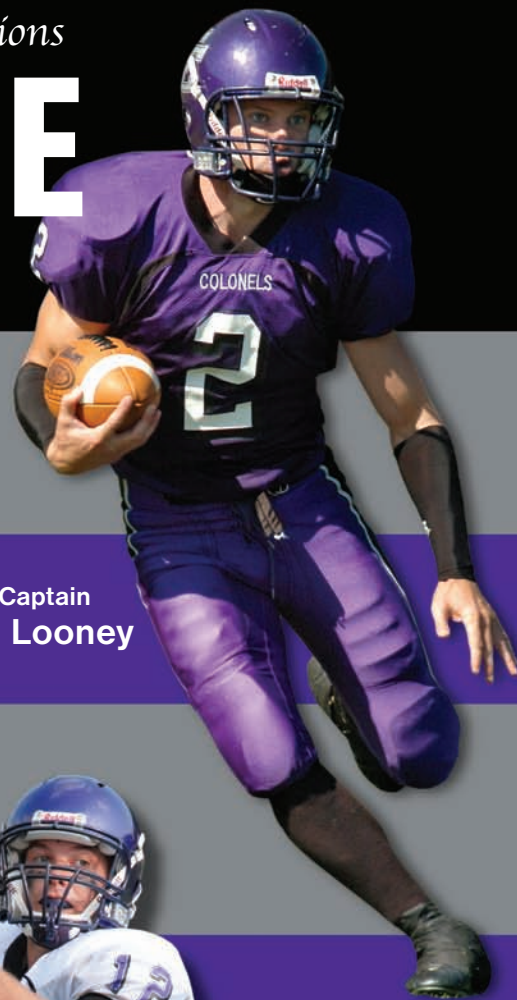

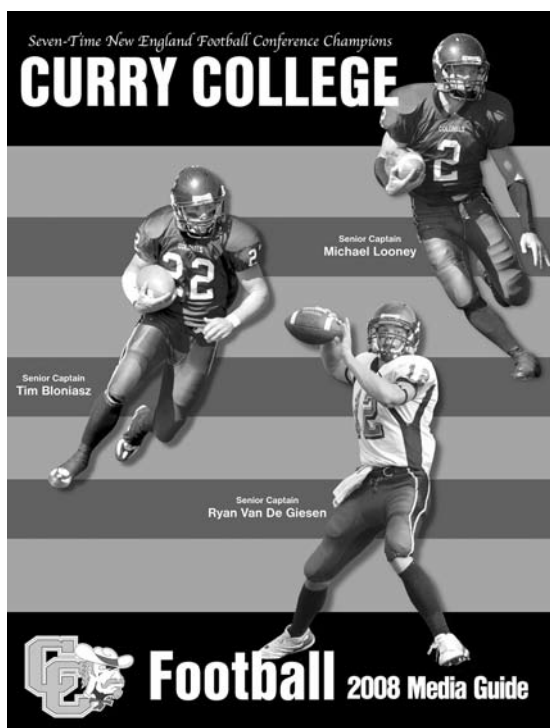

OFFENSE QUARTERBACKS

Coming off a year when he established a number of school records and was named as the Boyd Division Offensive Player of the Year, team captain Ryan Van De Giesen must be considered as a serious All-America candidate. The senior sits on the verge of setting career marks in nearly every passing category, including attempts and total yards. Head Coach Skip Bandini says without hesitation that "Ryan is clearly one of the better quarterbacks in the country." Van De Giesen's passing numbers were so solid last year that two other critical parts of his game could be easily overlooked. He not only cut down dramatically on his interceptions as compared with 2006, but also led the Colonels with 12 rushing touchdowns in 2007.

Sophomore Harold Rose is described by Bandini as "one of top athletes we've ever recruited." This two-sport athlete had a fairly quiet rookie campaign, but will be asked to contribute at a much higher level in 2008. "He understands the game at an extremely high level," says Bandini, adding that "Harold will not only serve as a back-up to Ryan but will also be a serious contender for significant playing time at wide receiver."

Bandini calls senior Pat Maloney "one of the classiest kids you'll ever meet." In addition to his on-field skills, Maloney is expected to contribute with his work ethic, understanding of the game, and willingness to do whatever is needed to help the team be successful.

Curry also boasts a trio of first-year signal-callers who will have the opportunity to impress their coaches during pre-season and keep the quarterback position in good hands for years to come. They include junior transfer Zach Cavanaugh and freshmen Anthony Carnevale and Robert Russo.

BACKFIELD

The 2008 Colonels' backfield corps may be the team's deepest in years. Junior Jamaal Woods, last season's leading rusher, is a natural playmaker with the most explosive speed on the team when he hits a hole. In 2007, Woods shared the workload at tailback with senior Steve DiFabio, selected as the Most Valuable Player in last year's conference championship game for grinding out yards on the ground in the second half of the Colonels' tense 10-7 win against Coast Guard. Bandini describes DiFabio as "one of the toughest kids I've ever been involved with."

Perhaps the most anticipated arrival in Milton this fall is a transfer from Central Connecticut State. Senior Joseph Freeman, a Lynn Classical grad, came to Curry after hearing of the football program's success and the team's reputation for cohesiveness. The Blue Devils' top rusher in 2007 rolled up 828 yards and scored 10 touchdowns. No doubt, the Division I-AA transfer certainly has his coach excited. "I would call him a true leader and a true teammate, who has incredible ability and an impeccable work ethic."

After a solid career at Marshfield High School, Scott Doherty attended Southern Connecticut State before transferring to Curry. The junior, who can play multiple positions, sat out last season as a redshirt but is now ready to contribute in 2008.

Among four rookie tailbacks in pre-season camp, Michael Gentili is definitely one that can look forward to a "great career at Curry College" according to his coach. Bandini cites the freshman's legitimate speed, good hands, work ethic and coachability in delivering that assessment.

Despite limited opportunities, senior Aljumaa McKenney is an evasive scat back with solid hands who has made key contributions when called upon during his first three seasons. Rounding out the tailbacks are rookies Raymond Russo, Daniel Joly and Gavin Parker, and sophomore Ryan Gagnon.

Three upperclassmen lead yet another deep group of runners at fullback. A solid blocker, junior Johnathan Sughrue played behind Frank Pacheco in 2007 and is likely to see more action in 2008. Classmate Shawn Perkins is a hard hitter embarking on his second

year at the fullback position. He also serves as the Colonels' special teams' captain. Sophomore Andrew Supple made great strides during his first year at Curry and might contend for increased game action.

Bandini touts Brockton's Aaron Richardson, a junior transfer, as a "hard-nosed player with great potential and a great attitude." He uses similar terms to describe his remaining fullback candidates, including sophomore Ryan Keller, and rookies David Bonaparte, San Lee and Brian Kureta.

RECEIVERS

Curry's receiving corps took a major hit with the graduation of Felix Borukhov. In 2007, he formed a tandem with then junior Brian Taylor that was as productive and reliable as any pair of wide-outs in the nation. Van De Giesen will not lack for targets this year even with Borukhov's absence. Taylor has and will continue to stand on his own as one of the best receivers in the country and may easily surpass the impressive numbers he posted a year ago.

After fulfilling a more limited role during his first two years, junior Jon Rodriguez seems poised for a breakout season. Bandini notes that "J-Rod" could evolve into an impact player in 2008 in large part because of his exceptional work on the field and his understanding of the system. Much the same could be said for the versatile Rose, whose pure athletic ability may pay off with a starting assignment at wide-out.

Beyond the projected top three, first-year Receivers' Coach Bill Struzzi has no shortage of candidates who can move up the depth chart with solid pre-season efforts. Some, like sophomores Dante Patterson and David Falaki, may have a leg up with one year in the system under their belts. Others, like rookies Matthew Bailey and Norman Landry arrive with enough raw talent to make an immediate impact. Sophomore Jonathan Chattman has a questionable status for 2008, but once his eligibility issues are resolved, he will quickly find himself in the mix among second-tier receiving candidates.

Bandini is encouraged by the progress of his remaining wide-outs, ruling nothing out as far as contributions to the team this season and beyond. That bodes well for sophomores Ryan Doherty and John Murphy, and freshmen Joshua Duford and Alexander Orekoa.

In terms of numbers, tight ends may not be the most plentiful position this year, but that will not diminish the competition among four hard-working candidates. Senior Shawn Parker is a tough player with a big heart who returns to the team after a one-year hiatus. Northeastern transfer Jeffrey Hibbard is a junior with great speed to go along with solid hands and excellent blocking skills. Sophomore Adam Braunstein, who saw significant action at the tight end position last fall, sets his sights on returning to that role by improving upon his rookie campaign. Lastly, Alexander Carluog is a first year player that Bandini bills as "an up and comer."

OFFENSIVE LINE

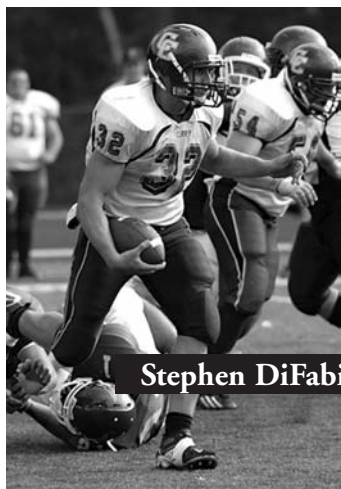
Recruiting and retaining all-conference performers on the offensive line has become a particular strength for the Curry coaching staff during the school's run of five-consecutive NEFC titles. Standouts like Kevin Kelleher and Eric Leonard gave way to equally-talented replacements like Chris Ernst, now the Colonels' offensive line coach.

Ernst himself made way for and now mentors a three-pack of outstanding junior linemen that includes center Peter Gustowski, right guard Kevin Lucius and right tackle Jarrod Ruiz. Bandini is not shy in describing this trio as "the best offensive lineman in the NEFC." He expected nothing less, but Bandini believes that all three have actually exceeded lofty expectations by excelling in camp this pre-season.

The line appears to solidify even more with the arrival of Connor McQuade, a junior transfer from Northeastern who has had a performance in camp equal to his three classmates. The plan on paper would likely have the aforementioned quartet among the team's

starting five, to be rounded out with senior Brian Breau, a frequent starter in 2007, and junior newcomer John Potsidis, a transfer from West Virginia University. Meanwhile, the talent pool on the o-line runs very deep. Sophomore John Pitkin has made a very strong case for himself throughout August, as have juniors Robie Leavitt and David Norris, and sophomore Kevin Fair.

To ensure that his team doesn't miss a beat when starters and significant reserves complete their four-year careers, Bandini has brought in a trio of newcomers who are a natural fit with the Colonels' recent offensive line traditions. Rookies Michael Lynch, Martin Prendergast and Brian Woollard will all see some playing time in 2008, but perhaps most importantly, they may be the next wave of all-conference performers and the anchors of the line in years to come.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Graduation hit the Colonels' defensive line hard with the departure of starting ends Nino Nunzianta and Will Chiccarelli, and Third-Team All-American and Boyd Division Defensive Player of the Year Tom Pinto at nose guard. Bandini and his staff worked tirelessly to bring in quality reinforcements to surround the lone returning starter Anthony Petrola. Now entering his senior year, Petrola turned in a high-quality effort at tackle in 2007, and will be the undisputed leader of the defensive line in 2008. Petrola should be counted on to turn in an all-conference caliber season according to his coach.

One returner working his way back from an off-season illness is Petrola's former high school teammate at Savio Prep, Bobby DiMarino. The junior, who has seen time as a back-up at nose guard, won't be ready for the start of the 2008 campaign, but may make his presence felt by the end of the season.

Pinto's immediate replacement is likely to be Dean College transfer Curtis Ushry. Bandini says that the junior from Brockton "can't replace Pinto, but he'll come pretty close." In fact, Bandini goes a step further, predicting that Ushry will quickly become one of best defensive linemen in league. In looking for a new first-stringer at end, the coaching staff may have already found what they need in sophomore Sean Pike, a solid contributor during his rookie year.

Several more defensive ends will try to separate themselves from the pack during pre-season camp. Two – sophomores Tim Dumas and Joseph Aswad – are known quantities seeking to break out in their second year. Two more – sophomore Jason Madden and freshman Tim Douglas – are new faces looking to make an immediate positive impression.

Among those vying for time at defensive tackle are Eddie Owens-Finch, another promising transfer from Dean; and a group of capable athletes that includes senior Aaron Smith (returning from an injury that kept him out of action all of last season), sophomores Chris Goll and Nicholas Bodge, and rookie Christopher Ingolia.

playing time as the season progressed, while Garafalo turned in his usual steady effort.

A First Team All-Boyd Division selection last year as a sophomore, Scott Driscoll made the move from the defensive backfield as a rookie and became a force as an outside backer with 47 tackles, five interceptions and a team-leading 12 pass break-ups. Classmate Mike Murray, Curry's 2006 Defensive Rookie of the Year, nailed down a starting assignment at outside linebacker early in his collegiate career and has maintained his high level of play ever since.

With five productive and experienced teammates ahead of them, the remaining six linebackers on Bandini's roster appear to have their work cut out for them, but the coach again sees promising signs. Four August standouts – junior Jason Margeson, sophomores Kevin McCarthy and Sean Spencer, and freshman Patrick Hannon – have appeared on the radar screen of Linebacker Coaches Rich Dykas and Paddy Forry. Margeson could be the first to crack the line-up by virtue of past experience, but all are likely to see some action as the campaign unfolds.

Adding further depth are Taylor Stancel and Mike Whittaker, a pair of second-year players who remain in the mix by displaying strong work ethics and good attitudes.

SECONDARY

Curry's defensive secondary used to be an area of high turnover from year to year, but the last few seasons have dramatically bucked that trend. There are few superlatives that can be omitted in describing the season turned in by Tim Bloniasz in 2007. Bloniasz' list of post-season accolades was lengthy and included a pair of all-region honors from d3football.com. His coach points out that Bloniasz is a "captain by action not words" and adds that he is "one of best free safeties in country."

The defensive backfield features another senior captain with all-conference credentials in cornerback Michael Looney. Preparing for his fourth and final season, and third as a starter, Looney has already proven to be an exceptional team leader. "Easily one of the most enthusiastic captains I've had in my career," Bandini says, adding "everyone should work as hard and help out their teammates as much as he does."

Looney's pass defense skills are complemented on the other side of the field by junior Carl D'Haiti. D'Haiti came back even stronger last fall after missing all of the 2006 campaign and is now considered one of the premier cornerbacks in the country. His coach is looking forward to watching D'Haiti perform for another full season in 2008.

Several more talented defensive backs saw their share of game action in 2007 and will be counted on to do so once again in 2008. A very good free safety playing behind Bloniasz is sophomore Bobby Driscoll, last year's team Defensive Rookie of the Year. Four very good cornerbacks – senior Mike Nicolo, junior Jaime Santiago and sophomores Jerome Freed and Jason Ryan – did not lack for playing time last year and will again be significant contributors. A strong hitter, Nicolo continues to battle a shoulder injury that might keep him sidelined for a brief time. Santiago (20 tackles, three interceptions in 2007) and Freed (11 tackles, two fumble recoveries in 2007) boosted their stock with excellent efforts in part-time duty.

To expand an already deep pool, the coaching staff's recruiting efforts landed talented rookies Matthew Duggan, Christopher Haddad, Matthew Macedo and Austin Pina.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Kickers who graduate are usually difficult but not impossible to replace. Those that hold every school kicking record can be another story. Such is the task that Bandini faces in finding the next David Vincent. A strong candidate for the job is sophomore Matt Alksninis, who cut his teeth last season by sharing kickoff duty with Vincent and produced a nearly identical kickoff average. His strong leg will give Alksninis the chance to handle both kickoff and punting chores in 2008. As far as field goals, Alksninis and rookie Glenn Allen will each strive for the accuracy, consistency and distance that will allow the kicking game to be another weapon in the Colonels' arsenal.

The return game is in excellent hands once again, as Tim Bloniasz, Carl D'Haiti and Michael Looney head up a unit that consistently provided the Curry offense with good starting field position.

Once again, veterans Brian Taylor and Robie Leavitt will fill the roles of holder and long snapper, respectively, although Aaron Smith may handle long-snapping responsibilities too.

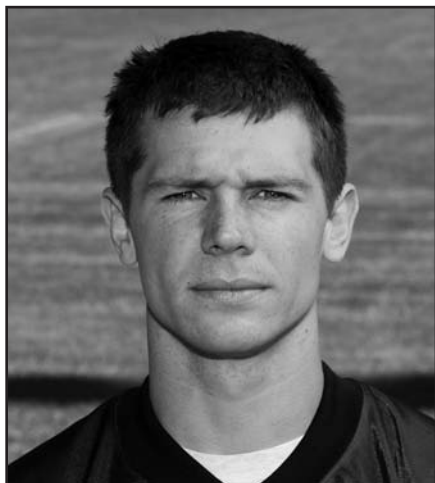
LINEBACKERS

The Colonels' defensive line may have required some re-tooling, but the team's linebacking corps returns almost completely intact and will be playing together as a highly cohesive unit for another season. Bandini refers to these veterans as a "no-nonsense group...not talkers, just players."

Dan Dawson had a breakout season in 2007 as an inside backer. The junior was second on the team in both total tackles (66) and tackles for loss (16). His partners on the inside will once again be sophomore Kenniel Velez and senior Nick Garafalo. Velez came into his own a year ago, seeing increased

Skip Bandini

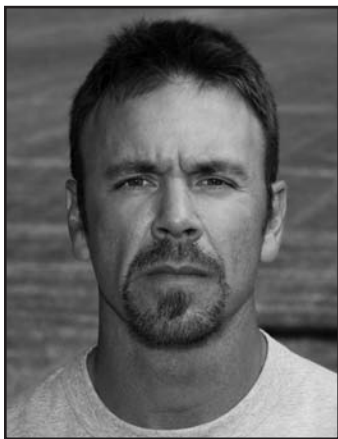
Head Coach

In his second year, Bandini guided the Colonels to a school-record 12-win campaign, including a second-consecutive undefeated regular season (11-0). Curry won its fifth-consecutive New England Football Conference (NEFC) title and qualified for the NCAA Division III Tournament for the fifth-straight year. Curry was selected to host an NCAA Tournament game for the first time, and on November 17, Bandini led Curry and the entire 16-team NEFC to their first-ever NCAA Tourney win – a convincing 42-21 victory against Empire 8 Conference Champions Hartwick College.

In addition to wins in a season, Bandini's 2007 squad established school records for points scored (474), touchdowns scored (62), passing yards (2,737), rushing yards (2,683), total yards (5,420), offensive plays (947) and first downs (276). Nearly all of these are now NEFC records as well. Curry is currently riding a 30-game win streak against conference opponents, as well as a 29-game win streak at home.

The 2007 Colonels were ranked as the #1 team in the New England Division III Poll for the entire season – a first for Curry – and #19 nationally in the final American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) poll – the school's highest-ever national ranking. At season's end, Bandini was named as 2007 Division II/III Coach of the Year by both the New England Football Writers (NEFW) and the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston.

In his first season, Bandini led the Colonels to a perfect 11-0 regular-season record and was named as New England Football Conference (NEFC) Boyd Division Coach of the Year. Bandini's squad won the NEFC title for the fourth year in a row, and earned a berth in the 2006 NCAA Division III Football Tournament. He has now compiled a stellar 23-2 record (.920 winning percentage) in his first two seasons at the helm.



Todd Nestor

Defensive Coordinator/Director of Football Operations

Nestor will serve a third year as defensive coordinator and director of football operations (DFO) in 2008-2009. Appointed as Curry's first full-time DFO in April of 2006, he handles the daily operations of the Colonels' football program.

In his capacity as DFO, Nestor concentrates heavily on recruiting, including assignment of all assistant coaches' recruiting responsibilities. He handles travel, lodging, preseason logistics, equipment, and academic

procedures, and serves as the program's liaison to Curry's Admissions, Financial Aid, and Residence Life staff.

Nestor attended Ithaca College, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education in 1996. He then completed coursework toward a Master of Education degree in Athletics Administration from Springfield College.

Bandini had served on former Head Coach Steve Nelson's staff for three seasons – as defensive coordinator in 2003 and 2004, then as offensive coordinator in 2005. Curry won the NEFC title and participated in the NCAA Division III Tournament in each of those years. Out of 228 Division III football programs nationwide, his Colonels' defensive units ranked 12th and 16th respectively in 2003 and 2004 in team defense.

Over a career that now spans more than 25 years, Bandini has coached at five different high schools and five different colleges throughout Massachusetts. Among his high school assignments were head coaching positions at St. Clement (1989-1990) and Don Bosco Tech (1992-1995), his alma mater. A Director of Facilities for more than 20 years and a Certified Plant Engineer since 1990, he assumed his current full-time position as Director of Facilities for the Waltham Public School System in June 2002. Bandini resides in Reading and is the proud father of two sons, John and P.J.

While at Ithaca, Nestor was a three-year varsity letter winner in football and a two-year starter at strong safety. He played on three NCAA Division III Tournament teams with the Bombers, including the 1991 National Championship squad. During his senior season, Nestor amassed 110 total tackles, 12 tackles for loss, two interceptions and two sacks, and was named as the team's Outstanding Back.

Nestor was a student assistant coach while at Ithaca, working primarily with the Bombers' junior varsity defensive backs. He was also a graduate assistant coach at Springfield, where he mentored the Pride's outside linebackers. Nestor and his wife Melanie currently reside in Quincy, Massachusetts.



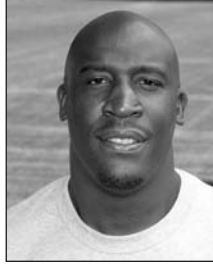
Mike Brown Defensive Line

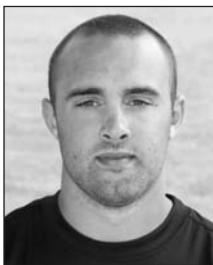

FOOTBALL TAKES A GIANT STEP FORWARD

Colonels Finally Erase NEFC “Goose Egg”

Maybe it was another undefeated regular season that finally resulted in a long sought-after home playoff game. Perhaps it was the memory of a punishing 69-14 defeat five years earlier. Or possibly, it was just time.

Whatever the combination of factors that came together on November 17, 2007, the outcome was historic: a first-ever win in the NCAA Division III Championship for a school from the New England Football Conference (NEFC). Curry's first-round 42-21 victory against Hartwick College marked a complete reversal of fortune not only for the Colonels but for the entire 16-team NEFC. To quote d3football.com, Curry had “managed to get an entire conference off the schneid.”

With the win came much-needed respect for a league that had struggled mightily on the national stage, coming up empty in 11 previous Tournament games, including eight in a row since the NEFC champion began receiving an automatic bid in 1999. The Colonels themselves were on the short end of four of those losses, none closer than 14 points. Since earning the first of its five automatic bids in 2003, Curry had been relegated to the road, where winning football games is always a challenge, but even more so in the spotlight of a national tournament against top-notch competition.

Yet in early November, the winds of change began blowing, giving rise to the belief that in 2007 things would be different. By virtue of their tense 10-7 win against Coast Guard in the conference championship game, the Colonels not only extended their prolific win streaks to 30 in a row against league rivals and 28 in a row at home, they locked themselves in at #3 in the NCAA East Region rankings and virtually assured themselves of a first-ever playoff home game.

When the playoff pairings were announced on November 11, the Colonels were indeed selected as a first-round host and would welcome Hartwick College, itself an automatic bid recipient as Empire 8 Conference regular-season champions, to the friendly confines of Walter M. Katz Field the following Saturday. The two teams had a brief, and from Curry's perspective, unpleasant history. In 2002, the 7-2 Colonels failed to

qualify for the NEFC Championship Game, but received a bid to play in the ECAC North Atlantic Bowl. On a snowy Saturday afternoon in November in Oneonta, New York, the Hawks stepped on the accelerator and never let up, sending a battered Curry team back to Milton with a demoralizing 55-point smack down in tow.

Although none of this year's Colonels were participants in or witnesses to Hartwick's earlier extreme inhospitality, they got more than an earful from recent football alumni. These firsthand accounts appeared to infuse the 2007 squad with even more motivation in “returning a favor” by defeating the Hawks and restoring the pride that took a severe hit half a decade earlier.

Years from now, many will recall the 83-yard game-opening kickoff return for a touchdown by Tim Bloniasz that set the tone for what was ultimately a dominating Curry win. And even with a disappointing Round of 16 loss at St. John Fisher a week later, it was abundantly clear that the Colonels and the NEFC were now players on the national stage, having finally hung the number “1” in the NCAA Tournament win column.

The 2007 Colonels were ranked as the #1 team in the New England Division III Poll for the entire season – a first for Curry. The program also ranked #19 nationally in the final American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) poll and #23 in the final d3football.com survey – the school's highest-ever national rankings.

Looking ahead, Curry will take its 30-game win streak against conference opponents and 29-game win streak at home into the 2008 campaign, seeking a sixth league championship in a row. That would leave the Colonels just two shy of tying Plymouth State's record eight-consecutive NEFC titles (1981-1988), and more importantly, give them the opportunity to further solidify their credentials as a bona fide Division III National Championship contender.

GAME ONE

Curry returned for a touchdown by Tim Bloniasz. The Lancers responded with a 4-yard Good-to-Pollard connection, followed by Van De Giesen's second touchdown run of the contest (1 yard) and a 10-yard scoring toss from Good to Hill. The Colonels held Worcester to -39 net yards rushing. Curry owned a 398-263 yard edge in total offense and a 36-23 advantage in time of possession. Each team lost two fumbles, while the Colonels also notched a pair of interceptions. Van De Giesen completed 18 of 31 pass attempts, while Borukhov had a game-high 181 receiving yards on nine catches. DiFabio collected 111 yards on the ground to lead all rushers. Will Chiccarelli led Curry with eight tackles, five tackles for loss, a forced fumble and three sacks.

GAME TWO

Curry 47, Fitchburg State 20

Curry looked to Borukhov again to extend the lead to 23-14 at halftime. Van De Giesen found him for his third score, a 42-yard reception with 2:40 left in the half. Borukhov found the end zone for the last time on the opening possession of the second half to help the Colonels open up 30-14 cushion. Van De Giesen had five scoring tosses, a new Curry record, while Borukhov's four touchdown receptions also established a school mark. The offense churned out 587 total yards, led by the quarterback's 307 yards passing on 23-of-39 attempts (all career highs) with no interceptions. Jamaal Woods led the rushing attack with 174 yards on 19 carries and a TD. Steve DiFabio added 83 yards on 12 carries while Brian Taylor hauled in four catches for 91 yards and a score. Michael Looney led the Colonels with five tackles, while Will Chiccarelli and Daniel Dawson each contributed 4.5 stops, including a combined six stops for losses.

GAME THREE

Curry 42, Westfield State 27

September 15, 2007

Curry scored on three straight possessions in the second half to put away the game. The Colonels took the lead for good, 28-27, on a 16-yard TD reception by Geoffrey Leard with 5:09 left in the third quarter. Minutes later, Westfield had a first and 10 at the Curry 25 when Jason Proulx fumbled. Bloniasz scooped up the loose ball at the line of scrimmage and raced untouched 75 yards to give the Colonels a 35-27 advantage. Giesen later ran it in from the four yard-line to extend the lead to 21-0. Van De Giesen saw Steve DeFabio in the open flat and the junior ran it the rest of the way to give Curry a commanding 28-0 lead. On the final play of the half, Van De Giesen connected with Felix Borukhov in the end zone to give Curry a convincing 35-0 lead at intermission. Hartwick, which finished the season with an 8-3 record, out-gained Curry in total offense 481-390. Van De Giesen completed 14 of 23 attempts for 220 yards and three touchdowns, while Borukhov finished with 137 receiving yards on six receptions. Defensively, Curry was led by Bloniasz, who had a team-high seven tackles (6 solo) to go along with his two picks. Nino Nunziane recorded four tackles for loss, including three sacks.

MILTON, Mass. – Tim Bloniasz returned the game's opening kickoff 83 yards for a touchdown, and snared two of Curry's five interceptions on the day, as the Colonels defeated Hartwick, 42-21, in a first-round NCAA Division III Tournament game. Curry picked up its first-ever NCAA Tourney victory. The Colonels extended their home winning streak to 29 and remained undefeated by capturing their school-record 12th victory of the season. James Reile. The Cardinals took the lead for good on a 36-yard touchdown run by Tim Marion. After giving up a touchdown on Curry's opening drive, the Fisher defense allowed the Colonels to convert on just 1-of-16 third-downs. Curry totaled 219 yards of total offense, including 176 in passing yards from Van De Giesen on 21-of-38 passing. Borukhov caught six passes for 88 yards, while Steve DiFabio also caught six passes for 30 yards. DiFabio also led a rushing attack that gained 43 yards on 31 carries with 27 yards on eight carries. Daniel Dawson led the Colonels' defense with 12 tackles and one sack. Nick Garafalo was in on 10 stops, while Tim Bloniasz intercepted a pass.

PITTSFORD, N.Y. – St. John Fisher scored 38 unanswered points and cruised to a 38-7 win over Curry in the regional semifinals of the NCAA Division III Football Championship. Curry, which entered the game as the region's No. 3 seed and as the nation's only 12-0 team, finished its year with a 12-1 overall record. The Colonels took the lead just 1:03 into the game. After a 49-yard kickoff return by Stephen O'Neil to start the game, Ryan Van De Giesen found streaking Felix Borukhov on the Colonels first play from scrimmage that brought the Curry offense to the two-yard line. Van De Giesen capped the drive with a two-yard run off right tackle for the Colonels only score of the day just two plays later. The Fisher offense answered back quickly, with a 69-yard run from
