

Official Opening of the 21st Muswellbrook Photographic Award

The 21st Muswellbrook Photographic Award opened in front of a record crowd on Saturday October 11 2008, Mayor of Muswellbrook Shire Martin Rush addressed the crowd and among his remarks Martin indicated that the " Muswellbrook Photographic Award, which turns 21 tonight, is a testament to the support of the Arts Centre by the Muswellbrook and Districts Camera Club and has enabled the Centre to build an important collection of photographs through the acquisitive nature of the Award. This collection would not exist except for the generous contribution of Coal & Allied who have been the major sponsor since it's inception". Antony Bijok, General Manager Studies Rio Tinto of Coal and Allied Mt Pleasant Project also spoke addressing the notions of art making and the importance to Coal & Allied of being involved with cultural Anthony Mravicic Mind Field 2006-08 development in the region. Rose Peel, former Senior Conservator of Works on Paper at the Art Gallery of NSW and the adjudicator of the 2008 Photographic Award, made a very considered approach to the adjudication spending about many

hours before making her final selection of the winning work "Mind Field" by Anthony Mravicic. Anthony's work has proved somewhat controversial in that it is an unfixed gelatin silver print which will grow darker and darker over time as it is exposed to light. Rose said in her address "This is a transient image that questions our understanding of what a photograph is, and what it is for. The work is about seeing and not seeing, about touch and not touching; two of the most important aspects of a work of art for both the creator and the viewer". The Regional Arts Centre is also pleased to announce a 108% increase in entries in 2008 and are hoping for another increase in 2010 when the next award will be staged.



Coal & Allied Localises Arts Centre

Local Aboriginal artwork will now be available to view at Muswellbrook's Regional Arts Centre thanks to a donation from Coal & Allied's Mount Pleasant Project. Coal & Allied has donated an original artwork entitled "Singleton Bats" to the gallery created by local Aboriginal artist, Denise Hedges. Coal & Allied General Manager Studies, Antony Bijok, said he was pleased to offer support to Denise and other local Aboriginal artists to help them achieve greater exposure for their work within the community. The Coal & Allied Aboriginal Development Consultative Committee has been strongly supportive of Denise as an Indigenous artist in the local area. We have funded her business plan, which included the recent Upper Hunter Valley Wupa@Wanaruah art exhibition which showcased work by Denise and another local Indigenous artist. We have also purchased several of her artworks, one of which is used as the emblem for the Aboriginal Development Consultative Committee. "We hope our recent donation to the arts centre will not only provide Denise with greater exposure but encourage other aspiring artists within the local Aboriginal community." Denise said she was delighted to know her artwork is appreciated and now would be available to the wider community to view. "I hope my artwork offers people an opportunity to reflect on the importance of our rich and vibrant Aboriginal culture," Ms Hedges said. "Our Aboriginal culture is very important to us and I would like to thank Coal & Allied for its support." The Muswellbrook Regional Arts Centre Manager, Brad Franks, said the art centre houses the Upper Hunter region art collection, which includes contemporary Australian paintings, photography, works on paper, ceramics and the Max Watters Collection. "Thanks to Coal & Allied's generous donation we are now honoured to say the centre also houses artwork from a Singleton based local Aboriginal artist," Mr Franks said. Art centre volunteer Roger Skinner has also donated an original artwork by Ms Hedges to the centre. Mr Skinner purchased the artwork "Hunting Party" at last month's Muswellbrook Police and Community Youth Club and Challenge Disabilities Services charity auction which was also supported by Coal & Allied.

Susana Enriquez -Molto Vivace

The artworks in this exhibition relate directly to the body of work produced for the artist's PhD and consist of a range of different mediums and disciplines including drawings and oil and acrylic paintings. The works are based around the theme of Sound and Colour and they examine the interrelationships between painting and music via a personal colour code in order to translate the sounds into painting. While residing in Newcastle in the Hunter Valley "Being born and raised in Mexico City has brought an intrinsic Latin American intensity that is readily apparent. Her studies with important Mexican artists and her constant exposure to Mexican art , both past and present, have been important in her creative process" (Gregorio Fritz, MA –Montecasino, Mexico. October 2005).

The exhibition will be mounted in the School of Arts Gallery at the Arts Centre and will include a number of lyrical works on paper presented as wall mounted "scrolls" which represent the musical score with the pertinent words being "gesture" and "performance". A selection of central hanging oil paintings on acetate film will create a double sided viewing experience for the audience as they pass in and around the suspended pieces. In addition, there will be a suite of 100 abstract "colour coded" paintings which will encircle the walls, arranged by the Arts Centre Curator, Peter Gill, in a completely personal and interpretative sequence according to the ideas suggested by listening to the music of Manuel Enriquez (the artist's late husband) and Arvo Part.

Susana Enriquez's Molto Vivace will open at 6.00pm on Friday 28 November with special guest speaker Mrs. Aggie Maisano, President of the Brandenburg Friends, and continue until Sunday 21 December 2008.

The works selected for this small suite of landscape based artworks demonstrate some of the ways in which artists can be inspired by particular features of the landscape. The means of communicating their responses range from a traditional or representational image, through to a more selective or abstract interpretation where a particular feature is given prominence by the use of a number of artistic devices e.g. the inclusion of a decorative or pattern making element which sums up the mood or presence of the subject, or the use of repetitive formats some of which present multiple viewpoints of a single subject. Sometimes by honing in on a detail of the landscape, identifying its key aspects and generalising its field, an artist is able to include the viewer into the much wider field giving a similar experience to the one which initially inspired the artist. Of course there are also examples where there is a combination of a number of these aspects in the one work with the result that a more inclusive experience is achieved.

Sunset from Mount Vincent, by John Montefiore, is a pastiche of realistic and closely observed features of an easily identifiable subject built up using design elements which reflect more than a working knowledge of Eastern (the stylized clouds in the sky) and Western (the traditional tonal rendering of the foreground rocks) traditions combined with contemporary theories of optical colour mixing in the dots and dashes to define the space. The profile of the mountain behind the township of Kyogle by David van Nunen further explores this aspect of combining the familiar and easily recognisable with a more adventurous and expressionistic method of execution in the bold brushwork shapes which make up the image. Pattern making, where vigorous brushwork is accompanied by the effects of bold and complimentary colour relationships, certainly increases the sense of space in David van Nunen's Midday Botanical Gardens. This is also the guiding force behind Stephen Earl's large highly coloured and spontaneous painting View. Maeve Woods' intimate study of Dirt, Feathers and Grass Seeds – Bush Abstract 4, is quite subtle. It also depends very much on the all over repeat motif to suggest both a particular point in time and a notion that the view continues far beyond the confines of the picture surface boundary. The use of an aerial viewpoint in the aspect of the landscape of Rouchel Brook by David McBride sees the watercourse and its surrounding forestation morphed into a sinuous study of rhythmic lines and accompanying shapes reminiscent of copperplate writing and calligraphy exercises combined with the key principles of the Art Nouveau movement.

Multiple viewpoints of a particular scene within the same artwork allow for an expanded portrayal. The viewer, like the artist, is compelled into assessing the subject from another direction. Not only does the picture plane oscillate from left to right, but it also moves along its vertical axis. The two major aspects of

Marrickville Town Hall by Frank Littler are contained within the one artwork. The kaleidoscopic six part assemblage which makes up *Through Alison's Looking Glass*, by Alison Hodges, also uses this multiple viewpoint technique. The repeated *Five Different Sized Houses* by Chris O'Doherty (aka Reg Mombassa), where similar shapes of varying scale houses are included in the landscape, accentuate the sense of perspective and space.

Another way of bringing a different aspect to the traditional full frontal view is to introduce an element of the unexpected into what, on the surface appears to be a fairly mundane and safe approach to the subject. *Kangerigars in the New England Tableland*, by Ken Searle, is dotted with a number of flying creatures which are half budgerigar and half kangaroo. A fighter jet passing through the centre of the artwork adds to the sense of the unreal. Likewise, *A Lovely View* by Margot Hutcheson seems to be based on a very ordinary and boring snapshot of a group of tourist at a favourite tourist pit stop. The series of four different sized canvases, arranged at staggered heights, presents an interrupted and unexpected view different to the usual approach employed by landscape artists.
