

THE RETIRED JERSEYS

NUMBER "23" BYRON LARKIN ('88), Xavier's all-time leading scorer with 2,696 career points, was the first Xavier player to have his jersey number retired. The ceremony was held at Cincinnati Gardens on February 8, 1990. Larkin, who is now the Xavier radio color analyst, won two Midwestern Collegiate Conference Player of the Year awards and three MCC Tournament MVP awards. Larkin is one of only two Musketeers ever to earn a spot on one of the top two teams of a major All-America Team. Larkin was a 1987-88 Scripps Howard and UPI Second Team All-American and a 1987-88 AP Third Team All-American.

NUMBER "42" TYRONE HILL ('90), Xavier's all-time leading rebounder with 1,380 career rebounds and fourth all-time leading scorer with 2,003 career points, was the second Xavier player to have his jersey number retired. The ceremony was held at the Gardens on February 4, 1996. Hill, Xavier's first-ever NBA Draft "lottery pick" in 1990, won the MCC Player of the Year award as a senior and the MCC Tournament MVP Award as a junior.

NUMBER "30" DAVID WEST ('03), Xavier's second all-time leading scorer with 2,132 career points and third all-time leading rebounder with 1,308 career boards, is the latest Xavier player to have his jersey number retired. The ceremony was held before the 2002-03 season's regular season home finale at Cintas Center on March 8, 2003. West, the first player to have his jersey number retired while still an active Musketeer player, was the 2002-03 Associated Press, United States Basketball Writers Association and *Basketball Times* National Player of the Year. Xavier's first-ever National Player of the Year and consensus First Team All-American, West won a conference-record three straight Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year awards.

Xavier University's impressive 2009 Athletic Hall of Fame class that will be inducted on Sunday, December 6 includes **Thrine M. Kane (Xavier '03)**, an eight-time All-American on the Xavier Rifle team that also earned a spot on the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team while still an XU student at the age of 19. The other two inductees to the Hall of Fame were part of the most successful women's basketball season in history, the 2001 Elite Eight run. **Nicole M. Levandusky ('01)** and **Taru T. Tuukkanen ('01)** join former teammate **Jennifer L. Phillips ('01)**, who is a previous inductee into the prestigious hall.

The latest three inductees will bring the total to 105 individuals that will be honored in the P. Douglas O'Keefe Athletic Hall of Fame at Cintas Center. These honorees and many others are honored in the displays at Cintas Center. The Cintas Center display, which opened in 2005, is the result of a gift from 1959 graduate P. Douglas O'Keefe. The hall was constructed on the Cintas Center concourse in an area that overlooks the student dining area of the Center. The hall includes display cases with a variety of memorabilia and trophies, video monitors and much more.







Xavier has become a regular in the major national polls, including a ranking of 15th in the 2009 Final ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll (post-NCAA Tournament seen to the left) and 20th in final 2009 Associated Press Poll. The year before, in 2008, XU recorded a school-record eighth in the 2008 Final ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll (post-NCAA Tournament seen to the right) and a school-record 12th in final Associated Press Poll in 2008 and 2003. The 2003 season was the senior year for 2003 National Player of the Year David West.

STREAKING IN THE MAJOR POLLS

The Musketeers made the Associated Press top 25 in each of the final 17 polls in 2008-09, including number 20 in the final poll. XU also made the ESPN/USA Today top 25 in each of the last 17 polls, including number 15 in the final post-NCAA tournament poll.

Xavier tied the school record this past season for highest regular season ranking in the Associated Press Poll when it climbed to number seven the week of December 15, 2008. That same week XU broke the school record for highest regular season ranking in the ESPN/USA Today Poll when the Musketeers were tied for seventh.

Xavier was ranked in at least one of the two polls every week from December 2, 1996 until March 8, 1998. Xavier spent a school-record 28 straight polls in the AP Poll (beginning 12-2-96) before being left out of the February 8, 1998 poll. XU reached as high as seventh in the December 7, 1997 AP poll. Xavier's run in the ESPN/USA Today Poll began December 8, 1996 and ended in the March 8, 1998 poll.

BACK IN THE TOP 20

Xavier cracked the Associated Press Top 20 in 1988 for the first time in 30 years. After winning 11 straight games, the 22-3 Musketeers were back in the AP Top 20 on Mon., Feb. 29, 1988. XU had not been ranked in the Top 20 in the AP or UPI poll since December of 1958.

The Musketeers went on to win a then-school record 15 straight games in 1988. They took a 26-3 record into the 1988 NCAA Tournament, finishing number 18 in the final Associated Press Top 20 Poll.

POSTSEASON TOURNAMENT TRADITION

Xavier basketball history is filled with many memorable postseason moments, including 23 appearances in postseason play (NCAA or NIT) over the last 27 years, including 19 NCAA Tournaments in 27 seasons.

In 2009, Xavier made its fourth straight NCAA Tournament appearance and its eighth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last nine years, including the 2009 Sweet 16, the 2008 and 2004 Elite Eight runs and the NCAA Second Round in 2007, 2003 and 2002.

Xavier reached at least the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 for the second straight year in 2009. Only seven teams reached the Sweet 16 in each of the past two seasons: Xavier, North Carolina, Kansas, Louisville, Michigan State, Memphis and Villanova.

TOP SEEDS EVER

Xavier's number three seed in the 2008 NCAA Tournament equalled the highest in school history. Xavier was a three seed in the 2002-03 season, which was the senior year for 2003 National Player of the Year **David West** (now a two-time NBA All-Star with the New Orleans Hornets). The 2008 team made the Elite Eight while the 2003 team made the NCAA Tournament Second Round.

NCAA TOURNAMENT SUCCESS

Xavier has enjoyed some recent success in postseason tournament play, including the impressive 2004 and 2008 NCAA Tournament Elite Eight runs and 2009's Sweet 16 appearance, and winning its way to the second round of the 2002, 2003 and 2007 NCAA Tournaments.

Xavier made its 20th all-time appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2009, including 10 at-large berths (2009, 2008, 2007, 2003, 2001, 1997, 1995, 1993, 1990 and 1961), six automatic berths through the MCC (1991, 1989, 1988, 1987, 1986 and 1983) and four automatic berths through the Atlantic 10 (2006, 2004, 2002 and 1998).

Xavier, 17-20 all-time in the NCAA Tournament, was 1-6 in NCAA play prior to 1990 but is 16-14 from 1990-present. Xavier has advanced to at least the second round in 10 of its last 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, including the Elite Eight appearances in 2008 and in 2004 and the

Sweet 16 in 2009 and 1990. The two prior to 1990 when Xavier didn't advance to the second round, 1988 and 1989, XU lost to the eventual National Champions in the first round, Kansas and Michigan, respectively.

ELITE STATUS IN 2004 AND 2008

It became known to Xavier fans as "The Run" in 2004. Xavier swept through the Atlantic 10 Tournament for a historic four wins in four days, including an 87-67 demolition of previously unbeaten and No. 1 Saint Joseph's in the second round.

No. 7 Seed Xavier trailed No. 10 Seed Louisville 42-31 at halftime in the 2004 NCAA First Round, but dominated the second half on both ends of the court to record an 80-70 victory, outscoring Louisville 49-28 after intermission. XU dispatched of No. 2 Seed Mississippi State 89-74 behind 31 points from senior **Lionel Chalmers** in the second round, earning its first spot in the Sweet 16 since 1990.

This time Xavier was determined to make it past the Sweet 16 round. XU beat No. 3 Seed Texas 79-71 in the Regional Semifinals in Atlanta, Ga., behind 27 points from senior **Romain Sato**. Xavier drew No. 1 Seed Duke in the Regional Final. The Musketeers led 30-28 at halftime and led for most of the second half thanks in great part to a dominating effort from senior big man **Anthony Myles**, who scored 16 points and grabbed 10 rebounds. XU led 44-41 with 12:27 left when Myles fouled out after logging 23 minutes.

Appropriately, seniors Lionel Chalmers, Romain Sato and Anthony Myles all earned spots on the five-member NCAA Atlanta Regional All-Tournament Team.

Xavier made another magical run in 2008. Musketeer senior **Josh Duncan** earned a spot on the five-member 2008 NCAA West Region All-Tournament Team as he led Xavier to wins over Georgia, Purdue and an overtime thriller over West Virginia on the way to a second NCAA Elite Eight appearance in five years. Duncan, who scored a team-high 18.3 ppg. during the NCAA Tournament, earned CBS/Chevrolet Game MVP honors for each of Xavier's three 2008 NCAA Tournament wins, including a career-high 26 points in the win over West Virginia. **B.J. Raymond's** overtime three-pointers will go down as some of the biggest moments in Xavier hoops history.

THE FIRST SWEET SEASON

Xavier was in the national spotlight in the 1989-90 season. There was another MCC Championship and NCAA Tournament berth. The best was yet to come.

Xavier, which earned an NCAA Tournament seeding of sixth in the Midwest Region, returned to a familiar and friendly site for its NCAA action. XU returned to the Indiana Hoosier Dome, the same place where XU had grabbed national headlines in the 1987 NCAA Tourney. XU upset 14th-ranked Missouri, 70-69, in the first round of the 1987 NCAA Tournament.

Xavier's 1990 roster had six current or future 1,000 point-scorers, including **Tyrone Hill, Derek Strong, Aaron Williams, Jamie Gladden, Michael Davenport** and **Jamal Walker**. Hill, Strong and Williams went on to the NBA. Hill and Strong combined for 46 points and 25 rebounds as XU advanced to the second round with an 87-79 win over the Big Eight's Kansas State.

The win over Kansas State put XU against Georgetown in the second round on CBS. Xavier jumped out to a 16-point halftime lead, 42-26, and held on for a thrilling 74-71 win over Alonzo Mourning, Dikembe Mutombo and the rest of the Hoyas. Strong had 19 points and 12 rebounds and Walker added 15 points and nine assists. The win advanced Xavier to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 for the first time ever.

XAVIER'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Xavier celebrated the 50th anniversary of the 1958 National Invitation Tournament Championship last season. Xavier won the title with a 78-74 overtime victory over highly-favored Dayton at Madison Square Garden in New York City on March 22, 1958. The championship, which marked the first major basketball national championship by any Ohio college or university, came at a time when the NIT was equal to or, according to many experts, more prestigious than the NCAA Tournament.

FIRST POSTSEASON ACTION

One of the first times that Xavier stepped into the national spotlight in basketball was 60 years ago in the 1948 N.A.I.B. (National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball) Tournament. The Musketeers made the appearance count with a fourth place finish.



THE CINDERELLA STORY

As the saying goes, "the third time was a charm" for Xavier and its fans. In 1956 head coach **Ned Wulk** guided the Musketeers to their first-ever National Invitation Tournament appearance, upsetting St. Louis 84-80 in the first round before losing in the Quarterfinals to NIT finalist Dayton 72-68. Wulk brought Xavier back into the NIT in 1957, defeating Seton Hall 85-79 before being eliminated by eventual champion Bradley.

Needless to say, expectations were high heading into the 1957-58 season. First-year head coach **Jim McCafferty**'s team jumped out of the gate with a 10-1 record and accepted an NIT bid at that time.

Then things started to fall apart. XU lost 10 of its last 15 regular season games and was asked by the NIT selection committee if it wished to withdraw from the tourney. McCafferty answered with an emphatic "No!"

This set the stage for Xavier's Cinderella Story, a championship which *Sport* magazine has called "one of the greatest upsets in basketball history." Most people thought the Musketeers' stay in New York would be a short one. They were seeded last.



Jim McCafferty led Xavier to the 1958 National Invitation Tournament Championship, giving XU the distinction of being the first university in Ohio to win a major national championship in basketball. There are plenty of trophies and other mementos of that championship in the P. Douglas O'Keefe Xavier Athletic Hall of Fame on the concourse at Cintas Center.

The underdog Musketeers struggled early in their first game, falling behind Niagara 16-3. XU came back to beat Niagara 95-86, and went on to defeat Bradley (72-62) and St. Bonaventure (72-53) on its way to the NIT Champion Game.

Three straight upsets put the Musketeers into the finals against highly-favored Dayton on national television.

Hank Stein, who was named Tourney MVP, took control as the game went to overtime tied at 67-all. He helped the Musketeers put together a 7-2 run, giving them a 74-69 advantage. XU held on for a 78-74 win, becoming the first college basketball team in Ohio to win a major national championship.

For the third straight game, Xavier had the hot hand, shooting 53 percent from the field. Stein (23) led the scoring parade while **Ducky Castelle** added 19. Four Musketeers were named to the All-Tournament Team, including MVP Hank Stein. **Joe Viviano**, Ducky Castelle and **Tony Olberding** joined Stein as All-NIT selections. The Cinderella Story was complete. It was time for the celebrations.







* Xavier made its 23rd postseason appearance in the last 27 years, including its 19th NCAA Tournament berth during that time. XU only made the NCAA Tournament field one time (1961) before the 1982-83 season.

* Xavier, a school record 30-7 for the 2007-08 season and 27-8 for the 2008-09 season, has recorded four straight 20-win seasons and 12 in the last 13 years.

* Xavier has won four Atlantic 10 Tournament Championships in its first 14 seasons in the A-10 (2006, 2004, 2002 and 1998). Xavier has won or shared 14 regular season conference championships over the last 27 years (seven A-10 and seven MCC), while winning 10 conference tournament championships (four A-10 and six MCC).


