The Marshall Foundation is based on the principles of **Arthur R. Marshall** (1919-1985). Named "Conservationist of the Decade" in 1985 by the Florida National Wildlife Federation, Art Marshall was a nationally recognized conservationist and crusader for the Florida Everglades. He received the original funding for the Foundation in 1982 from his friend and colleague **Marjory Stoneman Douglas**, the undisputed "First Lady of the Everglades." Art's nephew, **John Arthur Marshall**, heads the non-profit organization today.

In addition to the River of Grass Gala, the Marshall Foundation sponsors numerous eco-friendly events including an annual Cypress Harvest and up to six tree-planting events every spring throughout Palm Beach County.
