Tanner Curl



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

This year, the Coe WC is going to St. Louis! The MWCA conference will be held at the Crowne Plaza St. Louis-Clayton Hotel is St. Louis, Missouri.

These presentations are: (1) Introduce the Writing Center staff's electronic portfolio project, present samples of portfolios, explain how the project was initiated, and introduce a variety of staff development opportunities the electronic portfolios now make possible. Research by Katie Becker,

Lillian Vince, and Johanna Schnell will be used for this presentation. (2) Describe our Writing Center's efforts to develop a creative writing project for disadvantaged students at an elementary school near our campus. This presen-

tation will use research done by Tanner Curl and Hallie Hottle. (3) A

poster presentation which will present samples of consultant conference forms that our staff have been filling out since 1988. The presentation will consider what kinds of information can be collected and how such data can be used to improve the quality of services for student writers. Katie Becker's summer research will be used for this presentation. (4) The presentation will examine two end-of-term research assignments required of all consultants

enrolled in our staff development court: one assignment involves new staff members writing about their interviews with experienced consultants; the second assignment involves experi-

enced consultants investigating a topic of personal concern.

All consultants in our Writing Center are expected to assist with one or more Writing Center publications during the year. In this poster session we will provide a diverse sample of these publications and address benefits that staff members from working on these projects.



Hannah Ross-Suits


She will be spending the next two years in beautiful Gambia as a Peace Corps volunteer teaching math and science.

After stimulating discussions about Adam Sandler's new film and the hot ass of Cleveland Indians' right fielder Casev Blake, nine excited Shakespeare fans drove toward Iowa City and the production Riverside of

"Twelfth Night."

Betsy Friedrich got in her car and started driving Bree Graczyk (front passenger), Katie Becker (back driver's side), Ben Franta (middle), and Johanna Schenll (back passenger's side) to Iowa City. This is when disaster struck.

A Johnson County sheriff arrived after many phone calls were made to parents and friends, recounting the neardeath experience.

A tow truck driver named Joel was called and arrived shortly thereafter to tow the damaged vehicle back to Coe.

Both men reiterated how lucky the passengers of the Oldsmobile were; had the lynchpin gone through the windshield, any one of the passengers (but probably Ben Franta) could have died. Said tow truck

The passengers of the Oldsmobile were unable to see Shakespeare in Iowa City but were found later that same evening harassing drive-thru customers outside of

the Dairy Queen on First Avenue.

The dump truck did not stop after the accident and thus the owner of the lynchpin was never found nor prosecuted. If you would like to see the lynchpin or the rearview mirror from the Cutless Culais, you may visit Morris (Mayhem) 30. Admission, as of this printing, is free.

Will Smith serves as a writer and editor for a car magazine in California.


