Old Treasury Tour and Sundowner

History Council members were treated to an exclusive tour of the old Treasury and Titles Office Buildings in central Perth on 29th November.

The striking three storey complex is currently being refurbished. Over many years it had been converted to office space by government departments, and the original spaces had been obscured by the installation of numerous false ceilings and partitions. These have now been removed, and members were treated to a viewing of the building's former glory.

The building was constructed in three stages, 1874, 1877 and 1887. Richard Roach Jewell designed the two storey Barrack Street frontage. Around 1887 Chief Architect George Temple Poole designed the St Georges Terrace section and added a third storey to the earlier part of the complex.

The bricks are handmade, laid in the variegated chequer pattern brickwork typical of the colonial period. The shingled roof is high and steeply sloping, with dormer windows, projecting pilasters and some Victorian classical ornament around the higher windows.

After negotiating the many stairs of the Treasury building, members willingly repaired to the impressive surroundings of the Western Australian Club for a convivial end-of-year Sundowner.

The Western Australian Club began life as the Exchange Club in 1893. Its current site has been associated with banking in WA since 1887, and elements of the former banking hall were much admired on our visit, so it was truly an historic afternoon's outing.

History Matters

The Afternoon of Review held by Committee in late 2006 was an opportunity to reflect on the role and achievements of the History Council. The Committee and our broad membership have worked effectively and we have a creditable list of achievements.

However, our Review highlighted the need to streamline and consolidate our structure, revising our objectives in order use our resources effectively and to move the work of the History Council forward. Some duplication had emerged in the activities of the Sub-Committees and we have now established a new structure that will be trialled over the next twelve months.

The new Sub-Committees are Advocacy, Communications and the Indigenous Sub-Committee, which will overlap the other two. We will be establishing working parties to deal with particular issues as they arise, as we have done with the History in Schools Working Party. An Issues Advisory Panel will be established for longer term and fast moving issues. Convenors for the new Sub-Committees have now been elected. Involvement of the broader membership in Sub-Committees is very important to the work of the History Council, and any members with an interest in one of these should contact the Executive Officer.

We have a busy year ahead in terms of advocacy and support for history and heritage. We will be working on a new Strategic Plan and we have a range of interesting events organised.

History and heritage play a key role in shaping our community and as we start the year there are some positives. The Premier has recently responded to our concerns about the State's archives by indicating that a new archives storage facility for State records is on the agenda. We will work to ensure that this promise is not forgotten! However, there is still a range of ongoing threats, one in particular being the imminent destruction of ancient rock art on the Burrup. I urge you all to get involved with our activities in whatever way you can.

2007 promises to be an exciting year.

Caught on the Wire

Exhibition: Australians on the Western Front 1916-1918

The Army Museum of WA and the Military Historical Society's Western Australian Branch have joined with St George's Cathedral to mount a spectacular display in April to help save the Burt Memorial Hall.

The Burt Memorial Hall is situated on St Georges Terrace in the St George's Cathedral Precinct and stands as a memorial by Septimus Burt to commemorate the service and sacrifice of his two sons in the Great War.

The exhibition is part of the campaign to restore St George's Cathedral and the Cathedral Precinct. A further \$5 million is needed to complete the task, including the restoration and repair of the Burt Memorial Hall.

The exhibition will increase the public awareness of the role of Australians on the Western Front, particularly Western Australians. It will highlight St George's Cathedral as the location of many memorials to individual Western Australians and as the custodian of the Victoria Cross awarded to Lt. C.W.K. Sadlier 51st Bn AIF and the unique 51st Battalion's Villers-Bretonneux Cross.

This will be a comprehensive exhibition of World War 1 objects, uniforms, weapons and images. The main display theme will concentrate on the Australian Army involvement in the campaigns of the Western Front 1916 – 1918, with particular emphasis on the Western Australian contribution. Other themes will include the importance of the Christian Chaplaincy in providing spiritual support and comfort to the troops, the departure from Albany, the Burt family and Villers-Bretonneux.

The Opening Night is on Friday, 20 April, and the exhibition runs from 21 April - 3 May 2007 at the Burt Memorial Hall.

Premier's West Australian History Award Cleared Out: First Contact in the Western Desert

The announcement of this award was made on Friday 9 June 2006 by the Minister for Culture and the Arts, Hon. Sheila McHale. The book *Cleared Out*, which tells the story of the first contact between a group of Martu women and children and white Australia in 1964, won the \$20,000 Premier's Prize in the 2005 Western Australian Premier's Book Awards. Written by Sue Davenport, Peter Johnson and Yuwali, this publication also won the West Australian History Award.

In 1964 the British and Australian governments were about to test the British 'Blue Streak' rockets across remote South and West Australia. They considered this area to be empty desert, but to one seventeen-year-old woman and her family, this was 'home'.

This book tells the story of the removal of the small group of Martu Aboriginal women and children from the Percival Lakes region of Australia's Western Desert – a group which had not previously had contact with European society. The story of the encounter and removal is told by Yuwali (that same seventeen-year-old), and two patrol officers, one of whom, Walter MacDougall, was later condemned 'for having placed the affairs of a handful of natives above those of the British Commonwealth of Nations.'

Besides presenting Yuwali's compelling recollection of events, the authors place this first encounter within the context of the political outrage, the public outcry, and the battles in the corridors of government at the time, forcing us to consider not only the consequences for the Martu of removal from the desert, but also the wider issue of Indigenous people's relationship to their lands.

Looking Forward

History Council Committee members, as well as a number of others who have served on Sub-Committees, gathered on the glorious sunny afternoon of 6 December 2006 for the Council's Afternoon of Review, a fore-runner to preparing the next Strategic Plan.

The current Plan will be in effect until the end of the 2006/2007 year.

Felicity Morel-EdnieBrown, one of our versatile Councillors, proved to be a most effective facilitator, inexorably moving us on (in the nicest possible way!) through a consideration of the Council's achievements to date, its strengths and weaknesses, ongoing needs and future directions. The end result was a restructuring of the subcommittees, refining them to just three, with some useful ideas emerging in preparation for the next round of strategic planning.

Those attending were offered refreshments on the delightful upstairs balcony of the National Trust building afterwards as a reward for their labours.

Women's Roll of Honour

Planning has started for a new Western Australian publication sure to be of wide interest - the *Women's Roll of Honour*. It will recognise women who have made a contribution to the Arts in WA.

A Roll of Honour Consortium Workshop was held recently on 31 January to discuss the project, intended for publication in 2008.

Pam Ryder, project facilitator, and Judith Parker AM, the Vice-President of the International Council of Women, head the two working parties formed as a result of this consortium workshop.

James Sykes Battye Memorial Fellowship

In honour of the 50th Anniversary of the Battye Library, the Library Board of Western Australia has established an award which will be known as the James Sykes Battye Memorial Fellowship. The aim of this fellowship is to foster research and publication on aspects of Western Australia based on the unique collection of the Battye Library. The establishment of this new award was announced at the Golden Anniversary celebration held on 14 December.

The fellowship, up to the value of \$20,000, has been established through the Leah Jane Cohen bequest. Leah Jane Cohen was an avid supporter of the Library. Her generosity will enable others to use the Battye collections to further our understanding of Western Australia. More details on the Fellowship will be available later in 2007.

SRAC/SRC retirements

It was with great regret that archivists and recordkeepers recently farewelled two long-standing members of the State Records Commission, as they moved on to fresh fields in their 'day jobs'.

First was the former Auditor General, Des Pearson, in late 2006, and last week it was the turn of Deirdre O'Donnell, State Ombudsman.

These Commissioners served at a crucial period in the history of the State Records Commission, whilst it was overseeing the implementation of the ground-breaking State Records Act 2000.

The State Records Office held farewell functions for each of the departing Commissioners. Speakers commented that all of the Commissioners since the Commission's inception in 2001 have worked extraordinarily effectively together, given that they approach the oversight of government recordkeeping from such widely different perspectives. This is one of the strengths of the legislation, demanding input and involvement at the highest level from all relevant agencies.

The State Records Commission membership is comprised of the Information Commissioner, the State Ombudsman and the Auditor General as ex-officio members, and a Governor's Appointee.

In future issues of the newsletter, there will be features on how the State Records Act ensures that governments and their agencies create adequate records and the process of selecting essential records for long-term preservation – areas of enormous importance for all historians.
