmental Stewardship Standards.



freshman hall building 4

Scheduled to be completed in April 2010, Freshman Hall Building 4 is the third phase of Emory's master plan housing project. The new 349-room residence hall, located on the corner of Asbury Circle and Means Drive was designed by Ayers/Saint/Gross in conjunction with Emory's Campus Services staff. When complete, this project will include a new 114,000-square-foot residence hall facility with an additional 23,000-square-foot green space on top of its adjacent parking deck.



turman hall

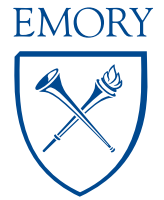
Opened in fall 2007, Turman Hall was one of the first "green" residence halls in Georgia. The five-story, 44,000 square-foot building has 132 beds plus two complete apartments. Eighty percent of the units are allocated for double occupancy; 20 percent of the units are allotted for single occupancy. With thermostats in each room, residents will be able to individually control the temperature settings in their room only within the University's approved thermostat settings. In addition, occupancy settings throughout most of the building will ensure that if the lights are left on, they will automatically turn off after 30 minutes.



candler school theology and ethics center

The new \$34 million structure, completed in fall 2008, includes approximately 70,000 square feet of space for classrooms, faculty offices, administrative space, and two large lecture halls with seating for 100 and 175 people, respectively. The building is the largest new structure built adjacent to the Quad in many years. In addition to housing the School of Theology, it will also house the Center for Ethics.





athletic facilities



The Woodruff P. E. Center is the headquarters for Emory athletics. In addition to housing offices for the Emory University athletics and physical education departments, the dynamic building houses athletic facilities for 18 intercollegiate sports teams, and is the primary workout facility for Emory's active student body, faculty, and staff.

The main arena at the Woodruff P. E. Center is home to Emory's volleyball team and basketball teams. Retractable bleachers provide seating for 3,000 spectators. A drop-down curtain and two sides of pull-out bleachers allow for multiple seating configurations.

The soccer field just south of the Woodruff P. E. Center is surrounded by a 400-meter track with an all-weather Rekortan surface. Permanent bleacher seating accommodates approximately 2,000 people.

The natatorium is home to Emory's nationally ranked varsity swimming and diving teams. The pool is 50 meters in length and 25 yards in width, which allow for official long- and short-course competition. A diving well features a pair of one-meter and three-meter diving boards. There is permanent seating for 500 spectators.

The men's and women's tennis teams enjoy a home-court advantage at the Woodruff P. E. Center outdoor tennis courts. The courts were totally resurfaced and all new fencing and windscreens put in place during the summer of 2006. The teams have another option to practice or play with the indoor courts located on the fourth floor of the Woodruff P. E. Center.

The Emory baseball team lays claim to one of the outstanding facilities in the nation in Chappell Park. The immaculately kept field houses its own locker room, press box, picnic area, and permanent seating for 500 behind home plate. In addition, the Clyde "Doc" Partin Indoor Batting Cage is adjacent to the playing field.

The Emory softball team plays home games at George F. Cooper Jr. Field. The facility features an all-dirt infield, sunken dugouts, two bullpens, and two batting cages.

Playing host to the Emory golf team is Smoke Rise Golf and Country Club located in Stone Mountain. The 6,845-yard, par-72 course combines both beauty as well as a challenging round of golf.

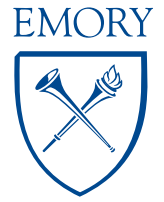

strength and conditioning

Being a successful athlete takes a commitment in a number of areas, one of which is a desire to improve one's strength, size, and conditioning. The Emory University Strength and Conditioning Program is committed to helping student-athletes maximize their athletic potential while decreasing the chance for injury. This is done through a philosophy that can be summed up in the following four points.

1. Performing exercises with feet on the ground
2. Performing exercises with free weights
3. Performing exercises that use multiple muscle groups that surround multiple joints
4. To be an explosive athlete, you must train your exercises explosively

The Eagles conduct their strength training at the Emory Varsity Weight Room, a 3,000 square-foot facility located on the fourth floor of the Woodruff P. E. Center.

The Emory Varsity weight room is geared primarily towards dynamic, explosive Olympic weightlifting (snatch, clean, and jerk) movements. Equipment includes 18 oak weightlifting platforms, six Eleiko training barbells, 12 Pendlay training barbells, six sets of Mavrik training bumper plates, six sets of Pendlay training bumper plates, dumbbells up to 115 lbs, four Powerlift Glute-Hamstring benches, one Keiser leg press, one Keiser Functional Trainer, one Vertimax vertical jump trainer, and a full set of UCS rigid foam Plyo-Safe plyometric jump boxes.

"My goal is to challenge our student-athletes every time they walk into the weight room. Head coaches demand explosive strength and power from their athletes during practice and competition, and we carry that concept right on through to all of our strength and conditioning sessions. My message to our student-athletes: show up, work hard, repeat. Great things will happen if you do that."

atlanta: jewel of the south



Atlanta is a vibrant and dynamic city that offers a wide-array of professional, social, and educational opportunities.

Metro Atlanta is home to nearly five million people and more than 137,000 businesses. Its healthy economic growth attracts hundreds of companies and thousands of well-educated job seekers.

Despite having a mild Atlanta climate, the city does experience all four seasons. The average annual temperature is 61 degrees. July is the hottest month, averaging 89 degrees, and January as the coolest month, with the average low at 33 degrees. The agreeable outdoor climate allows people to enjoy more than 100 golf courses, 200 public tennis courts, and hundreds of miles of hiking and biking trails more than 300 days a year.

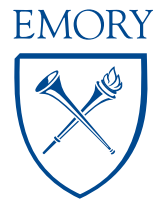
The arts are represented by several theaters and museums, including the Fox Theatre. The Woodruff Arts Center is home to the Tony Award-winning Alliance Theatre, Atlanta Symphony, and High Museum of Art. Atlanta features the world's largest aquarium, the Georgia Aquarium, which officially opened to the public on November 23, 2005. The new World of Coca-Cola, which opened adjacent to the aquarium in May 2007, features the history of the world famous soft drink brand. Underground Atlanta, a historic shopping and entertainment complex, lies under the streets of downtown Atlanta.

Atlanta is home to several professional sports franchises, including teams from five of the different major league sports—the Atlanta Braves of Major League Baseball, the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League, the Atlanta Hawks of the National Basketball Association, the Atlanta Thrashers of the National Hockey League, and the Atlanta Dream of the Women's National Basketball Association.

atlanta folklore and trivia

- Ever wonder why no matter where you go in Atlanta, you always seem to be driving on Peachtree? There are more than 55 streets with Peachtree in their name.
- You can ride your bike from Atlanta to Alabama. The Silver Comet Trail is a recreational path that begins in Smyrna and runs all the way across the Alabama border.
- Atlanta is one of only two cities in the world to be home to two Nobel Peace Prize winners. At the age of 35, Martin Luther King Jr. was the youngest man to receive the Noble Peace Prize in 1964. President Jimmy Carter received the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002 and became the third U.S. President to receive this honor.
- Buckhead, one of Atlanta's most affluent neighborhoods and shopping mecca of the South, owes its unusual name to 19th-century local general store owner Henry Irby. Irby killed a large deer and prominently mounted the buck head on the wall of his establishment, a popular outpost for locals and travelers.
- Fifty-five thousand runners from around the world descend on Atlanta each Fourth of July for the Peachtree Road Race, making it the largest 10K foot race in the world.
- With a passenger terminal complex equivalent to more than 45 football fields, Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport is the world's busiest passenger airport. Atlanta is an ideal location for carriers like hometown Delta Air Lines, as the city is a two-hour flight away from 83 percent of U.S. cities.

the uaa— where theory meets practice

For 21 years, the University Athletic Association has served as a bold statement of what college athletics can and should be—that it is highly desirable and possible for a group of committed institutions to conduct a broad-based program of intercollegiate athletics for men and women; to compete with like academic institutions spread over geographically expansive areas; and to seek excellence in athletics while maintaining a perspective which holds the student-athlete and the academic mission of the institution as the center of focus.

Members of the UAA share the belief that academic excellence and athletic excellence are not mutually exclusive. Implicit in this belief are several sets of assumptions. The first is that the academic enterprise is the primary element. Student-athletes are just that—students first and athletes second. The second set of assumptions has to do with athletic excellence. Athletic excellence is not to be confused with a win-at-all-costs attitude. It properly relates to the caliber of experience offered to students who participate in intercollegiate athletics.

The final assumptions concern what might be termed a proper athletic emphasis. Athletic programs are extracurricular activities conducted for students and should be given consideration similar to that accorded other such institutionally sponsored activities. They should not only complement the academic experience, but should also reflect the quality of the academic environment within which they exist. Division III is an approach to athletics—not a synonym for third-rate. The University Athletic Association sponsors competition in 22 sports—twelve sports for men and ten sports for women—including football, soccer, cross country, volleyball, basketball, fencing, wrestling,

swimming and diving, indoor track and field, baseball, softball, outdoor track and field, tennis, and golf.

Many student-athletes from UAA institutions have been recognized for their achievements as scholars and athletes. During the 2007–2008 academic year, 23 student-athletes from UAA institutions were recognized as College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-Americans, 78 received All-America honors in team or individual sports, and five garnered individual national championship or national Player of the Year accolades in their respective sport. In addition, seven student-athletes from UAA institutions were among the select group of seniors across the country named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

Teams throughout the UAA are perennial contenders for post-season play. In 2007–2008, UAA teams were selected or qualified to compete in NCAA championship competition in football, softball, and volleyball, as well as men's and women's championships in basketball, cross country, soccer, tennis, and track and field. UAA schools captured national championships in men's basketball, men's cross country, men's tennis, and volleyball, finished as national runner-up in men's tennis, and placed third in women's cross country and women's indoor track and field. In all, 18 UAA teams posted top ten finishes in their national championships, and 17 others finished in the top twenty.



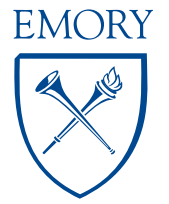

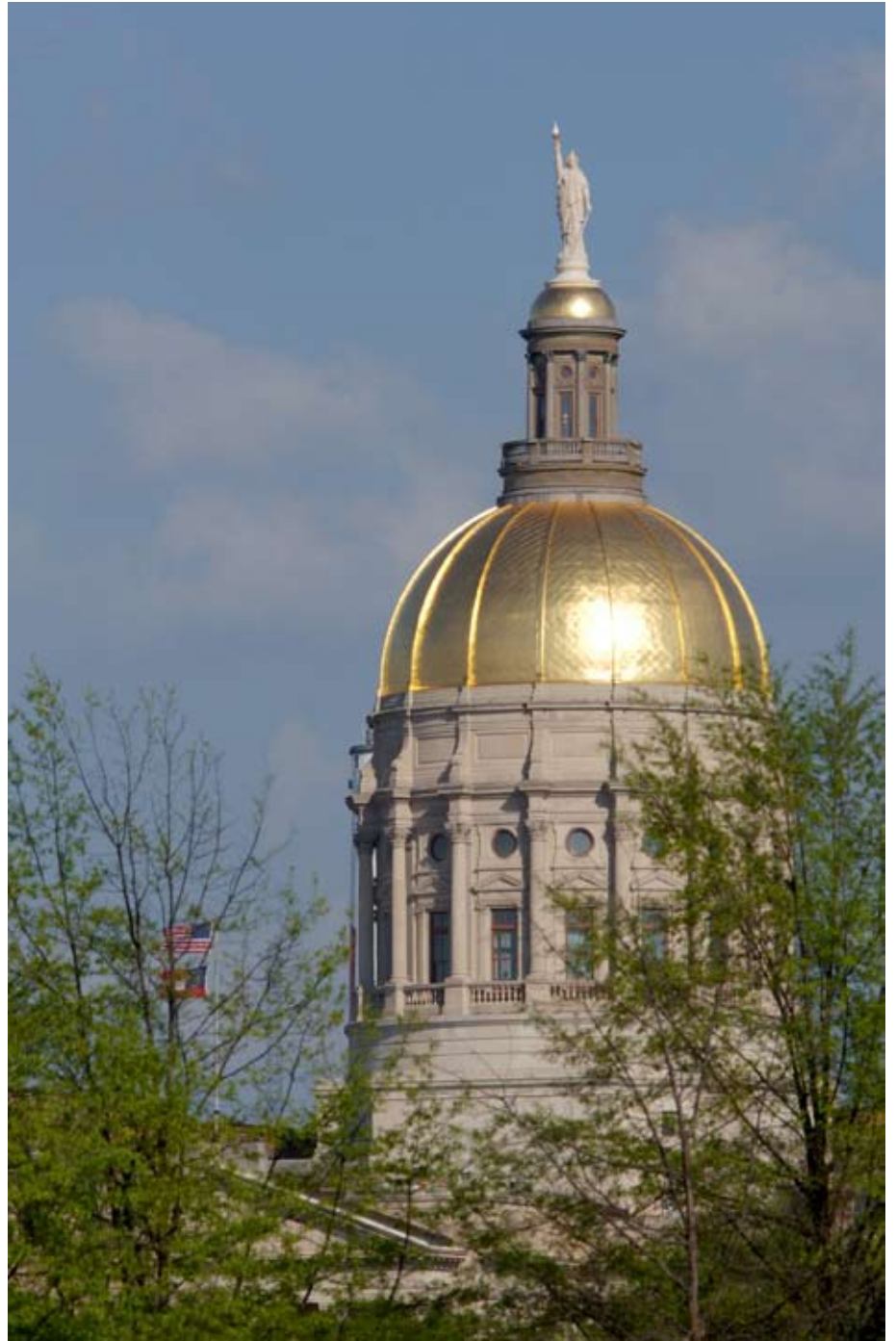
