### **Biographies of International Guests**

CHRIS ABANI (Nigeria) Song for Night

Genre: Fiction

**Book:** Song for Night is the story of a West African boy soldier's lyrical, terrifying, yet beautiful journey through the nightmare landscape of a brutal war in search of his lost platoon. The reader is led by the voiceless child who, as part of a land mine-clearing platoon, had his vocal chords cut, a move to keep these children from screaming when blown up, and thereby distracting the other minesweepers. The book is written in a ghostly voice, with each chapter headed by a line of the unique sign language these children invented. This book is unlike anything else ever written about an African war.

**Author:** Recipient of over 17 awards including the PEN USA Freedom-to-Write Award Winner, Abani wrote his first book, political thriller *Masters of the Board,* about a neo-Nazi takeover, when he was 16. In 1985, at 18, the government of Nigeria, who had suddenly decided that his novel was a 'threat to national security', incarcerated him.

When he got out he joined a street theatre group, which only sent Abani back to jail, this time in a maximum security prison Kiri Kiri. After a year, he was released and studied literature at a Nigerian university. He continued to write, but his third play, *Song of a Broken Flute* (1990) took him this time to Kalakuta Prison where he was locked up with other political prisoners on death row. The charge against him was treason and he was found guilty.

There he wrote his famous collection of poetry *Kalakuta Republic*. It is a poetic tribute to the people he suffered with and those that died in prison. Abani was able to leave Nigeria for exile in 1991. He has since lived in England and the United States.

Abani is a Professor at the University of California, Riverside. He is the author of five novels and four poetry collections. He is a popular keynote speaker at human rights celebrations and plays the clarinet.

**Book:** Described as extremely funny, but also containing a horrific beach scene, *The Other Hand* reflects Chris Cleave's admiration for brave and funny people facing horrible situations. In his novel, two women's lives, a 16 year old Nigerian refugee and a high-flying London executive, are inextricably linked by a chance meeting and tragedy, which neither can put behind them. Inspired by his early childhood in West Africa, Cleave is making a broader statement about the treatment of illegal immigrants from the developing world. Cleave was inspired by his time working in a canteen at a British removal centre for asylum seekers which included Nigerian refugees.

**Author:** Chris Cleave's debut novel *Incendiary* was an international bestseller published in 20 countries. An emotionally charged open letter to Osama bin Laden about a London bomb plot, *Incendiary* gained notoriety for the macabre coincidence of its UK publication on 7th July 2005, the day of the London terrorist bombings. It won the 2006 Somerset Maugham Award, was short listed for the 2006 Commonwealth Writers Prize and won the Prix Special du Jury at the French Prix des Lecteurs 2007. In late 2008, *Incendiary* will be released as a major motion picture, starring Michelle Williams and Ewan McGregor.

Chris Cleave is 35 and has a regular column in *The Guardian*. He has been a barman, long-distance sailor, teacher of marine navigation, an internet pioneer and journalist. He writes literary fiction but figures it is okay to maintain a sense of humour when exploring serious subjects. He lives in London with his French wife and two mischievous Anglo-French children.

**Book:** Welcome to LA - city of contradictions. It is home to movie stars and down-and-outs with palm-lined beaches and gridlock, shopping sprees and gun sprees. *Bright Shiny Morning* takes a wild ride through the ultimate metropolis, where glittering excess rubs shoulders with seedy depravity. Frey's trademark filmic snapshots zoom in on the parallel lives of diverse characters, bringing their egos and ideals, hopes and despairs, anxieties and absurdities vividly to life. Some suffer, like the otherworldly wino who tries to save a spoilt teenage runaway. Others gain, like the canny talent agent who turns sexual harassment to blackmailing advantage. Some are loaded, or grounded, and have luck on their side. Others, like the countless actresses-turned-hookers, or schoolboys-turned-gangsters, are doomed.

**Author:** James Frey is originally from Cleveland, Ohio. His first memoir, *A Million Little Pieces*, was published in spring 2003. Its follow-up, *My Friend Leonard* followed two years later. Both books became New York Times #1 bestsellers. In late 2005 and early 2006, *The Smoking Gun* and other investigators discovered elements of his memoir, *A Million Little Pieces* were untrue. As accusations against the book continued, Oprah Winfrey invited Frey onto her show, to find out whether he had lied to her and her viewers or had simply embellished minor details. The controversy spread around the world. *Bright Shiny Morning* is a novel.

**Book:** Winner of the 2008 Commonwealth Writer's Prize for Best Book, *Someone Knows My Name* is a sweeping slave narrative, from a tribal African village to the plantation fields of South Carolina. Abducted as an 11year old child, from her village in Sierra Leone, and forced to walk for months to the sea in a coffle—a string of slaves— Aminata Diallo is sent to live as a slave. Years later, she forges her way to freedom, serving the British in the Revolutionary War and registering her name in the historic 'Book of Negroes'.

**Author:** The son of African-American immigrants - a black father and a white mother, much of Hill's writing touches on issues of identity and belonging. Growing up in the mainly white '60s suburbs of suburban Ontario, Hill was greatly influenced by his parent's work in human rights.

He has lived and worked across North America and Europe. As a volunteer with Canadian Crossroads International, he has travelled to the West African countries Niger, Cameroon and Mali. He has a B.A. in economics from Laval University in Quebec City and an M.A. in writing from Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

**Book:** The Age of Wonder is an examination of the life and work of three remarkable scientists of the Romantic age, who laid the foundations of modern science in Britain. It tells the story of astronomers William and Caroline Herschel, chemists Humphry Davy and Michael Faraday and medical scientists, John Abernethy and William Lawrence. They each challenged traditional ideas about human identity, morality and religious belief and they were pioneers, in a time where distinctions between poetry, art and science were yet to take hold.

**Author:** One of the greatest living biographers, Richard Holmes is an immense authority on history, military and is a household name on the BBC. His biography of *Shelley* won the Somerset Maugham Prize. *Footsteps* (1985) revolutionised the way biography was thought about and written. Part one of his biography of *Coleridge* won the 1989 Whitbread Book of the Year Prize. His portrait of the friendship between *Dr Johnson and Mr Savage* won the James Tait Black Prize. The concluding volume of his Coleridge biography won the Duff Cooper Prize and the William Heinemann award. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, a Fellow of the British Academy and was awarded an OBE in 1992. He lives in the UK with novelist Rose Tremain.

The story concerns Matilda, a 13 year old girl living in a remote village surrounded by civil unrest in the Pacific. With services shutting down, the only remaining white man, Mr Watts, takes over classes in the schoolroom, reading aloud to his class from *Great Expectations*. Soon Dickens' hero Pip starts to come alive for Matilda, becoming as real to her as her God-fearing mother, and the greatest friendship of her life begins.

**Author:** Award-winning novelist Lloyd Jones was born in 1955 in New Zealand. He has worked as a journalist and covered Papua New Guinea's blockade of Bougainville during the 1990s, the setting for his latest book *Mister Pip*. Jones has received awards including the Katherine Mansfield Memorial Fellowship in 1988, the Deutz Medal for Fiction, the Tasmania Pacific Fiction Prize (2003) and the Montana New Zealand Book Award (2001) for *The Book of Fame*. An early collection of Jones' short fiction *Swimming to Australia and Other Stories*, was short-listed for the New Zealand Fiction Award.

She highlights the plight of so-called enemy combatants, who ended up at Guantánamo because of large bounties paid by U.S. forces. A blistering exposé of the blatant injustices inflicted in the name of fighting terrorists.

Author: Mahvish Khan is an American lawyer, born to immigrant Afghan parents in Michigan. Outraged that her country was illegally imprisoning people at Guantánamo, she volunteered to translate for the prisoners. She spoke their language, understood their customs, and brought them Starbucks chai, the closest available drink to the kind of tea they would drink at home. She is a recent law school graduate and journalist. She has been published in the The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times, The Washington Post and other media. She lives in San Diego.

Book: Born to an Iraqi-Christian father and a British mother, and raised in Britain and Canada, Leilah Nadir has never set foot on Iraqi soil. Distanced from her Iraqi roots through immigration and now cut off by war, the closest link she has to the nation is through her father, who left Baghdad in the 1960s to pursue his studies in England. His Iraq is of mythical origins; his beginnings are in a garden at the family home that now lays vacant. Through her father's memories, Leilah recounts her family's lost story, from Irag at the turn of the twentieth century during the British occupation, to the Irag- Iran War and the Gulf War. Through her cousins still living in Baghdad, she experiences the thunderous explosions of the present-day conflict. A wonderfully detailed exploration of life in Baghdad filtered through the voices and memories of the Iraqi Diaspora.

Author: Leilah Nadir is a freelance writer who has written and broadcast political commentaries for the CBC, The Globe and Mail, and The Georgia Straight and in Brick magazine. She has a master's degree in English literature from the University of Edinburgh and a joint honours bachelor's degree in English and history from McGill University. **Book:** Sun Shuyun grew up in China and has always been fascinated by Tibet and Buddhism. Both an author and historian, Shuyun takes the reader, with her latest book, to a tiny and isolated village in Tibet, known for its anti–Chinese stance. She and a television crew, who were half Chinese and half Tibetan, lived and worked there for eighteen months, filming and recording daily life. A Year in Tibet is an insight into the relationship between the Chinese and Tibetans, the history behind it, and the way the two interact in the 21st century. Written with Sun Shuyun's characteristic insight into relationships, this is social and political history with an emphasis on humanity.

**Author:** Sun Shuyun was born in China in the 1960s and grew up during the Cultural Revolution. She graduated from Beijing University and won a scholarship to Oxford. She is now a film and television producer. For the past decade she has been dividing her time between London and Beijing, making documentaries for the UK's BBC, Channel 4 and international broadcasters.

The play is a one-man show, written, directed by, and starring Ryan J-W Smith. It takes audiences into the pseudo-classroom of the would-be nefarious world ruler as he gives a master class in leading a nation to war through fear and propaganda. Smith's play is an unique, humorous and disturbing commentary on the startling truths surrounding America's current Neo-Conservative administration, its rise to power, how it relates to past administrations and fits in with America's overall quest for global hegemony since the end of World War II. *New World Order* presents some of the evidence supporting the suggestion that 9/11 was an inside job. Like all Smith's plays, *New World Order* is written entirely in rhyming iambic verse.

**Artistic Director:** Ryan J-W Smith is the Artistic Director of *The Rogue Shakespeare Company*. Founded in 2001, the company's first production was Smith's first verse play *Sweet Love Adieu* performed in the Roman Amphitheatre at St. Albans, UK. Smith has been a professional actor since the age of 19 and graduated from Trinity College, Dublin. He then spent a twenty-year career as a foreign correspondent for The Guardian, winning several awards. While at The Guardian, he was a witness to the events of 'Bloody Sunday' He has more recently written for such publications as Condé Nast Traveler, Smithsonian Magazine, National Geographic and The New York Times. Before his success in book writing he was notable for being a journalist held captive by Argentinean forces in the Falkland Islands. In the BBC television drama about the invasion, An Ungentlemanly Act, he was played by Paul Geoffrey.
