The start of the 2002–2003 academic year finds Metropolitan State University in a very healthy state. This institution is vibrant, reflects our diverse metropolitan area, and offers excellent programs and services. Most of all, it is characterized at this point in its history by *growth* that is occurring across several dimensions.



#### **Enrollment**

Most obvious is numerical *growth*—more and more students are learning about us and coming to study with us. Our enrollments have grown by more than five percent annually, and our students are taking larger credit loads. This good news keeps us busy managing our growth carefully to preserve the high quality of our programs. We are greatly encouraged

by this strong student interest. We believe we must respond by keeping our programs financially accessible; therefore, this past fall we implemented the lowest tuition increase of any public university in Minnesota.

#### **Faculty**

Our full-time resident faculty is *growing* too, in response to increased enrollment and new programs—there are new faces at every campus event. As always, our dynamic part-time community faculty bring their real-world expertise to a significant proportion of our curriculum. The administration's task is to maintain a healthy balance between resident and community faculty in light of increasing demand and falling state allocations.

#### **Physical Space**

We are *growing* physically. The most visible expansion is the eagerly-awaited Community Library and Information Access Center, which is beginning to take shape on East Seventh Street in Saint Paul. This state-of-the-art center will bring together in one place, and will make available across the metropolitan area, the digital and print resources needed by students and faculty. The library will also include wireless computer

access, meeting and study spaces, and will house a branch of the Saint Paul Public Library serving neighborhood families. The grand opening, in mid-2004, will be an event our community will not soon forget. Meanwhile, we continue to roll out our long-term campus beautification plan.

This semester we have also *grown* at our Midway site—our Communication, Writing and the Arts Department has moved into attractive new leased quarters there, giving us some welcome breathing space in Minneapolis and Saint Paul.

In Minneapolis, we are moving forward with plans to vacate our leased space at 730 Hennepin Avenue (in



2004) and to "co-locate" with Minneapolis Community and Technical College (MCTC) on their campus. This physical transition, and the unprecedented collaboration that makes it possible, have produced growth in our visibility and reputation for innovation and financial stewardship. The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Board of Trustees, the Minnesota Department of Finance, and our legislative leaders have recognized and supported the value and promise of this new approach. This co-location will save the state from needing to erect an expensive new building in downtown Minneapolis, and it makes the flow between MCTC's programs and ours more seamless, while allowing our institutions to offer many programs and services on campus jointly and with added efficiencies.

#### Marketing

Our visibility is *growing* in other ways, thanks to our new marketing direction. This research-driven initiative has resulted in tightly integrated print and broadcast marketing efforts that memorably convey what today's Metropolitan State University is all about. The new logo you see in our materials is just one element of

#### **Support**

One of the biggest *growth* stories of the past two years has been the superlative philanthropic support we have received, thanks to our generous friends and foundations and the creative and sustained work of our University Advancement Division. You can read more about this amazing story in the donor honor roll pages that follow.

#### **Maturity**

At the age of 31 years, this institution has *grown* in maturity. It has come into its own as a seasoned, midsized, urban, comprehensive university characterized by a developed policy environment and governance structure, fiscal disciplines that have drawn praise from legislative auditors, professional development investments that take a long-term view of the institution's needs and a self-sustaining quality improvement culture.

#### **Student Services**

The depth and impact of our student services have *grown* in the past year. With significant enrollments of students of color and first-generation college attendees, it was natural that we should apply for federal grants to offer a range of TRIO programs, the "gold standard" of academic support for students of color and other groups underrepresented in higher education. We also seek to *grow* into a more just and open community by continuing to pursue training experiences across our campuses such as "Undoing Racism."

#### Alumni

As our alumni population has *grown* to nearly 19,000, so it has also emerged as a leader in civic engagement. For example, Metropolitan State's Alumni Association was the first in Saint Paul to respond to Mayor Randy Kelly's call for volunteers to go into local grade schools to help boost reading achievement, leading the way for the alumni of our city's other fine colleges and universities.

#### **Programs**

Metropolitan State has kept pace with the evolving needs of the metropolitan area with a *growing* selection of programs for students to choose from. We have recently added the M.A. in Psychology, our outstanding Urban Teacher Program, the innovative Bachelor of Applied Studies for technical-college graduates, and the Center for Women Entrepreneurs. In addition, we recently received formal approval to offer several high-demand programs completely online.

#### Reputation

This institution's reputation has *grown* in recent years, too, as evidenced by invitations from area service organizations and foundations for President Bradshaw to serve on their boards. These opportunities reflect that Metropolitan State has become part of the landscape



of the metropolitan area, and that people look to it to provide leadership in shaping the region's future.

#### The Future

*Growth* is just as certainly in our future—there is a large, diverse population in the seven-county area and even beyond, that will need university education in the years just ahead. We will do everything we must to invite them and to be ready for them. For the Foundation Board of Trustees, this has been a very successful year. #### **Major milestones**

Together we are making a significant difference in the lives of student learners at Metropolitan State University. Each of these milestones represents an opportunity to expand our programs and scholarships throughout the communities we serve. We look forward to working with you during this year.

## PROFILE FROM A CEO

When John Owens graduated from Metropolitan State University in 1994, he already had a career working in the family business, Owens Service Corporation, a heating and air conditioning company, where he is now president and CEO. But, he says graduating from Metropolitan State is one of his proudest accomplishments.

He came to Metropolitan State because of the flexibility and while here, he gained new, life-changing perspectives including an increased awareness

of the need to take care of the environment, which is especially important in the heating and air conditioning field.

Many years ago, Owens' father worked to establish a culture of charitable giving. Today, John Owens works to continue that tradition to improve the health, welfare and quality of life for all Minnesotans. The company is involved in the Minnesota Keystone Program, giving at least five percent of its pretax profits to charitable and civic organizations. It also received the Minnesota Keystone Honored Company Award in 2001. The major recipient of these donations is the Greater Minneapolis United Way. Owens Companies, Inc. has been a presenting sponsor for the Metropolitan State Alumni Association's SkyGolf Saint Paul Winter Carnival event that raises money for student scholarships.

Owens' charitable works do not stop there. He has participated in the Twin Cities to Chicago AIDS Ride to raise money for organizations providing support services for people with AIDS. He has served as a graduate advisor to the Metropolitan State Building Committee and was elected three times to the Metropolitan State Alumni Board, where he chaired the Legislative Committee. He is now a Metropolitan State Foundation board member.

He also wants to make sure Owens Companies, Inc. is a place where people like to work. His desire is to provide an opportunity for all employees to do new things and to be challenged. He wants a company where people "can make their career here." He enjoys celebrating with people who receive 5-, 10-, 15- and 20-year awards. He is especially proud of an employee who recently received his 30-year award.

This self-described "huge fan" of Metropolitan State continues to be committed to the university and what it stands for. He is a role model for his business and employees, for the community, and for Metropolitan State.

Legislature funded first Saint Paul building—\$13 million. Minneapolis Campus moved to 730 Hennepin Avenue. "The air was charged," Charlotte Mitau-Price, 82, recalls, when more than 30 years ago her husband Ted Mitau and other state college administrators lobbied the Legislature to fund the new school with the innovative approach to education. "Ted would come home at night, revved up about his bold new project," she says. "Everyone was so positive, so excited by this grand experiment," she recalls.

"The Legislature failed to take action on that first request for the college's funding," she recalls. But, by May 1971, a \$350 million higher education bill made a commitment to the idea of the nontraditional new school.

Dr. David E. Sweet, vice chancellor for academic affairs for the Minnesota State College System, was appointed president. With an enrollment of 50 and an administrative headquarters in a storeroom in Saint Paul's Capitol Center Skyway, the new university opened its "doors" in 1972. Most of the student body were 30-something dropouts who worked full-time.

Metropolitan State was accredited by the North Central Evaluation Committee in 1975 and was voted one of 25 outstanding curriculum innovators of the 20th Century by the Carnegie Council on Policy Studies in Higher Education. A 1971 *Minneapolis Star* poll endorsed the school's no-campus plan.

## PROFILE FROM AN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

As the widow of the late Minnesota State College System Chancellor G. Theodore Mitau and an early Metropolitan State alumna, Charlotte Mitau-Price has had a birds-eye view of the development of this innovative, nontraditional university from the beginning.

As a former Metropolitan State Foundation trustee and a strong proponent of education, she exerted significant influence on Metropolitan State and on

education around the state of Minnesota.

"I chose Metropolitan State because of Ted's encouragement. He was very strong on what the college was doing and that it existed at all."

Mitau-Price fit the Metropolitan State student profile in many ways. With some University of Minnesota work to her credit, she had dropped out early on to pursue motherhood and a variety of educational, civic and community activities. Mitau-Price served on the Saint Paul Public School Board, both as chairman and vice-chairman, from 1964 to 1976. She served on many local and national education and school board committees as well.

She was a member of the Saint Paul Charter Commission, the Hallie Q. Brown Community Center, the Youth Service Board, the Minnesota PTA, the Mayor's Revenue Committee, the Macalester Women's Club and many, many more organizations. "I've always liked to be busy," says Mitau-Price. "Staying involved and active was second nature to me."

Mitau-Price appreciated the small class size. "There were 15, 20 students at the most," she recalls. "That was small enough so that there was a lot of interacting with the teacher and other students.

That was very helpful." "The university owned no buildings," Mitau-Price recalls. "It used space everywhere—churches, auditoriums, schools, libraries, streets and parks. The education was different from the U of M," she says.

Mitau-Price graduated in June 1979. She says her degree has always been especially poignant because she received it just one month before Mitau's death. "Ted would be so pleased," she says of Metropolitan State's growth and development.

## PROFILE FROM A PHILANTHROPIST

Elsa Vega-Perez is a senior program officer with the Otto Bremer Foundation. Together, they have a common mission: "To promote human rights and to create opportunities for social and economic justice in Minnesota, Montana, North Dakota and Wisconsin."

Hers is the first generation in her family to be born in the United States, and she is the first in her family to achieve a postsecondary education. She graduated

in 1993 with a focus in human service administration, a degree that has served her well in her efforts to empower the Latino community.

Vega-Perez is cofounder of the first battered women's shelter for Latino women in Minnesota, Casa de Esperanza. She has served the community as executive officer of the board of directors of the Urban Coalition; as National Urban Fellows Alumna Association vice president; as National Hispana Leadership Institute alumna; as a member of the Minnesota Women's Fund, the State Task Force on the Hispanic Learner, the Chicano/Latino Human Rights Task Force and the Neighborhood House Board of Directors; and as advisor to the Governor's Executive Cabinet on issues affecting minority groups in Minnesota.

She is also a trustee of the Metropolitan State University Foundation, and cochair of Hispanics in Philanthropy, an organization with an interest in promoting the Latino community.

When she was executive director of the Minnesota Hispanic Education Program, an organization established to promote continuing education for Hispanics, she said, "I strongly support Metropolitan State's lifelong learning concept. It brings a sense of one's own history with an opportunity to learn about and respect the elders and the young. Lifelong learning offers an opportunity to expand your own work instead of living with just a narrow focus. This was a vision on which Metropolitan State was founded."

Vega-Perez has been honored by Metropolitan State on more than one occasion. In 1997 she was named one of "25 Graduates Making a Difference," and in 2001 she was recognized by Metropolitan State and its Women's Commission as one of 30 women of vision and courage.

She has excelled in her career, demonstrated commitment to the community, and is a model of vision and courage, striving for social justice and equality for the Latino community.







"David enjoyed his job as vice chancellor of the Minnesota State College System (MSCS), but missed the vital interaction with students, staff, faculty and administrators. "The more David and Chancellor Mitau talked about the bold new concept for a nontraditional college in the Twin Cities, the more excited they became. When the MSCS Board appointed him founding president of Metropolitan State in 1971, he was thrilled," Arleene Sweet recalls.

Sweet's enthusiasm for the progressive new university was apparent from the beginning, Arleene explains. "David believed in the intelligence of men and women and their desire to achieve meaningful goals," she says. The new college provided an opportunity for many who had delayed their degrees because of work and family. Knowledge from previous courses and other learning experiences could be the basis for continuing education.

"The staff was so young and enthusiastic. David didn't just seek academic people, but talented practitioners. Above all, they were a team. It was that team spirit that made it all work," she stresses.

Sweet presided over Metropolitan State from 1971 to 1977.

## PROFILE FROM THE FORMATIVE YEARS

When Metropolitan State's first president, Dr. David Sweet, died 18 years ago, his wife Arleene faced both a great loss and an array of choices. True to form, Arleene Sweet, herself an avid lifelong learner, soon embarked on a new series of adventures.

President Sweet was deeply committed to his family. "David always gave me the drive and courage to know I was my own person," Arleene recalls. "He encouraged us as much as he did Metropolitan State's students and faculty.

He did that for many people during a very exciting and progressive time in the university's history," she adds.

After David's death, Arleene quickly dusted off her résumé and her networking skills. After meeting with the deputy commissioner of education in her native Missouri, she was offered a research associate job with the state of Missouri. After excelling in that position for twelve years, she moved on to Shenandoah University in Winchester, Va., where she now manages *Parent's Choice*, a national review of children's literature, videos, audio, music, software and parenting materials.

Arleene recalls providing advice and counsel to David. "He listened to me, often taking the opposite view, as was his way. Occasionally I would see that he had followed my advice. I used to say, 'David, if I don't tell you the truth, who will?' 'Everyone tells me the truth,' he'd say."

Arleene, an accomplished painter and silversmith with an art degree from Southwest Missouri State University, taught a beginning art class for Metropolitan State. It was challenging, she says, because in those days there were no easels, and satisfactory space was hard to find. Arleene crafted the first presidential medallion, which is still in use today, worn by the vice president for academic affairs at each commencement ceremony.

"Metropolitan State took a lot of energy, but David had a lot to give," Arleene says. She notes that, with all its recent growth and development, the university has retained its First College, offering an outlet for nontraditional, working students. "I know David would be pleased with the institution today," she concludes.
