FINANCIAL AID GRADUATE SCHOOL OF ARTS & SCIENCES (GSAS)

Merit-Based Aid

Assistantships and Fellowships, providing both scholarship and stipend support, and tuition only scholarships are awarded by the Graduate School on the recommendation of individual departments and programs. Assistantships and Fellowships are typically available only to Ph.D. students. Scholarships are available to both Master's and Ph.D. students. External Research Support & Assistance

The Graduate School of Arts & Sciences is able to provide graduate students with guidance on securing external sources of funding to support dissertation research and writing. Maria Snyder, Sr. Grants Administrator for the Humanities and Social/Behavioral Sciences, is available to meet with students to discuss funding options and, when time permits, to edit and prepare applications to external funders. Due to limited time and resources, however, assistance with tuition scholarship and Master's research support is limited to specific federal programs sponsored by the NSF, NIH, DoS, DoD, and DoED. Students should contact the Office of Student Financial Services to discuss the options available to fund their graduate education.

The Office of Student Financial Services (OSFS) helps graduate students assess their ability to meet educational costs, awards need-based financial aid packages, and provides information about other options available to finance their educational expenses.

Two initial forms are required to apply for need-based financial aid:

- The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- Georgetown University Graduate Supplement Form Both forms may be accessed online at the OSFS website.

Federal and Private Loan Programs

Students may finance educational costs through loan programs.

Federal Subsidized and Unsubsidized Stafford Loans

Students must complete the required FAFSA and Federal Stafford Loan application/promissory note online. Another application requirement for a first time Federal Stafford Loan borrower is Loan Entrance counseling to review the borrower's rights and responsibilities; this may also be completed online at the OSFS website

• Federal Graduate PLUS Loan

Students must complete the required FAFSA and may complete a Federal Graduate PLUS Loan application/promissory note online at the OSFS website.

Federal Perkins Loan

Students must complete the required FAFSA online. Recipients of these need-based student loans, upon receipt of an e-mail notification, must sign their promissory note and complete Loan Entrance Counseling online at the OSFS website in order to receive their loan funds. Loan Entrance Counseling is a federal requirement to review the borrower's rights and responsibilities.

Private Supplemental Loans

Lending institutions offer private supplemental loans to assist students in meeting educational expenses. Please visit the OSFS for more information about these programs.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The Office of Student Financial Services is also home to the Student Employment Office (SEO), which operates two student employment programs:

Federal Work-Study (FWS) is a need-based, federally funded financial aid program which subsidizes the earnings for eligible students. FWS awards are included as part of an eligible student's financial aid package.

Employment Referral Service (ERS) is a federally funded program that provides information about employment opportunities in the local D.C. metropolitan area. This program receives numerous job postings each year from local businesses and individuals. It also provides information on opportunities for child care employment and temporary jobs.

All information about available job opportunities on- and off- campus are posted to the website seo.georgetown.edu. Students seeking employment will be required to supply the following documentation before beginning work:

An I-9 Employment Eligibility Verification is required by federal employment regulations. Students must bring <u>original documentation</u> to prove their identity as well as their eligibility to work in the United States. A United States passport or an Alien Registration Receipt Card will satisfy both I-9 requirements. Other documents that can be used in combination to prove identity include a driver's license, Georgetown or other school ID card, a United States Social Security Card, or certified copy of a birth certificate.

CAPS strives to provide students with opportunities to develop greater self-understanding, identify and solve problems, and improve academic performance through the alleviation of psychological, emotional, and cognitive impediments.

CAPS offers a range of psychological and psychiatric services including: (1) psychological evaluations, individual and group psychotherapy, and referral; (2) medication consultation and follow-up; (3) outreach and campus consultation; and (4) crisis assessment and intervention. GERMS is a student-run, all-volunteer ambulance service that provides free emergency care and transport to anyone calling from the campus and surrounding community, including the neighborhoods of Georgetown (west of Wisconsin Avenue), Foxhall, and Burleith. It operates seven days a week, 24 hours per day. All members are certified as Emergency Medical Technicians at the basic life support level (EMT-B) or higher. GERMS regularly responds to a wide variety of medical emergencies with an average response time of less than five minutes.

Georgetown University's location just within the perimeter of the city makes it a relatively safe haven in an urban environment. The University's Department of Public Safety (DPS) is in operation 24 hours a day. In an emergency off campus, call 911 to reach the DC Police and Fire Departments. Please contact DPS as well, to receive the additional resources and assistance you may need during and after an emergency.

As in any urban environment, it is important to be aware of your surroundings at all times and take proper precautions to ensure your safety and that of your property. Report suspicious activity to DPS immediately. Doors should be kept locked at all times. Travel in groups when you walk into the city at night. Call SafeRides (202-784-RIDE), an escort service for students traveling around Georgetown and the campus. Register your bicycle & laptop with DPS and insure your belongings in the event of theft. Enroll in HOYAlert, the University's emergency notification system. Be aware of the Campus Alert System, which is an outdoor siren system that indicates the need to shelter-in due to a threat outside.

Additional Services:

- SafeRides: The SafeRides service enables students to request an individual ride to or from campus and any location in the Burleith or West Georgetown areas by calling 202-784-RIDE (7433). SafeRides is available Sunday through Wednesday from 8pm-2am and until 3am Thursday through Saturday.
 - The boundaries for these escort services are Whitehaven Parkway and W Street to the north, Prospect Street to the south, Foxhall and Reservoir roads to the west, and Wisconsin Avenue to the east.
- Individual Escorts: When SafeRides is not in service, you may call 202-784-RIDE to request an individual escort from DPS. The method of escort (walking, patrol car, SafeRides van) will be determined by DPS, based on the resources available at the time of your call. We encourage you to request an individual escort outside of SafeRides operating hours if you need special assistance or feel unsafe for any reason. The boundaries for these escort services are the same as the boundaries for SafeRides.
- Neighborhood Shuttle: Two shuttles operate to and from the main gates of campus

(37th & O Streets) in continuous loops from 10pm-3am Thursday through Saturday during the academic year. One shuttle loops through Burleith and the other one loops through West Georgetown. Shuttle service begins on the first Thursday of the academic year and ends on the Saturday evening of commencement weekend. There is no Shuttle service Thanksgiving weekend, winter break, and during the summer.

The Student Health Center (SHC) is the primary health care center for Georgetown students. Staffed by a team of Family Practice faculty physicians, nurse practitioners, nurses, and support personnel, these professionals are dedicated to working with students and providing quality health care. Students can receive the same scope of services that they expect in their family physician's office.

The SHC is located on the Ground Floor of Darnall Hall, operating regular office hours Monday through Saturday. Check the Student Health website for hours during the summer, and university holidays and breaks. When the clinic is closed, students can call the emergency/after hours clinician at (202)444-PAGE. The clinic encourages students to make an appointment in order to receive the most time and attention, although urgent problems are attended to on a walk-in basis.

The SHC is an outpatient facility; if a student requires longer observation or overnight care, he or she is admitted to and cared for by physicians at the Georgetown University Hospital. Services include routine office visits, preventive health care, a variety of procedures and laboratory work, immunizations, and referrals. An outpatient pharmacy is located at Georgetown University Hospital (GUH). In the event of an emergency, care is available at the GUH Emergency Room and at other area hospitals (student and health insurance provider are responsible for cost of emergency room visits). GERMS, a student-run volunteer ambulance service, provides transport to Georgetown University Hospital.

As there is no Student Health fee at Georgetown, the SHC charges for all services. Students and parents should make the determination that their existing health insurance provides adequate coverage to include the cost of primary health care in the Washington, D.C. area. The University has arranged for an insurance plan that provides sufficient coverage should the student or parents so desire. Remember to submit your Immunization and Tuberculosis Screening Certificate to the Student Health Center. Georgetown University requires graduate students in a degree program who are registered for eight or more credit hours to have health insurance coverage. This requirement assures some relief of the burden of expensive health care to the students. Students who are required to have health insurance will be mandated to enroll in a 12 month plan if they do not have other insurance that is in effect prior to September 15. The Premier Plan's Sickness and Injury benefits include worldwide coverage, national PPO network discounts, and pharmacy card prescription coverage.

All members of the Georgetown community are required to carry a GOCard, an "all-in-one" ID card that streamlines and simplifies daily campus life. All students are expected to carry their GOCard on campus as a means of identification and present it when requested by University personnel. Issued to each registered student free of charge, the GOCard is used to permit access to residence halls, libraries and other secured buildings on the three campuses, as well as free transportation on the GUTS buses. The GOCard also functions as a debit card by adding money through Deposit Stations, the Online Card Office, Student Account Refunds, or the GOCard Office. The GOCard is the preferred method of payment for the purchase of goods and services at the University bookstores, vending machines, copy machines, laundry machines, food establishments, and other businesses that are partners. Additionally, the GOCard is linked to meal plans, Flex Dollar account, library circulation, and the usage of athletic facilities. The replacement fee for a lost, stolen, or damaged card is \$25.

Student Parking

Students who reside in residence halls, University-owned townhomes, in the District of Columbia, or in the North Arlington area are not authorized to obtain on-campus parking decals. Depending on availability, students living off campus and outside of the District of Columbia and North Arlington areas may be able to purchase parking decals for satellite parking. It is also not possible to park on the streets outside the main gates because of District of Columbia restrictions on residential parking. Therefore, students are strongly urged not to bring a car or motorcycle to campus. For those students who are eligible, parking decals for the 2009-2010 academic year are approximately \$699.50 per semester. Students may park in the general visitor lot where the fee is \$15.00/day (6:00am-5:00pm). Parking after 5:00pm is available to students with a valid University ID for a \$3.00 fee.

Bicycles

Outdoor racks are provided on campus for students' bicycles, and bicycles may only be parked on those designated racks.
