The Center for Jewish Education provides a wide variety of educational opportunities to all levels and ages of Jewish learners. Programs and classes include discussions of

current happenings in Israel, basic Judaism courses, adult education classes, community lectures, cultural arts events, the annual Jewish Film Festival, Hebrew reading, and conversational Hebrew. The agency also coordinates the Community Yom HaShoah Commemoration, an annual Holocaust remembrance service.

The Center for Jewish Education provides direct financial subvention to the synagogue religious schools and oversees the administration of grants and scholarships for preschool, day school, undergraduate and graduate studies, residential Jewish camps, and Israel experiences. The agency is also involved with the Federation's Partnership with Israel program, including educational and cultural programs, as well as Israel advocacy efforts. Special needs services to the synagogue religious schools and teacher training for religious school, day school and JCC preschool staff are also included in the agency's responsibilities.

The Jewish Community Center (JCC) is both a facility and an organization. Membership dues, activity fees and Federation allocations support activities at the JCC. A variety of JCC membership categories are available to meet the needs of our community. The JCC offers a vast array of activities for members of all ages that encourage family bonding.

- Athletics -

The JCC basketball and athletic program is like no other in the city. Dedicated and talented staff work year round with children and adults in having fun, perfecting their skills, and creating a love for the game,



whatever it may be, including basketball, soccer, flag football, volleyball, lacrosse, and more. The JCC also offers athletic programming with a special focus on girls' participation in sports, teaching girls the necessary skills to enhance their athletic ability, learn fundamentals and have fun playing sports.

- Aquatics -



With two adult and two children's pools, the Aquatics Department has room for everyone. The outdoor Olympic size pool is open from Memorial Day through Labor Day. The indoor pool offers lap lanes

for fitness swimmers and space for water aerobics and swim classes year round. Swim lessons are available for youth from beginners to advanced. There's even a swim team for swimmers to compete in city-wide leagues.

The Phil Sokolof Fitness Center offers state-of-the-art cardiovascular and resistance machines, and free weights with professional staff to orient you to the equipment and get you started on the road to a healthier lifestyle! We also provide personal training for that additional encouragement, support and expertise. Group exercise classes are also available, and are among the best in Omaha, including spinning, kickboxing, aerobics, master's classes, yoga, Pilates reformer training, and more!

- Dance -



The Dance Department of the Jewish Community Center strives to impart the joy and discipline of dance through a well-rounded program of high caliber dance instruction. Classes in pre-ballet, ballet, pointe, jazz, tap and modern dance are offered in a variety of levels with emphasis on technique, musicality, body awareness and the development of

self-expression through movement.

In addition to classes, students may participate in a variety of special programs such as choreographic workshops and performance opportunities with local and nationally recognized artists, field trips to area dance events, dance films and special lectures.

As dance is a performing art, performance experience is an important element in dance training. Each year there is a culminating recital in May. Performances alternate each year between a grande story ballet and a themed show.



- Massage -

The JCC offers a first class men's and women's massage program to our members. All JCC Massage Therapists are licensed and certified, and specialize in a variety of massage techniques. Our staff is extremely talented and dedicated to providing a relaxing and soothing massage experience at a time that is convenient for you.

- Jewish Culture -



The JCC offers many Jewish Cultural and Educational Programs for children and adults, including community- wide celebrations such as Yom Ha'Atzmaut and the Hanukkah Festival. This department also schedules exhibits in the JCC

Art Gallery, where contemporary Judaic and Israeli art is displayed, along with the works of local and regional artists.

Our year-round Community Shaliach also brings the Israel experience to Omaha in a very personal way.

Through the latest in satellite technology, the JCC of Omaha is partnering with the "92nd Street Y" in New York to bring the best of their programming to our community.

- BBYO and Teen Programming -

The B'nai B'rith Youth Organization (BBYO) is a youth-led worldwide organization that provides Jewish teens with a peer group that reinforces Jewish identity and strengthens links within the community. Chapters elect officers, run their own meetings, and plan and carry out their own activities with adult guidance.

The boys belong to Aleph Zadik Aleph (AZA), and the girls belong to B'nai B'rith Girls (BBG). Presently Omaha has two AZA chapters and two BBG chapters. The BBG chapters program in the areas



of community service, sisterhood, recreation, social action, creativity and Jewish heritage. Likewise, AZA chapters focus their programming on athletics, community service, cultural, social and religion.

BBYO also sponsors regional conventions and sends many teens to Israel and BBYO leadership training seminars throughout the summer.

The teen department offers teen trips to Israel, and organizes the Omaha team for the JCC Maccabi Games, which are held annually in locations around the country.



This department also offers programming for 5th - 8th graders, including JCC specialty camp. Specialty camp participants are constantly on the go with field trips, art activities, sports and swimming.

- Youth Services -



The Youth Services Department specializes in serving school age youth from kindergarten through sixth grade. In addition to Kidz Inn, our before and after school program, Youth Services provides

special programs for children when school is not in session. School break specials offer field trips and activities to keep children active and entertained.

We also offer a variety of special classes and events after school, Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons.

During the summer, Youth Services offers JCC summer camp. Our day camps are fully accredited by the American Camping Association.

The Pennie Z. Davis Child Development Center (CDC) provides a top quality early childhood program to JCC families with children from 6 weeks to 5 ½ years. The CDC has been accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

Our program provides an educational experience which emphasizes age appropriate activities designed to build self-confidence and prepare youngsters for the formal school environment. The curriculum incorporates Judaic culture and values to enhance Jewish identity. Part time programs include gym, swim, art and music. An early childhood education specialist and a special needs teacher are also on staff. Exploratory classes for children 3 to 5 ½

years of age are available for an additional cost.

Camp Shemesh provides young children with a summer camp experience 2, 3, or 5 days per week.

An accomplished team of JFS therapists and social service professionals provide outstanding assistance to the community in the following areas:

<u>Counseling & Crisis Intervention:</u> Provides support for families and individuals confronted with personal difficulties or sudden tragedy.

<u>Adoption Services:</u> Includes home studies and placement, both domestic and international.

Emergency Financial Assistance: Provides short-term support and relief to Jewish families in need.

<u>Family Life Education & Enrichment:</u> Assists with parenting issues and everyday challenges facing families.

<u>Project Dreidel and Tzedakah:</u> Serves Jewish families in need during the holidays by delivering traditional kosher meals, gifts and other items.

<u>Special Needs (Yachad):</u> Includes social, cultural and religious activities plus advocacy, referral services and general support for Jews with developmental disabilities and their families.

Beth El Synagogue, affiliated with the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, is the center for Conservative Judaism in Omaha. We are committed to conserving and upholding Jewish traditions. We also

believe the Jewish tradition continues to grow and change over the generations as the tradition interacts with modern life. Because of this view, women participate equally with men in our services.

Our membership includes singles, just married couples, families with young children, families with teen-aged children, empty nesters, Jews-by-choice and intermarried couples exploring Jewish choices.

Daily, Sabbath and holiday services, Sabbath and High Holiday child care and a full array of youth and adult programming activities are all offered. There is also a full range of adult education opportunities.



- BESTT Religious School -

Beth El offers a Sunday morning program for grades K-2, and Sunday plus two-day-a-week program for grades 3-7. Weekly Shabbat Junior Congregation stresses Siddur Skills and the weekly Torah portion for grades 3-7. Tot Shabbat and Shabbat Tunes & Tales are offered for families with children age 6 and under. Shabbat Morning Live, a program for children ages 4-8 and their parents, provides a brief Shabbat morning service and activities several times a year. The High School of Jewish Studies meets weekly, offering a contemporary curriculum geared to the needs and interests of teens in grades 8-12. A trip to New York or Washington, D.C. is offered annually.



- Beth El Youth Group Activities -

All Jewish 9-12th grade students are invited to join United Synagogue Youth (USY), the youth movement of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. Seventh and eighth grade students have a youth group of their own called Kadima. USY and Kadima are both dedicated to creating a fun, educational environment where Jewish teenagers can connect. Chaverim is a social group for all Jewish students in grades 4-6. College students meet several times a year.

synagogue affiliation. NCSY offers local and regional programming for teenagers in a relaxed, fun environment. Jr. NCSY is for youth in grades six through eight and Senior NCSY for ninth through twelfth graders.





- Beth Israel Religious School -

Beth Israel offers an innovative approach to religious education through the following programs:

Shabbat Morning: Age appropriate classes on Shabbat morning are offered for children ages two through pre-Bar/Bat Mitzvah, and include study on the parsha of the week plus aspects of Shabbat services and upcoming holidays and rituals. Babysitting is available at no charge each Shabbat (infants welcome).

<u>Hebrew Tutoring:</u> Beth Israel offers one hour per week of private or small group tutoring in Hebrew language and synagogue skills.

<u>Junior High/High School:</u> Class is held on Sunday mornings during the school year for the 7th through 12th graders. This class covers everything from biblical literacy to Israel advocacy, always focusing on making Judaism relevant to a 21st century teen.

<u>Friedel Tuition Subsidy:</u> Families whose primary membership is at Beth Israel are eligible for a tuition subsidy to Friedel Jewish Academy.

Our Middle/High School meets weekly and students are given a large "menu" of classes from which to choose.

Our religious school welcomes children of all abilities and

provides special services for children with special needs. A weekly parent/toddler program is available for families with children 12-36 months old.





- Omaha Temple Youth Group (OTYG) -

A Temple Israel priority is developing Jewish identity and commitment among our youth. Trips to Israel, intra-city activities, summer camping, and meeting peers from neighboring states are integral components in helping our youth mature as Jews. Pre-teen programming begins with Club 56 for fifth and sixth graders, and continues through Junior Youth Group (for seventh and eighth graders) and OTYG (Omaha Temple Youth Group) for ninth through twelfth grade students.

In 1994, the Dan and Esther Gordman Center for Jewish Learning was established on the JCC Campus to house the relocated Friedel Jewish Academy. Friedel is an elementary school for Jewish children in grades K-6 and is fully accredited by the Nebraska State Department of Education.

Friedel was founded in 1965 by a small group of people who wanted to provide a superb education for their children in a pluralistic Jewish community — a mission we continue to honor today.

Our innovative Fine Arts curriculum permeates the general and Jewish studies programs. General studies include the traditional areas of math, social studies, science, reading, language arts, technology, health and wellness, music, and physical education,



including weekly swimming lessons. Along with special emphasis in communications, integration and interdisciplinary studies, Friedel Jewish Academy offers a unique and exceptional educational experience.
