


A Profile of Haggerston Ward

Introduction

This profile explores the demographic, social and economic characteristics of Haggerston ward. All data used in this profile has been drawn from Census 2001 unless stated otherwise. All census data has been sourced via Neighbourhood Statistics (http://neighbourhood.statistics.gov.uk).

Haggerston ward lies in the south-west of Hackney. At the time of the 2001 census its 124 hectares were home to 10,366 people. The ward forms part of the Shoreditch neighbourhood. It includes some of Shoreditch itself, an increasingly fashionable area that has become a focal point of London's night-time economy.

The profile shows that Haggerston's population has a similar age profile to Hackney's, though with slightly more 20 to 30 year olds, and is more ethnically diverse, with proportionately more Black people and fewer White ones than average. The ward has many single person and lone parent households.

Haggerston's economic and social profiles show it to be poorer than the Hackney norm. Levels of qualifications are lower and more people are unemployed or economically inactive - less than half the working-age population is in work. Residents also have marginally higher levels of poor health.

The area has much higher crime rates than the borough average, although crime has fallen in the last year.

Hackney's population is younger than that of either London or England and Wales. It has particularly big cohorts of 0-14 year olds and 25-44 year olds, but smaller ones among those aged 45 and over.

Haggerston's age profile broadly follows Hackney's. However, it does have relatively fewer children and more twentysomethings.

Hackney is one of the most ethnically diverse boroughs in the country – more than 40% of its people are non-White. Black groups make up the largest component of the minority communities, accounting for almost a quarter of Hackney's people.

This diversity is even more pronounced in Haggerston. Almost 30% of the ward's population is Black. It also has higher proportions of Bangladeshis and Chinese or Other groups than is typical for the borough.



Religion in Haggerston



Less than half of Hackney's residents describe themselves as Christians — a significantly smaller proportion than in London or England and Wales. The borough has relatively high proportions of Jews, Muslims and people with no religion or who declined to state one.

Haggerston has higher proportions of both Christians and Muslims than Hackney does, but a much lower one of Jews. Its Buddhist community is also slightly larger than the average for the borough.

Close to 60% of Londoners are classed as ABs or C1s (the groups conventionally regarded as the middle class), a significantly higher percentage than in the country as a whole. Hackney, though, lies closer to the England and Wales average. However, more than a fifth of the borough's people fall into social class E, an unusually high proportion by national standards.

Haggerston's class profile shows high concentrations of grades D and E – they constitute almost 45% of the ward's people. Haggerston has comparatively few ABs.

Hackney has proportionately more lone parent, single person and multi person households than the averages for both London and England and Wales, and fewer married couple households (both with and without children).

Haggerston generally has a similar profile to the wider borough, but it does have a higher share of lone parent households and a lower one of married couple households.

More than half of Hackney's housing is socially rented, a much higher percentage than in London or nationally. Home ownership is correspondingly lower – less than a third of the borough's properties fall into this category. According to Halifax Estate Agents, property prices per square metre rose by 320% between 1996 and 2006 in Hackney, the biggest rise in London. In 2002 (the last year for which we have ward data) median house prices in Hackney were in line with the London average, and well above the national equivalent.

Social housing is dominant in Haggerston, too, accounting for around 64% of tenure. Prices for flats in the ward are much higher than the Hackney average.

In England and Wales the largest single group is those with no qualifications – 29% of adults. London's qualifications profile, however, is very different from the national picture. It has a better-educated population, with 31% of people having at least a first degree (level 4/5). It also has below average numbers with level 1 or 2 qualifications, while less than a quarter of its people have none. These trends are even more distinct in Hackney, which has lots of residents with degrees or with no qualifications, and relatively few with intermediate level ones.

Haggerston's profile is also skewed in this fashion, although it has slightly more people with no qualifications than with degrees.





Economic activity rates in Hackney are much lower than in London or England and Wales.

Unemployment is higher and there are many more students as a proportion of the population.

Economic Activity in Haggerston



Things are worse in Haggerston than in Hackney generally. Less than half the residents between the ages of 16 and 74 are in employment, and the unemployment rate is above the borough average. There are also large numbers of students.

Although the wide-ranging 'real estate, renting and business activities' is the largest single category of employment, the most striking element in Hackney's profile is its dependence on public services, especially education, health and social work. Like the broader London economy, Hackney also has a much smaller share of employment in manufacturing than the national average.

Haggerston shows a somewhat different pattern. The public services are not so important here. The business activities sector is larger than average, while employment in hotels and restaurants is also higher than the Hackney norm.

London's profile is strongly skewed towards managerial, professional and administrative occupations, with smaller proportions than nationally of skilled tradespeople; process, plant and machine operatives; and those in personal or customer service occupations. Hackney differs somewhat from the London pattern. It has more professionals and associates and fewer managers. It also has a higher percentage of those in elementary occupations.

Haggerston's profile is different again. It has relatively low shares of managers and professionals by Hackney standards, but slightly higher ones of personal and customer services workers. Perhaps the most notable figure, though, is that for those working in elementary occupations – almost 14%. This category includes labourers, postal workers, cleaners, bar/restaurant staff and security guards.



The health of Hackney's residents is broadly in line with national trends, but is a little worse than London's. It should be noted though that the borough has a young population by England and Wales' standards, so its health ought to be relatively good.

Haggerston residents' health is marginally poorer than the average for Hackney. Just over two-thirds of residents report their health as good, while almost a fifth have a limiting long-term illness. Despite this, the proportion of people providing unpaid care is comparatively low.

The most recent figures available from the Metropolitan Police suggest crime has been falling in Hackney in the last year. Only one category of crime – sexual offences – has seen an increase, while significant falls have been recorded among some other types of offences: burglary, for instance, has seen a 30% fall.

Recorded crime in Haggerston ward has also been falling. However, increases have been seen some categories, such as drugs offences and violence against the person. Crime in Haggerston is generally much higher than the average for Hackney, especially for theft, violence against the person and burglary, perhaps reflecting problems associated with the area's booming nightlife.



The Index of Multiple Deprivation tries to gauge the level of deprivation in a locality across several 'domains', including employment, income, health, education and crime. Much of Hackney falls into super output areas (SOAs) classified as being among the 20% most deprived in the country.

All seven SOAs in Haggerston ward rank among the 20% most deprived nationally. According to a calculation prepared for the GLA, Haggerston itself ranks as the 11th most deprived ward in London.



Land Use in Haggerston



London is a surprisingly green city – public green spaces, bodies of water and domestic gardens account for almost two-thirds of its land area. Hackney is more built-up than the London average, though green space and gardens still take up over 40% of its land.

Haggerston has very little domestic garden space, presumably due to the preponderance of flats in the area and the high number of business premises. However, more than a fifth of its land is public green space – principally, Haggerston Park.



Civic Representation

Haggerston ward's three councillors are Afolasade Bright (Lab), Barry Buitekant (Lab) and Jonathan McShane (Lab).

Turnout in Haggerston fell between 2002 and 2006, and remains below the borough average.

Haggerston lies in the parliamentary constituency of Hackney South and Shoreditch. This seat was won at the 2005 general election by Meg Hillier (Lab), with a majority of 10,204 on a 49.7% turnout.
