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2010 GENERAL ELECTION

Liberal Democrats Surge After First Televised Debate in Britain

Party gains ten points in a week, and is now tied with the Conservatives; Labour drops to its lowest share of the vote since January.

[LONDON – Apr. 19, 2010] – The performance of Nick Clegg in the first televised debate of the General Election campaign has catapulted the Liberal Democrats into a tie for first place with the Conservatives, a new Angus Reid Public Opinion poll has found.

The online survey of a representative national sample of 2,004 British adults also shows that the economy and immigration remain the most important issues for voters.

Voting Intention

Across Great Britain, 32 per cent of decided voters and leaners (-6) would support the Conservative candidate in their constituency in the 6 May General Election.

The Liberal Democrats are tied with the Tories at 32 per cent (+10) while the governing Labour Party has dropped to 24 per cent (-4)—its lowest level since late January.

The United Kingdom Independence Party (UKIP) is fourth with four per cent (-1), followed by the British National Party (BNP) with two per cent (-1) and the Green Party also with two per cent (=).

From April 16 to April 19, 2010, Angus Reid Public Opinion conducted an online survey among 2,004 randomly selected British adults who are Springboard UK panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/- 2.2%. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region data to ensure samples representative of the entire adult population of Great Britain. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.

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Regional Breakdowns

The swing to the Liberal Democrats was particularly pronounced in London, where the party is now first overall with 38 per cent, followed by Labour with 31 per cent and the Conservatives with 27 per cent. In the North, the perennial two-way tie between Labour and the Tories has now become a three-party fight, with the Lib-Dems edging both rivals by a two-point margin.

In Scotland, the Liberal Democrats are now three points ahead of Labour, with the Scottish National Party (SNP) at 23 per cent. The Tories are still holding the upper hand in the South of England (39%) and Midlands and Wales (35%).

Other Demographics

The big leads that the Conservatives had in the two gender demographics have vanished. Amongst males, the three main parties hold a similar proportion of the vote (Con. 30%, Lib-Dem 28%, Lab. 28%). Labour is only attracting one-in-five female voters (20%), while Lib-Dems (36%) and Tories (35%) are locked in a tight contest for first place.

The Liberal Democrats have become the most popular option for younger voters (34%), pushing the Tories to third place. The Conservatives have lost their edge amongst voters aged 55 and over—where they consistently garnered the support of 40 per cent of respondents—and are now just three points ahead of the Lib-Dems.

Issue Watch

Following the second week of the campaign, the economy is still the most important issue facing the United Kingdom for a third of respondents (32%, -2). Immigration is second on the list of concerns with 22 per cent (+3), followed by unemployment (10%, =), leadership (7%, -1) and crime (5%, +2).

Marginal Seats

The survey also includes an analysis of voters in 150 marginal seats—widely considered as the constituencies the Tories need to win in order to form a majority government—and the 63 seats won by the Liberal Democrats in the 2005 General Election, using the seat boundaries for this year's contest.

Labour to Conservative Marginal Seats

In the 150 marginal seats, the Conservatives are first among decided voters with 32 per cent, followed by Labour with 30 per cent, and the Liberal Democrats with 28 per cent. Since February, the Tories have lost 10 points in these seats, and are now at roughly the same level they had in the 2005 General Election. Labour is 13 points behind its 2005 total, while the Lib-Dems have gained 11 points.

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Liberal Democrat Held Seats

After what appeared to be a shaky February result, the Liberal Democrats are once again in command of these seats, with almost half of respondents (49%) expressing a willingness to support the Lib-Dem candidate. Labour has plummeted to single digits (9%) and the Conservatives are stable (28%).

Seat Predictor

The Angus Reid Public Opinion seat prediction model shows that, if these results were replicated in the General Election, the Conservatives would gain control of 271 seats in the House of Commons, followed by Labour with 193 seats and the Liberal Democrats with 153 seats. This scenario would leave the Tories 55 seats short of a majority.
