The University

The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, founded in 1886, combines the advantages of a strong private tradition with those of a state-assisted institution. With an enrollment of more than 8,600 students, UTC is a vibrant, comprehensive, metropolitan university with curricula that combine strong grounding in the liberal arts with the applied professional programs essential to the economic vitality of the region.

Bachelor's, master's, selected doctoral, and post-graduate degrees are awarded through our Colleges of Arts and Sciences; Business; Engineering and Computer Science; and Health, Education and Professional Studies; and the UTC Graduate School.

In 2003, UTC implemented its first doctorate in physical therapy. Since that time, the campus has added a Ph.D. in computational engineering and an Ed.D. in learning and leadership.

Stretching beyond the traditional classroom, UTC encompasses the entire area as a learning laboratory, and students have a variety of opportunities for experiential learning.

UTC faculty, staff, and students are proud of these and other recent achievements:

- Computing power of the UTC SimCenter ranks 90th in the world and supports the research center's Internet2 connection.
- The Probasco Chair hosts internationally recognized economists on campus for public lectures.
- Project REEL, a \$3.6 million federally funded grant, is allowing UTC education faculty members to establish a statewide center specializing in early childhood education.
- Research projects underway on campus range from the development of a disease resistant American chestnut tree to ways to reduce wind drag on tractor trailors.

The campus is assisted in its academic mission by the University of Chattanooga Foundation Inc. With an endowment that exceeds \$100 million, the foundation supports scholarships, professorships, and academic enhancement programs.

As UTC looks to its future and the emerging needs of the metropolitan region, it will continue its commitment to quality education, excellent research, and dedicated service.

Roger G. Brown, Ph.D.

Dr. Roger G. Brown, a proven academic leader and native Tennessean, is being installed as the campus' fifteenth leader, Chancellor of The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

Brown comes to Chattanooga from the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, where he served as Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs since 2000. During his tenure at Pembroke, the campus experienced a 60 percent growth in student enrollment and added degree programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Previously, he had served since 1991 in various academic and administrative capacities with The University of North Carolina at Charlotte. Brown left UNC Charlotte in 2000 as Senior Associate Provost.

A political scientist with particular academic emphasis in American government, Brown earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Political Science from the University of Tennessee and the Ph.D. in Political Science from The Johns Hopkins University.

He has been inducted into four national and international honor societies.

In 2002, Brown was appointed to the inaugural delegation of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Sino-American Leadership Development Training for Higher Education Leaders in China. He has traveled

on assignment for the U.S. Department of State to Syria, Jordan, and Israel. He also helped establish international exchanges with universities in Germany, France, South Korea, and South Africa.



Along with his academic achievements, Brown has maintained a high level of community involvement and service. In 2004, the North Carolina Supreme Court appointed Brown to serve the Chief Justice's Advisory Committee on the Political Conduct of Judges. He was a member of Rotary International, Leadership Charlotte, and the Public Safety Committee of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

Brown's wife and partner is Dr. Carolyn Thompson. They have two children, Caroline and Austin. Roger and Carolyn share custody of "Madeline Albright," a rescued husky mix with diplomatic immunity.

Heademic Regalia

Academic regalia had its beginnings in medieval Europe, where clergymen draped themselves in heavy caps, gowns, and robes for warmth in unheated buildings. In those days, schools were operated by the church, and the priests served as teachers. Church fashion, then, became scholarly fashion.

When education and religion began to follow different paths, much of the pomp and circumstance of the church was retained in academic ceremonies. Each school developed its own commencement and a different wardrobe for its faculty and students.

Europeans brought their popular traditions to the New World, and in 1643 America experienced its first commencement at Harvard University.

To avoid confusion in color and style of academic clothing, representatives from most American universities met in 1895 to consider a uniform code for academic costume. The result was the Academic Costume Code, which is still in effect today. About 98 percent of American institutions adopted the code.

The code covers three main areas of academic regalia—caps, gowns and hoods.

The mortarboard, or Oxford Cap, was introduced in the 1890s and consists of a closely fitting headpiece with a flat, square top. The code allowed for one exception: a soft cap that may be worn by women.

Black tassels may be used for any degree. Gold metallic tassels are reserved for doctors and governing officials. Some institutions, including UTC, use gold tassels to represent undergraduate honors.

Academic robes are usually black. The bachelor's degree holder's gown is simply constructed in straight lines. Its only distinguishing characteristics are long, pointed sleeves. Until 1960, master's degree holders' gowns came with long, full sleeves and slits at the elbows. After 1960, sleeves dropped to the wrist, allowing men to forego wearing coats underneath the robe. Doctoral degree holders' robes are adorned with velvet panels on the front and the neck, and three bars of velvet at the bell-shaped sleeves.

Probably the most ornate piece of academic costume, and the most informative to the trained eye, is the academic hood. Each color of academic hood represents a different discipline:

Economics: Copper Education: Light Blue Engineering: Orange Fine Arts: Brown Journalism: Crimson

Law: Purple

Library Science: Lemon

Music: Pink Nursing: Apricot

Oratory (Speech): Silver Gray

Philosophy: Dark Blue Physical Therapy: Teal

Public Administration, including Foreign Services: Sapphire Blue

Science: Golden Yellow Social Work: Citron Theology: Scarlet

Mace and Chain of Office

The University Mace and Chancellor's Chain of Office are significant icons of the institution and stand as impressive symbols on permanent display in the Lupton Library when not in service.

Creation of the mace and chain was commissioned to New York artist and professor of silversmithing at State University of New York Kurt J. Masdorf in 1977.

The University Mace and Chancellor's Chain of Office are emblazoned with the institution's name along with symbols of Tennessee, the state whose citizens we serve. Borrowing from ancient traditions, these hand-crafted ceremonial pieces create interest and respect by both participants and observers. They have become important representations honoring and identifying our educational personage.
