IN EARLY DECEMBER last year, Chief Minister Clare Martin unveiled a plaque at the Big 1888 Railway Bridge that recognizes the engineering heritage significance of the bridge.

The day of the ceremony, 3 December, marked 116 years to the day that the bridge was officially opened.

The great bridge heist

THANKS TO GERRY WOOD, we have been receiving support on our disappearing bridges. The bridges are on the old railway line between Darwin and Noonamah and some are rather remote, so it can be some time before theft or vandalism is discovered.

This is very valuable heritage and we urge everyone to be on the lookout and report any suspicious to the police, who have also been working on tracking the thieves.

The bridges were built in the 1890 and were an integral part of the North Australian Railway which closed in 1976. Built mainly by Chinese workers in the 1890s, the rail was Darwin's most important transport link to the Territory's gold mining towns.

During World War II, the rail transported vital munitions, supplies and troops.

The sad fact is that even if these people are apprehended, we will never be able to put the bridges back as they were. A valuable part of our heritage has disappeared.

Adelaide River briefs

PLACE NAMES

OUR PRESIDENT has been researching street and place names in Adelaide River:

DORAT Road – an acronym for Darwin Overland Road Authorities Transport, which was a collection name used to describe the various state authorities who constructed the Stuart Highway in the early 1940s.

Michael Terry, in his 1945 book *Bulldozer*. the war role of the Department of Main Roads, NSW wrote of the road:

...got together, planned and instituted their men, transport organisation and called it Dorat – abbreviation for "Darwin Overland Road Authorities Transport" and started business in March 26 (1942).

The road was formerly a section of the Stuart Highway, named under the *Military Roads Act* of 1942. (source: www.lpe.nt.gov.au/place)

ADELAIDE RIVER RAILWAY HOUSE VISIT

FOLLOWING A committee meeting at the Slingsbys, we visited an old railway house that belongs to Shirley Hollingsworth at 3335 Virginia Road. The house was relocated from Adelaide River by Roy Jansen in May 1980 and, according to Shirley, in one piece. Shirley has original plans dated 1950, which is the date of the standard house drawing

but is not indicative of the construction date of this particular house.

Keith Smith's 1965 photo of three houses in his book *Railway Odyssey* suggests that the houses were quite recently constructed at that time.

Shirley reported that the price of the house was \$1 and Roy's price to relocate it on to Besser block stumps installed by him was \$5999.00.
